SCREEN SHOP

Give 'Em Hell, Harry is an experience. Hardly what is now known as a "film experience" these days, but an experience using film, nevertheless. For Give 'Em Hell, Harry is not a creation from the filmmaker's dictionary of effects, but the special magic of stage performance which uses celluloid as its reporter.

Give 'Em Hell, Harry is a one-man show starring James Whitmore as former President Harry Truman, performed before a live-audience non-stop. What you see on your local movie screen is simply the product of placing cameras in the theater and capturing the performance exactly as it occurred onstage. I say "simply" only as it refers to the filmmaker. For, while the men behind the cameras would have an easy night of it, and the film editors weren't needed at all, the man on whose shoulders the burden of "creation" would come to rest faced an awesome task. And defeated it handily.

You probably recall that Oh, Calcutta, the film, was also a stage production which only employed film to record its presence. But there was no unique creation there, except perhaps to those titillated few who consider mere nudity arty. But Give 'Em Hell, Harry is quite a bird of a different sort. The eagle, the sparrow and the rooster all rolled into one.

James Whitmore's performance in Give 'Em Hell, Harry will probably reward Mr. Whitmore with the highest compliment the stage can bestow total oblivion. To be overlooked in a performance because you're bad is the supreme degradation; but to be over-

looked because you're so good is a blessing for art, although not necessarily the artist. For the first time in a long time, the old cliche about so-and-so actor BEING so-and-so character is true. James Whitmore IS Harry Truman. His performance demonstrates the absurd gall of the advertising men who once tried to convince us that Barbra WAS Fanny Brice or Diana Ross WAS Mahogany, Art, ultimately, levels all imposters.

The ease with which Whitman moves from Harry Truman the county commissioner to Harry Truman the Senator to Harry Truman the President, all the while interlaced with Harry Truman the father and Harry Truman the husband is spellbinding. This is no actor in a role we watch, but the voveuristic condensation of a man's life.


A man who, as President of the United States, wrote a personally scathing letter to the Washington Post drama critic for lambasting his daughter's stage performance, while remarking at the conclusion. "I was a father before I became President, and after I've left this job, I'll go back to being a father again. First things first."

A man who recalls that Winston Churchill, after being told by the pompous Lady Astor that he had had a bit too much to drink replied, "You're right, Lady Astor, I am drunk. But your face is very ugly. But in the morning when I wake up. I'll be sober. And no one can deny it."

Whitmore also allows us to see the firing of General Douglas McArthur by Truman, as well as a vicious attack on the Klan and Senator Joseph McCarthy. And we shall not overlook Truman's delightful, yet stern reference to Richard Nixon as a "No good, lying, general son-of-a-bitch." Truman knew how to use words, and Whitmore provides him the vocal chords.


The magic aura never breaks. Even at the conclusion of the performance, it is not James Whitmore the actor who


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


Dear Eve.






