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Paia Elementary School, sited on a campus with mountain and ocean views and a large open playground area, remains considerably intact. The two main concrete classroom buildings (designated Buildings A and B on the attached site plan) are sited at a right angle to each other and open to the sloped playground supervision area. Primary and special education are housed in Building B, a one story reinforced concrete building built in 1930, with four classrooms added in 1936. Other classrooms are housed in the main, two-story Building A which also houses offices, staff toilets, the health room and an assembly room. There are several wooden structures on the campus that were also built in the late 1920's-1930's, including a cafeteria constructed in 1936. Except for a wooden bus stop shelter, a small wooden storage cottage and a custodial cottage that closely resemble other wooden structures on the site, no new buildings have been added since 1936.

Main Building A

The two story main structure built in 1926, Building A, is the most dominant structure on the campus. It is a rectangular building with double loaded corridors and double doors at the ends of each corridor. Plans were prepared by William d'Esmond "and they call for a bright, airy and room building that is the last word in school construction."¹ Originally there were nineteen classrooms, 9 rooms measuring 25' x 26' and 10 rooms measuring 24' x 26' with a total of 7,936 square feet per floor and an overall dimension per floor of 133' x 59' x 8-10'.

The hip roofs are constructed with corrugated sheet metal with walls of class B construction, reinforced concrete, painted beige, with six engaged flat columns painted white which defines five equal spaces. All of the large classroom windows in this building have been replaced with wood jalousies. What appears to have once been small balconies on the two ends of the second floor, has become part of two fire escapes. Ramps have been added to the side entrances as well. These additions have not significantly altered the front appearance of the building. The original side doors and transom windows with a four wooden strip star pattern remain on this building.

The entrance from the front of the building is through a central porch which protrudes from the first floor and is several steps up from the ground. The interior wooden staircase to the right side of the entrance hall as one enters the building appears to be in

excellent condition and many 5-panel doors remain, although the interior transom windows have been removed and boarded.

Partition walls and ceiling are sheathed in plasterboard, molding is used at ceiling/wall intersections and floor/wall intersections. The 10 classrooms on the second floor remain intact with its 9'6" hallway. The 9 class rooms on the first floor have become the offices and an assembly room with two folding or accordion doors apparently removed, while the health room and toilets remain. One large class room on the first floor was also originally two rooms with the folding or accordion door apparently removed. The original maple floor appears to be in very good condition.

Classroom Building B

The one story primary grades building was constructed in 1930 with four rooms. In 1936 four more rooms, 2 on each side of the building were added. Today, eight classrooms remain along its double-loaded corridor, but the original central entry has been converted into a special education class with a toilet added.

The corrugated sheet metal roof is of similar proportion and slope as the main Building A and the front entrance is also through a central porch. The walls are of class B, reinforced concrete construction with the same beige coloring as the main building and white painted, engaged flat columns between four equal bays with a smaller, central entry.

Some of the double hung windows remain, but most have been replaced by wooden or glass jalousies. Sited on a slope, handicap accessibility is attained through the side entrance on the upper part of the site without much compromise to the integrity of the building.

The interior transom windows with the four wooden strip star pattern, the moldings for the wainscot, floor/wall and ceiling/wall intersections and the five panel doors remain, but a new wall and door on the hall side of the special education class has been added. One accordion door remains between rooms D-1 and D-2.

The areas of significance for these buildings relate to the developments of public education in Maui during the pre-war era and the architecture of Maui's public schools. It was the first all English speaking government school in Maui and the first school on Maui to build a housekeeping training cottage and teachers' cottages.

The original Paia School, at a different location, opened on January 17, 1881 with 20 pupils in a 28' x 40' structure that "looked like a dwelling house"² and was the first all English speaking government school on Maui. In 1909, a three story reinforced concrete building with eight classrooms and two large basement rooms used for the kitchen and dining rooms was built on a site deeded by the Maui Agricultural Company. The structure has since burned during a cane fire in 1963.

The first enrollment at this new site was between 150-200 students. Due to the increase in enrollment from 1914-1924, 14 more wooden classrooms were built, of which, only two remain. Several teachers' cottages were built during this time, but none remain today. Two were burned in 1918 and the remaining cottages were torn down in 1989 due to poor conditions. In the late 1920's to 30's, the school population increased to a high of 1,300 students with 43 teachers. This was about the time most of the existing buildings were erected, including the first model cottage built on Maui for housekeeping training built in 1928.

In 1936 the Holy Rosary Church opened its Catholic School taking away about 500 students. During the war the school population continued to decline as many people moved to Oahu to work at military positions. Later, the Sugar companies started phasing out the housing for laborers, so that today the enrollment has dropped considerably.

Constructed in a Classical Revival style popular during that period, the buildings were reflective of Maui's commitment to solid education with the use of permanent concrete structures. The large, nearly 10 acre lot donated by Maui Agricultural Company for the additional room of a playground and athletic park was indicative of "the broader vision that corporations [were] adopting toward the physical well being and happiness of their employees and their children."³
