I was born November 1, 1955, of humble origins, which improved and disproved alternately as life continued. supposed to happen to me that day, and wondering what in the first place was I doing there.

A couple of days ago I chanced to be in a Farrell's Ice Cream Parlour Restaurant where absolutely dozens of birthday parties were in progress simultaneously. I must confess that I have a fixation on birthdays. It occurred to me that Farrell's should perhaps be complimented on their unique approach to fast food catering and making the co-sequent celebration of a hundred events under one roof possible. At a table of close proximity to mine was commencing a double birthday ice cream party, and I was watching one of the little boys whose birthday it was. He was four years old, it was announced. It is, I am sure, a fact that after the age of twenty people reflect on how far they have made it and how far they have to go, in the way of time left; especially on their birthdays. The kid was very pretty with dark brown hair and the biggest blue eyes I have ever seen. He sat next to his mother, or a woman I presumed to be his mother. He was tapping his open mouth with the back of a spoon and staring off across the dining room with an expression which I can best describe as being of awe, amazement, wonder, and perplexity. If I could actually tell what he was thinking, I would bet that he: thought the whole thing was pleasant but didn't really understand what it was about.



"TIDAL WAVE"

Everybody knows enough about the movie industry to know that **Tidal Wave** is going to be a terrible film...even before you see it.

We have all become painfully accustomed to the "spin-off" principle. Or in this case, the "rip-off" principle. A movie comes out and it becomes a hit. So, dozens of producers in all parts of the world decide to capitalize on the hit movie by making their own copy of it. In this case it's the disaster film craze.

Producer-director Irwin Allen made a relatively low-budget film called the Posioden Adventure. It made a lot of money in a very short time and the race was on. Next, came Earthquake and, then, Towering Inferno. They were respectable efforts and it wouldn't have been so bad if the whole trend had stopped there. But now, the really low-budget producers are making copies of the high-budget copies. And you know, even before you buy your ticket, that this spells disaster, for the audience.

Watching the ads on television, you know Tidal Wave is going to be a loser. It looks cheap and rough. But even so, you end up buying a ticket because you're curious. You want to know just how terrible it can be. And secondly. you want to know what Lorne Green is doing in it. You know you're going to be ripped-off, but you have a morbid interest in knowing how they're going to do it. Also, you wonder why you never heard anything about the making of the film. It seemed to pop up from nowhere, with no advance publicity or pre-release stories concerning its filming.

But you only have to see the first three minutes of the film and it becomes abundantly clear what has happened. And it's the biggest con artist shenanigan of recent time.

The first thing that appears on the screen are the words. "Lorne Green In." The second thing you see are the words "Tidal Wave." And then, the opening titles for all the other actors in the film, and they're all Japanese names! The truth is obvious. This is a Japanese film made for Japanese audiences. Lorne Green wasn't even in the original film. They've just taken the completed Japanese film and tacked the words "Lorne Green In" on the opening titles. Then, they came to L.A. and shot a few scenes with Lorne Green and inserted them in the already-completed film. It's like taking a book that's been published and then inserting a couple of mimeographed pages. The Lorne Green parts aren't even important to the story. They were just thrown in to sell this Japanese film to American audiences. For shame!

The plot is very simple. The earth under the nation of Japan crumbles and the entire island sinks into the sea. The advertisements say that the "world's greatest cities are in danger." But take my word for it, all the "greatest cities" they're talking about are in Japan. DOCTORS BAG

Because they are more sexually knowledgable and liberal, members of the gay community, as a whole, tend to have a greater understanding of syphilis than do their heterosexual counterparts.

If you ask the average homosexual about syphilis, he will tell you it is a veneral disease spread through sexual contact. He knows that it is usually recognized by a sore or lesion on the penis. Many are aware that the sore is not painful and will eventually go away, although that person will still have the disease, and a blood test is the only way to tell for sure it you have it.

The homosexual that knows that much about syphilis is far ahead of his heterosexual counterpart. But even knowing that much is not enough. Let's review some of the basic facts, especially in light of recent discoveries.

A person can only get syphilis by coming into direct contact with a syphilis sore of another person. But that contact can occur on any part of the body. Once you have contact with a syphilis sore, the part of your body making contact will itself erupt into a syphilis sore, in most cases. But not all.

There are many things to remember. First, you may never see a syphilis sore on you own body. If one of your sexual partners had a sore on his penis and engaged in anal intercourse with you, your syphilis sore would occur inside your anus. Secondly, and this is most important, some people have syphilis and never show any sores anywhere.

In most cases, the syphilis sore or chancre will be seen on your body from three to four weeks after you came into contact with the disease. Although the period could vary from as few as ten days to as many as 90. But like I said, you might be one of those people who shows no signs of primary syphilis on your skin.

But even if you are one of those persons who has syphilis, but has no outward signs of the disease, make no mistake in thinking the disease is not attacking all parts of your body. It is, and it can be a killer.

Syphilis will attack in any form and in any part of the body it can. Women who have syphilis at the time they give birth to their children produce children whose eyes are filled with syphillitic infections. Many people today are blind for their entire lives simple because the mother did not get a syphilis blood test before childbirth.

And that is my advice to you. Get a blood test. Thre are three stages to syphilis: primary, secondary and latent. The primary stage is all we have talked about in this installment. We will discuss the secondary and latent stages next time. But don't put off your blood test. Not all syphilis causes a sore you can see, in the primary stage. Some people don't get sores at all. Ever. They just die. So, get your blood test. Go to your city health department if necessary. They're generally courteous and the test is free. Do it today. It'll make reading next week's information on syphilis a lot easier.




