The Street, Now and Then

The first year of Wilson has been an eventful one for Wall street. Starting with his election, or even before, the market began to go down. The President-elect, so it seemed to the street, was unfortunate in some of his utterances, and this did not reassure the financial interests. When he took office various factors conspired to further the general belief of the street that he was a radical of the first water, but most of these factors, it turned out, were despite the President, rather than because of him. The climax, as everyone remembers, came last June, and at that time the stock market was dangerously near the panic level of 1907. But then the turn came. Since then, with the usual reactions, the trend has been generally upward, and while the market average is still some six points below what it was on March 4, 1913, the tone is steadily improving, whether quoted values do or not. For the immediate future there are several opinions—and many capable judges believe that prices will have to have at least one more break before the real upturn can come—but for the long pull sentiment is almost universally bullish. President Wilson still has three years before him and possibly seven, and nobody doubts for a moment that by the end of his incumbency not only the stock market, but the whole country, will be in vastly better condition than it has been or is—Brooklyn Eagle.

ATHLETIC LEAGUE

The Public School League for Promotion of Athletic Sports Arranges Baseball Schedule for Season of 1914 (Final Revision.)

At a meeting of the Cape May County High School Athletic League, operating under the auspices of the Supervisors' and Principals' Association, held at Middle Township high school, the baseball schedule for the coming spring for the high school teams, was prepared and the day selected for the annual county field sports. The following rules were also formulated for the government of entries for the latter:

- 1. Freshmen must have at least 18 credits at the end of the first year to be eligible for entry for any of the events.
2. Sophomores must have at least 31 credits to be eligible for entry.
3. Juniors must have at least 49 credits to be eligible for entry.
4. The events of 1913-1914 will include a Freshman relay race and a Sophomore relay race.
5. The Standing high jump and the baseball throw will not be included.

The County High School Baseball League includes to date teams from the following high schools: Upper Township high school, Woodbine high school, Middle Township high school, Cape May high school, Wildwood high school, Ocean City high school.

High schools desiring to take part in the annual field events are required to enter a team in the baseball league. The schedule as arranged to date, follows:

- March 28th—Upper and Woodbine at Tuckahoe, Middle and Cape May, at Cape May.
April 4th—Upper and Wildwood, at Wildwood; Woodbine and Cape May, at Cape May; Middle and Ocean City, at Court House.
April 10th—Upper and Cape May, at Tuckahoe; Woodbine and Wildwood, at Woodbine.
April 11—Upper and Wildwood, at Tuckahoe; Middle and Ocean City, at Ocean City.
April 15th—Upper and Woodbine, at Woodbine; Wildwood and Ocean City, at Ocean City.
April 18th—Middle and Wildwood, at Wildwood; Cape May and Ocean City, at Cape May.
April 22d—Middle and Cape May at Court House.
April 25th—Woodbine and Middle, at Court House; Wildwood and Cape May, at Cape May; Ocean City and Upper, at Ocean City.
April 29th—Middle and Wildwood, at Court House; Cape May and Woodbine, at Woodbine; Upper and Ocean City, at Tuckahoe.
May 2d—Upper and Middle, at Tuckahoe; Woodbine and Wildwood, at Wildwood; Cape May and Ocean City, at Ocean City.
May 9th—Upper and Middle, at Court House; Cape May and Wildwood, at Wildwood; Ocean City and Woodbine, at Woodbine.
May 16th—Track meet for pupils of high and grammar schools.
May 23d—Upper and Cape May, at Cape May; Woodbine and Court House, at Woodbine; Wildwood and Ocean City, at Wildwood.
May 30th—Woodbine and Ocean City, at Woodbine.
N. B.—Rules 1, 2 and 3, affect the year following a failure to secure the minimum of credits named.

New License Bill Introduced

Below is text of Assembly bill, No. 670, introduced by Mr. Hammond, of Mercer County. This bill is of special interest to people of rural districts and small municipalities: "That in addition to the requirements of law now applicable there to every applicant to the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas of the various counties of this State for a license to sell spirituous, vinous, malt, brewed or other intoxicating liquor shall hereafter be required to publish his intention to make such application at least three times in a newspaper published in the municipality where said proposed licensed place is located, if any such paper there be, or, if not, in a newspaper published in the county seat of said county, if any paper be there published, otherwise to be published in a paper having a general circulation in the municipality where said proposed licensed place is located. This notice shall clearly set forth the name of the applicant, the location of the proposed licensed place, the time when and the place where said application for license shall be made, and the names and post-office addresses of the citizens recommending the said application. Said notice shall be published the first time at least four weeks, and the last time at least one week before the opening day of the term of the court to which said application is to be made, and no such application shall be granted by the court unless due proof of such publication shall be filed with the clerk of the court on or before the said opening day of the term. The provisions of this act shall also equally apply to all applications for renewals or transfers of any such license, and all acts, or parts of acts, inconsistent with the provisions of this act shall be and the same hereby are repealed. This act shall take effect immediately."
