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SOUTHWESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

In 1920, eight men representing six colleges from the state of Texas met to discuss collegiate athletics and the many challenges that face their respective institutions.

By the time the session in Houston had concluded, they had founded an athletic league that went on to become one of the leading sports associations in the world of collegiate athletics, the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

The Southwestern Athletic Conference's current members include; Alabama A&M University (Huntsville, Ala.), Alabama State University (Montgomery, Ala.), Alcorn State University (Alcorn State, Miss.), Grambling State University (Grambling, La.), Jackson State University (Jackson, Miss.), Mississippi Valley State University (Itta Bena, Miss.), Prairie View A&M University (Prairie View, Texas), Southern University and A&M College (Baton Rouge, La.), Texas Southern University (Houston, Texas) and the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (Pine Bluff, Ark.).

Former members of the SWAC include Bishop College (1920-56), Paul Quinn College (1920-29), Sam Houston College (1920-59), Texas College (1920-68), Wiley College (1920-68), Langston University (1931-57) and Arkansas AM&N (1936-70).

The founding fathers of the original "Super Six" were C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn College, E.B. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M College, D.C. Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College.

Paul Quinn became the first of the original members to withdraw from the league when it did so in 1929. When Langston University of Oklahoma was admitted into the conference two years later, it began the migration of state-supported institutions into the SWAC. Southern University entered the ranks in 1934, followed by Arkansas AM&N in 1936 and Texas Southern in 1954.

Rapid growth in enrollment of the state-supported schools made it difficult for the church-supported schools to finance their athletics programs and one by one they fell victim to the growing prowess of the tax-supported colleges.

Bishop withdrew from the conference in 1956, Langston in 1957 and Sam Houston in 1959, one year after the admittance of two more state-supported schools – Grambling College and Jackson College.

The enter-exit cycle continued in 1961 when Texas College withdrew, followed by the admittance of Alcorn A&M in 1962.

Wiley left in 1968, the same year Mississippi Valley State entered. Arkansas AM&N exited in 1970 and Alabama State entered in 1982. Arkansas-Pine Bluff (formerly Arkansas AM&N) rejoined the SWAC on July 1, 1997, regaining full-member status one year later. Alabama A&M became the conference's tenth member when it became a full member in Sept., 1999 after a one year period as an affiliate SWAC member.

Today, the SWAC ranks among the elite in the nation in terms of alumni playing with professional sports teams, particularly in the sport of football. On the gridiron, the conference has been the biggest draw on the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level. SWAC home attendance has led FCS in home attendance for 23 consecutive years the I FCS division has been in existence. In fact, in 1994, the SWAC fell just 40,000 fans short of becoming the first non-Division I-A conference to attract one million fans to its home games.

Current men's championship competition offered by the SWAC includes baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field and tennis. Women's competition is offered in the sports of basketball, bowling, cross country, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field, soccer, tennis and volleyball.

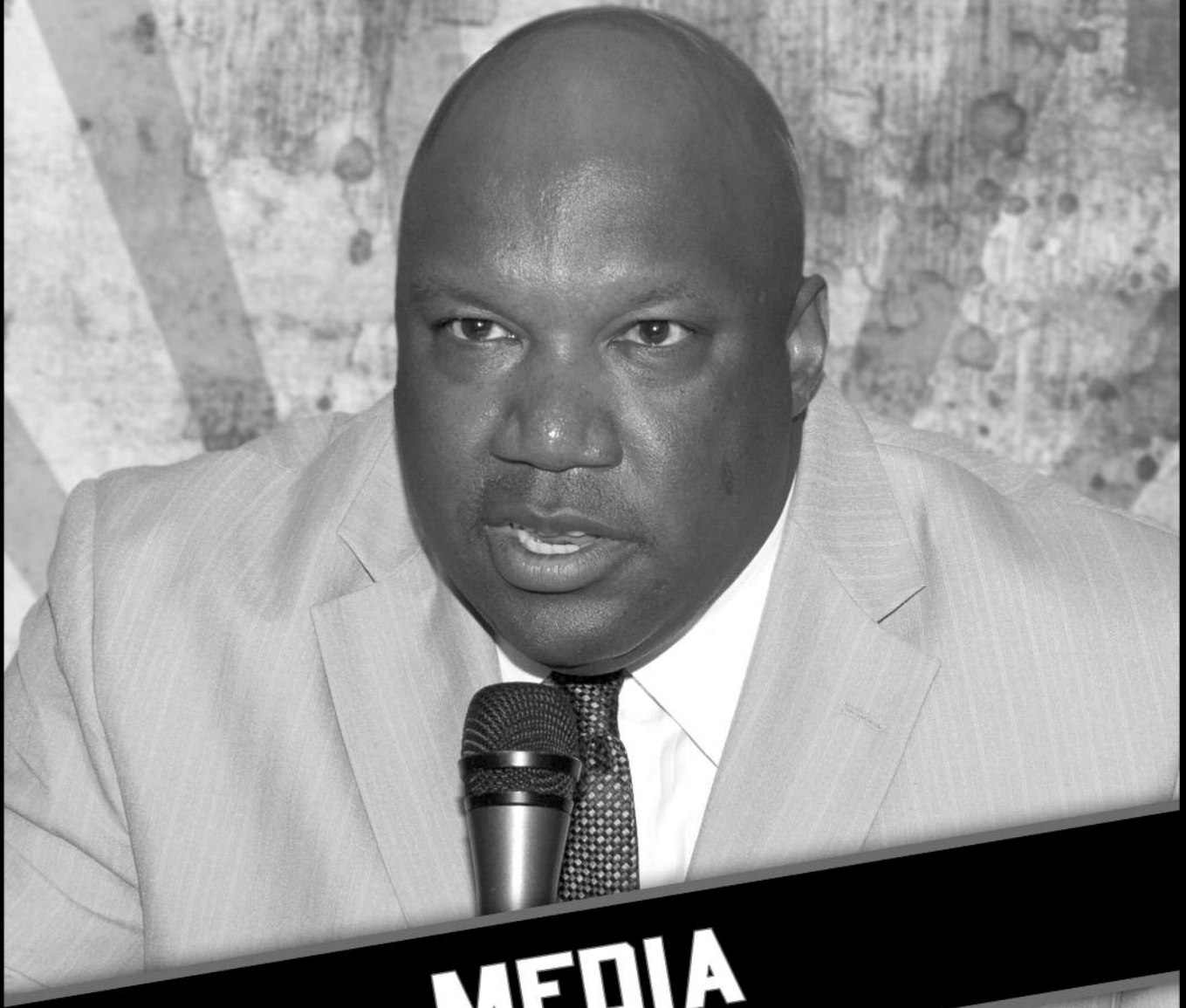

The following is a list of policies and procedures that are in place for the season. Please contact the Prairie View A&M Office Of Sports Information with any questions or concerns.



PRAIRIE VIEW A&M OFFICE OF SPORTS INFORMATION

The Prairie View A&M Office Of Sports Information is located in the Department of Athletics building located in front of Blackshear Field at the corner of T.R. Soloman at O.J. Thomas Streets on the campus of Prairie View A&M University. The main numbers are 936-261-9106 or 9140.

SEASON CREDENTIALS

Working media and photographer credentials for Prairie View's 2011 home and neutral site games against Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Mississippi Valley, Jackson State and Alabama A&M will be handled by the Prairie View A&M Sports Information Office.

Requests should be made in writing by sports editors or sports directors of accredited media outlets on company letterhead. Requests should be made as early as possible and should be limited to working media only.

For the annual State Fair (Dallas) and

Shreveport (Louisiana) Classics, requests made within three days of the game may not be considered and for contests at Blackshear Field, requests made within two days of the game may not be considered.

Credentials will be mailed to the requesting individual or organization if time permits or sent to the visiting school's sports information director for distribution. Credentials can also be picked up at the press box will-call window at the William Nicks Building (The Baby Dome).

SIDELINES

Prairie View A&M follows guidelines set forth by the NCAA Public Relations Committee, the NCAA Football Rules Committee, the American Football Coaches Association and the National Press Photographers Association. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines and must have credentials visible at all times. In an effort to insure the best possible working conditions for media photographers, uniformed security personnel will be patrolling the sidelines. Anyone holding a media pass who is not actively involved in coverage of the game will be escorted from the sideline. Similar procedures will be in effect in the press box.

BLACKSHEAR FIELD PRESS BOX

The Blackshear Field Press Box opens two

hours prior to game time. The working press box is located in the center of the first floor, while the Sports Information, home radio and coaches booths are at the far ends. Official team videographers will only be allowed to access the second floor of the Blackshear Field Press Box. Media credentials are required for admittance to the press box. Game notes, media guides and programs are provided prior to the game. Play-by-play game accounts will be distributed at the conclusion of each quarter with abbreviated statistics at the end of each half. A full booklet containing play-by-play and stats are provided after the game. Player features and other important information will be forwarded throughout the season on a regular basis.

VIDEO

Videographers are welcome to shoot from the broadcast level of Blackshear Field Press Box (2nd level) or on the sidelines. Due to limited space in the Blackshear Field Press Box, shooting areas for each game are designated only for official videographers of the teams in play.

PRACTICE COVERAGE

All Prairie View A&M football practices are open to the media and public. As a general rule, video and still photographers may shoot the entire pre-practice (stretching period) and the first 20 minutes of actual practice time. At no time should photographers shoot from the end zone. A member of the Sports Information staff will be on hand at every practice to assist the media.

ADDITIONAL INTERVIEWS

In addition to Monday's media teleconference, Prairie View A&M student-athletes (Tue., Wed.) and coaches (Tue., Wed., Thu.) will be available for in-person

or phone interviews before practice. Requests should be directed to Ryan McGinty. All interview requests must be coordinated through the Sports Information Office with at least one day advance notice. Student-athlete's phone numbers will not be given out. Coaches and student-athletes are not available for interviews the day before a game or on game day unless arrangements are made in advance.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Prairie View A&M coach Heishma Northern and requested players will be available for interviews immediately following the game at a prearranged location on the football field or in the Department of Athletics Office. Prairie View A&M's locker room will remain closed following games. Prairie View A&M University is committed to a policy of equal access for both male and female reporters and photographers. The visiting SID will determine the best site and establish interview policies for their coaches and players.

VISITING RADIO INFORMATION

The official radio broadcast network for the visiting team must be designated in

writing by the opposing team SID. For information on radio lines, contact the Prairie View A&M Sports Information Office at 936/261-9106.

WEEKLY SWAC TELECONFERENCE

In conjunction with the Southwestern Athletic Conference, Prairie View A&M head coach Heishma Northern will participate in the league's weekly teleconference. The teleconferences will be conducted each Monday from Aug. 29 until Nov. 14 from 10 a.m. until noon CT. Northern's scheduled time is 11:20 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. CT each Monday. Media representatives wishing to participate in the teleconference should contact the league communications staff for further details. A replay of the briefing will be available later that afternoon.

DIRECTIONS TO BLACKSHEAR FIELD

Blackshear Field is located off T.R. Soloman Street, directly behind the William Nicks Building (The Baby Dome).

FROM AUSTIN (Eastbound on Hwy 290): Take Hwy. 290 east toward Houston. Exit Prairie View / FM 1098 and turn left at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM BATON ROUGE (Westbound On Hwy. 290): Take I-10 west to Houston. Take I-610 North to Hwy. 290 west toward Austin. Exit Prairie View/FM 1098 and then turn right at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM DALLAS: Take I-35 south to Waco, then turn left (east) onto Hwy. 6 to Hempstead. Exit Hwy. 290 east/Hwy. 6 toward Houston. Go approximately 5 miles on Hwy. 290, and then exit Prairie View / FM 1098. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM DALLAS: Take I-45 south toward Houston. Exit Hwy. 75 south in Madisonville and then take Hwy. 90 west to Navasota. In Navasota take Hwy. 6 east (left turn) onto Hwy. 6 to Hempstead. Exit Hwy. 290 east/Hwy. 6 toward Houston. Go approximately five miles on Hwy. 290, and then exit Prairie View / FM 1098. Turn left at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM HOUSTON (Bush Intercontinental Airport): Take John F. Kennedy Boulevard south (going toward I-45) to Beltway 8 west ramp. Stay on Beltway 8 west, it becomes the Sam Houston Toll-way (you will have to pay toll road fare). From the Sam Houston Tollway, exit Hwy. 290 west toward Austin. Go approximately 30 miles on Hwy. 290, and then exit Prairie View/FM 1098. Turn right at the light onto University Drive. University Drive will run to the campus.

FROM HOUSTON (Hobby Airport): Take Broadway to I-45 north to I-10 west to I-610 north to Hwy. 290 north. Take the Prairie View / FM 1098 exit and turn right at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM SAN ANTONIO: Take I-10 east toward Houston. In Sealy take Hwy. 36 east (left) to Bellville and then take Hwy. 159 north to Hempstead. In Hempstead make a right at Austin Street (should be the first stop sign). Make a left on Business 290 (first traffic light), and then take Hwy. 290 east toward Houston (right turn after passing old Lawrence Marshall Dealerships). Go approximately five miles and exit Prairie View / FM 1098 then turn left at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM SHREVEPORT: Take I-20 west and then exit Hwy. 79 south. Take Hwy. 79 south toward Carthage, Texas and then take Hwy. 59 south toward Houston. In Cleveland take Hwy. 105 west to Conroe, and then take I-45 south to FM 1488. Continue on FM 1488 thru Magnolia to FM 1098. Stay straight onto FM 1098 (FM 1488 will turn right, Do Not Turn). Make a left at the traffic light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

FROM VICTORIA: Take Hwy. 59 north toward Houston. Exit Hwy. 71 north in El Campo (turn left onto Hwy. 71). Take Hwy. 71 north to I-10 east in Columbus to Sealy. In Sealy take Hwy. 36 east (turn left onto Hwy. 36) to Bellville and then take Hwy. 159 north to Hempstead. In Hempstead make a right at Austin Street (should be the first stop sign). Make a left on Business 290 (first traffic light), and then take Hwy. 290 east toward Houston (right turn after passing the old Lawrence Marshall Dealerships). Go approximately five miles and exit Prairie View / FM 1098 then turn left at the light onto University Drive. Turn left on T.R. Soloman Street. Stadium is directly ahead.

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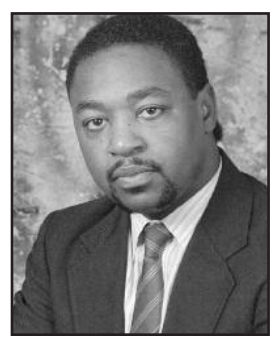

He has been at the microphone for several history-making events most notably Prairie View's historic 2009 SWAC Football Championship season, three consecutive winning football seasons (2007-09) and the Prairie View A&M Lady Panthers' three-straight SWAC Championships and three NCAA Tournament appearances. In addition, he hosts the weekly one-hour live call-in "Coach Heishma Northern Show" heard live on KNTH 1070 AM during football season.

Prior to his arrival on "The Hill", Moon did sports broadcasting (football and basketball) for Texas Southern University for 14 years. Additionally, the veteran award-winning journalist has parlayed his experience as host of several boxing shows on syndicated television, hosted several coaches shows on both TV and radio, and has served as Sports Editor for several Houston area news publications.

RADIO HOME OF THE PANTHERS



Panther fans will once again be able to follow every minute of Prairie View A&M football this season on KPVM 91.3 FM in Prairie View, Texas.

KPVM is a non-commercial, listener-supported, public radio station licensed to Prairie View A&M University, in Prairie View, Texas. KPVM serves Prairie View, as well as a seven-county coverage area that includes Waller, Austin, Grimes, Montgomery, Washington, Fort Bend and Harris Counties. This coverage allows KPVM the potential of being heard by nearly 200,000 listeners, as well as additional coverage online through our internet broadcasts. Recently, the station increased its wattage to over 30,000 watts.

NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

PANTHERS IN THE MEDIA

Thanks to lofty national rankings, historic individual performances, a SWAC Championship and four consecutive winning seasons, the national spotlight has begun to shine on Prairie View A&M like never before.

In 2010, the Panthers opened the season nationally ranked amongst Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) teams. Prairie View A&M had the nation's leader in interceptions in addition to sending two players to the NFL via free agent contracts. Once again, the Panthers shined on national TV as they finished 2-1 with games on ESPNU and COX-Sports TV.

In 2009, PVAMU cracked The Sports Network's Top 15 for the first time ever and finished second in the Sheridan Broadcast Network Poll. The regular season was followed by several players earning All-Americans honors and featured the nation's top passer in quarterback K.J. Black and Eddie Robinson Award Winner Henry Frazier III.

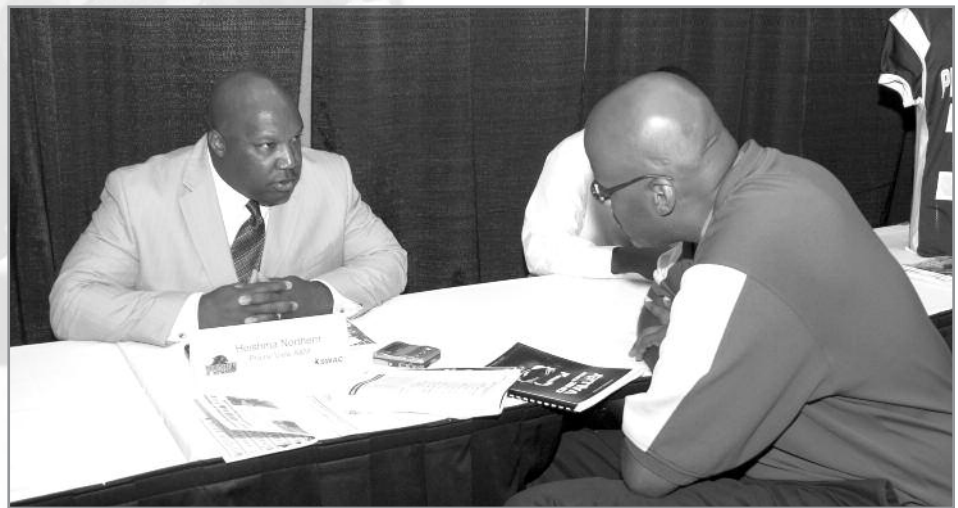
And along the way, the Panthers became even more popular with television executives. Prairie View A&M closed the 2009 season with three contests on the ESPN family of networks and finished undefeated for the second straight year.

Over the last seven seasons, 20 Panther games have been televised, including 17 games that were viewed by a national audience.

At press time, the 2011 Panthers were already booked for several television appearances, including a rare ESPN game at Orlando, Fla. in September.

Since 2000, Prairie View A&M football has made appearances on ESPN, ESPNU, Fox College Sports, Major Broadcast Cable, Fox Sports West, Cox Sports Network (Louisiana) and College Sports Television (CSTV, which was renamed CBS College Sports in 2008). A new era began in the fall of 2005 as ESPNU became the primary television partner for the Southwestern Athletic Conference, which forged a multi-year agreement that gave the fast-growing cable network rights to football and men's basketball, plus coverage for all other league sports. This fall, several Panther football games will be available nationally on the ESPN family of networks. Recently picked up

by Comcast Corporation along with its broadband partner ESPN360.com, ESPNU will have more than 46 million subscribers and ESPN360.com will be available to nearly 41 million homes, a majority of broadband homes in America.

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LABOR DAY CLASSIC

The annual Labor Day Classic enters its 27th year and features Southwestern Athletic Conference rivals Prairie View A&M University and Texas Southern University. Outside of the annual gridiron match-up between both institutions, the classic has also become an anticipated event as bragging rights are on the line for families, the marching bands and cheerleaders on Labor Day Weekend.

Moved to the beginning of the football season in 1985, the Labor Day Classic has had its share of memorable moments over the years as the contest has been played in several stadiums across the Houston area and featured a colorful bunch of players and coaches.

The first-ever Labor Day Classic was played in the Astrodome during the 1985 campaign and featured current TSU head coach Johnnie Cole throwing two touchdowns en route to Texas Southern capturing a 19-7 victory over the Panthers. Over 25,000 fans were present to witness the victory and the birth of Houston's most successful rivalry.

In 1986, Texas Southern claimed a 2-0 margin in the series as the Tigers staged a memorable comeback in the second half to defeat Prairie View on Labor Day night at the Astrodome. One year later, TSU once again came out on top as 19,500 fans made the trek to Robertson Stadium on the campus of the University of Houston in a 30-21 win.

Prairie View A&M made series history in 1988 as the Haney Catchings-led Panthers used a 23-yard field goal by Jorge Medina with 1:17 left to claim its first-ever win at Robertson Stadium by a score of 13-10. However, the excitement was short-lived as one year later, new TSU head coach Walter Highsmith arrived in Houston and dismantled the Panthers 45-7.

Beginning in 1990, the classic featured several new faces due to the disbanding of Prairie View A&M's football program. Texas Southern played host to Hampton University in 1990 and walked out of Robertson Stadium with a 28-16 victory. The following year, NAIA power Central State University traveled to Houston but the result was the same as TSU knocked off the defending NAIA Champions 19-10.

Prairie View, which reinstated football prior to the 1991 season, returned to TSU's schedule the following weekend on Sept. 7, 1991. Despite losing 23-6, the classic once again returned to normalcy as the Panthers featured a new head coach in Ron Beard. The 1992 edition featured future NFL Hall-of-Famer Michael Strahan suiting up in the classic for one final time. Strahan went out a winner as the Tigers easily disposed of the Panthers 35-0 at Rice Stadium.

While the head coaches and players changed on a consistent basis, one thing that remained constant throughout the 1990s and beginning part of the 2000s was Texas Southern's dominance in the classic series. After dropping the 1988 match-up to the Panthers, the Tigers reeled off 14 consecutive victories over the Panthers and held ground until the 2004 season when a changing of the guard occurred in both school's head coach positions.

In 2004, the weight of the classic was lifted off the backs of Prairie View A&M coaches, athletes and fans as first-year head coach Henry Frazier III and staff ushered in a new era with a 25-7 victory over TSU at Reliant Stadium. What made the victory even sweeter for Prairie View A&M at the time was the fact that then-first-year TSU head coach Steve Wilson served as Frazier's defensive coordinator at Bowie State University in 2003.

Due to Hurricane Katrina relief efforts at Reliant Park the week of the Labor Day Classic in 2005, the game was moved to Thanksgiving Weekend. For the second consecutive year and first time since 1964, Prairie View A&M had TSU's number as the Panthers defeated the Tigers in back-to-back seasons.

In 2006, the trophy returned to Houston as Wilson and staff defeated the Panthers in a defensive battle at Reliant Stadium. However, the victory was short-lived as Frazier and staff captured an easy 34-14 win over TSU before a nationally televised audience on ESPNU at Reliant Stadium in 2007.

After watching Prairie View turn the tide, Texas Southern stayed at home when it came time for a coaching change in 2007 and hired alumnus and former star quarterback Johnnie Cole to resurrect them Tigers. In addition to Cole's hire, TSU continued to add excitement leading up to the classic as they lured former PVAMU Director of Athletics Charles McClelland and several staff members to their campus along with former high school standout Bobby Reid. With an abundance of familiar faces and bold predictions, the 24th annual Labor Day Classic was primed to be one of the best yet.

On the field, Prairie View once again reigned supreme in 2008 as the Panthers jumped out to a big lead early on and cruised to their second consecutive win and fourth win in five years over TSU following a 34-14 win.

In 2009, the Panthers held TSU without an offensive touchdown for the first time ever in series history. The Panthers upped their streak to three straight wins over the Tigers and their fifth in sixth years over TSU following a 17-7 win. A year later in 2010, Prairie View upped their winning steak to four games over TSU following a 16-14 victory.

STATE FAIR CLASSIC

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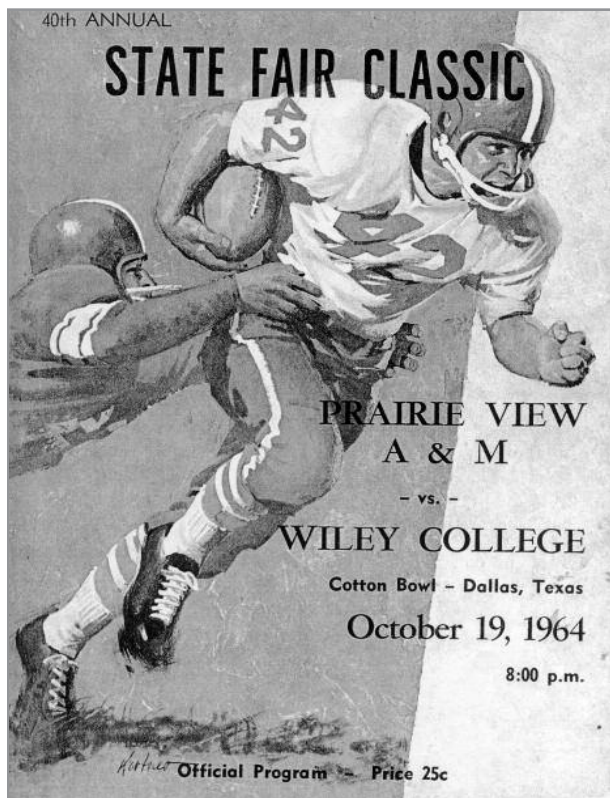
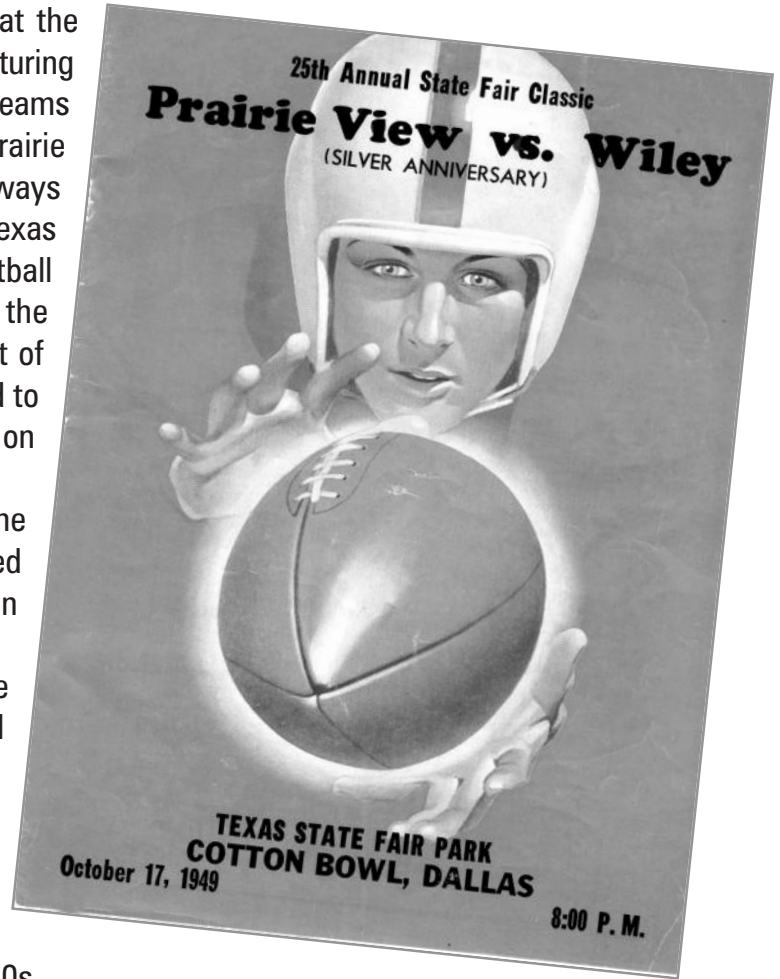


The annual State Fair Classic, held annually at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas, began in 1925 featuring the Wiley Wildcats and Langston Lions. Both teams met four consecutive years in Dallas before Prairie View replaced Langston in 1929. The contest always took place on "Negro Day" at the State Fair of Texas and would feature the city high school football championship in the afternoon followed by the anticipated college game at night. The concept of "Monday Night Football" could also be attributed to the State Fair Classic as the contest took place on Monday nights well into the 1960s.

Wiley wasn't the only college to play PV in the State Fair during that era as the Panthers battled Tennessee State in 1958 and Texas Southern in 1959.

After relocating to Dallas in 1961, Bishop College eventually took Wiley's place in the annual contest in the 43rd classic in 1967. From that point, Prairie View maintained a presence in the Cotton Bowl with match-ups against Bishop, East Texas State (A&M Commerce) and Southern over the years before moving its game against Grambling State to the bowl in the mid-80s.

With the disbanding of the Prairie View A&M football program in 1990, the State Fair Classic featured Grambling State and Elizabeth City State. Even though Prairie View brought football back in 1991 (Grambling played North Carolina A&T), it wasn't until 1992 that the classic would see the annual PVAMU-GSU showdown once again. Since 1992, this has been the annual match-up held at the State Fair Classic.



SHREVEPORT CLASSIC



The Shreveport Classic was created in 2010 by the Prairie View A&M Department of Athletics and the City of Shreveport as a way to bring another game into the Northern Louisiana area and an event to compliment the popular Louisiana State Fair. Prairie View A&M captured the inaugural classic in 2010 with a victory over Southern University before nearly 20,000 spectators. With the success Prairie View A&M had in the classic, the Shreveport Classic has a bright future.

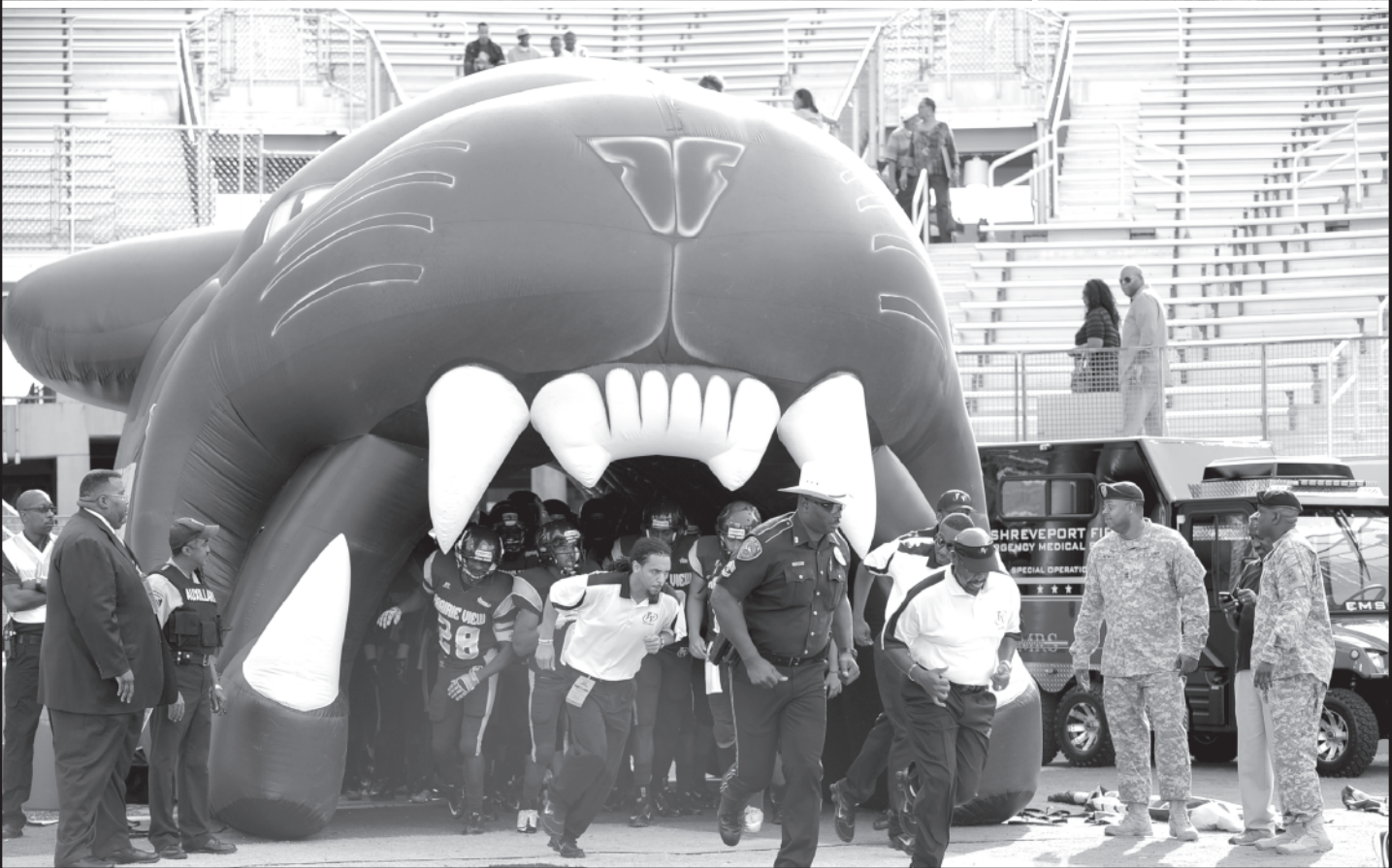

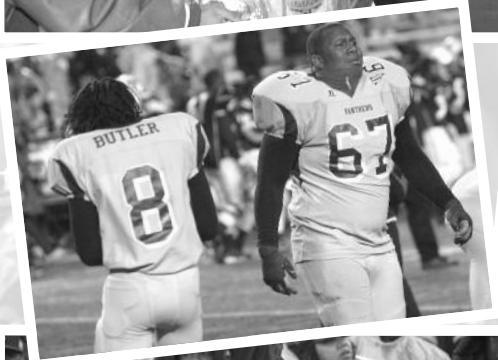
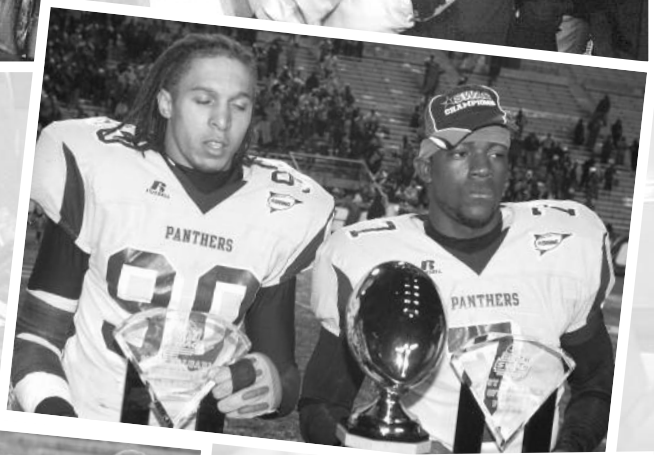
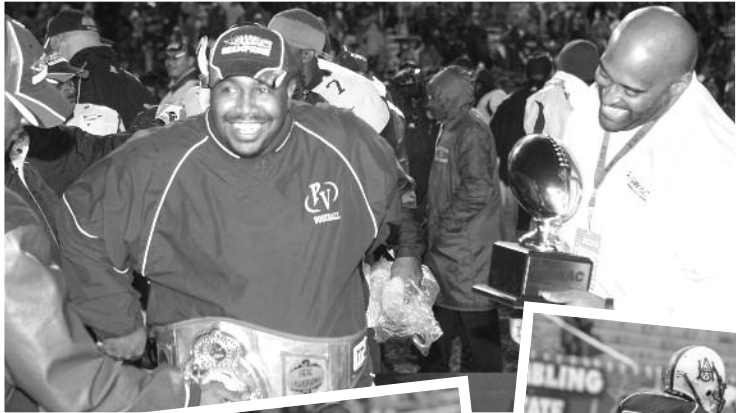


2009 SWAC CHAMPIONSHIP

In 2009, the Prairie View A&M Panthers earned their first-ever trip to the Southwestern Athletic Conference Championship Game at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. The Panthers spent nearly a week in the "Magic City" and participated in several press functions, luncheons in addition to touring the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.

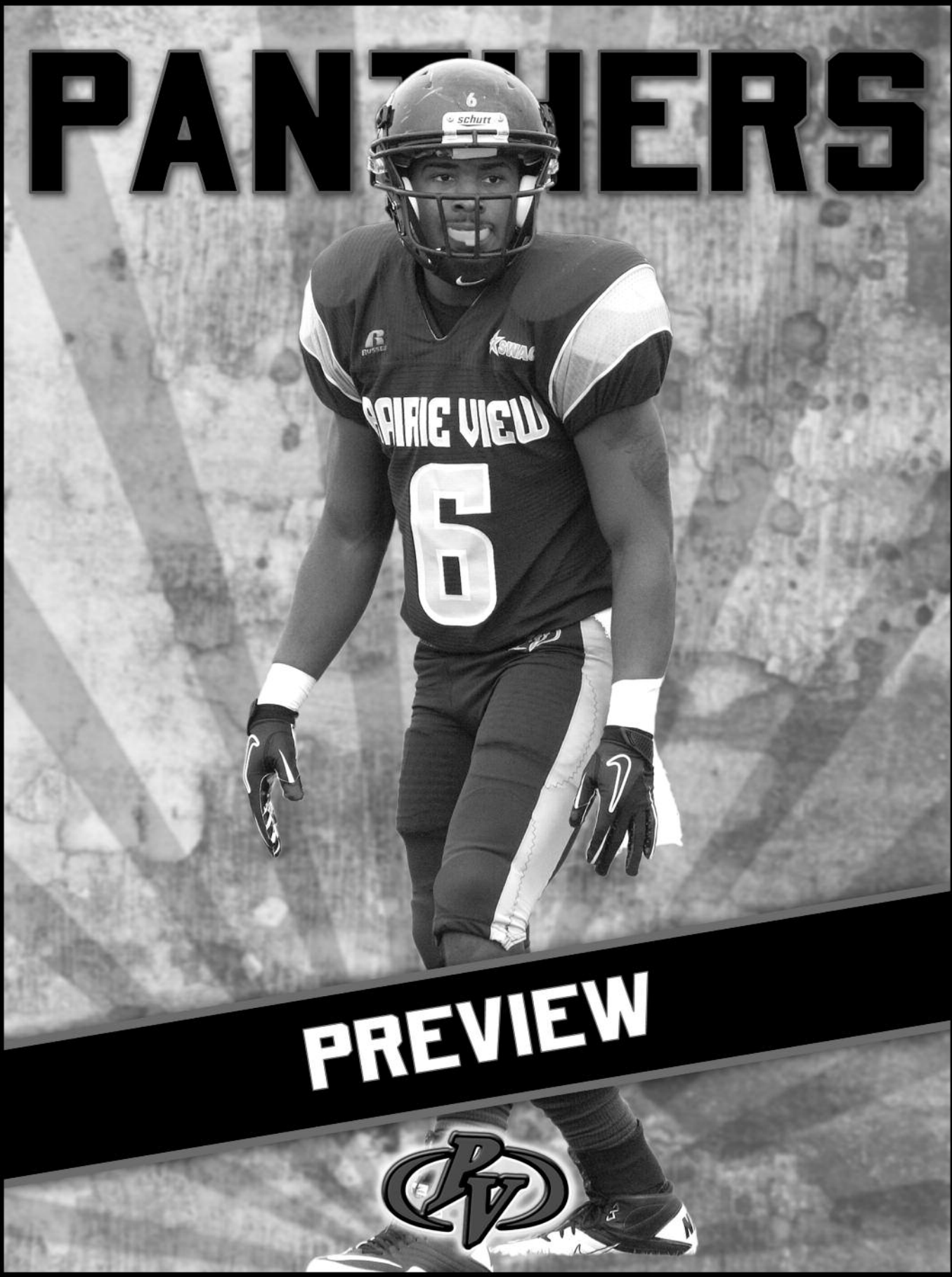
The first school in SWAC history from the state of Texas to participate in the annual contest, the Panthers cemented their name in SWAC history as they defeated Alabama A&M 30-24 on Dec. 12, 2009 for their first SWAC football championship since 1964.

Head coach Henry Frazier III was named SWAC Coach of the Year following the game while quarterback K.J. Black and defensive end Quinton Spears were named Offensive and Defensive MVP, respectively.



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SEASON OUTLOOK

For the first time in seven seasons, the Prairie View A&M football program will have a new leader in charge as former defensive coordinator **Heishma Northern** was elevated to the head coaching post in December of 2010 following the departure of **Henry Frazier III** to North Carolina Central. Northern, who spent six years on the staff as the team's defensive coordinator, becomes the 31st head coach in university history.

A veteran of the Southwestern Athletic Conference as a player and coach at Southern, Grambling State and Prairie View A&M, Northern has been preparing for this day since his collegiate playing career came to an end in 1995. However, transitioning to the CEO of the entire program as opposed to worrying about one side of the ball was his biggest task upon assuming control of the program.

"A lot of it was management decisions from managing the coaching staff to the player's schedules and making sure everyone was on the same page in terms of doing what they were supposed to do," stated Northern. "The biggest thing was being a manager instead of just worrying about the defensive side of the ball."

With six years at Prairie View A&M, Northern has the advantage of knowing the university system inside and out. As a result, Northern plans on building a solid bridge between athletics and the university as a whole.

"The biggest thing is getting everyone (on campus) on the same page," he said. "The behind-the-scene things can throw your football team off or make it better for them from places such as financial aid, dining hall, housing, the locker room, training room, etc. My goal is to do everything I can to make my players lives comfortable and coaches' jobs more efficient. I want to do what's right for my players and coaches."

As soon as Northern took control of the program, his phone began to ring off the hook from individuals all over seeking positions on the coaching staff as four coaches departed Prairie View A&M with former head coach **Henry Frazier III**. However, Northern took his time and assembled a staff which has a wide variety of experience from the professional, collegiate and high school ranks. Offensively, Northern lured offensive coordinator **Mark Orlando** back to the SWAC after a one-year stint at Bethune-Cookman University which saw them win a MEAC Championship. A 30-year veteran of the game, Orlando is best known for his



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high-energy and high-scoring offensive units at Southern University.

“The biggest thing I thought about when hiring an offensive coordinator was hiring a guy who I didn’t want to defend and who I knew would cause problems for other people, as well,” said Northern. “It had to be someone who I thought could get the ball to our playmakers, knows the no-huddle offense, the spread, the up-tempo (style) and what we call the ‘sideline-check game.’ He has that experience.”

Assistant head coach and offensive line coach **Prince Pearson** was the only offensive coach to remain on staff. As a result, Northern elevated former Tuskegee and NFL player **Harry Williams** to wide receivers coach after two years of volunteering along with hiring **Brian Morgan**, a former Grambling State standout, native Texan and SWAC record holder who played under Northern at Grambling, as running backs coach and special teams coordinator.

Defensively, Northern elevated linebackers coach **John Pearce** to defensive coordinator and added a dose of NFL and major college playing experience in **Gabe Northern** (defensive line/strength & conditioning) and **Bubba McDowell** (safeties). The younger brother of Northern, Gabe was a standout at LSU with several years of NFL experience with the Buffalo Bills, Pittsburgh Steelers and Minnesota Vikings in addition to a coaching stint at Grambling State. McDowell played collegiately at the University of Miami and was an All-Pro with the Houston Oilers. He also brings Prairie View A&M several years of collegiate coaching experience after serving as the defensive backs coach at the University of Houston and Texas Southern. **Raasaan Haralson** and **Miles Brandon** also remained on board and will coach cornerbacks and defensive line, respectively.

“I think the staff is gelling well and my job is to make sure it’s managed right from compliance, class check and work outs,” Northern said. “We have to get the small things right and if we do that as a staff, it’ll translate to the players which means they’ll put out more. We have an outstanding staff and I want to make sure we’re all on the same page when it comes to getting things done.”

With the hiring of Orlando, it meant the Panthers would transition towards a new offense. With the loss of several standouts on the offensive side of the ball, the spring practice session was wide open as the team learned the offense. Defensively, the Panthers won’t change much as

Northern will have a hand in the defense along with Pearce, one of two coaches on the staff with eight years of experience at Prairie View A&M.

“I thought we did a good job in getting the new offense implemented and making the subtle changes in our special teams philosophy,” said Northern. “The defense pretty much stayed the same but we wanted to get back towards being an aggressive defense. We have a lot experience in the secondary so I would like to blitz more and let those guys make plays.

QUARTERBACKS

For the fourth straight year, the Panthers could potentially open with a different starter at quarterback as school record holder **K.J. Black** completed his eligibility. However, the cupboard isn’t bare as several quarterbacks on the roster do have game experience.



SEASON OUTLOOK

Senior **Jonathan Troast** took the majority of snaps in the spring and has the inside edge as he started the first two games of the 2010 season after arriving from junior college late last summer. Troast, who quarterbacked the Panthers to a 1-1 mark before suffering a season-ending injury, will face competition from freshmen **Jerry Lovelocke** and **De'Auntre Smiley**.

"The biggest thing we want to do is not turn the ball over," Northern said. "I feel like we'll be pretty good on defense and special teams so we should be fine if we keep our mistakes to the minimum. We want to score a lot and fast as possible but I don't want to be careless with the football. The biggest thing is that we need someone to manage the game, make good decisions, correct reads and not put the team in a bad situation."

RUNNING BACKS

Panther fans will have to break out their game programs this fall as the team will feature a new crop of runners. **Donald Babers**, a 3,000-yard career rusher, graduated along with backup **Devin Brown**, a converted fullback who found success as the number two rusher on the team. Despite the loss of the duo, Northern remains confident as the Panthers do return a number of prospects at the position. At the conclusion of spring drills, newcomer **Le'Darryae Groover** shined with an impressive spring game but will face competition from veteran **Jeremy Waddy** and several other newcomers who didn't suit up for the Panthers last season.

"I think we will have depth but not a lot of experience," said Northern. "We lost two players in Babers and Brown who got the bulk of the carries and pass protections the past few years."

With the new offensive scheme, Northern stated the responsibilities of the running backs will change as pass protection is a must for the scheme to be successful.

"In the spread offense, your edges are shorter so our pass protections will be in the hands of some inexperienced guys," he said. "First and foremost, we have to make sure the running backs can and will protect the quarterback. After that, running will become important as we'll do running back by committee and go with the hot hand."

Despite the shift to a pass-based offense, Northern also reiterated that the fullback position will remain viable.

"We're still going to use the fullback," said Northern. "When people think of a spread offense they usually think of no fullback or tight end. The term spread is used loosely as we're not going to line up with four to five wideouts all the time."

WIDE RECEIVERS

Similar to the running back spot, the wide receiver position took a huge hit with the loss of three seniors. However, the Panthers are pretty used to the situation as they encountered the same type of scenario last season.

As a result, junior **Spencer Nelson** assumes the responsibility of elder statesmen and should have a career season similar to what **Gabe Osaze-Ediae** and **Shaun Stephens** did in 2009 and 2010, respectively. Nelson finished as the third-leading receiver on the team last season with 25 receptions for 323 yards and one touchdown.

Another candidate the staff is looking forward to working with is junior **Deandre Cooper**. Cooper originally came to Prairie View as a defensive back but saw his career halt due to an injury as a freshman. He missed a season-and-a-half before returning to action in 2010 primarily playing special teams. This past spring, Cooper caught two touchdowns in the annual spring game and has the physical tools needed to thrive in the new scheme. After Cooper, several redshirt freshmen and true freshmen will have an opportunity to show what they can do to solidify the rotation.

"Cooper came here as one of the top players out of Houston but suffered an injury and didn't play for a couple of years," stated Northern. "We're looking for big things out of him and the rest of the receiving corps. There will be quite a few young guys that are going to get their feet wet and hopefully some of them rise to the occasion. If they don't, we'll run the ball more, bring some tight ends and fullbacks in and throw it when we have to. We have some good young receivers but the question is 'will they step up and make the plays they're expected to make'."

TIGHT ENDS

The Panthers lost a veteran blocker in tight end **Darrick Myles** last season but return several candidates who each bring something different to the table. **Donald Law III** is the biggest tight end on the roster and will be counted on for his blocking while **Alonzo Revuelta** provides the team with another pass-catching option. Both players will be counted on heavily in the new scheme.

"We have a good mixture of tight ends," said Northern. "We have one that's real small who can catch the ball in the slot and we have another who can possibly play tackle and be a good blocking tight end. We also signed two tight ends last year and redshirted another this year so we plan on using them because you have to run the ball and open up holes for the running backs in order to win."

SEASON OUTLOOK

OFFENSIVE LINE

With so many new faces offensively at the skill positions, Northern does have the luxury of returning a veteran offensive line. All-American and All-SWAC guard **James Dekle** returns for his senior year and will be joined by former All-SWAC tackle **Tim Tusey**. **Langston Patterson** and **Jomar Cauley** are also experienced veterans and will battle it out at guard while offensive line coach **Prince Pearson** auditions several candidates for the role of center and tackle.

"The line has to step up, make plays, open holes and protect the quarterback because we're going to have inexperienced quarterbacks, running backs and wide receivers," said Northern. "We're going to see a lot of eight and nine-man boxes and if you're not opening up holes you're going to see a lot of blitzes. We have to make people back up and give the quarterback time to throw."

DEFENSE

While the offense remains a work in progress, the Panthers feature an experienced defense that may have to carry the team until the offense comes around. While it may sound like pressure to some, this has been the norm for the Panthers as the defense has been in this position since Northern took over the coordinator reigns in 2005.

"I think we have a pretty good mixture of new and returning players," said Northern. "We have experienced linebackers even though they're only redshirt sophomores. We'll need to replace our two safeties from last year in the secondary but we're secure at cornerback. The main thing on defense is that we need to limit our mistakes and don't give up big plays."

DEFENSIVE LINE

The defensive line opens the 2011 campaign minus All-American defensive end **Quinton Spears** and defensive tackle **Dalvin Nettle** as both have graduated. Even though both players were three-year starters, the line should be in good hands with an abundance of players possessing game experience. **Adrian Hamilton** and **Jarvis Wilson** are the projected starters at defensive end and will be counted on to rush the quarterback. Nose tackle **Ryan Love** received a lot of playing time last season and should excel this season followed by fellow tackle **Dwayne Chappell**. Redshirt sophomore **Liki Porotesano** will be an asset for the line as he'll play both inside and outside.

"Naturally, **Adrian Hamilton** and **Jarvis Wilson** are our top two playmakers up front," said Northern. "In the middle, we ask those guys to keep our linebackers free so we're looking for (Ryan) Love and (Dwayne) Chappell to play well. We're going to rotate four guys inside so that our ends can be as fresh as possible. I

anticipate having an eight-man rotation on the defensive line so they can play at a high level."

LINEBACKERS

Three of the top five tacklers from 2010 were linebackers with two of the three returning to action in 2011 in redshirt sophomores **Raheem Cardwell** and **Marcus White**. Two of the smartest players on the team, both athletes should come into their own this season with another year in the defensive scheme. Last season, White and Cardwell combined for 111 tackles, nine tackles for loss and two interceptions.

"Marcus had an outstanding year but tailed off at the end of the season as he needs to be a little bigger and stronger," said Northern. "Raheem went through the same thing and realized the difference between playing high school and college football at the end of the year. They're working hard to make sure they don't have the end-of-the year slump again."

In the middle, even though linebacker **Max Sencherey** hung up his cleats for medical school, Northern is confident someone will step up to fill his position. **Elton Holmes** has been in the system for several years and should compete along with redshirt freshman **Danny Brownell**.

"We lost Max to graduation and medical school but **Elton Holmes** and a few other candidates should battle in training camp," he said. "No one will be given anything; they'll have to earn the position."

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The defensive backfield once again features an All-American as cornerback **Moses Ellis** returns for his senior season. The Fort Worth, Texas native led the nation with eight interceptions in 2010 while tallying 14 pass breakups and 41 tackles. One of the fastest players on the team, Ellis has the ability to change a game in an instant.

JohnMark Henderson also returns and gives the Panthers two seasoned cornerbacks to open the season as Henderson had 25 tackles and two pass breakups last season.

While the corners are solidified, Northern will have a tall task at safety as the defense has to replace All-SWAC safety **Chris Adingupu** along with fellow senior **Eric Moore**. **Adrian Grant** is the lone safety back with experience as he started the first two games of the 2010 season.

"The biggest thing is communication from this point," said Northern. "If they communicate properly; we won't have a

problem in the secondary.”

SPECIAL TEAMS

Similar to the offense, fans will have to learn a new set of names as the Panthers lost a trio of four-year lettermen in the kicking department in punter **Pedro Ventura** and placekickers **Brady Faggard** and **Kyle Mathews**. As a result, redshirt freshman **Chris Barrick** will man the placekicking duties while the team auditions a punter during camp.

“The biggest thing out of special teams is that you want to create a big play but not give up a big play,” said Northern. “Chris has a strong leg but needs to get more accurate. Coach (Brian) Morgan has been working with him throughout the spring in helping him develop the mentality of being a solid collegiate kicker.”

Whoever assumes the kicking duties will have to work with a new deep snapper as the Panthers signed one in February.

In the return game, several candidates will vie for the role of kick and punt returner. **Spencer Nelson** has the most experience with 14 combined kickoff and punt returns.

“We’re also bringing in a deep snapper as well but every spot is open for competition,” stated Northern. “I started off being a special teams coordinator so I know the importance of solid special teams play and we’re going to be fundamentally sound in that area.

RECRUITING CLASS

With so many new faces offensively, this could be the year the Panthers rely on a true freshman in some areas as they loaded up at the skill positions during the past recruiting period. Northern prefers to redshirt freshmen for developmental purposes but won’t hesitate to play one if they prove they’re ready.

“I prefer to redshirt freshmen but if a young player is even with an older player, I’ll play the younger player first,” he said.

SCHEDULE

This year’s schedule ranks as one of the toughest in recent memory for the Panthers as they prepare to face the defending MEAC Champion Bethune-Cookman University in the season opener during the annual MEAC/SWAC Challenge in Orlando, Fla. on ESPN. Texas State, who’s in its last year as a Football Championship Subdivision member, is also on the schedule as the Panthers travel to San Marcos in November. In SWAC play, six of Prairie View’s nine conference games are on the road.

Northern is excited to start the season out with the opportunity to represent the university on a national scale.

“I want to start off good on national TV as you want to represent the university and conference well,” stated Northern. “I cut my teeth playing and coaching in the SWAC and we’re known as a football conference but we’ve lost a few games to the MEAC schools so I want to reverse that.”

The remainder of the season from that point will be full of storylines as Northern will face two teams that feature coaches he worked for in Grambling State (**Doug Williams**) and Alcorn State (**Melvin Spears**) plus the return to his alma mater and hometown for a matchup versus Southern.

“I look at the games the same way because I’m not playing against Coach Williams, Spears or Mitchell,” said Northern. “All of that talk doesn’t bother me and I won’t coach any differently because I know the coach on the other sideline. I want to win every game regardless of who’s coaching.”



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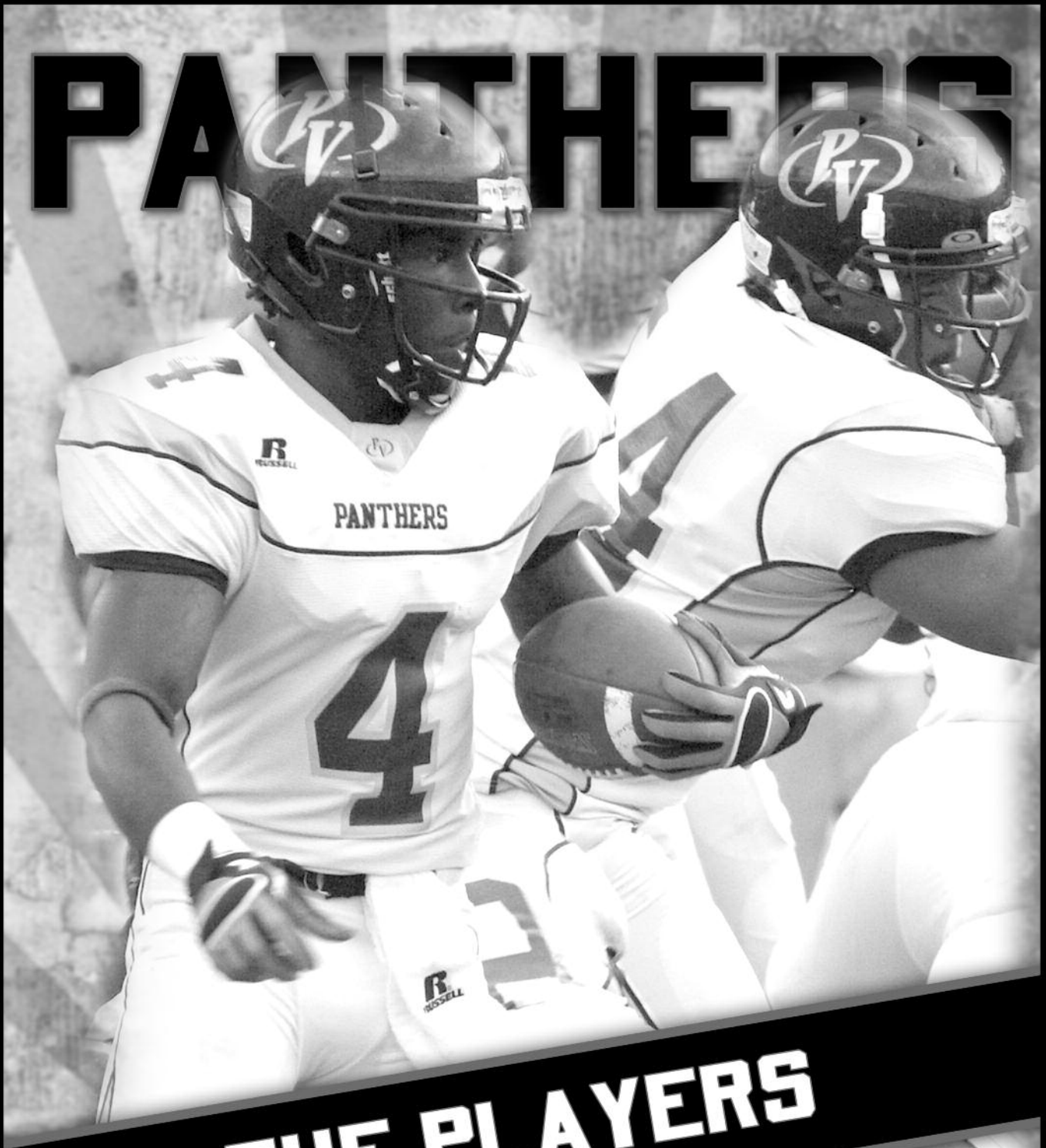

Head Coach

1st Year as Head Coach at Prairie View A&M, 7th Overall

Heishma Northern was named the 31st head coach in university history on Dec. 13, 2010. No stranger to the Southwestern Athletic Conference, Northern begins his 15th season on the collegiate level and seventh season at Prairie View A&M.

Prior to becoming head coach, Northern was an award-winning defensive coordinator for six seasons at Prairie View A&M. Under his watch, the Panther defense has risen to become one of the top units in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Ranks.

For the fourth straight season, Northern's defense produced another All-American following the 2010 campaign as cornerback Moses Ellis led the nation in interceptions with eight and defensed 22 passes en route to earning All-American and All-SWAC honors. As a unit, the Panthers finished second in pass defense amongst SWAC foes as they only yielded 164.6 yards per contest. As a result, four members of the Panther defense earned All-SWAC honors in Ellis (first team), defensive lineman Quinton Spears (first), free safety Chris Adingupu (second) and middle linebacker Max Sencherey (second).

Despite losing six key starters and a two-time All-American from the previous year, Prairie View's defensive unit was instrumental during the team's historic run to the SWAC Championship last year as the unit led the SWAC in scoring defense with 16.6 points per outing and pass defense efficiency (101.7). The Panthers finished the 2009 season ranked fifth in total defense and produced its second consecutive All-American in defensive back Anthony Beck along with having three All-SWAC members in Beck, Spears and Adingupu. In addition, Northern's unit recorded two shutouts on the season and held four teams to 74 yards or less on the ground.

In 2008, the Panther defense set the tone for the team's 9-1 record as they concluded the year ranked second nationally in



scoring defense, third in total defense, third in rush defense and seventh in pass efficiency defense. Prairie View also made history and recorded two shutouts for the first time since the 1966 season.

As a result of Prairie View's defensive prowess, Northern earned national acclaim and was selected as FootballScoop.com's 2008 Division I-AA Coordinator of the Year. Individually, linebacker Zach East closed out his career as a two-time All-American while Beck and Spears earned First and Second Team All-SWAC Honors, respectively.

During the 2007 season, Northern's defense played a key role in helping the Panthers clinch their first winning season in four decades as they finished atop the SWAC in scoring and red zone defense along with a third-place total defense ranking. A total of three starters earned All-SWAC honors led by East earning All-American and SWAC Defensive Player of the Year Honors.

among SWAC foes, Northern made his mark in his second year at Prairie View during the 2006 season after fielding the top-ranked defensive unit in the conference. Led by first team All-SWAC defensive end and future NFL free agent signee Jermaine McGhee, the Panthers set a school record for fewest yards rushing by an opponent after holding Edward Waters College to -35 yards. For his hard work on the gridiron after the season, Northern was one of 26 coaches from across the nation invited to attend the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy in Miami, Fla.

Prior to his tenure at Prairie View, Northern spent seven seasons at Grambling State University in a variety of capacities.

Initially brought to GSU to serve as running backs coach, Northern made a seamless transition to coaching defensive backs in 2001 as his unit ranked ninth nationally in interceptions en route to GSU's second-straight SWAC Championship. During the 2002 season, which marked Grambling's third consecutive SWAC title, Northern's group improved on the interception mark as they ranked fourth nationally.

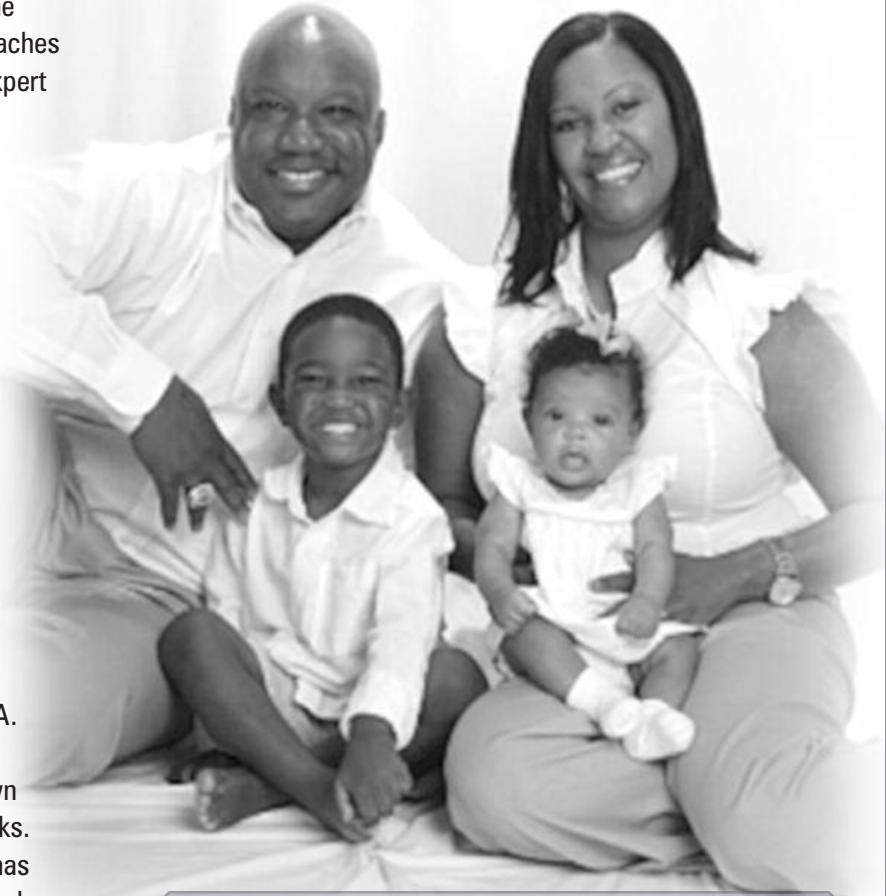
In 2003, Northern assumed the role of interim defensive coordinator and immediately made his impact felt as the Tiger defense finished the year ranked third nationally against the run in Division I-AA. In the SWAC, the Tigers finished second in rushing, third in scoring defense, fourth in opponent third down percentage, fourth in turnover margin and fifth in sacks.

Over the course of his coaching career, Northern has had several of his former players enter the professional football realm gaining experience with the NFL, World and Arena Football Leagues. In addition, several of his pupils have received an opportunity to coach on the collegiate level.

A 1996 mathematics education graduate of Southern University, Northern began his coaching career on the high school level at Glen Oaks High School in Baton Rouge, La. where he coached girl's basketball and baseball. He then moved on to Morehouse College in Atlanta, Ga. serving as the team's running backs coach and special teams coordinator in 1997 under former head coach, Super Bowl MVP and current Grambling State head coach Doug Williams.

A student of the game of football, Northern was one of only 15 coaches from across the nation selected to participate in the prestigious NCAA Champions Forum during June of 2010. He has also completed a training camp internship with the Oakland Raiders of the National Football League in the summer of 2009.

Northern, who also holds a master's degree in Sports Administration from Grambling State, is the oldest of three siblings and is married to the former Paula Duell of Baton Rouge, La. Together, they have two children, Adam (3) and newborn Brooke.

John Pearce

Defensive Coordinator / Linebackers

Eighth Year At Prairie View A&M

An eight-year veteran of the Prairie View A&M coaching staff, John Pearce was elevated to the role of defensive coordinator prior to the 2011 season after spending his first seven seasons as the team's linebackers coach and special teams coordinator.

For the second consecutive season, Pearce had to roll out a revamped linebacking unit which featured two redshirt freshmen. Despite the abundance of youth, three of the top seven tacklers on team were linebackers with senior linebacker Max Sencherey leading the unit with 75. Sencherey was selected to the 2011 All-SWAC Team for the second straight year as the Panthers finished with a 7-4 record.

Despite losing his entire starting unit that included a two-time All-American prior to the 2009 season, Pearce rolled up his sleeves and received career-best performances from a unit that finished with three of the top seven tacklers on the team. In their first season as starters, the trio of Chris Ford, Max Sencherey and Renoldo Revuelta helped the Panthers lead the SWAC in scoring defense and pass defense efficiency. In addition, the unit also played a major part in holding four teams to 74 yards or less on the ground.

From 2006 to 2008, Pearce had the opportunity to coach and mold one of the most decorated defensive players in school history in linebacker Zach East. Under Pearce's watch, East completed his three-year career at Prairie View as a two-time AP All-American, the 2007 SWAC Defensive Player of the Year and a two-time member of the All-SWAC Team. Along with East, fellow linebackers Van Sallier and Gary Hicks also earned All-SWAC honors as the duo played a large role on Prairie View's nationally ranked defensive units over the course of their careers.

In addition to his linebacking duties, Pearce also oversees all phases of Prairie View's special teams and serves as assistant recruiting coordinator.

Since assuming command of the unit in 2005, Pearce has fielded one of the top units in the SWAC as Prairie View's punters have finished no worse than second in punting among SWAC teams in four of the past five years with a top ranking in 2009 from All-American and two-time All-SWAC punter Pedro Ventura. Ventura also finished the 2009 season ranked third nationally on the FCS ranks with a punting average of 43.8 yards.

In 2010, placekicker Kyle Mathews achieved perfection as he didn't miss a single field goal or PAT. In 2009, placekicker Brady Faggard recorded his best season ever as he went a career-best 7-of-8

in field goals with 35-of-38 PATs for a total of 56 points.

In the return department, Prairie View finished 11th nationally as a team during the 2007 season in punt returns capped off by Anthony Weeden's second-place ranking. During the 2008 season, Prairie View put together its best finish returning kicks under Pearce's tenure as they averaged 20.3 yards per kick return to finish fourth in the SWAC.

Pearce has a wide variety of experience coaching within the high school and collegiate ranks. He started out as the line coach at Parkdale High School in Maryland before moving to Catholic University and then to Bowie State. At Bowie State, Pearce served as the team's defensive line coach and co-defensive coordinator.

After his stint at Bowie State, Pearce moved to Florida and coached at Santa Fe and Buchholz High Schools from 1996-2000. After four years in Florida, Pearce returned to the college level and coordinated recruiting efforts along with coaching the defensive line at Shepherd College from 2000-2003. In 2003, Pearce moved to Norfolk State of the MEAC and served as the defensive line coach along with coordinating film exchange.

In addition to his bachelor's degree in health and physical education, Pearce earned a master's in secondary education from Bowie State University. He's a member of the American Football Coaches Association and Texas High School Coaches Association.

The team's community liaison, Pearce has spent a considerable amount of time bridging Prairie View A&M football with the surrounding community via service projects with Waller ISD, Campbell Middle School of Cy-Fair ISD and the Southwest Boy's and Girl's Club of Houston.

A 1991 graduate of the University of Delaware, Pearce is married to Samantha Krumpe of Medford, N.J., and the couple has two sons, Max (13) and Calvin (12).

Offensive Coordinator / Quarterbacks
First Year At Prairie View A&M

Renowned offensive veteran Mark Orlando begins his first season as a member of the Prairie View A&M coaching staff. Orlando, who'll also coach the quarterbacks, returns to the SWAC after a one-year tenure at Bethune-Cookman University.

A native of upstate New York, Orlando played quarterback at Florida State University and spent two seasons at Lincoln High School in Tallahassee, Fla. immediately upon graduation. Orlando moved on to the college ranks after his stint at Lincoln and made history as he helped coach Florida A&M University to the 1978 Division I-AA Championship under former head coach Rudy Hubbard. He remained at Florida A&M for five more seasons before accepting the role of running backs coach at Tennessee State University under head coach Bill Thomas in 1984.

While at Tennessee State, Orlando was apart of two teams that posted 10 or more wins highlighted by a NCAA Division I-AA Playoff Appearance in 1986. Orlando was elevated to the role of offensive coordinator in his final season at TSU before moving on to Winston-Salem State University on the staff of Pete Richardson in 1991.

Orlando remained at WSSU for two years and followed Richardson to the state of Louisiana in 1993 as he joined the staff of Southern University. Serving as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator and quarterback coach, Orlando helped elevate the Jaguars to the

national scene as they recorded a six-game turnaround with an 11-1 and 7-0 SWAC record en route to the school's first SWAC Championship since 1975 following the 1993 season.

From 1993 to 2001, the Jaguars were the envy of Division I-AA, the SWAC and Black College Football as Orlando helped Southern compile five SWAC Championships and four HBCU National Championships. Offensively, the Jaguars ranked amongst the nation's best as three of Southern's offensive career record holders occurred under his watch in quarterback Bryant Lee, running back Steve Wofford and wide receiver Michael Hayes.

In December of 2001, Orlando rejoined Bill Thomas and moved to Texas as he accepted the role of offensive coordinator at Texas Southern University prior to the start of the 2002 campaign. In his inaugural season at TSU, the Tiger offense moved up from seventh to fourth place in the SWAC statistics in total offense while also increasing their scoring output from 19.1 to 28.5 points per outing.

After two years at TSU, Orlando rejoined Richardson at Southern University in 2004 and picked up where he left off as quarterback Bryant Lee flourished under Orlando's watch. Lee concluded his career at Southern as the school's all-time leader in passing yardage and touchdowns while wide receiver Juamorris Stewart burst on to the scene with a monster senior campaign that saw him top the 1,000-yard mark in receiving following the 2009 season.

Orlando returned to the state of Florida in 2010 and served as the offensive coordinator at Bethune-Cookman University. Once again, Orlando displayed his offensive knowledge as the Wildcats endured a five-game turnaround from 5-6 in 2009 to 10-2 in 2010 which featured a MEAC Championship and second round appearance in the NCAA FCS Playoffs. BCU nearly doubled its offensive output from the previous season as they ranked second nationally in scoring offense, fourth in pass efficiency and 12th in total offense.

Orlando and his wife Jenifer, have three children.

**Assistant Head Coach / Offensive Line
 Eighth Year At Prairie View A&M**

Prince Pearson enters his eighth season with Prairie View in 2011, serving as the Panthers' assistant head coach, offensive line coach and run-game coordinator. Pearson joined the Panther coaching staff in the spring of 2004 following a four-year stint at Texas Southern.

Since his arrival, Prairie View has quietly fielded one of the top rushing attacks in the Southwestern Athletic Conference as the Panthers have rushed for 1,700-plus yards in three of his eight seasons at the helm.

Last season, Pearson's line helped the Panthers achieve the SWAC's third-ranked pass offense as PV averaged 222.2 yards per game in the air. Led by All-SWAC guard James Dekle, the offensive line paved the way for running back Donald Babers to rush for 918 yards and 10 touchdowns. Babers also etched his name into the record books as he finished second all-time on the Prairie View A&M rushing charts with 3,404 yards and 35 touchdowns. As a team, the Panthers had four games with 125 yards or more on the ground with a season-high 217 yards at Alabama A&M.

In 2009, Prairie View's offensive line clicked on all cylinders as the team's offensive unit put together four games of 400 or more total offensive yards. In addition, the line blocked for the SWAC's third-ranked offense while also helping the unit finish third in rush offense and fourth in pass offense. The Panthers also finished second in time of possession (31:51) and sacks against (19) in addition to helping the team rush for 100 or more yards in seven-of-10 contests with two games over 200-plus yards.

For the second straight season and only fourth time in 23 years, two members of the unit earned All-SWAC honors in Tim Tusey and James Dekle. The duo helped Prairie View A&M win a SWAC Championship and produce the SWAC's Offensive Player of the Year that also finished as the nation's leader in passing efficiency among the Football Championship Subdivision ranks.

In 2008, the Panthers made history on the ground as they rushed for 1,727 yards and 23 touchdowns en route to a 9-1 campaign. For only the third time since 1986, Prairie View had two offensive linemen (Cleveland Collie and Dekle) receive All-SWAC honors as they paved the way for the team's first 1,000-yard rusher (Babers) in 20 years. In addition, opposing defenses found Prairie View's offensive line tough to get around as they finished tied for first in sacks against with only 17 allowed.

Led by their ground game, the Panthers made history in 2007 as they clinched their first winning season in four decades en route to rushing for nearly 1,400 yards and 14 rushing touchdowns. Offensive



linemen Maurice Robinson and Daylan Deal earned Second Team All-SWAC honors for the Panthers as they led a line that only allowed 12 sacks.

Prairie View's ground game enjoyed a breakout season in 2005 under Pearson as the duo of Arnell Fontenot and Kerry Wilson helped the Panthers combine to rush for over 2,000 yards. The Panthers doubled their output from the previous season as they averaged 4.4 yards per carry and scored 15 touchdowns.

Prior to Prairie View, Pearson spent four seasons as the offensive line coach, run game coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Texas Southern. While at TSU, the Tigers leaned heavily on their ground game during his tenure there as they consistently ranked among the top five teams in the league under his watch from 2000 to 2003 in rush offense. As a result, several of his recruits received the opportunity to participate in NFL Training Camps.

Born in Lake City, Fla., Pearson had a successful high school career as an offensive lineman at St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. He was recruited by the University of Minnesota and finished his career as an All-Big 10 nominee. After graduating from Minnesota in 1993, Pearson returned to Florida and eventually became the offensive coordinator for Boyd Anderson High School in Fort Lauderdale.

In 1997, Pearson moved to the college ranks and became an assistant football coach at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass. While at Holy Cross, he assisted with the team's film breakdown and coached the defensive line. After one season at Holy Cross, Pearson returned to Florida in 1998 and assumed the head coaching duties at Hallandale High School. Pearson quickly made his mark at Hallandale by leading the team to their first playoff berth in 16 years. For his efforts on the field, Pearson was selected to coach in two all-star games and was nominated for Coach of the Year in 1998.

Pearson is married to the former Evangeline Suarez of Fort Lauderdale, Fla. They have one child Morgan (4).

**Defensive Line
 Seventh Year At Prairie View A&M**

Miles Brandon enters his seventh season coaching the Prairie View A&M defensive line. Brandon came to Prairie View A&M with a wealth of coaching experience, including a stint as head coach at Lane College.

A three-year letterwinner on the defensive line at Ohio University from 1982 to 1987, Brandon has been instrumental in helping Prairie View's defense become one of the nation's best on the Football Championship Subdivision. Last season, defensive lineman Quinton Spears capped off a memorable career at Prairie View with his third straight All-SWAC and second consecutive first team selection after tallying a career-high 70 tackles, nine sacks and three blocked kicks. As a result, Spears' performance caught the eyes of NFL scouts as he signed a free agent contact with the Miami Dolphins. As a team, the defensive line was instrumental in Prairie View A&M achieving its fourth straight winning season as they held three teams to 80 yards or less on the ground.

In 2009, the Panthers featured an All-SWAC First Teamer in defensive end Spears and finished tied for fifth in rush defense amongst SWAC foes. In addition, Brandon's line played a major part in holding four teams to 74 yards or less on the ground along with helping the defensive tackle duo of Devin Boyd and Dalvin Nettles finish the year with career highs in tackles.

During the 2008 campaign, Prairie View's defensive line was one of the top units on the FCS level as they ranked third nationally in rush and total defense. Spears was rewarded for his play in the trenches with a selection on the All-SWAC Second Team after leading a unit that garnered 32 sacks on the season.

In 2007, Prairie View's defensive line played a key role in helping the team capture its first winning season in four decades. As a unit, the Panthers finished third nationally in total defense and first among SWAC schools in red zone defense. In addition, Brandon also coached an all-conference performer in defensive lineman Jon Johnson. During the 2006 campaign, Brandon's line helped the team set a school record for fewest yards rushing by an opponent after holding Edward Waters College to -35 yards rushing. Also that season, Prairie View ranked atop the SWAC in total defense along with featuring All-SWAC First Team defensive end and future NFL free agent signee Jermaine McGhee.

Prior to coaching at Prairie View A&M, Brandon spent three years as head coach of Lane College in Jackson, Tenn. While serving as head coach, Brandon played a major role in recruiting, strength and conditioning and the overall administration of Lane's football program. Under Brandon's watch, Lane College had two players during his tenure earn roster spots in the NFL.

After two years of coaching on the high school level in the state of Ohio, Brandon moved up to the collegiate level in 1990 and spent two years coaching the defensive lines at Urbana University in Ohio followed by a year at Clarion University in the state of Pennsylvania. He left Clarion in 1994 and moved to Kentucky for the position of

defensive line coach and strength and conditioning coordinator at Morehead State University.

A participant in the 2006 NCAA Football Coaching Academy and an intern with the Pittsburgh Steelers in the summer of 2009, Brandon is a native of Pittsburgh, Pa. and holds a bachelor's from Ohio University and a master's from Prairie View A&M. Brandon is married to the former Latonya C. Schooling of Radcliff, Ky. They have two children, Summer (10) and Miles, Jr. (8).

Once his NFL career came to a close, Northern joined the football coaching staff at Grambling State University under head coach Doug Williams. On the staff with his older brother, Northern helped the Tigers capture two SWAC Championships in 2001 and 2002 while coaching the defensive line. After his stint at Grambling, Northern returned to the high school ranks following the 2003 campaign and spent time across the state of Louisiana as an assistant coach at Scotlandville, West Monroe and Glen Oaks High Schools.

An entrepreneur and fitness buff, Northern moved to Tallahassee, Fla. between coaching stints and served as the owner/operator of an Anytime Fitness Franchise. Northern offered personal training to members of the community in addition to handling the day-to-day operations of the franchise.

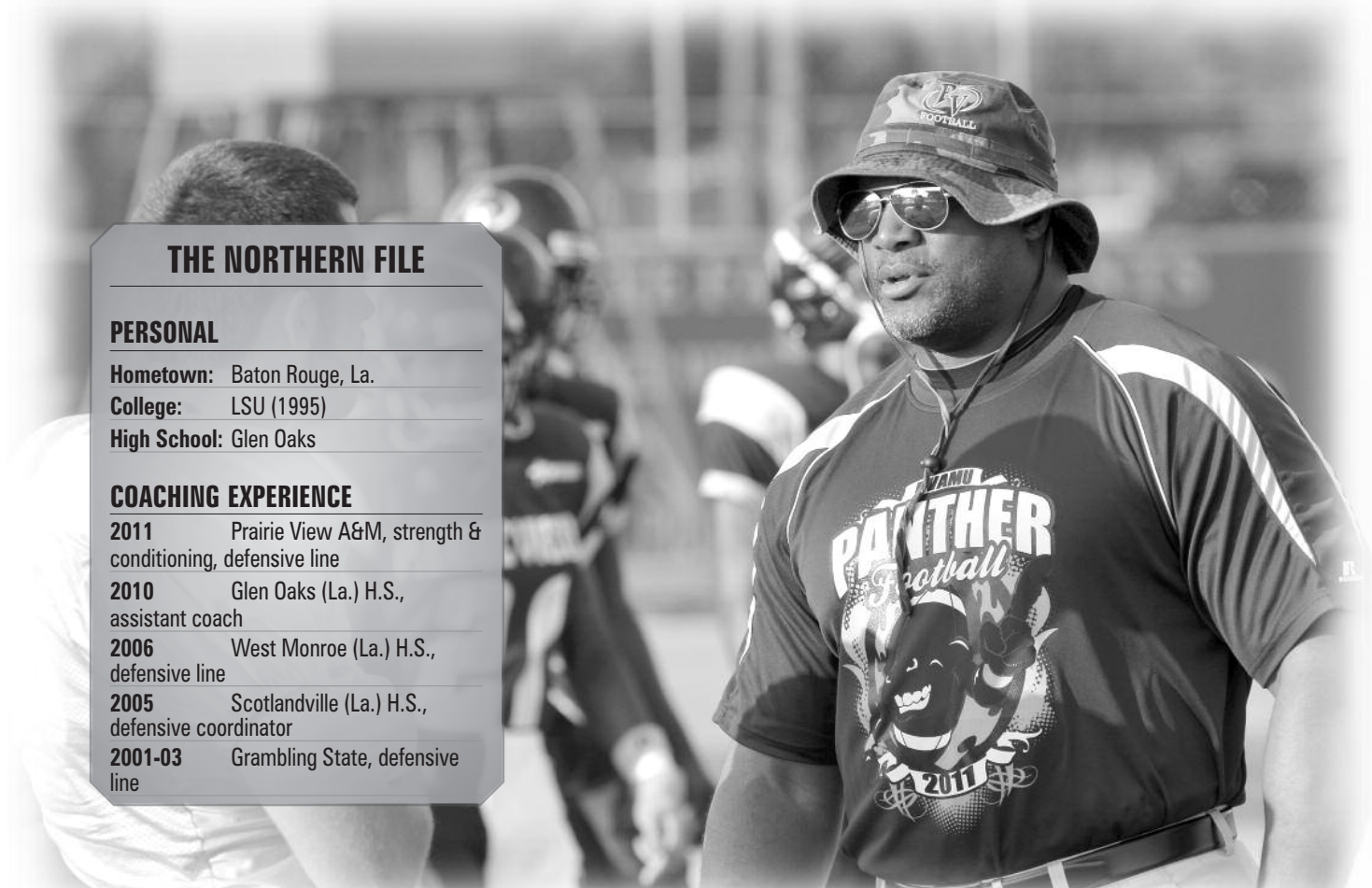

Southwestern Athletic Conference record holder Brian Morgan is in his first season as the running backs coach at Prairie View A&M University. Morgan will also help coordinate the Panthers' special teams along with serving as the team's recruiting coordinator.

Morgan has several years of experience at the high school and collegiate levels as both a player and coach. The Port Arthur, Texas native was an All-American and Academic All-American placekicker in addition to a three-time team captain at Grambling State University from 2001 to 2004. He helped the Tigers earn two SWAC Championships in 2001 and 2002 and was a three-time All-SWAC selection and a two-time All-American.

Morgan's name is etched in the SWAC and national recordbooks as he's the all-time leading scorer amongst SWAC kickers and the career record holder with 50 field goals and single season field goal leader with 18. He also led Division I-AA following the 2001 campaign with 18 field goals and finished as the I-AA all-time leader with 197 extra points. Once his career came to a close following the 2004 season, Morgan served as a student assistant on the Grambling State coaching staff. With Morgan's assistance, the Tigers finished

the 2005 season with an 11-1 overall record which culminated with a SWAC and Black College National Championships.

A 2005 biology graduate of Grambling State, Morgan returned home and began his coaching career at Port Arthur Memorial High School. While at Memorial, Morgan served as their linebackers coach, special teams and video coordinator in addition to coaching the school's soccer team for three years.

Morgan returned to the collegiate level in 2009 and accepted a graduate assistant position at the University of North Texas. He served as UNT's defensive graduate assistant with emphasis on the linebackers along with coaching special teams. Individually, Morgan played a part in helping UNT linebacker Craig Robinson finish as the eighth-leading tackler in the nation following the 2010 season. Also, UNT's field goal and punt block teams blocked three kicks under Morgan's watch.

He's currently pursuing a master's at the University of North Texas and is a member of the American Football and Texas High School Football Coaches Association.

Raasaan Haralson

Raasaan Haralson begins his second season as the defensive backs coach at Prairie View A&M University.

In his first season at Prairie View A&M, Haralson was instrumental of developing cornerback Moses Ellis into an All-American. Ellis led the nation in interceptions in 2010 and broke up 22 passes. As a result, Ellis became Prairie View's third consecutive consensus All-American in addition to earning All-SWAC First Team Honors. Haralson also aided in the growth of safety Chris Adingupu as the senior closed out his career at Prairie View A&M with a career-high 83 tackles, eight pass deflections, an All-SWAC Second Team berth and a free agent contract with the NFL's Minnesota Vikings. On the season, Panthers finished second in pass defense amongst SWAC foes and 15th nationally as they only yielded 164.6 yards per contest and came within three of yards of setting a school record in pass yardage allowed after holding Lincoln University to only 12 yards. As a unit, the secondary played a key part in the pass game as the 2010 defense tied the school single-season school record with 16 total interceptions.

Haralson, who joined the staff in May of 2010, joined the Panthers from Louisiana State University, where he served one season as a graduate assistant under veteran defensive coordinator John Chavis. In his position, he worked with a Tiger defense that ranked third in the SEC and No. 12 in the nation in scoring defense going into the 2010 Capital One Bowl game. As an assistant with the linebackers, Haralson worked with a unit that combined for 346 tackles, 27.5 tackles for losses and five sacks which also included LSU's top four tacklers on defense for 2009.

He got his start in college coaching in 2007 as a graduate assistant coach at University of Tennessee. He served in the capacity for two years, working on the defensive side of the ball and learning under the tutelage of coaching greats Phillip Fulmer and John Chavis. While at Tennessee, Haralson worked with one of the nation's top defensive units. In 2007, the Volunteers ended the season as SEC East champions; in 2008, the Volunteers defense was ranked third in the country in total and fourth in the country in pass defense. As an assistant with the secondary, Haralson worked with a talented secondary unit that included NFL first round draft pick and Jim Thorpe Award winner defensive back Eric Berry, who was recognized by five All-America outlets -- American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Football Foundation, Football Writers Association of America, Associated Press and Sporting News.

Prior to working with football, he spent two years as a UT assistant strength and conditioning coach for football and track. Haralson began his coaching career on the high school level at Istrouma High School in Baton Rouge, La. where he coached football and girl's track & field. A former defensive back at Southern University under head coach Pete Richardson, Haralson helped spark the Jaguars to a pair of 11-1 seasons that each ended in SWAC Championships and Heritage Bowl victories

(1993, 1995).

Former NFL defensive standout Bubba McDowell joins the Prairie View A&M coaching staff for his first season as the team's safeties coach.

Born in Georgia and raised in Florida, McDowell was a four-year letterman at the University of Miami and earned a National Championship ring as a starter on the undefeated 1987 squad under former head coach Jimmy Johnson. McDowell was also recognized by ESPN for his play on the gridiron that season as his knock down of a two-point attempt against longtime rival Florida State was featured as the 11th-best play that defined college football. He graduated with a degree in business management from the university in 1989.

McDowell was drafted by the NFL's Houston Oilers in 1989 and immediately became a starter en route to earning First Team All-Rookie Accolades from Pro Football Weekly and Football News. After a solid rookie year, McDowell played a big part in the Oilers' success on the field as they posted five consecutive winning seasons and five AFC Playoff berths from 1989 to 1993. In 1991, McDowell earned NFL All-Pro Honors and was honored by the Oilers with the "Ed Block Memorial Courage Award" which acknowledged his courage in the pursuit of professional excellence.

During his final season with the Oilers in 1994, McDowell was selected as the Houston Oilers' NFL Man of the Year for his work in the community. McDowell moved to the state of North Carolina prior to the 1995 season and helped usher in a new era as he played on the inaugural roster of the Carolina Panthers before retiring the next season.

Despite concluding his career in North Carolina, McDowell remained popular in the city of Houston for his work in both the business and community sectors. In 1995, he became one of the first two professional athletes to receive the Human Enrichment of Life "Young African American Achiever" award. During the same year, he became the first athlete ever to receive the Friends of Friends "Positive Influential African American Male" award. In 1996, McDowell earned the first "Warren Moon Athletic and Community Service Award" by Houston's United Negro College Fund which recognized former professional athletes who have excelled in their particular sport while improving the lives of others.

In the business sector, McDowell was a partner and vice president for Copeland's of New Orleans in Houston for several years. However, the urge to return to the gridiron hit McDowell once again which led him to Texas Southern University from 2003 to 2006. In 2007, McDowell moved up to the NCAA Division I-A ranks and accepted the position of safeties coach under former head coach Art Briles at the University of Houston. While at UH, McDowell helped the Cougars field the top pass defense in Conference USA and a berth in the Texas Bowl.

McDowell remained active in a variety of athletic ventures across the Houston area in addition to coaching on the high school level for several years upon Briles' departure from UH in

December of 2007. He has also completed NFL Minority Coaching Internships with the Green Bay Packers, Miami Dolphins and Houston Texans.

McDowell and his wife, Candace have two sons, Trey and Myles.

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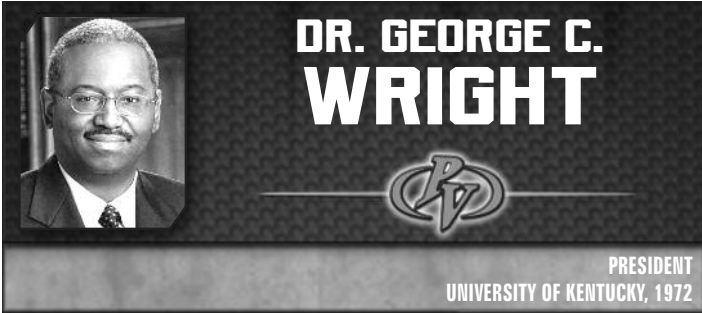

Under Washington's watch, Prairie View has continued to remain in the upper echelon of the Southwestern Athletic Conference as the Panthers finished third overall in the 2010-11 SWAC Commissioner Cup standings and had two female student-athletes selected as the SWAC's Women of the Year.

Faced with the departure of women's basketball coach Cynthia Cooper-Dyke in May of 2010, Washington elevated assistant coach Toyelle Wilson to the head position and quickly reaped the rewards as Wilson guided the Lady Panthers to their third-ever NCAA Tournament Appearance after winning the 2011 SWAC Tournament Championship. The Prairie View A&M Lady Panther bowling program also had another stellar season by capturing their first-ever division crown and second consecutive runner-up appearance in the SWAC Championship. On the diamond, the Panther baseball team turned the corner and returned to the SWAC Tournament for the first time since 2008 while the football posted its fourth consecutive winning season coupled with several men's track performers earning a spot at the NCAA Regionals.

In 2009-10, the athletic program earned the Barbara Jacket/Sadie Magee Award as the top overall women's sports program in the Southwestern Athletic Conference for only the second time in school history. Also during that year, the women's athletic programs at Prairie View boasted several solid performances highlighted by second place finishes in women's basketball, bowling, soccer and outdoor track and field.

On the men's side, the football program recorded its first SWAC Championship since 1964 this past fall while the tennis team recorded its 19th SWAC Championship and second-ever NCAA Championship appearance. In addition, the men's basketball team returned to the SWAC Tournament for the second consecutive season which hasn't happened since 2003.

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W.P. TERRELL (MIT)



The first coach in Prairie View A&M History (then called Prairie View State Normal & Industrial College), Terrell founded football on the Prairie View campus as the student body at the time desired athletics. With help from the athletic club, led by W.C. Rollins and A.J. Sykes in 1904, Prairie View fielded football in 1907 with little funds as coaches and players paid their way for games off the campus.

CALVIN HOFFMAN WALLER (Penn State)



Believed to be Penn State's first African-American graduate, Hoffman's specialty was in agriculture as the Macon, Ga. native served as the head of the agricultural department and was the chair of the FSA Committee for Negroes in Texas. The school's Cooperative Extension Building also bears his name.

ELMER ANDERSON CARTER (Harvard)



Carter was Prairie View's third coach and served for three years. An Army veteran, Carter was the executive secretary for the Urban League in several cities, edited several books and was heavy involved in the United States political system.

HARRY LONG (Millikin)



The brother of Fred "Pop" Long (who would become Prairie View's head coach two decades later), he spent two seasons as head coach. Long was regarded as having one of the best defensive minds ever in the game football.

H.B. HUCLES



The sixth coach in school History (then called Prairie View State Normal & Industrial College), Hucles coached three years at Prairie View and led the Panthers to two winning seasons.

Taylor was the first Prairie View coach to remain for more than four seasons and is known as the "Father of Track" as he introduced track & field to Prairie View A&M. He captured the first two SWAC Championships in school history and ranks second all-time in wins with 74. Taylor continued the string of powerful defensive units as the Panthers as he logged an unprecedented 64 shutouts over the course of his 14-year tenure. He left Prairie View in 1943 as he was named the "Supervisor of Negro Education" for the state of Kentucky. He was one of the primary educators in the state of Kentucky responsible for de-segregation of public schools after the Brown v. Board of Education ruling in 1954. He returned to coach at Kentucky State in 1959.

WILLIAM J. "BILLY" NICKS (Morris Brown College)



On June 1, 1945, the 49th Legislature changed the school name from Prairie View State Normal & Industrial College to Prairie View University. Also during that season, William "Billy" Nicks, formerly the head coach of Morris Brown College and fresh off a two-year stint as USO director at Fort Stewart (Ga.) and then at Tuskegee Army Air Force Base, arrived on campus for the start of a legendary coaching career as the sixth head coach in school history. However, Nicks only spent three seasons at the helm of the Panthers during his first tenure and went 15-9-3 before assuming duties as an assistant coach at Prairie View for four years.

After serving three years as head coach, Nicks remained on staff as an assistant coach and handed the reins to Fred "Pop" Long in 1948. Long, the legendary head coach at Wiley College, had eight SWAC Championships under his belt before coming to Prairie View. The 12th coach in school history, Long went 6-4-1 in his lone season before returning to Texas College for seven years and back to Wiley where he captured one more title in 1957. Prairie View also changed its official name previously in 1947 from Prairie View University to Prairie View Agricultural & Mechanical College of Texas.

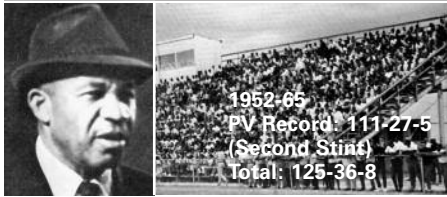

After serving three years as an assistant coach, Nicks assumed control of the Panthers fresh off a SWAC Championship in 1952. His second stint was a far cry from the first as the Griffan, Ga. native finished as the most decorated head coach in school history with seven SWAC titles and five national black college championships while amassing a total of 111 wins. Also, Prairie View became a pro football factory during that time as eight players recruited by Nicks were drafted by either AFL/NFL clubs, including NFL Hall of Famer Kenny Houston and AFL standout Otis Taylor.

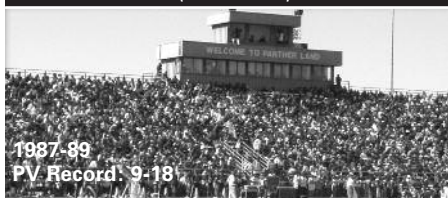

On May 25, 1990, Prairie View A&M announced that it would discontinue its football program which sent ripples throughout college athletics. As a result, the Panthers did not field a team in 1990 but the school reversed its decision several months later and announced it would return to the gridiron in 1991. Legendary Houston high school coach and PV alumnus Luther Booker was picked to revive the program but resigned less than a year on the job. Ronald Beard, an assistant coach at PV since 1984, was selected as the team's 23rd head coach in February of 1991.

Eventually, Beard was let go by Prairie View officials in July of 1995 after compiling a 0-44 record and a losing streak that spanned 46 games.

With several weeks before the start of camp in July of 1995, the new administration released Beard shortly before the annual SWAC Football Media Tour would arrive on campus. Several days after Beard's removal, PV alumnus and former San Antonio ISD Athletic Director Hensley Sapenter was hired as interim coach and athletic director. Sapenter went winless in 1995 but received a dose of good news prior to the 1996 season when the school reinstated athletic scholarships at the NCAA minimum (15.8). However, Sapenter never received a chance to see his first scholarship class graduate as the 1996 season was a tumultuous one. He was suspended for seven games after the Labor Day Classic and assistant Fred Freeman took over for seven games. Sapenter returned with three games remaining but that would be the end as he left winless in two seasons and a losing streak that now spanned 68 games.

HENRY FRAZIER III (Bowie State)



In December of 2003, the Panthers ventured to the East Coast and tabbed former Bowie State head coach Henry Frazier III to do what no coach has done since 1976 – have a winning season. Frazier assembled a solid staff in his first season and brought in some talented newcomers that made history from the opening coin toss as the Panthers defeated TSU for the first time since 1988. One week later, he defeated Paul Quinn for the team's first 2-0 start since 1964. PVAMU won three games that season and marked its most wins since 2001. In 2005, Frazier continued Prairie View's upward swing and guided the Panthers to their best season since 1988 with a 5-6 record. Included among the highlights was the Panthers' first victory over Jackson State since 1971 and the team's first SWAC road win in 17 years. In addition, Frazier moved into some elite company and joined PVAMU legendary head football coach William "Billy" Nicks as the only other coach in Prairie View history to beat Texas Southern in consecutive seasons. During the 2006 campaign, Frazier and staff made history as they defeated Southern University for the first time since 1988 with an overtime victory. Also during the season, Frazier guided Prairie View to its first defensive shutout since 1987 and its first-ever win in school history over Alabama A&M. In 2007, the Panthers enjoyed a four-game turnaround from the previous season as their 7-3 record marked the program's first winning season since 1976. For his history-making efforts on the field, Frazier was selected as Coach of the Year by the College Sporting News and the Black College Sports Page. After a history-making 2007 season, Frazier continued to rewrite the record books in 2008 as he led the Panthers to a No. 25 national ranking after the team posted its best record since 1964 following a 9-1 season. Due to his efforts, the national media took notice as Frazier was named the Sheridan Broadcast Network/Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year in addition to the American Football Coaches Region III FCS Coach of the Year. In December of 2003, the Panthers ventured to the East Coast and tabbed former Bowie State head coach Henry Frazier III to do what no coach has done since 1976 – have a winning season. Frazier assembled a solid staff in his first season and brought in some talented newcomers that made history from the opening coin toss as the Panthers defeated TSU for the first time since 1988. One week later, he defeated Paul Quinn for the team's first 2-0 start since 1964. PVAMU won three games that season and marked its most wins since 2001. In 2005, Frazier continued Prairie View's upward swing and guided the Panthers to their best season since 1988 with a 5-6 record. Included among the highlights was the Panthers' first victory over Jackson State since 1971 and the team's first SWAC road win in 17 years. PRAIRIE VIEW A&M PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE KENNY HOUSTON



Ken Houston excelled as the premier free safety of his era in a 14-year span that began with the 1967 Houston Oilers who drafted him in the ninth round of the AFL-NFL draft after a solid career under legendary head coach William J. "Billy" Nicks at Prairie View A&M University. He earned a starter's role by the third game of his rookie season. Two weeks later, in a game against the New York Jets, he scored two touchdowns, one on a 71-yard blocked field goal attempt, and the other on a 43-yard interception return.

After excelling for six years with the Oilers, Ken was traded to the Redskins for five veteran players in 1973. The Redskins once referred to Houston as "pro football's most underrated super-star," but his capabilities were widely recognized. He won all-league acclaim with the Oilers in 1969 and 1971, and then was either All-Pro or All-NFC with the Redskins every year from 1973 to 1979.

He was selected for either the AFL All-Star game or the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl 12 straight seasons from 1968 through 1979. With a long, fluid stride, he had excellent speed and quickness. His 6-3, 197-pound frame made him an ideal pass defender. Yet his lean, muscular body helped him to become a punishing tackler.

Once he got his hands on the ball, he was a talented runner. Even before he finished his tenure with the Oilers, Houston had assured himself of a spot in the NFL record book by returning nine interceptions for touchdowns. He also tied two other records with four TDs on steals in one season and two interception touchdowns in a single game.

Altogether, he stole 49 passes and returned them 898 yards. He also recovered 21 fumbles and scored 12 touchdowns, nine on interceptions and one each on a punt return, a fumble return, and a blocked field goal return.

Since leaving the world of professional football, Houston has committed his life to education and athletics - serving as a coach, teacher, and counselor.

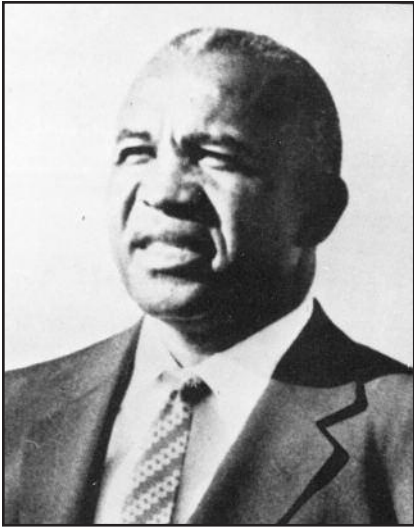
He is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Byron Whizzer Award for Humanitarian Service, which was bestowed upon him by the NFL Players Association; the Outstanding Civilian Service Award from the Department of the Army; the Vince Lombardi Memorial Award; the Bart Starr Meritorious Award; the Dodgers NFL Man of the Year Award; and the Texas All-Time Professional Football Team Award. In addition, he was named Man of the Year for 1980- 1981 by the Washington Redskins, is Honorary Chairman for the Special Olympics, and is a member of Fellowship of Christian Athletes, the Texas High School Coaches Association, and For Kids Sake.

A native of Lufkin, Texas, Houston received his bachelor's degree in health and physical education and elementary education from Prairie View A&M University. In addition, he holds a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Prairie View A&M.

He and his wife, Gustie, have two children.

PRAIRIE VIEW A&M COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE **WILLIAM J. "BILLY" NICKS**

William J. "Billy" Nicks was born Aug 2, 1905 in Griffin, Ga. and attended Morris Brown High School and Morris Brown College in Atlanta. In college, he played end and halfback and was the team punter in addition

to being a member of MBC's basketball, baseball and track teams. athletics and in some years coached basketball and baseball. In 1966, he was named special assistant to the university president and remained there until 1973. In 1975, Nicks was named Director of Parks and Recreation for the city of Houston and held the position until 1984

For his efforts, Nicks was honored by Morris Brown College with "Billy" Nicks Day in 1964, the city of Atlanta in 1982 and the naming of the Prairie View A&M Athletic Complex in 1988.

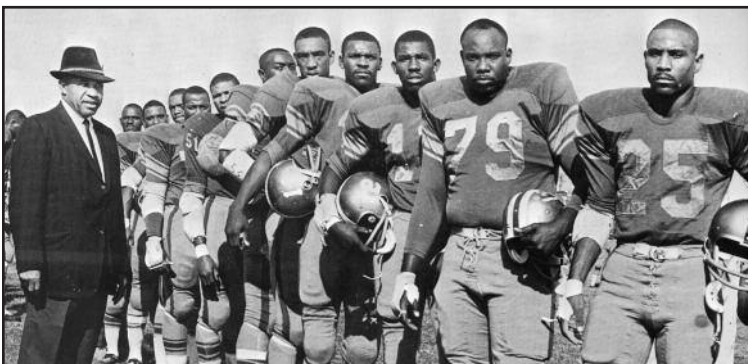
Nicks died peacefully on Nov. 2, 1999 in Houston at the age of 94.

After one year coaching at Washington High School in Atlanta, Ga., Nicks moved to Morris Brown College and was head football coach and principal from 1930-35, 1937-39 and 1941-42 and compiled a 66-22-13 mark and a 1941 Pittsburgh Courier Black College National Championship.

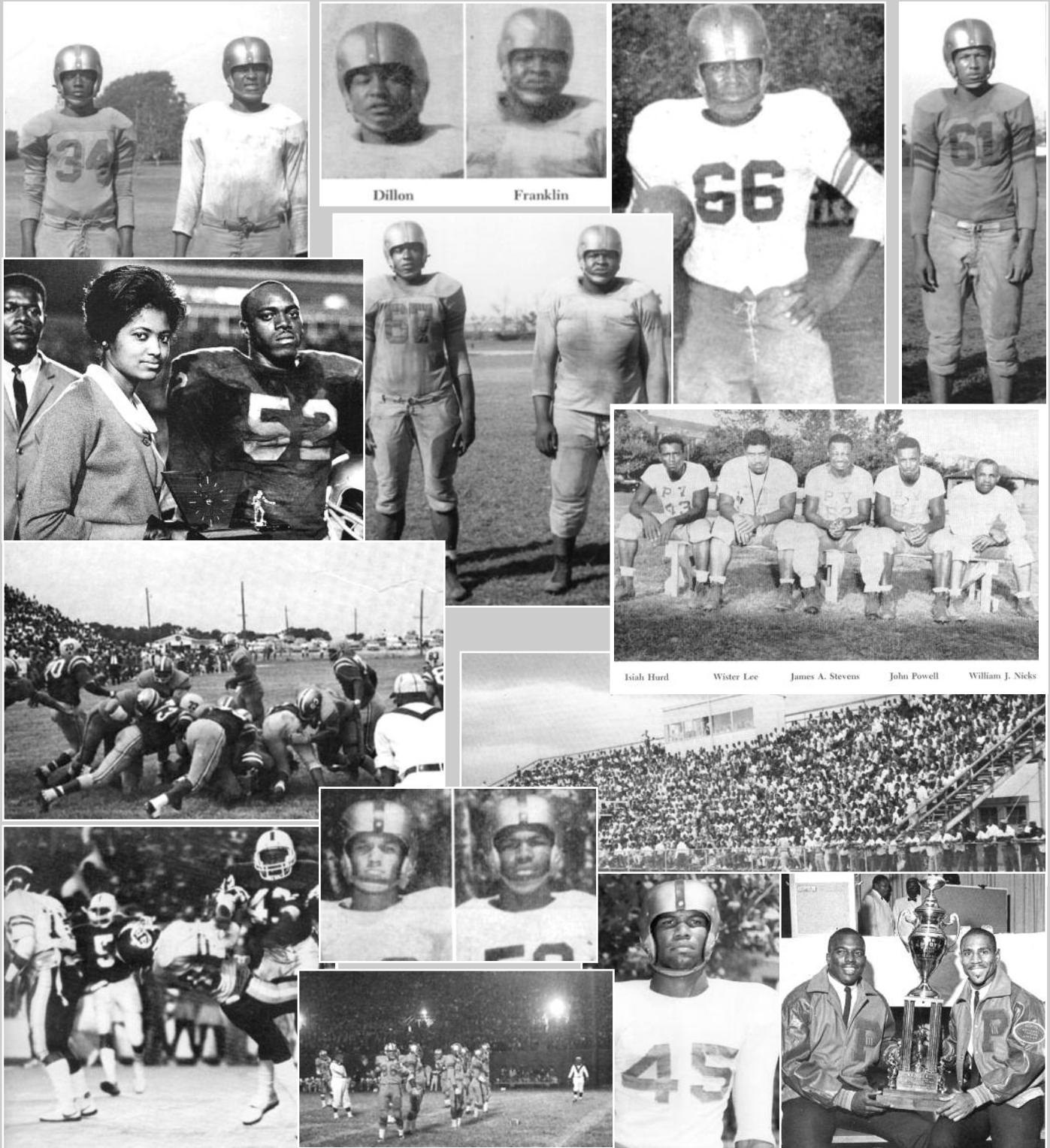
In 1943-44, Nicks left football and was the USO director at Fort Stewart (Ga.) and then at Tuskegee Army Air Force Base. He returned to the gridiron two years later and moved to Prairie View A&M University as head coach from 1945-47. Nicks stepped down and served as an assistant coach for four seasons but returned to his head coaching duties in 1952.

During his second stint at Prairie View, Nicks compiled a record of 111-27-5 and captured eight Southwestern Athletic Conference championships and five Black College National Championships. He recruited 15 players who eventually were drafted from Prairie View by either AFL/NFL clubs, most notably NFL Hall of Famer Kenny Houston and AFL standout Otis Taylor His career record for 28 years was 193-61-21, a winning percentage of .763.

After football, Nicks served Prairie View as director of

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THE MARCHING STORM

The very soul and spirit of every historically black university is conveyed through its marching band. From the deep, rich sounds of the tubas, the elegance of the majorettes down to the exuberant dance routines of the drum majors, black college life would not be the same without its bands. With that in mind, no marching band comes close to uplifting its fans like the Prairie View A&M University "Marching Storm". The band's high octane, in-your-face routines are unmatched. The Marching Storm stands out from the rest of the pack with its theme-oriented halftime pageants, innovative drum routines and professional musical sound.

Through its performances, the nationally regarded Marching Storm and their renowned, classy dance troupe, the "Black Foxes", has had the privilege of sharing the spirit and culture of Prairie View to a wide range of audiences and venues. The band has participated in high profile events such as the inaugural parades of George W. Bush, Jr. as governor of Texas and President of the United States, Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, Calif, the Battle of The Flowers Parade in San Antonio, Texas, the opening of Houston's Reliant Stadium and a live nationally televised audience on CBS's "The Early Show" in January 2001.

As a result of its past success, the Storm's popularity stretches from coast to coast as they were selected through a nationwide vote to participate in the annual Honda Battle of the Bands for three consecutive years. During January of 2004, the Storm received a standing ovation from a capacity crowd for its performance in the Georgia Dome during the second annual Honda Battle of the Bands contest in Atlanta. In July of 2006, the Storm also performed during the annual ESSENCE Music Festival held in Reliant Stadium.

With all of the aforementioned achievements it could be easy for a band of this magnitude to rest on its laurels. However, the band has astonishingly been in existence for 80-plus years! The great success that the band has experienced can be attributed to its tremen-

dous work ethic. For a monument to stand the test of time to the degree that the Marching Storm has, truly takes sacrifice, dedication, and extreme hard work. In addition to work ethic, a strong leader is also needed and that's where former head band director George Edwards (1948-2009) came into play.

For 24 years, Edwards, commonly referred to as "Prof", transformed the band from a small ensemble to a national icon known as the "Marching Storm."

The proud holder of a bachelor's and master's in music education from Florida A&M and Michigan State Universities, Edwards received musical training from some of the best in the business.

A host of assistant directors have been alongside Edwards throughout the years but the "Big 3" of Dr. William McQueen (drills/instrumentation), Professor Larry Jones (percussion) and Dr. Margaret Sherrod ("Black Foxes" Dance Troupe) has played a huge role in the success of the Storm. Along with the three, former Storm drum major Mark Gordon continued the tradition and returned to assist Edwards and staff several years ago.

Keeping in line with Prairie View A&M's motto: Prairie View Produces Productive People; several of the Marching Storm's prominent alumni include the likes of Terry Ellis (member of the Multi-Platinum recording group En Vogue), Virgin Records singing group IDEAL and Ricky LaFontaine of the Richard Smallwood Singers. In addition, the Storm also has several of its alumni directing top-notch high school bands across the state of Texas.

The Marching Storm's intense and highly choreographed style allows them to share a little of Pantherland with ones who ordinarily do not get to experience Prairie View's magic abroad.
