Hate Crime In Katy Sparks Fire of Support and Activism

HOUSTON--Sixteen-year lovers Fred Mangione and Kenneth Stern, who made their living as waiters and selling cosmetics on the side, frequently ended their days at Dolly's Place, a neighborhood pub in Katy on the outskirts of Texas' largest city.

But a jarring halt to the relationship and their routine came last week when both were attacked and one died at the hands of two half-brothers--self-proclaimed members of a California-based neo-Nazi organization.



said that they were "going to get a fag." Later, they bragged: "We cut up this fag real bad."

The suspects, both from Columbia Falls, Mont., and visiting their mother in the Katy area, have been charged and are in custody. Harris County Sheriff Tommy Thomas lost no time declaring the killing "a hate crime."

Stern told police that the four had met at the bar and taken a drive together to get cigarettes. They returned to the bar 30 minutes later, with Stern and one of the suspects going inside, where Stern was attacked. When he returned to his van, he found Mangione dying.

The suspects were caught running from the scene, covered in blood. They confessed to the crime but claimed it was provoked by sexual advances.

Carolyn Mobley, associate pastor of Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection, termed the murder "heinous."

Mobley said: "The fact that these people would brag about it like there was no consequence indicates to me that they actually thought someone would approve. I hope and pray that our society is ready to stand up and say, 'no more, we will not tolerate this kind of hate, this kind of barbarism'."

Meanwhile, the German Peace Corps, the California-based neo-Nazi group with which the suspects claim affiliation, is under investigation by the FBI. Norma Graves, co-president of P-FLAG Houston, said she has been "pleased by the response from the FBI to this horrible act because they immediately classified the crime as a hate crime and are investigating it as domestic terrorism."

"I think only when our leaders in government respond in this way will it result in a greater understanding of the importance of stiffer hate crimes penalties," added Graves.

The suspects have been charged and are being held in the Harris County jail on \$50,000 bail each. "This was good work by law enforcement and the deputy who apprehended them," said Annise Parker, who serves as law enforcement liaison to the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus.

hate crime." Harris said the suspects said they committed the crime because one of the assaulted men had placed a hand on one of them in their van. The brutal murder--the tenth slaying of a gay man in Texas in recent years--left a statewide community in mourning but no more so than the mothers of Stern and Mangione, who lived with them.

The Rev. David Welles of the Thai Presbyterian Church of Houston, who last Sunday participated in a memorial service for Mangione, said he knew Mangione and Stern as neighbors. He said Mangione "was friendly with everyone... almost naively that way" and termed his neighbors "reliable, trustworthy, good community members."

"Fred cared for both his own mother and Kenny's mom," said Welles. "He could not imagine not caring for them. I'm proud to have known Fred."

Stern said Mangione, 46, suffered more than 35 knife wounds. "He bled to death in my arms," reportedly said Stern. "I said, 'Breathe with me, breathe with me', but he was gone."

Witnesses told police that, earlier, the suspects--Daniel Christopher Bean, 19, and Ronald Henry Gauthier, 21--had

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Patrol Deputy Tim Navarre spotted the two suspects running near the police department's new storefront on Katy's Clay Road, as he was about to end a late-night shift. He later learned about the murder scene they were fleeing.

Harris County Sheriff Tommy Thomas promptly declared: "This was definitely a

PFLAG In Action

STRAIGHT FROM THE HEART, by Mary K. Jones

How can we promote love and tolerance for our gay children? Let me share what I have been doing.

When I saw Dee Mosbacher's powerful video "Straight From the Heart", I knew I had to order this video and try to get this information into our Sunday School Classes at my church. After I received the video, I showed it to my friends individually, then to small groups of friends, always trying to get someone to present it as a Sunday School Lesson.

Finally, I decided that if it was to be done, I would have to do it myself. Praying for courage, I took the video to the staff member in charge of approving teachers and the material that would be presented to the adult Sunday School classes. I told him that there was so much misinformation about the Gay Community that I wanted to share with my friends and acquaintances at the church that our son was gay and to tell them how much we loved and cared for him. Also, to let them know how proud we are of our children, both gay and straight.

After he previewed the video, he approved it, and I was on the list. I felt excited and nervous! Keep in mind that this was the first time I had ever taught adult classes, even though I have a background of teaching children and teens. I belong to Memorial Drive Methodist Church which has a large membership with 20 adult classes. Now the next step would be to get invited to some of these classes.

The new list of teachers and their subjects went out last January, and it was April before I was asked to teach. However, I have now been invited to eight different classes, and I have had some really good feed-back. One woman told the class after the video that she had five close friends that had gay children, and she asked for extra hand-outs (material from "Healing the Hurt" conferences that I had copied) to send to her friends. Also, she called me later to find out how her friends could order the video.

Each time I presented my lesson, there were always some members in the class that acknowledged their support for what I was doing and told me that the church needed to hear and act out this message of love and tolerance for all people. This video does the work for you, so all you have to do is find someone to watch it. By the way, I just found out that I will be on the new teachers list coming out in 1996.

Area Teen Coalition of Homosexuals. "Until we educate people in high schools, and even in junior high and elementary schools, about gays, then hate crimes will not be a surprise and will constantly occur."

Aaron Masterson, president of the Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Alliance at the University of Houston, said Mangione's murder is another example of the link between hate speech, political rhetoric and violence. "Certain religious people say it's okay to hate sin but to love the sinner," he said.

"Some get this message but many don't. They are taught that homosexuality is wrong and they use it to justify killing in the name of God.

"Stopping hate-related violence will continue to be one of our top priorities in Texas," said Diane Hardy-Garcia, executive director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. She noted that Ft. Worth police are still investigating the stabbing death last month of Jackie Wayne Myers, who was gay.

Our gay children have decided--in defiance of a massive social tide of misinformation and hostility--that accepting their God-given natures is part of their quest for authenticity and wholeness. They have shown us honesty, courage and compassion. They are gifted and giving Americans.

That's why we are proud of them.

That's why we are grateful to them.

That's why we are going to Washington.

1996 has started off on a rather sad note. Another one of our gay loved ones was brutally murdered on January 4. My emotions have run the gamut from anger to sadness to helplessness. Intrigued by the several stories about PFLAG and public libraries I had read in my email, I stopped by my local public library branch. First, I searched on keyword "homosexual" and was dismayed to find only 2 books - both perhaps outdated having been published years ago. However, searching on "gay" found 56 titles - one about a parrot named "Gayneck" and all the others about our topic. "Lesbian" revealed over 20 books - some of course on former list, having "gay" in title also.

I was a bit surprised to find Bob Bernstein's new book "Straight Parents, Gay Children" on the shelves, considering how new it is. Eric Marcus's "Is It a Choice" was there, too. Some of you reading this know I am a "DittoHead" (80% dittos), and may not be pleased to hear that Rush Limbaugh's books are shelved in the same rack between the 2 above-mentioned volumes. (Such are the workings of the LC or Dewey Decimal System or however books are cataloged.)

Anyway, I took Bernstein's book up to the middle-aged lady at the reference desk, and said I wanted to complement the library for having such book. Her eyes lit up and she said they try to carry books for all needs of their patrons. She then showed me where, almost hidden as on purpose, Cassell's "Dictionary of Gay Language" or some such (I think published by the language-dictionary people.) resided in the reference stacks among unrelated tomes. I gave her a P-FLAG brochure ("About Our Children"), which I always carry in my backpack "just in case" and she filed it away with other brochures. But not before a young lady behind the reference desk saw it and said "Oh, P-FLAG!" I turns out she has a gay cousin and knew all about P-FLAG. She's been to one meeting and said she will attend the next.

Anyway, this librarian is open for suggestions for other books to acquire and definitely will be a helpful person if any patrons enlist her help in finding books on homosexuality. The only bad thing now is that I may not be able to follow Emily's hint of putting P-FLAG business cards in the books - because she knows I would be the culprit.

Nationwide, the lobbying strategy is two-fold: PFLAGers going to Washington are making appointments to call on their two Senators and 1 U.S. representative.

Other PFLAGers are contacting their Members of Congress at home, calling on them in person and writing them to urge their support of ENDA (Employment Non Discrimination Act).

That's where YOU come in.

We are asking you to contact YOUR Members of Congress--Senator Phil Gramm, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, and your Representative.

Don't know who your U.S. Representative is? NOW is the time to find out, not just for this issue, but for all those that lie ahead of us. Here's some ways to find out:

AND, we'll have postcards for you to sign and address, which we'll mail for you. (Donations appreciated for the stamps!) NOW, what is your message to your Members of Congress? (Use your own words. But to be sure you know each one's status, in relation to ENDA)

Seasons of Grief and Grace: A Sister's Story of AIDS by Susan Wiltshire. Former Governor, Ann Richards, describes the book as "A powerful reminder that the tragedy of AIDS extends beyond personal sadness and grief to issues of family and community -- and ultimately to the very heart of our nation's life."

I'll Not Go Quietly: Mary Fisher Speaks Out by Mary Fisher. "Some of us will only have these insights on our deathbed -- if then -- and at that point it may be too late to use that knowledge. Or else, we can read Mary Fisher's wonderful, sagacious, and transforming document and have our epiphany here on earth." Abraham Verghese, author of *My Own Country*

My Own Country: A Doctor's Story by Abraham Verghese. In Johnson City, Tennessee, in 1985, Dr. Verghese became by necessity the local AIDS expert. Out of his experience comes a startling but ultimately uplifting portrait of the American heartland as it confronts -- and surmounts -- its deepest prejudices and fears.

The Journey Out: A Guide For and About Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Teens by Pollack and Schwartz. The Journey Out includes: Common sense advice on how (and whether) to "come out," health, religion in a gay life and more; personal stories; practical strategies to prepare you for whatever may come your way on the journey out.

Joining the Tribe: Growing Up Gay and Lesbian in the '90's by Linnea Due. "A compelling tribute to human suffering and determined resiliency, Joining the Tribe shatters the formidable myths facing lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) youth today. Ms. Due has done a marvelous job of showing how LGBT youth are eloquent warriors and leaders in their own rights." Jenie Hall, Director, Bridges Project, Philadelphia

School's Out: The Impact of Gay and Lesbian Issues on America's Schools by Dan Woog. From the scared teenager who doesn't want his teammates to know he's gay, to the straight teacher who wants to honor diversity by teaching gay issues in the classroom, Woog puts a human face on the people who truly are fighting for "liberty and justice for all." Together, the stories that make up School's Out shed light on a brave new era in American education.

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At that meeting I related some of the important conversation my daughter and I had. I told of my worry that I had let her down in my response, and my fear that her life from here on would be erratic, rootless and difficult.

The other parents, without any attempt to sound like psychologists, enlightened and encouraged me. They relieved my guilt. And, most important, the Lesbians and Gays told me, in open discussion and one-to-one during the break, that many of their experiences paralleled my daughter's: going through career and social upsets while coming out to themselves. And they reassured me that I had not let her down.

I was given several very helpful pamphlets, but I knew they were not to substitute for the human contact I was to have. They were to help me frame further questions and reinforce all I was learning.

But gratitude for the help I received more than five years ago, and the wish to help other parents as I was helped, is only one reason I keep coming to meetings. Another big reason is that my Lesbian daughter and I live many miles apart. The Gays and Lesbians who come to PFLAG, whom I've come to know and consider friends, provide me with continuing insight that help me understand my daughter though I can't be with her very much.

Some of my daughter's Lesbian friends have told me that their parents refused to have anything to do with them after they came out. If any of the Gays and Lesbians who come to our meetings are in that position, perhaps I fill a need for them.

To get to Rice University and the Student Center, take entrance 13 off Rice Blvd. At the second stop sign the student center will be diagonally across the street on your left. There are two adjacent parking lots across from the student center (on your right). You may park in either one. Enter the double doors of the student center which face the parking lots. Walk through the building and out the double doors at the other end of the building. Follow the outdoor corridor and take a right at the end. The chapel is immediately on your left.

Resolution and Petition Against Radical Right

A Resolution to Condemn the false and inflammatory anti-homosexual campaign of Pat Robertson, Founder, the Christian Coalition & CEO, the Christian Broadcasting Network.

Employment Non-Discrimination Act & Defense of Marriage Act in Spotlight

Two pieces of gay/lesbian-related legislation with very different agendas have recently been in the spotlight. On July 12, the US House of Representatives voted by 5 to 1 margin in favor of the anti-gay Defense of Marriage Act, or DOMA. This bill defines marriage as a legal union between a man and a woman and allows states to refuse to recognize same-sex marriages performed in another state. It also excludes same-sex couples from any possible federal benefits - such as Social Security or veteran's benefits, even if legally married under the laws of a state.

While this bill has yet to go to a vote in the Senate, unfortunately President Clinton has stated his support of DOMA and the fact that he would sign it if it reaches his desk. In what is seen by some as an interesting twist, the Human Rights Campaign, a gay and lesbian political lobbying group, is urging the Senate to amend the Nickles Bill, the Senate's companion bill to DOMA, with the Employment Non-Discrimination Act. This would force anti-gay Senators to pass legislation they are opposed to in ENDA in order to pass the Nickles Bill. In other words, it would likely stall the process. More on this issue is sure to come.

Meanwhile, the Senate recently held hearings on ENDA that included a number of supporters. According to Elizabeth Birch, executive director of the Human Rights Campaign, Employers in 41 states are free to fire any employees because he or she is gay. State laws forbid on-the-job discrimination in the remaining nine but anti-gay bias "remains sanctioned by federal law, or rather by the absence of any law prohibiting it," she told the subcommittee.

No one spoke against the bill -- named H.R. 1863 after the year President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation -- at the hearing although opponents were invited to testify, subcommittee Chairman Peter Torkildsen, R-Mass., said. In a written statement, however, the conservative Family Research Council denounced the bill as a "gay jobs bill" that "will not only endanger the freedom of millions of Americans to conduct their businesses according to their most deeply held moral beliefs, but .. will entangle businesses of all types in expensive litigation."

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., plans to introduce the bill as an amendment to another bill that has drawn the anger of gay-rights groups and the applause of some conservatives who say "homosexual extremists" are trying to force all Americans to accept gay marriage.

The Human Rights Campaign released a study this week reporting that 251 of the nation's Fortune 500 companies have policies forbidding discrimination based on sexual orientation. They include IBM, Time-Warner, American Express, and Johnson & Johnson. The study also stated that 66 of the 100 US Senators and 238 of the 435 House members have similar staff-hiring policies.

GFLA is a non-profit organization dedicated to presenting positive image of Gays and Lesbians during the weeks coinciding with the upcoming GOP Convention. The organization, launched by Brad Diskin, Gene Burkard and Don Belcher has been endorsed by the City of San Diego Human Relations Commission and Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG), San Diego Chapter.

GFLA will also place several display advertisements in key San Diego publications, designed to attract both local and national media attention. The ambitious media blitz is scheduled to begin July 15 and continue through August 15. The estimated cost of the entire project is \$37,000.

"Those appearing on the billboards are real people from all walks of life," said Brad Diskin, committee member of GLFA.

Diskin and his life partner, Alex Urbano, along with GLFA's advertising firm, recently flew to Arizona for the photo shoot of the first billboard. Urbano and Diskin planned the shoot during a 4 generation family gathering.

A Congressional Speech to Remember...

The following is taken from the Congressional Record of the 104th Congress during debate on the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) on July 11, 1996. This speech given by Rep. John Lewis, an African-American Democrat from Georgia's 5th District, is one to remember.

Let me say to the gentleman that when I was growing up in the south during the 1940s and the 1950s, the great majority of the people in that region believed that black people should not be able to enter places of public accommodation, and they felt that black people should not be able to register to vote, and many people felt that was right but that was wrong. I think as politicians, as elected officials, we should not only follow but we must lead, lead our districts, not put our fingers into the wind to see which way the air is blowing but be leaders.

Mr. Chairman, this is a mean bill. It is cruel. This bill seeks to divide our nation, turn Americans against Americans, sow the seeds of fear, hatred and intolerance. Let us remember the Preamble of the Declaration of Independence: We hold these truths self-evident that all people are endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights. Among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

This bill is a slap in the face of the Declaration of Independence. It denies gay men and women the right to liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Marriage is a basic human right. You cannot tell people they cannot fall in love. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. used to say when people talked about interracial marriage and I quote, "Races do not fall in love and get married. Individuals fall in love and get married."

Why do you not want your fellow men and women, your fellow Americans to be happy? Why do you attack them? Why do you want to destroy the love they hold in their hearts? Why do you want to crush their hopes, their dreams, their longings, their aspirations?

We are talking about human beings, people like you, people who want to get married, buy a house, and spend their lives with the one they love. They have done no wrong.

I will not turn my back on another American. I will not oppress my fellow human being. I have fought too hard and too long against discrimination based on race and color not to stand up against discrimination based on sexual orientation. Mr. Chairman, I have known racism. I have known bigotry. This bill stinks of the same fear, hatred and intolerance. It should not be called the Defense of Marriage Act. It should be called the defense of mean-spirited bigots act.

I urge my colleagues to oppose this bill, to have the courage to do what is right. This bill appeals to our worst fears and emotions. It encourages hatred of our fellow Americans for political advantage. Every word, every purpose, every message is wrong. It is not the right thing to do, to divide Americans. We are moving toward the 21st century. Let us come together and create one nation, one people, one family, one house, the American house, the American family, the American nation.

An Olympic Book Review

Gay Olympian: The Life and Death of Dr. Tom Waddell,
by Tom Waddell and Dick Schaap, Alfred A. Knopf, \$23

How much can be said about a decathlete who finished only sixth in the 1968 Mexico City Games, when the event's history includes Jim Thorpe, Rafer Johnson, Bob Mathias and Bill Toomey? A bookful can be said, and *Gay Olympian*, which alternates between Schaap's narrative and Waddell's letters to his daughter, is more than worth a pre-Atlanta read.

Waddell lived a couple of lifetimes in the 49 years he had before he died of AIDS in 1987. He earned a medical degree, became an expert in infectious diseases, excelled in one of sports' most grueling tests, created the Gay Games and forced anyone who met him to reconsider his or her notions about homosexuals. One such man was '68 gold medalist Toomey, who admitted to feelings of homophobia before he was reunited with his rival early in '87. Said Toomey when the meeting was over: "He's a very valuable person to this planet."

Not everyone agreed with that, least of all the USOC. After Waddell announced plans to found the Gay Olympic



Games in 1982, the USOC got an injunction that forced him to drop the word Olympic from the title of what became known as the Gay Games. Fourteen years earlier in Mexico City, Waddell, an Army captain, angered the USOC by supporting Tommie Smith and John Carlos, who had raised black-gloved hands during the national anthem. Waddell, who was serving as U.S. team physician even as he pursued a decathlon medal, said the protesters "have been discredited by the flag more often than they have discredited it."

Those and other comments led to a threatened court-martial by Col. Don Miller, later executive director of the USOC. Miller never followed through, perhaps because Waddell performed so well, losing a chance at a medal only because he was a relatively poor runner.

That's ironic because Waddell never stopped running. He was not perfect-his high-risk promiscuity is chronicled in the book-but he was unique, a Renaissance man who, as Schaap says, found success in the event designed for the Renaissance athlete.

Author & this month's speaker Marilyn Bennett Alexander talks about her new book *CHRISTINE WICKER*, Dallas Morning News

DALLAS -- Marilyn Bennett Alexander was looking over a Montana lake in the summer of 1992 and talking about justice with the daughter of Archbishop Desmond Tutu. "Oppression is not only evil but blasphemous because it makes a child of God doubt that he or she is a child of God," said Mpho Tutu, quoting her father.

With one sentence, Mpho Tutu crystallized the pain that Alexander, who is a lesbian and lifelong United Methodist, felt about her church's stance toward gays and lesbians. Mpho Tutu also set off a process of change that has altered Alexander's life considerably.

Today, Alexander is the co-author of a new book, "We Were Baptized Too: Claiming God's Grace for Lesbians and Gays." And last month, she left her job as executive director of Perkins Relations, which handles public affairs, alumni relations and development at Southern Methodist University's Perkins School of Theology.

She had been at the school for 10 years, first as a graduate student of divinity and then as an employee at SMU. The preface to the first-time author's book bears an illustrious name -- Archbishop Tutu himself. In it, the South African clergyman aims harsh words at churches that condemn homosexuality. "We reject them, treat them as pariahs, and push them outside the confines of our church communities, and thereby we negate the consequences of their baptism and ours. We make them doubt that they are the children of God, and this must be nearly the ultimate blasphemy."

The premise of the book Alexander wrote with Chicagoan James Preston is that the Christian church makes a covenant to support and love those it baptizes. She thinks she fulfilled her end of the contract, biblical injunctions against homosexuality notwithstanding. Last month, the general conference of the United Methodist Church affirmed that "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching."

Among the book's main contention is that homosexuality is a state created by God, but Alexander argues that even if homosexuality were wrong, churches are singling out that particular sin for special condemnation. Many churches put other issues, such as slavery and the ordination of women into historical perspective, but are so fearful of allowing gender roles to slip that they continue to preach against homosexuality, she says.

For gay and lesbian Christians the church's current policy is devastating, Alexander says. "When you're told that you're an abomination, that's a long way from saying you're a child of God."

Alexander told her own story in the book as well as those of many other gay and lesbian Christians. Before publication, she says, she helped prepare a crisis management plan for Perkins to head off negative reactions. But there has been no outcry about her or the book, as far as she knows. Some people have that they are concerned that her public acknowledgment might hurt the school, Alexander says.

She also says some alumni supported her. "Some people said,

'I'm so glad Perkins has a prophetic voice -- that's what Perkins used to be,'" she says. Soon after the book was released, responsibility for major fund raising and development at Perkins was transferred to someone else's department. She believes the change was linked to her public admission that she is a lesbian.

"Personnel changes that have been made in the university and in Perkins have been made as a result of university-wide strategic planning and were not motivated by personnel matters with regard to particular people," says Perkins Dean Robin Lovin, who added that he received no feedback critical of the book.

"I've never had a single person call or write," he says. "I think that's because people are becoming used to the idea that these are issues in the life of a church that are going to have to be addressed more openly."

Alexander left Perkins and now works for the Foundation for Human Understanding, a gay and lesbian social service group. She says her book is directed not at fundamentalists, but at the liberal and moderate church. She says such churches' tolerance for non-practicing homosexuals is not enough. Neither is the idea that homosexuals ought to be succored because they are the "stranger" that Christians are asked to protect, she says. "I am not a stranger," says the lifelong church member. "We're equal. I am a child of God."

Alexander says she struggled for much of her adult life against accepting that she is a lesbian. "I was one of those who told (gay and lesbian) people that if only they would accept Jesus, everything would be OK," she says. "I've since had to make amends, to go back and say, 'I was afraid to deal with my own feelings.'"

The question of whether gays and lesbians can change their sexual orientation is one she can't answer for others, she says. "But I've met many people who've known since they were children," she says. "It's not like we got together and said, 'This will be a fun sin. People will hate us and we won't have children and our children will be taken away from us. We'll lose jobs. But let's do it anyway.'"

Five years ago when she fell in love with her partner, she finally began coming out. "I didn't want to commit to secrecy. I was very happy with her and with our life, and I wanted to share it ... I also felt that it was a gift from God and a measure of grace," she says.

The book ends with liturgies to affirm gay and lesbian Christians. One pledges to "act-up with marches, singing, and hosannas until ... (God's) will is done." Alexander sees the book as an extension of her faith's mandate. "Lay down your life for a friend. Reach out and bring hope to the desperate," she says. "My only mistake was that I took that seriously."

ACTION ALERT--ENDA & DOMA

Contact your Senators Today!

As we mentioned last month, the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) is likely to arrive at the Senate in the next few weeks. This bill would exclusively define marriage as being between 1 man and 1 woman. The Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) is also soon to be voted on in the Senate. Here is what we are hearing from our contacts in Washington.

The push is to get Senators to support adding ENDA to the DOMA bill. They have 40 out of 100 to date, so it IS do-able. Even if the strategy doesn't work, any new "signers-on" will add to the overall ENDA sponsorship.

So, NOW is the time to write Senators Kay Bailey Hutchinson & Phil Gramm to let them know we want their support for attaching ENDA to DOMA. We want to overwhelm their Houston and DC offices with information about why ENDA should be passed. Include any personal stories about discrimination that you are aware of. Although Gramm probably won't vote for us, at least he'll know we're out here.

Judge Rules in Favor of Benefits for Homosexual Couples

PORLAND, Ore.—For the first time in the United States, a judge has required a public agency to extend to homosexual couples the medical, life and dental insurance benefits that married couples often have. Judge Stephen L. Gallagher of Multnomah County Circuit Court ruled on Aug. 8 that Oregon Health Sciences University here was discriminating by denying benefits to the domestic partners of three gay employees.

Gallagher said Oregon had to provide insurance to the partners of all gay state workers who sought coverage. "Constitutional law may mandate, like it or not, that customs change with an evolving social order," the judge wrote.

The decision could be stayed if the state appeals before Sept. 9. A spokesman for the state attorney general's office, Peter Cogswell, said the state would decide on an appeal by "the end of next week or the first

part of the following week."

The ruling will not make Oregon the first jurisdiction to extend benefits to homosexual couples. The state of Vermont and about 50 county and city governments, including Boston, San Francisco, Seattle and Portland, Ore., do so. But all those jurisdictions offer the benefits voluntarily or because legislation forces them to.

The Oregon decision is significant, said Beatrice Dohrn, legal director for the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, a gay-advocacy group based in New York, because it sets a precedent that will aid lawyers who are fighting for homosexuals in other states.

Christine Tanner, a professor of nursing at the university, filed the suit, along with another nursing professor and a university pharmacist, in 1992. Ms. Tanner sought to obtain insurance for her partner, Lisa Chickandonz. "It was a long, slow process," Ms. Tanner said in an interview after the ruling, "and now we've attained fairness and equality under the law."

"For me, it was more practical than that," said Ms. Chickandonz, a midwife who is insured through her employer. "I was concerned. What if I became disabled and had no access to health insurance?"

Some conservative groups have denounced the rule. The chairman of the state chapter of the Christian Coalition, Jim Adkisson, said the decision "opens up a Pandora's box." "What's to say now that the courts can't do the same for someone who's married to two or three people?" he asked. "As an employer, I'm worried about the cost impacts." Dan Kennedy, administrator of the state human resources division, said the economic effects would be slight. "Other jurisdictions have extended their benefits," Kennedy said, "and it's had a very minor effect."

Update on PFLAG Houston Project Open Mind

Many of you are aware that Project Open Mind is a national campaign to stop hate speech against our gay and lesbian friends and family. Although our local stations would not air the original TV ads, there are many other things that we have been going on locally to make an impact.

Fortunately, in 1995 PFLAG Houston Project Open Mind received a grant from the John Steven Kellett Foundation to help fund our efforts against hate speech. During the year, this grant has enabled us to sponsor the Hate Crimes Community Meeting, speak at Rodney Ellis's Town Meeting on Hate at the Jewish Community Center, speak with a congregation at Bryan/College Station about their Open and Affirming process, speak with a gay and lesbian student group about Project Open Mind. In addition to those speaking engagements, we had buttons created for distribution at these functions saying "Stop Hate." We also created book marks with ideas to help end discrimination against gay and lesbian people. These were given out to individuals at the International Festival.

Now, we come to a crossroads with Project Open Mind and we will be making some decisions with the two new commercials

The foundation is committed to funding organizations which work to end violence and discrimination, provide education in these areas, and/or seek to develop public policy in areas where such policy is lacking or inadequate.

The Board of PFLAG Houston is honored and grateful for the grant we received. Sincere thanks to the John Steven Kellett Foundation for making so much of this possible.



We expect our billboards to generate positive news media coverage for gays, lesbians, and PFLAG that goes beyond the effect of the billboards themselves. I am often asked to describe the experience of raising a child who is gay - to try to help people who may not share this unique experience to understand it, to imagine how it feels. It is like this...

When you are having a baby and raising a child, it's something like planning a fabulous vacation trip to Italy. You buy a bunch of guidebooks and make your wonderful plans -- the Coliseum, Michelangelo's David, the gondolas in Venice. You learn some handy phrases in Italian. It's all very well-planned and exciting.

After months or even years of eager anticipation, the day finally arrives and your journey begins. Much, much later the plane finally lands. The flight attendant comes on the air and says, "Welcome -- to Holland."

Now, there are some choices to make. You may scream, "Holland? What do you mean Holland? I signed up for Italy and by God, Italy it will be!"

You may refuse to get off the plane. But no matter how long you stomp and fume, no matter how long you rant and rave about your plans and all you've invested to get to Italy, it's still Holland.

You may even go so far as to try to convince the Dutch that deep, deep down, they are really Italians operating under some delusion. You press your handbook of handy Italian phrases into their hands, hoping that if they repeat "Buon Giorno" often enough and practice gesturing significantly and enthusiastically when they speak, that

American Express Extends Employee Benefits to Domestic Partners

Harvey Golub, Chairman of American Express, has announced that the financial services company will extend employee benefits to the domestic partners of its employees as of January, 1997.

Members of the company's Gay/Lesbian Employee Network and Gay/Lesbian Organization to Build Equality applauded the decision, which they had worked for during the past four years. According to the company's official statement, "Our decision does not represent a corporate judgment on a way of life, but rather support for the people who work here. American Express is committed to being the best place to work for all of its employees regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, religion or disability."

During the past year, American Express has also expanded financial services to lesbian and gay clients by offering a financial plan specifically designed for same-sex or other unmarried couples. The company has also granted domestic partners the right of accumulation in mutual fund investing, by which they can qualify for discounts on investments on the same basis as married couples do.

Executives who oppose granting employee benefits to domestic partners of employees usually raise several objections: that it would be unduly expensive, that it would be impossible to administer, or that the customers would object. As more companies like American Express either solve these problems or show that they don't exist, it will weaken the objection to employee-benefit equality for domestic partners until equality becomes the rule in American industry rather than the exception.

Show your Support for Disney Supportive Shopping Planned

All lesbians/gays, their advocates, and supporters are invited to meet at the Walt Disney Store in the Galleria on Saturday, September 7 at 1:00pm. We will be gathering in support of the Disney Corporation for not backing down to the religious right.

The Disney Corp. is being boycotted by both the Southern Baptist & Assemblies of God churches who oppose Disney's "declining moral compass" when it comes to gay and lesbian issues. Those items that especially irked the RR include Disney's providing benefits for their employees in same-sex relationships and their Gay and Lesbian Days at the Disney theme parks.

A PFLAG Houston member speaks out on ENDA & Discrimination

My family just observed a wonderful event this month: the marriage of my half-brother and his new wife. Something keeps me from fully celebrating this union, however. As I greeted my new sister-in-law, a recent immigrant from Japan, I realized that she now enjoys more legally-protected rights in this country than I do, for one simple reason. I am a gay man.

I thought about the most obvious right she has--the right to legally marry the person she loves. She also has the right to serve as her husband's guardian should a medical emergency arise, inherit his military and Social Security benefits, work at her job without fear of being fired for who she is, and have the complete backing of the courts under Hate Crime legislation if she is ever harassed or harmed by bigots. I have none of this.

While I do not begrudge her any of these rights and truly wish her "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," I keep wondering when will I be protected and supported by the laws of my country. How many more thousands of dollars do I need to pay in taxes and how many more letters to my representatives do I need to write before I am no longer treated like a second-class citizen?

My mother, along with other parents from our local chapter of PFLAG (Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) just returned from a trip to Washington, DC where they met with their elected officials and asked for the passage of ENDA (the Employment Non-Discrimination Act). This bill would make it illegal to fire someone based on their sexual orientation. I am truly thankful to this group and hope that other fair-minded Americans will support this legislation so we as a nation can begin to recognize that the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights applies to us all. As for the other rights I mentioned, I'll just keep hoping, praying and working to make them a reality, someday.

Unitarian Universalists Pass Historic Stand On Gay Marriage

What a wonderful resolution!

Indianapolis, IN - June 25, 1996--In an historic vote, delegates to the Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly became the first representatives of a denomination to affirm their support of same-sex marriage. The General Assembly, which has been in session with over 1,500 delegates and 3,000 attendees from 49 states and 7 Canadian provinces, voted overwhelmingly to endorse support of a Resolution of Immediate Witness which was introduced on the Plenary floor in yesterday's session.

The resolution, which was voted on June 25, 1996, passed by a vote of 667 to 19. The resolution supported is printed in its entirety below.

The Unitarian Universalist Association, with continental headquarters in Boston, MA, has had a history of support of social justice causes, and has been an outspoken voice in support of civil rights for gays, lesbians and bisexuals. Resolution of Immediate Witness In Support of the Right to Marry for Same-Sex Couples

BECAUSE Unitarian Universalists affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every person; and

BECAUSE marriage is held in honor among the blessings of life; and

WHEREAS many states, the Congress, and the President of the United States are acting to void the recognition of same-sex marriages and to deny "full faith and credit" to such marriages formalized in Hawaii or any other state;

WHEREAS debate about extending legally recognized marriage to same-sex

couples has focused on the objections of certain religious communities, while the Unitarian Universalist Association has adopted numerous resolutions over the last twenty-six years supporting equal rights for gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered persons, including support of Ceremonies of Union between members of the same sex; and

WHEREAS the Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees and the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association have voted their support for the right to marry for same-sex couples;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that 1996 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association adopts a position of support of legal recognition for marriage between members of the same sex;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 1996 General Assembly urges the Unitarian Universalist Association to make this position known through the media; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the 1996 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association urges the member congregations to proclaim the worth of marriage between any two committed persons and to make this position known in their home communities.

A Friendly Reminder from Fred Wilson

It has been over a year now since I spoke to many of you about passing out PFLAG cards like the one to the right. If, for whatever reason, you haven't started this wonderful habit, start. You won't believe the reward you get when that waiter or store clerk smiles knowingly when they read your card.

We must let everyone everywhere know how we feel. They must know that we are out here and that we support those that support our gay and lesbian loved ones. Unless each of us does our part, the myths, stereotypes, and discrimination will continue to prevail.

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

One Vote: Reflections on the Defeat of ENDA

Editor's Note: By now, all of you have realized that in early-September, the Senate passed the anti-gay Defense of Marriage Act and defeated the Employment Non-Discrimination Act. Both of these events caused a lot of us to think about what had happened. What could we do differently? Here are the thoughts of one of our presidents Gail Rickey.

As the dust began to settle after the U.S. Senate defeated ENDA by a vote of 50 to 49, the image of "one vote" started to form in my mind. For me, it has now become a symbol for the work that we in P-FLAG do as we speak up for full human and civil rights for gays and lesbians. Its symbolism is multiple, addressing our present and our future.

- The more that each of us recognizes the injustices that gays and lesbians face, the more committed we become to exercising our right to cast our **one vote** in elections, and to the need for us to cast that one vote wisely, educating ourselves on the candidates whether they are running for the local school board or the president of the United States.
- If we had been able to get one more U.S. Senator to endorse ENDA, this landmark legislation would have passed the Senate. Similarly, in the last Texas legislative session, the Hate Crimes Bill, which included sexual orientation, was tabled in the Texas House by a vote of 70 to 68, which means that if one more state representative had voted in favor of discussing the bill, and the tie had been broken in our favor, the bill had a good chance of becoming law in our state (it had already passed in the Texas Senate).

Consequently, every visit that we make to a lawmaker, every letter that we write, every phone call, every fax, every email does matter, because it is entirely possible that we are only **one vote** away from victory. Each lawmaker that agrees to stand up for us--and with us--is invaluable, not just for the vote at hand, but for all the votes that will follow.

- ENDA failed to pass the U.S. Senate by only **one vote**. In fact, Senator David Pryor of Arkansas, who was absent due to his son's surgery, intended to vote in favor of ENDA. In the event of a tie, Vice President Al Gore, who was away from Washington, was prepared to return via helicopter and vote for ENDA.

It is important for us to understand that over the past Congressional session, support for ENDA grew from the handful of Senators who originally co-sponsored it to 43 who had signed on as co-sponsors before the act was voted on. And when the final vote was cast, 49 U.S. Senators voted to protect gays and lesbians against employment discrimination.

We were close--really close. No, ENDA would not have become law even if the Senate had passed the legislation, because there was not enough time--or enough votes--to pass it in the House. But progress has indeed been made, and with that encouragement, that incentive, we can re-commit ourselves to the task--not just in passing ENDA, but in passing legislation at every level of government that will make our city, our state, and our country a safer, healthier place for all persons, whatever their sexual orientation.

One vote. Use it in November. Be challenged by the value of each one lawmaker whose support you gain. Be inspired by the progress we've made, and the attainability of the goal. **One vote.**

Gay Partners of IBM Workers to Get Benefits

A steady march by Corporate America toward providing benefits for the partners of lesbian and gay employees took its largest step forward Thursday when IBM announced that it would do so for its domestic work force beginning in January. With 110,000 employees in the United States, IBM is the largest employer yet to extend health-care coverage to couples of the same sex. It follows a trend set by prominent companies in entertainment, communications and technology, including its own subsidiary, Lotus Development Corp.

"We want to make sure we can attract and retain a full range of talented people," said Jill Kanin-Lovers, vice president of human resources at IBM. "The other consideration is that we have a longstanding policy of fairness and equity toward employees." The company, based in Armonk, N.Y., has barred discrimination against gay employees since 1974.

Under the new benefits policy, a lesbian or gay worker who wishes to enroll a partner must sign a notarized affidavit stating that the couple live together in the same home, have a "committed relationship" and are "financially interdependent." The policy does not cover unmarried heterosexual couples. "Heterosexual couples have the option of getting married," Ms. Kanin-Lovers said. "What we wanted to do was allow an opportunity for gay and lesbian employees who don't have that opportunity to have access to our benefits program."

A Voice of Experience: Sexual orientation can't be changed

Editor's Note: The following is from a letter that PFLAGer John Bush wrote to the radio station (WABC) who happened to have a talk show with a man by the name of Dr. Charles Socarides that said many invalid things about gays and lesbians. Dr. Socarides promotes the theory that sexual orientation can be changed. Unfortunately for Dr. Socarides, his gay son doesn't think this is possible. Neither does John nor the hundreds of ex-"ex-gays", or "Dos Equis" (2 X's) that have spent much of their life trying to change their sexual orientation unsuccessfully.

I am a 30 year old gay male. I did not choose to be this way and have finally come to this decision after many years of turmoil over my sexuality. I grew up in a small town and was taunted by all the bullies because I was different than everyone else. I had no one to talk to about my feelings. I went to college and suppressed every feeling I had. I then graduated from college and moved to Houston where after 2 years I felt I had to deal with my feelings. I got involved with several ex-gay support groups (Homosexuals Anonymous and 2 that were at individual churches). I also spent thousands of dollars on psychotherapy to rid my homosexual feelings.

The basic premise of these meetings and psychotherapy sessions was to blame everything on your father, mother, or some sexual abuse that may have occurred during childhood. The blame was always on someone else and the answer to becoming free of the feelings was to get in touch with God and also address the past. My problem with these groups and psychotherapists is that I was in touch with God and I had nothing in the past to get in touch with. I grew up in a loving family (my mom and dad have been together for 35 years), my father was always there for me, my mother was not smoldering, and I was not sexually abused as a child. I also have a brother that is 2 years younger than I. He and I spent a lot of time together and he happens to be straight! So how is it that I'm gay and he's not?

I've heard some people say 'Well maybe he hasn't met the right girl yet?'. I dated women, in fact I met a girl in Houston that I thought could become my wife. We had everything going for us except I was not sexually attracted to her, in fact I've never been sexually attracted to women. We dated for almost 2 years when I decided to call it quits. I hurt her, her family, my family, and me because of my dishonesty.

My homosexual feelings never went away, instead they intensified. I had had enough of the ex-gay groups and church because I was miserable. I then found a wonderful organization called PFLAG (Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) that helped me understand my feelings and also showed me the love, understanding, and acceptance that I had been longing for all of my life. Because of this support I was able to come out to my family, friends, and work. My family has been very loving and supportive along with my work and friends. I even feel that we've become closer because there are no secrets anymore. Yes, you can find people that say that they were homosexual but now lead either a celibate life or have married in the traditional sense, but on the other hand you will find people that entered the ex-gay realm and found only empty promises such as myself. I applaud these people because they have found their own form of happiness but I don't want to be punished because I was not able to find happiness the way they did. I'm happy with myself and my life, why can't people accept that? Also keep in mind that there is a very high turn over rate in these groups. There are even support groups and therapists offering to help people de-program themselves from the harmful effects of the ex-gay ministries.

I am in a monogamous and loving relationship with a guy and I am hopelessly in love with him as he is with me. We are emotionally as well as sexually attracted to each other. I think it's the kind of love that Jesus talks about in the Bible. Isn't it strange that he never mentioned homosexuality as a sin?

"A Coming-Out Story" by Jane Smith

Irv & I just spent 5 days in Georgia. We traveled with Irv's 2nd cousin Al and wife Phyllis, whom we met by chance several years ago while all were doing genealogy. Irv is the recorder, Al the raconteur.

We visited Atlanta's Oakland Cemetery and found the great-great-aunt who arranged the funding for the "Wren's Nest" of Uncle Remus fame. We found the grave of the spinster aunt lost at sea - whose shark-eaten body was tossed ashore several days later. We saw the grave of a great-great-great-grandfather who was supply officer for Andersonville Prison. (We also visited this historic site and knew that he must have anguished as empty supply wagons kept arriving - pilfered no doubt by the starving Confederate citizens.)

In Dahlonega we saw the Methodist Church where stained-glass windows are dedicated to various long-gone family members. In LaGrange we saw the grave of Irv's uncle who died at 13 after being kicked by the family horse. Irv's grandfather brought the body from Roswell, NM, to lie in the family plot. The horse remained in the family - which speaks well for this gentle Methodist minister. We also visited Smith Hall at LaGrange College. Irv's dad was born in this building 92 years ago when it was the girls' dorm. (Irv's grandparents were faculty members, and his great-grandfather was college president.)

Irv tramped into heavy brambles 200 yards off a dirt road hunting the patriarch of the Smith family (b 1790). Shaving cream rubbed onto the face of one tombstone in this secluded spot revealed the words: "Gone but not Forgotten."

I even visited my great-great-grandparents who lie alone, as they died before the War Between the States and their children were forced from Georgia after the war - they went by wagon to Missouri. Cornelius, a son, does lie somewhere in that Baptist church's cemetery - he fought the whole war in Lee's Army of Southern Virginia and surrendered at Appomattox. He died a pauper in a grave with no dates.

Al introduced us to several distant cousins. He had told us that a nephew, Bruce, was a closeted gay. (When we had first told Al about our gay son and our involvement in PFLAG, he expressed astonishment as his brother also is a closeted gay.) We fittingly met Bruce on the steps of that lovely Dahlonega-gold-encrusted state capital in Atlanta, and then followed his car to a nearby restaurant. The Human Rights Campaign "Equal Sign" bumper sticker provided the means of bringing up ENDA, PFLAG, etc. I showed our family pictures, which of course include Paul's partner Gary. At the end of our visit Bruce pulled me aside and said "If I'd ever been able to come out to my parents, they would have been just like you."

We had a grand 5 days in Georgia and so many memories. I'll always close my eyes and see Bruce's gray pony tail and remember his last warm hug. After many years, Bruce finally had come out to two strangers who shared a common bond. Al said he knew we'd be good for Bruce, but Bruce taught us one more lesson about relationships, the shortness of life and the importance of creating an atmosphere where everybody can come out.

It's a boy!!

Having taken considerable time to study the issue, IBM made its announcement coincidentally in the middle of a national debate on same-sex marriages. Last week the Senate overwhelmingly passed a bill that would deny federal recognition of same-sex marriages. But on the same day, it narrowly defeated a bill prohibiting employment discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

"The IBM decision is an indication that employment protection is commonplace and common sense," said Elizabeth Birch, the executive director of the Human Rights Campaign, a gay and lesbian political group, who was previously the chief litigator at Apple Computer Inc., an IBM competitor.

"What they're doing in essence is valuing their employees and providing equity without using the 'M' word," Ms. Birch said. "It will have a resounding effect on the business world. Big Blue is still seen as so much at the heart of American business."

In 1991, Lotus, which specializes in computer software, became the first publicly traded company to offer benefits to the partners of lesbian and gay employees. When it was acquired by IBM last year, workers retained their existing benefit plan.

Other corporations that offer such benefits include Apple, Eastman Kodak, Hewlett-Packard, Intel, Microsoft, Sun Microsystems, Time Warner, Walt Disney and Xerox. All told, the Human Rights Campaign said, 313 employers have adopted benefits. The city of Denver did so Monday by an 11-1 City Council vote.

Based on the experience of others, Ms. Kanin-Lovers said, IBM did not expect more than 1 percent of its employees to take advantage of the policy. The company also announced that it would provide health care coverage for children under legal guardianship of employees.



Book Review: *A Separate Creation*, by Chandler Burr

If you are interested in the biological origin of homosexuality, this book is required reading. The subtitle is "The Search for the Biological Origins of Sexual Orientation". Chandler Burr, who is not a scientist, does an almost unbelievable job of reducing some very detailed information on genetics and endocrinology to language that lay persons can understand and enjoy reading. It is concentrated stuff, and not something that makes light reading when you just have a few minutes to relax, but it is gripping and informative. Many of us feel that a strong case for a biological origin for sexual orientation can be a strong factor in future public understanding and acceptance of our gay children.



What this book does not do, is give us a pat, concise statement that proves beyond any doubt that sexual orientation is genetic and our gay children were born that way. It certainly gives evidence in that direction, but it also leads the reader to comprehend some of the complexity inherent in this field of research that makes such simplistic statements impossible, at least for now. Interestingly, Burr titles Chapter 2, "The Debate: Definitive Proof that Homosexuality Is Biological", and Chapter 3, "The Debate: Definitive Proof that Homosexuality Is Not Biological" to illustrate how the same facts can be interpreted in different ways.

He discusses at some length Dean Hammer's work on the "Gay Gene", which gives very strong statistical evidence that determination of sexual orientation has at least a genetic component. Hammer started with the premise that being gay is not chosen and not changeable, studied 114 family histories, and noticed a preponderance of gay males on the female side of family trees. This led Hammer to look in the X chromosome, contributed to each of us only by our mothers. He found that in one particular region of the X chromosome, 33 of 40 gay men shared the same gene "allele", or variant. The chance of this finding being coincidence is negligible. Hammer's finding is now listed in standard genetic reference works as GAY-1. Everyone has this same gene, but the alleles are different for different people. Confused? Get a copy of "A Separate Creation" and see how Chandler Burr makes it crystal clear if you take your time in reading.

Burr includes all sorts of other fascinating information on genetic traits such as handedness (left-handed or right-handed), which has the most similarities to sexual orientation as to how it occurs in the general population. The genetic nature of diseases, such as diabetes and cystic fibrosis, are also explained. He discusses how the gay genetic contribution might work and the ethics that may be involved when full understanding is gained, including how sexual orientation might be identified before birth. Burr even discusses how a GeneChip is now technologically possible, using integrated circuits similar to computer chips, to be able to give a complete assessment of a person's genetic makeup. A prototype GeneChip has already been made, containing some 3 billion different genetic probes within it.

Are you fascinated with the latest in genetics research and how it applies to determination of sexual orientation? Good. Get a copy of "A Separate Creation" and read all about it.


New Regional Director for PFLAG Southern Region

On City Council at 2pm on Tuesday to discuss the reasons for the project. A Council member had contacted PFLAG wanting more information about the billboards after receiving complaints from clergy in his district.

"Ignorance often promotes violent acts toward gays and lesbians," said Winston, the mother of a gay man. "Misinformation creates an atmosphere where young (gay) people take their own lives. It leads to parents throwing their children out on the streets, simply because their child is gay."

The Gulf Freeway board features a large family photo because one-in-four families has a gay or lesbian member, said PFLAG co-president Pat Rickey.

"Gay people are a part of our community and our families," Rickey said.

"The person who defaced the billboard is attacking my child and my family. When parents of gays and lesbians realize the prejudice our children face every day, we can't stand by anymore. The billboards are a positive way for us to take action, and a little spray paint isn't going to stop our message."

"Same-Sex Benefits: Where IBM goes, others may follow"

It sees the strategy as a low-cost way to draw top talent. Five years ago, it would have rocked America's corporate Richter scale. But when IBM announced on Sept. 19 that it would extend medical benefits to its employees' same-sex partners—treating them, in essence, as spouses—the news produced nary a rattle. True, Big Blue was merely following the lead of its high-tech peers. Lotus Development Corp. was the first major employer to offer spousal benefits to gay and lesbian live-ins, in 1991. And the revolution was old news at Apple, Hewlett-Packard, and Oracle by the time IBM, which bought Lotus two years ago, adopted the policy.

Still, when such an Establishment icon buys in, can the rest of America be far behind?

"The airlines are all studying it now," says an excited Elizabeth Birch, executive director of the Human Rights Campaign, a Washington-based gay political group. Although only 2% of America's publicly traded companies now extend benefits to gay and lesbian live-ins, the movement is growing. Employers in industries as diverse as telecommunications and chemicals are revamping benefits plans to include gays. Even Coors Brewing Co., whose founding family was long associated with right-wing politics, extended its coverage a year and a half ago.

Employers are changing policies because they need every edge in attracting and retaining all of the best workers. "In terms of business competitiveness, it made sense for us," says an IBM spokesperson. The gesture can also generate goodwill among employees and consumers. "In some ways, a little goes a long way with us. Even a partial response to us gains a lot of loyalty and respect," says Scott W. Walton, executive director of Digital Queers, a network of gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and transsexuals working in high tech.

Gender-blind benefits policies also don't cost much. IBM expects less than 1% of its workforce to register. That's partly because many partners already have other jobs, with benefits. Others prefer to keep their sex lives under wraps. Studies by Hewitt Associates, a human resources consulting firm, show that despite the AIDS epidemic, gay partners file for about the same number of claims as traditional spouses. They also have far fewer babies, greatly reducing a major medical expense.

So far, high-tech companies, where the bidding for so-called knowledge workers is the most intense, have led the way in offering same-sex benefits. Media and entertainment companies such as Disney, MGM, Sony Pictures, and The New York Times are joining the trend. To be sure, big industrial unions aren't yet mobilizing. "It's an issue that hasn't come up at a bargaining table, as far as I know," says an official at the United Steelworkers, which handles some 6,000 contracts. But with the wave of mergers and acquisitions, benefits policies can leapfrog into unexpected places. Indeed, IBM officials acknowledge that the 1994 Lotus acquisition, along with high-tech peer pressure, helped to push Big Blue toward its benefits shift. Fox and ABC offer same-sex benefits, and if CBS and NBC feel pressure to follow suit, activists hope it will build on their industrial parents, Westinghouse and General Electric.

Even in deeply conservative regions, resistance is wanng. Three years ago, Williamson County in Texas blocked Apple Computer Co.'s proposed plant, objecting to its same-sex benefits policy. But after job-hungry state politicians twisted some arms, the resistance ebbed and Apple moved in. More recently, Walt Disney Co. stared down a threatened consumer boycott on the issue. Of course, even after deciding to embrace new policies, human resource pros have to wrestle with some prickly issues, from how to certify relationships to whether the policy covers a partner's dependent children. Then there's the question of offering benefits to heterosexual live-in partners. IBM limits it to same-sex couples, reasoning that men and women can marry. Other companies, such as Levi Strauss & Co., offer benefits regardless of gender. This pleases more employees, but raises the cost. While only 1% of Levi's U.S. workforce signed up their partners, two-thirds of those who did were straight. The considerable irony in all this is that President Clinton just signed legislation banning gay marriages. Politicians may condemn gay unions, but more and more companies are quietly moving to institutionalize them.

The Dallas City Council voted 13-2 on Wednesday to adopt a package of proposals that includes a stronger hate crimes bill for the next session of Texas Legislature. The city will seek to pass a hate crimes bill that includes sexual orientation in its application. Inclusion of this measure is a first for Dallas, and should help LGRL and others who are seeking passage of this measure.

A PFLAGer Speaks Out on the Plane by Sue Null

My flight home (from the 1996 National PFLAG Convention) this morning was memorable for a variety of reasons. First, an older French couple in the shuttle bus to the airport asked me why I had been in Washington. I explained why and that I was concerned about equal rights for gays, and the lady in a sympathetic tone said that she understood their plight, but that the extreme ones were problematic; I answered yes, but that equal rights must be available for ALL people, regardless of whether you agreed with them or not. The black cabbie let them out first, and then commented to me, "I LIKE your definition of equal rights." He warmed my heart, and I thanked him for saying so.

Then, who appeared on my flight but Sen. Phil Gramm from Texas, the renowned homophobe? Ah Hah, I thought, HERE is my opportunity. Those who sign up to lobby their Congresspeople often end up speaking only to an aide, and here was a live senator, captive in an airplane for two and a half hours! He was sitting next to a mother with a baby, and one of my roommates suggested it would be great if the baby puked on him. Later, she suggested I tell him we had taken a poll and we had voted to throw him off the plane! As intriguing as these suggestions appeared, I tried to play it more conventionally. As soon as breakfast was served, I went up to him and said I was a constituent and wanted to discuss an issue with him. The following is a brief summary of a frustrating conversation.

Sue: Sen. Gramm, You have said that MERIT is the principal issue in employment, not quotas. We have an area of agreement. You have a Korean-American wife and I have a Korean son. (I showed him a photograph). They will have the benefit of some legislation to protect them from job discrimination, but my son will have an additional impediment: he is gay. There is no legislation to protect him from being fired for being gay, and you recently voted against ENDA. I would like you to consider changing your vote the next time.

PG: I believe in non-discrimination, [familiar lip-service] but this bill places a burden on the employer to prove that he didn't discriminate. Affirmative action lawsuits are clogging the court system. The Constitution supports equality. ENDA is not necessary.

Sue: The Constitution may support equality, but it's NOT working. For that reason, we need legislation to guarantee non-discrimination in the workplace. Perhaps these lawsuits that you refer to are the price we pay to ensure fairness to all.

PG: Well, we have two opposing opinions. I'm not going to change my mind, so we will have to disagree.

The flight was crowded with gay men and gay-friendly people, as evidenced by various pins and T-shirts that they wore. Three of them told me thanks for speaking up, one kissed me and told me his story. Two of them made a brief comment to Sen. Gramm that indicated they agreed with the lady who had spoken to him.

One Mom's Perspective on the 1996 National PFLAG Conference by Sue Null

This P-FLAG mom just came back from the national conference in Washington DC and what a wing-ding it was for all of us. I was one of about 1000 who attended from across the country and one of 16 or so from Houston.

Everybody remembers a variety of special moments during this jam-packed long weekend of workshops, tours, lobbying, general meetings, regional meetings, and social events. I especially enjoyed meeting for the first time a number of online people from pflag-talk, people who knew each other by their loving, supportive messages, but who had never before met in person.

A few highlights: a reception in a congressional office building with our two retiring gay Congressmen and their mates, the Washington Gay Men's Chorus with Holly Near, speakers including Cher, whose daughter Chastity is a lesbian; the woman lawyer who was successful in fighting Colorado's Amendment 2 against equal rights for gays, and IBM's diversity director, who reminded us that extending domestic partnership benefits to same sex couples was simply good business: gays are the first disadvantaged minority group with economic power. Comedian Suzanne Westenhoefer suggested that gays take back the word "Sodomite," just as they had done with "queer," and turn it into something positive!

Saturday night was highlighted by the AIDS Quilt Candlelight March at the Lincoln Memorial. People whose lives had been touched by AIDS spoke to us in the audience, in a sea of thousands of candles in the dark. We huddled together in the chilly quiet evening, arms around each other, swaying in the dark.

Sunday evening closed with the children (and their spouses) of Mitzi Henderson, the retiring president of national P-FLAG, offering a delightful spoof of their mom's involvement in P-FLAG, entitled Adult Children of Parents Addicted to P-FLAG. Does your mom check her e-mail the first thing every morning?

The final dance was highlighted by people of all sexual orientations dancing together, EVEN straight dads dancing with gay young men! Next year's meeting is scheduled for Orlando. Start saving your dollars now and go for the time of your life!

I made my way down the aisle of the plane, speaking to several people whom I judged sympathetic to my point of view, and everybody was happy I had said something. One person suggested we start a petition against Gramm, and another said, "Let's start a chant," but then we were afraid we might get thrown off the plane! I suggested that THEY speak to the Senator, but they all refused. WHY??

Because they didn't want to invade someone's privacy on a flight? Were they being too polite? Hey, Phil Gramm is running for re-election in November; he's fair game, I feel. Some said they wouldn't lower themselves to speak to someone whom they detested; others said it wouldn't do any good anyway. But my point is, if NOBODY (other than me) expresses his/her opinion, Sen. Gramm and other public figures continue to think that most people agree with them and that the Religious Right expresses the dominant thinking for the nation. Sure, it's highly unlikely that the likes of Phil Gramm are going to change their minds because ONE person, or even SEVERAL people express contrary opinions, but what does that mean? We just give up and let them take over? They MUST know that their medieval ideas are not shared by all responsible citizens. We must put a face on the opposition. Here was a golden opportunity, I thought. I felt disappointed that almost no one took advantage of it.

Homosexuality Linked to Teen Suicide

EDMONTON (AP) -- Young gay men are more likely to try to kill themselves than heterosexual men, suggests a survey believed to be the first to conclusively link homosexuality and youth suicide.

A random survey of 750 men between 18 and 27, conducted in Calgary between 1991-92, found gay and bisexual males were 13.9 times more at risk of making a serious suicide attempt.

Celibate gay men were the most likely to try to harm or kill themselves. And homosexual and bisexual males were nearly three times more likely to have tried to harm themselves.

The study, conducted through the University of Calgary, an internationally renowned center in the study of suicide, was recently tabled in the Alberta legislature.

Pierre Tremblay, co-author of the report, said it's not surprising young gays attempt suicide.

"They're in a world where the message is just hatred -- and kids are really sensitive to that -- of knowing that if anyone knew what they are they're toast."

Editor's Note: It is depressing information and studies like this that only remind us of what we already know. It is a matter of life and death when it comes to helping to create a safe community where everyone, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and transgendereds, knows that their life is important and that someone out there does really care for them. This is what PFLAG must be about.

What's Your Story? Maybe your School District wants to know!

Help Make our Schools Safer for our Youth



In our continuing efforts to reach the public and private school system with our message that there is a need to make schools safer for g/l students, your story is needed. Bob McLaughlin, a psychologist who works closely with schools, has made some promising contacts with several school districts, plus some parochial and private schools, regarding ways to assure safer schools for all children.

Even open administrators need to hear from parents and students as to whether this is really an issue in their districts. One school district's interest in addressing this issue was in direct response to an alert from a PFLAG mom of a graduate regarding the harassment and other difficulties her son faced while a student there.

Whether you are a g/l person or the parent of a g/l person, take a few minutes to look back on your or your child's school experience. Then write a letter or make a call to a key administrator in your local school district. Once more it is the personal story that can best be heard. H.A.T.C.H. and PFLAG can consult but constituent calls and letters are the

most effective. Bob says, "Letters are evidentiary documents and leave a useful paper trail, but phone calls are great, too, and make an impression."

If you or your child attended an HISD school, we urge you to contact Harriet Avery, Ed.D., Assistant Superintendent for Student Support Services and tell her your story. She is extremely supportive and specifically requested any and all input from parents of HISD students or former students, former or current students themselves, and teachers and former teachers. You may reach her at 892-6670 (specify if you are parent, teacher, student, etc.) or fax her at 892-7494. Whatever school district you live in, a memo concerning your call or a copy of your letter for Bob McLaughlin's files would be very helpful. Dr. McLaughlin's address is 3355 West Alabama, #585, Houston, TX, 77098-1718.

PLEASE take time to consider carefully if you have a contribution to make. There must be many stories that none of us has heard that could help us begin to make a positive difference for our g/l youth still in school. We have all seen the problem either first hand or as interested persons. This is an opportunity to be a part of the solution. Taiwan Has First Gay Wedding

TAIPEI, Taiwan -- More than 500 guests, including officials of the Taipei city government, attended Taiwan's first public gay wedding, between a Taiwanese author and his longtime American companion.

Wearing a traditional Chinese scholar's robe, Hsu You-sheng exchanged vows and rings with Gray Harriman at a downtown hotel. The ceremony was praised by social reformers, but will not be legally binding because Taiwan does not recognize same-sex marriages.

Hsu, a well-known author of 11 books on gay topics, met Harriman, a college administrator, while studying in New York. Hsu's open homosexuality is a rarity in Taiwan, where many gays face social stigma and intense pressure from parents to marry and continue the family line.

But the wedding has gained mostly positive response in Taiwan, and one of the state-owned television networks plans to run a special on the couple. Another leading cable television station carried the ceremony live.

Taipei Mayor Chen Shui-bian sent a letter of congratulation read at the ceremony by his spokesman. Other guests included officials of the municipal government and Taiwan's in opposition Democratic Progressive Party. "I wouldn't make a big deal out of this. I'm just here to wish them well," said Shih Ming-teh, a former DPP chairman.

Chrysler refuses to change discrimination & harassment policy

Chrysler has refused to give equal rights to gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered persons. Chrysler has refused to accept the demand of the United Auto Workers to add the two words "sexual orientation" to the contract for equal protection.

The October 28, 1996 Wall Street Journal reported Chrysler's excuses for rejecting the UAW's demand by quoting Tony Cervone, a Chrysler labor spokesman: "Chrysler prohibits discrimination and will not tolerate harassment of or retaliation against any person in the workplace...by singling out any one group, we would be implicitly excluding others. That's the fundamental reason why we didn't see a need to make the change."

On November 14th, many groups chose to protest in front of local Chrysler dealerships. PFLAG Houston chose to instead contact our local Chrysler dealerships via phone. PFLAGer Sue Null contacted several dealers and managers only to find out that they had no idea of what was happening at the national level. So in an effort to promote education and advocacy, the Board has decided to write letters to the general managers and dealers of local Chrysler dealerships. We encourage you to use the following text as a sample to go from as you compose your letter.

"I was disappointed to read of Chrysler Corporation's decision to not include sexual orientation in their non-discrimination policy. I recognize that Chrysler's decision does not necessarily reflect the policy of your dealership, however the publicity has prompted me to express my thoughts on this issue to you, a Chrysler affiliate."

"Sexual orientation is NOT a choice! Every person is born with an individual sexual orientation and I believe it is fundamentally wrong to discriminate against someone based on that orientation. I hope that you agree and will help make our Houston area a better place to live and work by insisting that your dealership be a place of respect and dignity for everyone in our community including my gay son/lesbian daughter."

Texas Bar Denies Gay Issues Section, *by Janet Elliott*

In the Texas State Bar Association, the Board of Directors can vote to create "sections" within the membership. These sections must meet the need of fostering interaction between lawyers who practice in this specialized field of law or whom have common professional interests associated with these issues. There are currently sections for issues ranging from Family law to Individual Rights and Responsibilities. Now just five months after creating an Animal Law section, the State Bar Board of Directors has voted down a proposed gay and lesbian issues section, marking the first time the board has ever rejected creation of a new section. The proposal was defeated 19-17 during the Bar board's Oct. 4 meeting in Fort Worth.

Bar President Colleen McHugh, whose column in October's *Texas Bar Journal* was ironically titled "Celebrating Our Differences," joined those voting against the section. U.S. District Judge Norman Black of Houston stunned the board with his observation of the vote. "I've always learned a lot about my fellow members from these meetings," said Black. "Today's the first time I wasn't real proud." Those board members opposed to the section were concerned about its "divisiveness" and how it would disenfranchise lawyers that were opposed to it.

Houston's Mitchell Katine, who proposed the new section, says he was amazed that the proposal created so much controversy. Currently supporters of the section are debating whether to bring the proposal before the current board or wait until next June, when W. Frank Newton, who favors the section, becomes Bar president. In the meantime, PFLAG Houston wants to encourage you to write letters of appreciation to those that supported the section and letters of concern to those that voted against it. GLSTN Salutes Jamie Nabozny And Lambda Legal Defense On Victory In First-Ever Federal Case On Anti-Gay Abuse In Schools

Hailed as "Most Important Decision Since Brown V. Board Of Education"

(New York, NY) The Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Teachers Network (GLSTN) today congratulated Jamie Nabozny and Lambda Legal Defense, plaintiff and counsel, on their victory in *Nabozny v. Podelsny et al*, the first-ever federal case on anti-gay violence in schools. A Wisconsin jury found Nabozny's Ashland, Wisconsin school system and its administrators guilty of failing to protect Nabozny from harassment on Tuesday, establishing a first-ever precedent on the rights of lesbian and gay students in K-12 schools. GLSTN is the only national organization specifically focused on winning equal educational rights for such students.

"Jamie's victory is an incredible moment in our history," said Kevin Jennings, GLSTN's Executive Director and a former high school history teacher. "Basically, this is the most important court ruling on education since *Brown v. the Board of Education* in 1954, when racial segregation was outlawed," said Jennings. "The courts have sent a similar message with this verdict. They've said that students who are lesbian or gay are entitled to equal protection and equal opportunity from their schools." Jennings added, "Now, students and teachers fighting for equity will have the courts on their side. Things will quite literally never be the same."

Jennings lauded Nabozny and Lambda for their leadership. "Jamie's courage, coupled with the legal brilliance of the Lambda team, have made history," said Jennings. "These are folks who will be remembered forever for their contribution to bettering the lives of lesbian and gay young people." Jennings added that GLSTN's network of over forty chapters will be hard at work in coming months to make sure the Nabozny ruling has teeth. "In the end, these kinds of rulings will only have an impact if there is someone on the local level who is holding their schools accountable for their behavior, just as Jamie and Lambda held Ashland accountable," said Jennings. "That's our plan for the next phase: to let school officials know that we're watching, and we'll be making sure they live up to their legal responsibilities to protect all students."
