
Over in San Antonio, the Penny Pub had their grand opening, complete with flashing lights and a bubble machine. A one, and a two, and . . .


"Not us! With him! The body! What are we going to do with the

"No."


"Then what makes you think we're in for a rough day?"


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

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
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Gay News Briefs

Gay rights organizations around the country are currently trying to assess the future impact of the recent Supreme Court action which turned a cold shoulder to legal efforts to allow homosexuals protection from punishment for sexual acts committed in the privacy of the home between consenting adults. Most agree that the March 29th ruling on the issue will not be the last word on the matter, but it is also evident that a pessimism has infected future legal efforts. The sought after legal victories now seem far off, indeed.

Dr. Bruce Voeller, executive director of the National Gay Task Force, issued a statement which seems to characterize the situation.

"From this decision it becomes clear that in the Court's view, the tempo of the times has not yet moved along so that both heterosexuals and homosexuals can avoid being criminalized by laws forbidding forms of private sexual behavior between consenting adults commonly practiced by 80% of our population. Since the so-called 'sodomy' laws are commonly associated with homosexuality, we can assume that bigotry has temporarily won out over constitutional equality. We are certain that the decision will not stand, and that the right of human beings to privacy and control of their own bodies will be established as the right of all

Americans."

"It is nonetheless necessary to point out that the United States is the only nation in the Americas and Western Europe which still has such oppressive laws on the books, and that the Court's ruling is particularly surprising in view of the opposition to such laws by major organizations including the American Bar Association, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association and the National Council of Churches." Dr. Voeller concluded.

Five members of Houston's Gay Political Caucus were among 64 leaders of the gay liberation movement that met on March 27th at Chicago's Hyatt O'Hare Hotel. The purpose of the conference was the establishment of a federal lobby in Washington, D.C., to push for broad-ranging legislation to benefit gay people.

The lobby will direct its efforts toward such areas as restrictive immigration and naturalization policies, laws discriminatory to the single taxpayer, and a federal bill now pending that expands all existing federal civil rights legislation to include "sexual or affectional preference."

The keynote speaker was Gary Aldridge, a gay aide to Senator Alan Cranston. The conference was organized by David Goodstein, publisher of The Advocate.

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
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
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
