The Practice Test may be used at home or at school for students to become familiar with the iLEAP test they will take in spring 2013. It can help students feel more relaxed when they take the actual test.

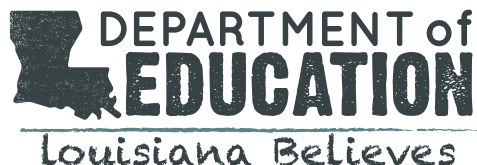

The mathematics test has three sessions to be taken separately:

- Session 1 (pages 3 to 16) includes 30 multiple-choice questions—a calculator may not be used.
 - Session 2 (pages 18 to 28) includes 20 multiple-choice questions—a calculator may be used.
 - Session 3 (pages 30 and 31) includes 2 constructed-response questions—a calculator may be used.
- ★ A Mathematics Reference Sheet, which students may use for all sessions, is located on page 34.
 - ★ Students respond to multiple-choice items using the Answer Sheets on pages 32 and 33 and constructed-response items using pages 30 and 31 of Session 3.
 - ★ The Answer Keys and Scoring Rubrics, used to score student responses, are located on pages 35 to 38.

When printing the PDF files for the three Math Sessions, be sure to set the *Page Scaling* drop-down menu on the Print screen to None, No Scaling, or Actual Size depending on the printer you are using. Otherwise measurement items may not be the correct size, which may impact student responses.

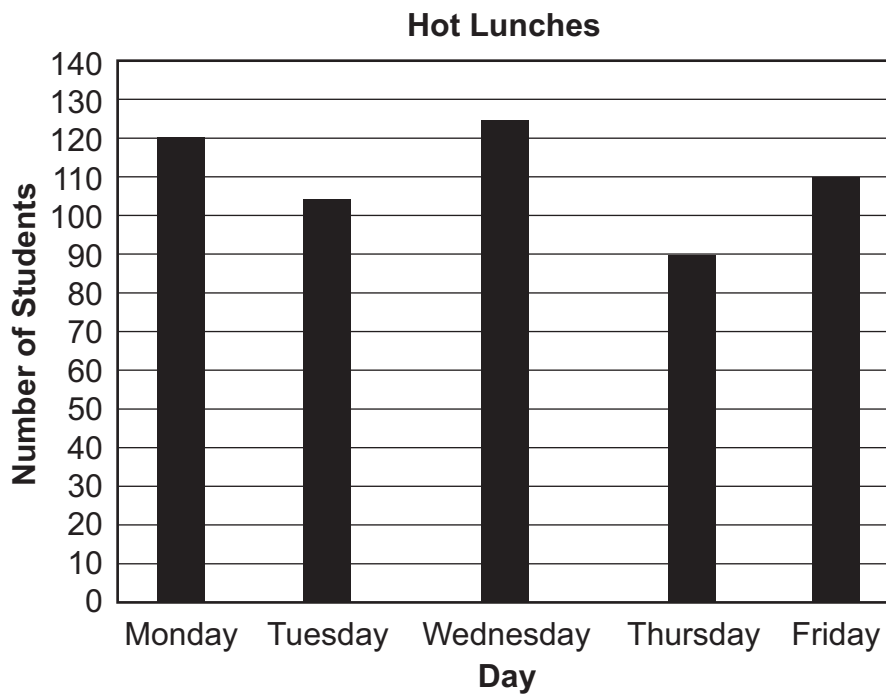

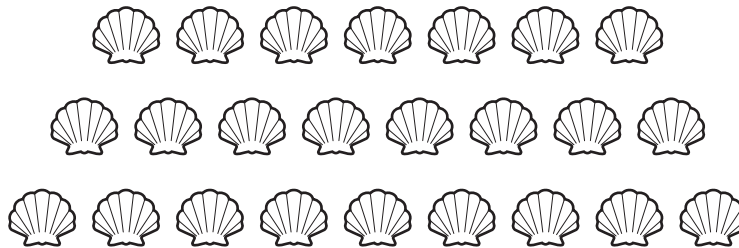

2	The student earns 2 points.
1	The student earns 1 point.
0	The student's response is incorrect, irrelevant to the skill or concept being measured, or blank.
Sample Answer:	
<p>A. The sides of each shape are the same length.</p> <p>B. </p>	
Points Assigned:	
<p>Part A: 1 point</p> <p>1 point for coming up with a classification that correctly describes a shared attribute of shapes A, C, D, and E that is not present in shape B (e.g., side lengths are the same, angle measures are the same, etc.)</p> <p>Part B: 1 point</p> <p>1 point for drawing any quadrilateral that does not fit the rule stated in part A (e.g., a trapezoid or a rectangle that is not a square [if side length congruence is the rule] or a rhombus that is not a square [if angle congruence is the rule])</p>	

Note: Scorers should follow along with the student's work throughout. If student makes an error in a previous part and subsequent answers are correct based on the earlier error, student should not be penalized again.

2	The student earns 2 points.
1	The student earns 1 point.
0	The student's response is incorrect, irrelevant to the skill or concept being measured, or blank.
Sample Answer:	
A. The student should circle 4 seashells in the picture.	
B. Ben found 24 seashells and $8 \times 3 = 24$. Since 8 is greater than 6, he can share with 8 people.	
Points Assigned:	
2 points for circling 4 seashells and for coming up with 8, 12, or 24 with a written explanation or for showing work.	
1 point for only circling 4 seashells in part A.	
OR	
Coming up with 8, 12, or 24 in part B.	
OR	
Showing understanding of the factors of 24, but does not meet the criteria of choosing one that is greater than six.
