2019-2020: A Year Like No Other

The 2019-2020 year was one like no other for PSD and the world. We began with activities ranging from students attending national conferences, purchasing a new property, Fall homecoming, and our 2nd Annual Golf Outing. Then on Friday, March 13, 2020, everything changed. As the Philadelphia school system and the city shut down, PSD quickly established safety protocols, online classrooms, and new ways to ensure that students and their families continued to receive critical services and information. The following timeline highlights just a few of this past year's successes, and the many ways our PSD community came together to ensure our students could continue to learn and grow in a safe and nurturing environment.

Summer 2019

- Extend School Year program- Theme: Space
- PSD purchased a new property, 156 West School House Lane, expanding the campus to 10 acres for additional activities and resources.
- Students attended Youth Empowerment Summit during National Black Deaf Advocates Biennial Conference in Oakland, CA.



Sept 2019

- Classes began.
- PSD hosted Annual Book Fair.
- Students attended leadership retreat hosted by Deaf Hearing Communication Centre, Inc. (DHCC) in Saginaw Children's Camp in Oxford, PA.
- Evon Black from Gallaudet University visited PSD to celebrate International Week of the Deaf and shared with students her life experience, wisdom, how proud she is as a Deaf person, and how important reading is to early childhood education and elementary school.



Oct 2019

- PSD hosted Homecoming and Community Day with both volleyball and soccer games. Alumni from PSD spanning 70 years (Classes 1948-2018) were in attendance.
- 2nd Annual Golf Outing held at Sandy Run Country Club.
- PSD received generous donation from Jeff Fitzgerald on behalf of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Council of Southeastern PA.
- Middle School students visited Pocono Environmental Education Center.



Nov 2019

- PSD's Transition Department coordinated a visit to Camden County College to explore college and career programs.
- Deaf Kids Code presented at Comcast's Headquarters, sharing their experience developing their own website.
- PSD received Conference of Educational Administrators of Schools and Programs for the Deaf (CEASD) accreditation for the first time, demonstrating its commitment to the highest standards of continuous school improvement.
- PSD exhibited and hosted PSD walk team PSD 2019 for Hearing Loss Association of America's Walk4Hearing at Philadelphia Navy Yard, earning funds for our Family Engagement Programs.
- PSD exhibits at PA Office of Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ODHH) Statewide Hearing Loss Expo with 60+ DHH resource agencies & services.



Dec 2019

- Comcast donated iPads with Internet Essentials® services to all PSD middle school and high school students. Comcast and PSD students attended the Flyers game that same day, where a video featuring PSD is shown on the jumbotron during the game!
- Students involved with Microsoft's Computer Science Education Week visit the Microsoft store at King of Prussia Mall, where they learn how to use code and watch Nadmionor Casiano, the first deaf woman with an Aeronautical Engineer Degree, via live-streaming at the Microsoft store.
- The PSD Robotics team attended the First Lego League at Chestnut Hill Academy, competing against 48 other teams!

- PSD participated in Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, with students participating in over 19 different projects across campus and in the community.
- Alex R. becomes the seventh PSD recipient of the prestigious Maguire Scholarship.

- PSD hosted ESDAA 88th Boys Basketball tournament and 42nd Cheerleading Competition.
- Domonic Gordine, PSD Alumni and National Association of the Deaf Youth Ambassador Special Guest Speaker for Black History Month.

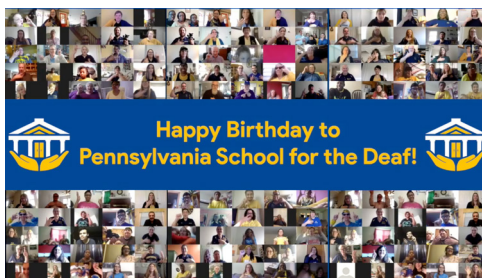


March 2020

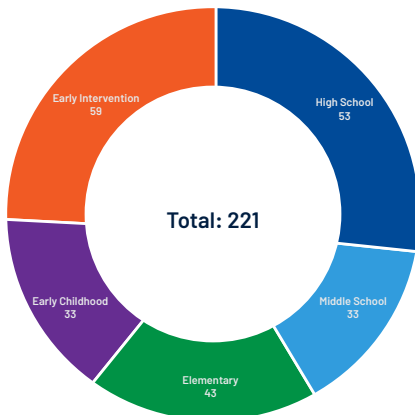

We welcome all students as valued members of our school community. We provide alternative programming for students with complex needs who require adaptations and support to meaningfully participate in all areas of academic and social life.

Early Intervention

PSD's Early Intervention Program partners with families and caregivers to support the development of the whole child. Trained professionals specializing in working with deaf/hard-of-hearing children visit families in the home and the community to support families' understanding of various communication opportunities, including American Sign Language and Spoken

English, their child's hearing levels and assistive technology. Our specialized team develops a plan with the family that recognizes each child's individual needs and utilizes strategies to optimize their child's communication development.

Early Childhood

Our Early Childhood Center offers several programs including pre-kindergarten and preschool classes for children three to five years of age. At its core, these programs promote the acuity of learning skills to ensure preparation for life-long learning. This includes aligning curriculum and instruction with Pennsylvania State standards. Our goal for early childhood education is to prepare children for continued learning and readiness in school-age programs. Additionally, our Deaf/Hard of Hearing students have a unique opportunity to interact with their same age hearing peers through our Community Preschool Program.

Elementary, Middle School, High School

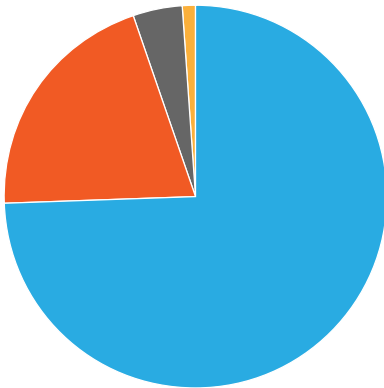
As children transition from early childhood into elementary school, our goal is to help them develop the necessary skills and independence that they will need throughout the rest of their educational journey. PSD provides a strong academic start for our elementary students which will set them off on the right path. Students also have the opportunity to develop social-emotional skills through natural times during the day like recess and lunch time, as well as throughout the week in various "special" classes, such as Physical Education/Health and Art.

Moving on to our Middle School department, students begin to transition to different classrooms for core academic learning. The adjustment to working with a variety of teachers helps increase and support work habits to prepare students for high school and beyond. These years of consistency, high expectations, and empowerment are the key for our middle school students to thrive both personally and academically.

PSD's High School department serves students Freshman through Senior years while providing ongoing educational and job readiness support for students who exercise the option to stay at PSD through the age of twenty-one. The High School Department continues to provide core academic courses required to earn a diploma while building upon the social, emotional and practical skills developed in the earlier grades.

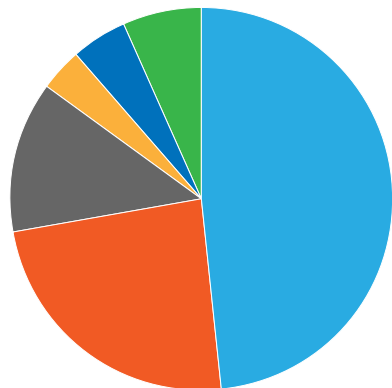
