*** The following statement on AIDs testing, also adopted by the Board at the Convention, is to be sent, from parent contracts, parent groups and their members to local, state and national representatives in appropriate legislative bodies: (At its annual meeting in Atlanta today , the Board of the Federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays adopted the following statement on the AIDS testing; "Parents FLAG opposes the establishment of the testing for AIDS antibodies without effective provisions to protect the rights of those tested. As Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays we have two great concerns

First, the serious health problems require that all available resources be called upon to find the means to prevent and cure AIDS and that Medicaid benefits be extended to people with AIDS and AIDS related illnesses (ARC).

Second, we are also very much concerned about use of the results of AIDS tests to discriminate against our children and deprive them of their civil and human rights. We call upon our representatives and administration officials to take immediate steps to insure confidentiality of test results and to prohibit discrimination on the basis of any test for AIDS.

The above press release on AIDS testing was mailed, together with a copy of our booklet "About Our Children" to President Reagan, Vice President Bush, and to all members of Congress as well as to 200 newspapers around the country.

At the same time, VIP members of the clergy were sent materials dealing with religious matters.

It is still against the law in Texas for two people of the same sex to engage in sexual contact, even in the privacy of their own home. Although there were times in the past five years when Texas gay men and lesbians thought their sexuality was legal, the conservative courts overturned favorable rulings every time.

On June 17, 1985, plaintiff Don Baker of Dallas went to New Orleans where the 5th Circuit Court heard the controversial case.

Most Texans thought the matter was settled in September of 1984 when a three-judge panel ruled that 21.06 was unconstitutional. But unfortunately, that favorable decision was appealed forcing the case to be heard in June by all the judges—not just three.

Two months later, on August 26, the unfortunate development was reported to TWT NEWS that the full banc of judges had decided in a 9-to-7 decision that the Texas sodomy law-21.06—was still constitutional still enforceable. Thus, one million homosexuals in Texas were re-criminized.

With all options exhausted at the circuit level, the only avenue left to take the 21.06 case to the United States Supreme Court. That will happen in 1986, after a similar case involving the Georgia sodomy law is heard this spring.

TWT HOUSTON:
Federal Law Protects Ill

Persons in Texas who have been denied employment, subjected to discrimination at work or denied admission or services by any federally funded agency because they have (or are thought to have) AIDS may be protected by federal legislation prohibiting discrimination against the disabled.

Here's why: Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794) provides wide-ranging protection of the rights of persons who are disabled or perceived as being disabled. The law applies to employers, applicants for employment and service beneficiaries of federally-funded agencies.

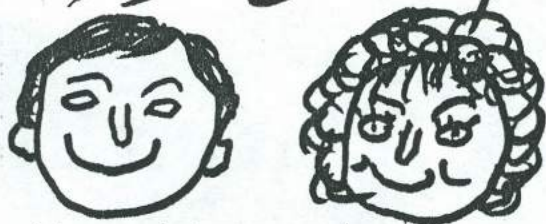
