Methodology

Aug. 10 (Bloomberg) -- The Bloomberg Politics Poll, conducted Aug. 5-8 for Bloomberg Politics by Selzer & Co. of Des Moines, IA, is based on interviews with 1,007 U.S. adults ages 18 or older.

Interviewers with Quantel Research contacted households with randomly selected landline and cell phone telephone numbers supplied by Survey Sampling International. Interviews were administered in English.

Percentages based on the full probability sample of 1,007 respondents may have a maximum margin of error of plus or minus 3.1 percentage points, and those based on the subsample of 749 likely voters in the 2016 general election may have a maximum margin of error of plus or minus 3.6 percentage points. This means that if this survey were repeated using the same questions and the same methodology, 19 times out of 20, the findings would not vary from the percentages shown here by more than plus or minus 3.1 percentage points for questions asked of the general population, plus or minus 3.6 percentage points for questions asked of likely voters. Results based on smaller samples of respondents—such as by gender or age—have a larger margin of error. Responses were weighted by age, race, and educational attainment to reflect the general population based on recent census data.

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
