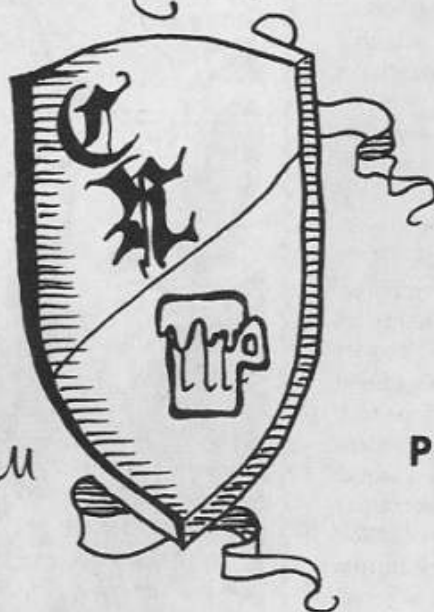

## EDITORIAL

*Let's find out exactly where our minds are at. What are we really trying to achieve? Equality? Power? Are we getting hung up on clearing our hang-ups? Are there times when we bring persecution upon ourselves by expecting it prematurely? Have we reached a point where all we are doing is bitching and thereby stagnating?*

*This is not a call to rise in revolution. In this great democracy of ours the revolution has already taken place!*

*A lot of brave people have been the vanguards and have done a good job on the whole, but now is the time for the average Joe to do his share. Warning! If Joe sits down on the job and does not do his part, all previous work will have been wasted. The vanguards can do nothing else but what they have been doing. They have bitched and bitched about what's wrong until just about everybody has heard and society has proven with their so called permissive attitude that it has not been in vain. However, if these vanguards are not relieved of duty now, society will become bored to tears and will resent aims and demands being rubbed in their face. A backlash will result causing either stagnation or a possible setback.*

*Let's look at first things first. Do we love America and what it stands for. You bet. A sudden influx of poor people on any economy has got to bring about a lot of hard feelings, no matter how good the intention or reception of the people*

*already living in the area. However, did they take advantage of the press to scream this is not what they wanted or expected or was promised by birthright or other? No. They looked around at another very close minority group, the Hebrews. They noticed how they survived the pressures luxuriously by pooling their resources together and bought businesses and property. They did not form little groups with fancy and somewhat ingenious initials to protect themselves from the oppressor but silently and perseveringly helped themselves. This same tactic was used by the Orientals that were originally brought to Hawaii as slaves eventually to fuse with the native Hawaiians to form the Polynesian Race. This same tactic was used by the Pennsylvania Dutch, the Swedes in Minnesota and countless other groups across this nation's history. We don't hear of them. Why? Are there not still discriminations against them? Of course there are! Why should one group, be it gay, black, female, postman, auto worker, etc. feel that they have a monopoly on persecution? Therefore, does this group have the right to demand re-imbursement plus for their woes? Would the power demanded be utilized justly or would it be used to persecute another group if not the whole nation! If this is the case, it should not be granted!*

*Of course it's not fair to compare one group with another because each group is different, but cannot the same principles that bring success and relative prosperity for one, with slight modifications, bring success to the other? Let's look at the Homosexual. This is one of history's most unique minority groups in that it is not limited in background to a certain class, a certain educational level, a certain financial background or limited in skills. Homosexuals, you might say, have "infiltrated" every phase of American life. Not without the help of demonstrators, adequate attention has been called to the fact that homosexuals exist and that gay life is not restricted to fairy-land. Adequate because if more attention is called by gay-ins and such demonstrations, the average homosexual conservative as he is, is not represented. Joe Public has no other alternative but to decide that he was right in the first place and that all homosexuals are swishy immature pansies that smoke pot, and are sisters to the rebellious hippie that will protest anything just to attract attention.*

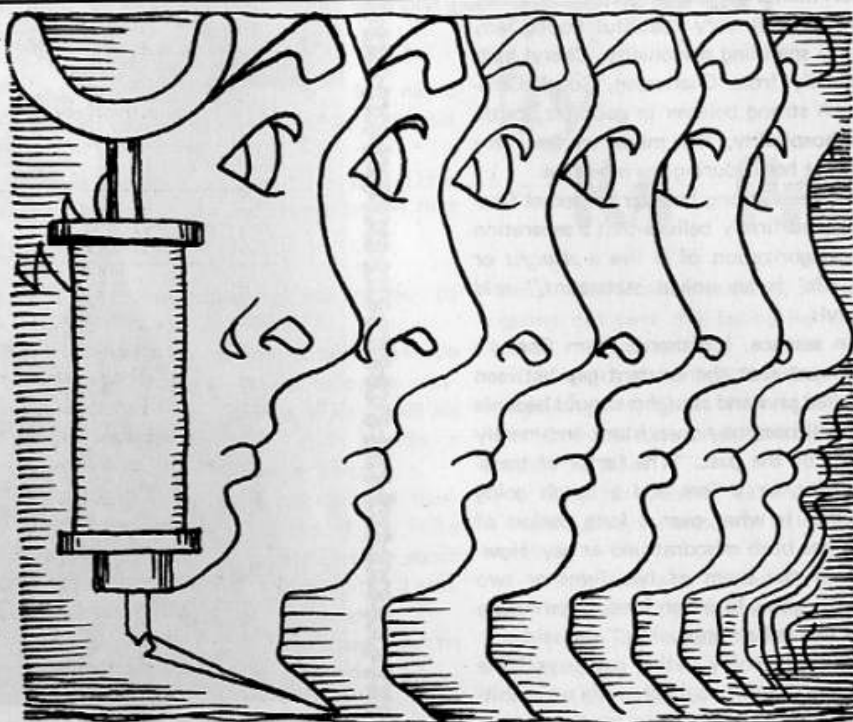
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2. Let's quit blaming others for our plight and feeling sorry for ourselves. It's a waste of energy and time.

LOOK Magazine is to be complimented on their very fine coverage of married homosexuals in the January 26, 1971 issue.

Last May, Jack Baker and Michael McConnell, Minnesota gays, applied for a marriage licence and were refused. LOOK decided to do a short feature on them for their issue on the American Family and the writer, Mr. Jack Star, apparently did his homework well.

Using Baker and McConnell as an example of the typical gay, common-law type marriage, the article states; "Sex researchers are beginning to realize that homosexual behavior can be as varied as heterosexual conduct. Not all homosexual life is a series of one-night stands in bath-houses, public toilets or gay bars (those queer, mirror images of the swinging-singles straight scene), parenthesis theirs. Some homosexuals—a minority—live to

"Yes, it's over. One finished, another beginning."

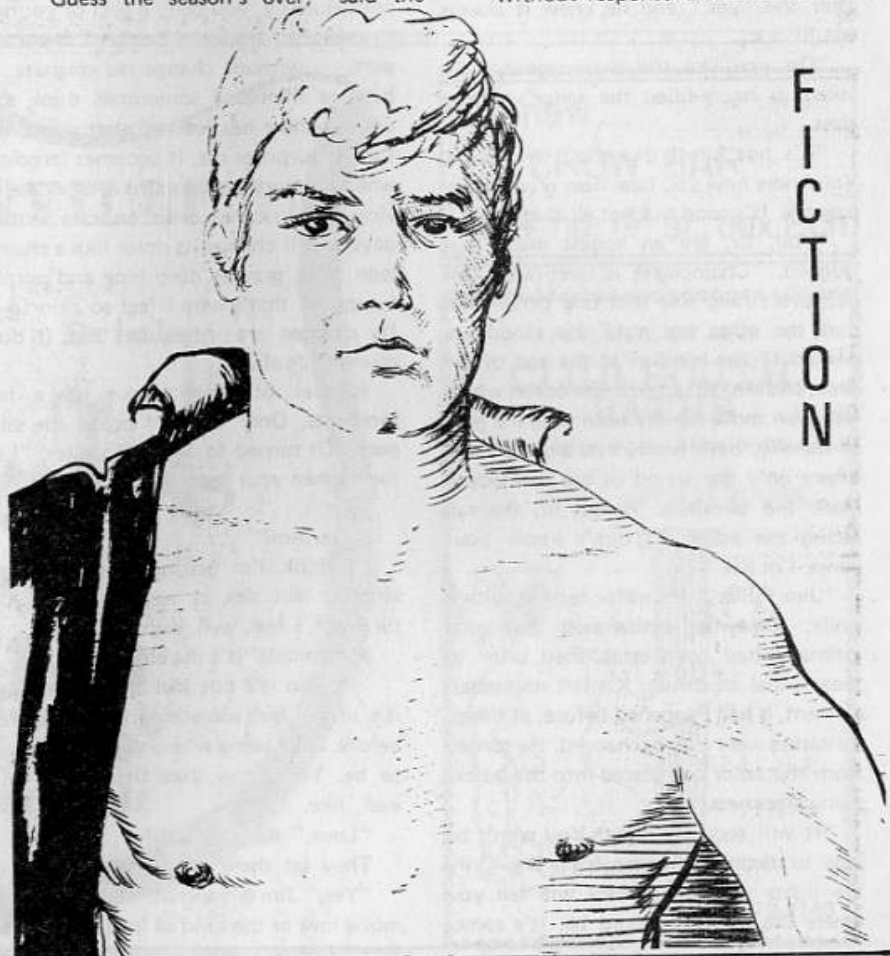
"Oh, you have a winter season too?" asked the sailor.

protege's this month certainly add a lot of flavor to anyone's menu.

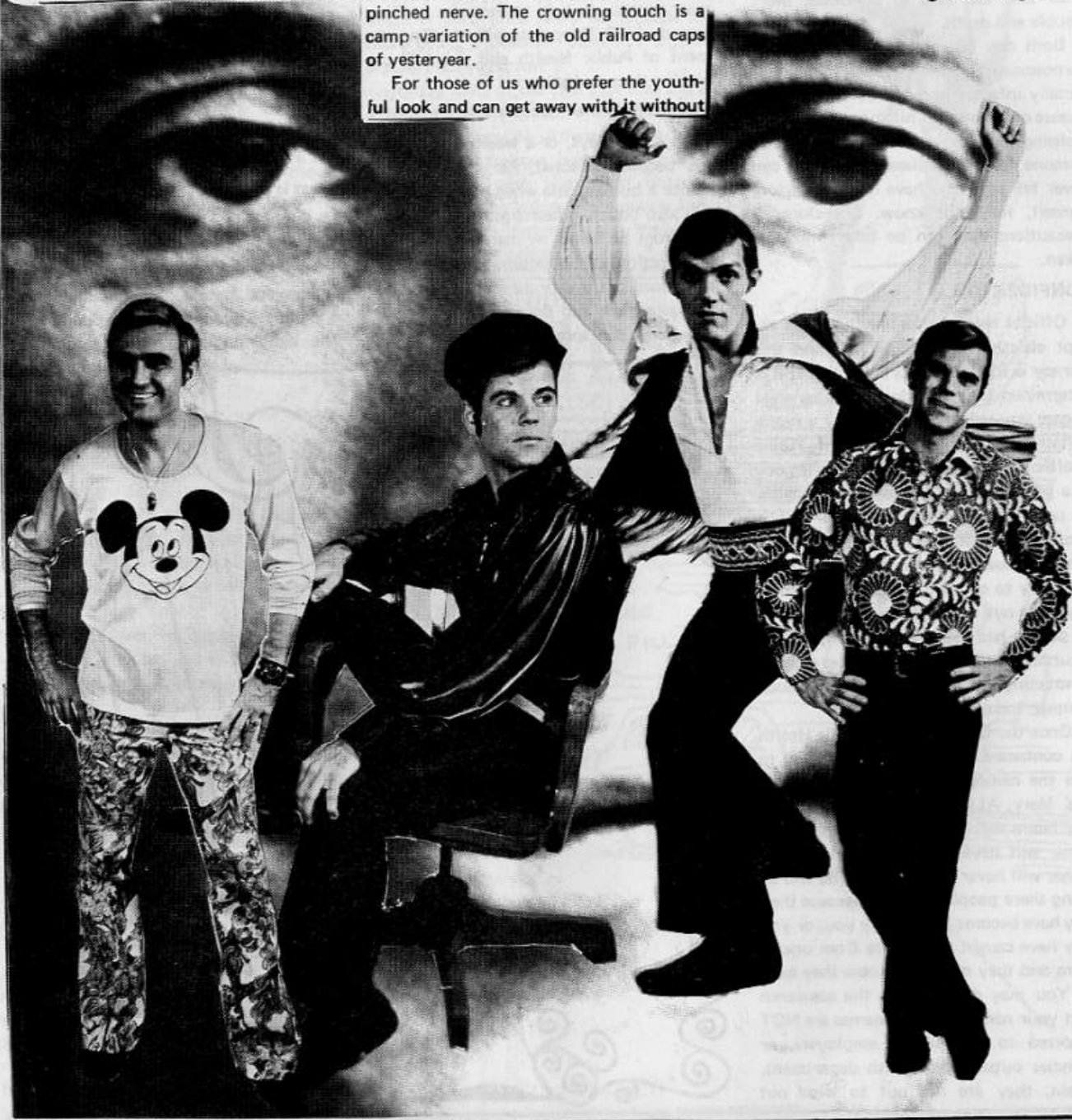

## THE HOMOSEXUAL AND VENEREAL DISEASES

Not a pleasant subject at all. Rather one we would all like to just ignore and "maybe it'll go away." But it's not going away. In most large cities, V.D. in the form of Syphilis and Gonorrhea, is on the increase. Especially among homosexuals. The health department has long ago accepted the fact that homosexuality is a major problem in the control of these diseases.

In some cities, close to fifty percent of those reported with the diseases have admitted to homosexual contact. Both Syphilis and Gonorrhea are serious diseases that can lead to blindness, heart trouble and death.

Both can be spread by all forms of homosexual and heterosexual contact. A rectally infected homosexual can pass the disease on to many of his contacts without realizing that he is infected. No one is immune from the disease, and you can never tell who may have it. The person, himself, may not know. Therefore all precautions that can be taken must be taken.

### CONFIDENTIAL

Official health department records are kept strictly CONFIDENTIAL and this secrecy is PROTECTED BY LAW. If it is determined that you do have a venereal disease you will be contacted by a representative of the Department of Public Health. This is true even if you have gone to a private doctor. He is required by law to report to the Department of Public Health any contagious diseases including venereal diseases. Remember, this is the only way to control and possibly eventually wipe out these manaces. If all infected people had reported it promptly and accurately in the past, the chances of your contracting the disease would be much slimmer today.

Once the Department of Public Health has contacted you, you will be asked to give the names of your sexual contacts. Yes, Mary, ALL OF THEM. The persons you name will be contacted, but YOUR name will never be used, and THEIR names will never be revealed. You will be doing these people a service because they may have become infected by you, or you may have caught the disease from one of them, and they might not know they have it. You may do this with the assurance that your name and their names are NOT reported to the police, employers, or agencies outside the health department. Again, they are not out to wipe out

queers, they're out to wipe out the health menace itself.

It is your responsibility, your right and your duty to yourselves, your friends and your country to help prevent the further spread of VD. Cooperate with the Department of Public Health and you will be helping them to help you.

### Symptoms in Men (Gonorrhea)

In a few days, or a week after a man has become infected, he will probably notice a burning pain when he urinates. He will also notice a discharge or dripping of pus from his penis. A man may develop an infection in the rectum which is often unnoticed but is very dangerous. If a man has gonorrhea and does not get treated, the germs can spread through the body.

If not treated it can cause sterility, heart trouble, arthritis, blindness and even death.

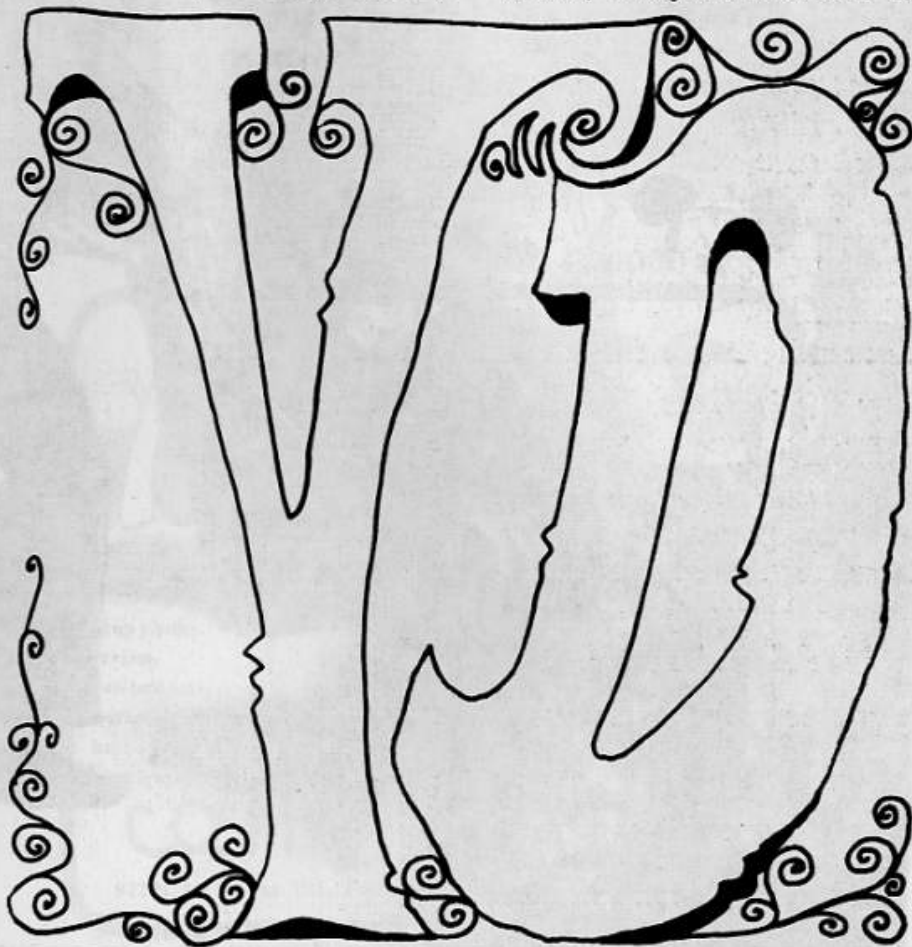
### Symptoms in Women (gonorrhea)

A woman, almost never notices any pain or other signs when she has gonorrhea. She can, therefore, pass on the disease without even realizing she has it. When the disease spreads, a woman's organs may get so infected that she may require an operation.

There is no blood test for gonorrhea. A doctor will take a smear from the infected part—penis of rectum or vagina, for a laboratory examination.

### What is Syphilis? (Siff)

Syphilis is a dangerous communicable disease, that is spread by a cork-screw shaped germ that lives in the blood, the lymph, and on certain syphilitic lesions of the body. The syphilis germ usually enters the body through the skin around the

sex organs, the rectum, the mouth. This germ can enter through the unbroken skin or through open sores or cuts anywhere on the body. Once the germ has entered the body, the first symptoms of the disease usually show up in about two weeks—sometimes less, and sometimes not for twelve or thirteen weeks.

The first symptom is a sore, called a chancre, which appears where the germ enters the body. It may show up on the sex organs, rectum, mouth, fingers, lips—or it may not show up at all. The chancre may look like an open sore, or just a pimple or blister. It does not hurt. This is called "primary" syphilis. It can be cured.

While a person has this sore, the disease is very easily spread. Even without treatment, the sore usually will go away by itself after a short time but the germs are spreading throughout the body. Later as the germs spread, the test will become positive which shows that the person has the disease. A simple, painless test, the Darkfield test, will show the presence of the germ even before the blood becomes positive.

No other sign will show up for about three to six weeks. During this period, the germs are multiplying and spreading throughout the body.

Then a rash will appear. This rash may look like a food rash, a heat rash, or hives. It may cover the body or it may just occur on the face or on hands and feet. Sores may appear in the mouth. Sore throat, fever, or headache may develop. Hair may fall out in patches. This is called secondary syphilis. It can be cured.

Syphilis also can be passed on to another very easily during this stage. It is doubly dangerous because it looks like so many other, milder diseases that a person may not know he has it. A blood test will tell.

Like primary signs of syphilis, the secondary signs will also soon disappear with or without treatment.

After all the outward signs have disappeared, syphilis is said to be latent or quiet. A person may feel fine. He may go along for years thinking he is healthy. But, sooner or later the disease may become active again and the person may become blind, insane or crippled. Even in the later stages of syphilis, one can be

cured of the disease, but the damage to the body can NEVER be repaired.

You ask what you can do about it to protect yourself? A medical examination and blood test should be taken at frequent intervals. This should include a rectal examination and should be done at least every six months. But remember—a negative examination guarantees nothing permanent. A person could have a complete examination and blood test one day and become infected the next day. This is why we suggest a blood test and examination at least once every six months or more often if possible, especially with a sexually active person.

In any case, at the first sign that there is something wrong, SEE A DOCTOR AT ONCE! Jacksonville, Atlanta, Miami and most other populous cities have public health clinics with competent doctors who will give the proper examination and treatment at no charge. Or, you may prefer to go to your private doctor.

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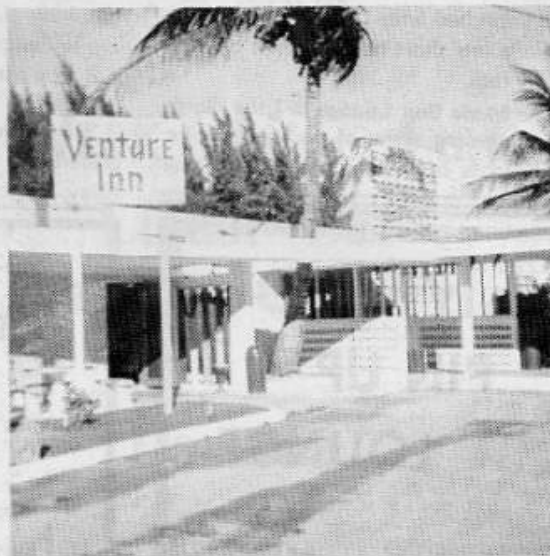

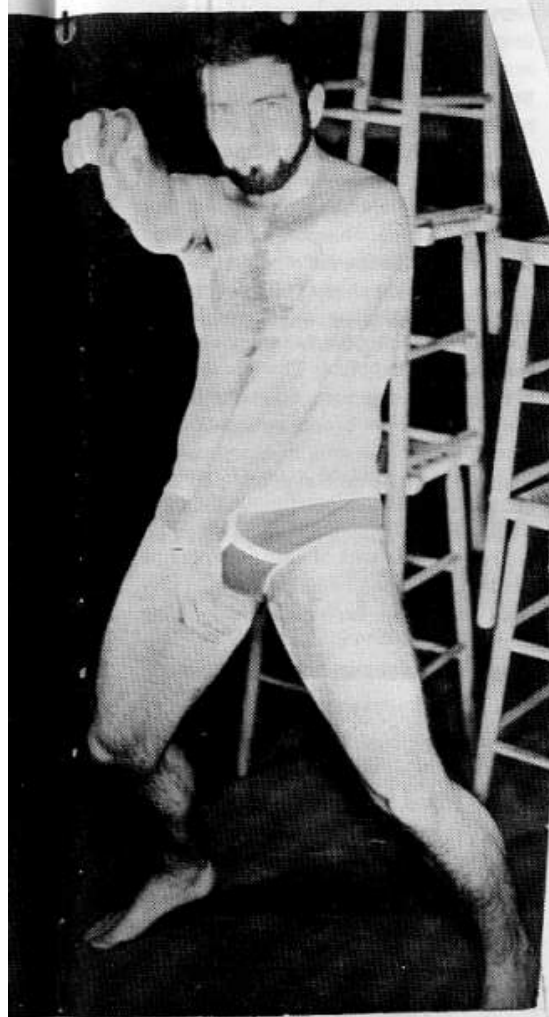

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# CAMERA QUEEN'S Corner by daniel

Hello, gang, Back again! This time the discussion will be tuned to Do's and Don'ts of picture taking. If you don't already follow these practices I'm about to mention, do so, and I'm sure you will see a noted improvement in future results.

First, film care! Film left in a hot, closed car, glove compartment, or trunk may sustain a color shift in pigments. Overheating causes the color layers in the film emulsion to fuse. As a consequence, the prints may be distorted in color and clarity. If you are at the beach, never leave film in a closed car. Take it with you in a bag or box and put it in a shaded area. Film at home should be stored in the refrigerator. However, prior to using it, leave it at room temperature for at least 2 hours. Always load film into your camera in a very shaded or darkened area. After exposing a roll, put it back in the original box and get it to the processor as soon as possible.

Remember at all times that a camera is a very delicate instrument. Handle it

with much care and concern. A camera left sitting up for any extended period of time can become inoperative. The lubricants in the shutter mechanism may run onto the shutter blades and make them sticky, thereby slowing down the shutter speeds and causing over or under exposure. For best care of your camera, if you are storing it for a long length of time, put it in a cellophane bag to keep out the dust. At least once a week, take it out and operate the shutter and other moving parts for several minutes.

Always keep your camera clean and free of dust. Keep a good supply of lens cleaner and tissue at hand at all times. When cleaning the lens, never blow on the surface. Minute spittal particles are emitted at even the faintest of breaths. This will put a disagreeing film on the lens surface. When using tissue, never press hard on the lens surface. Wad the tissue in a loose and fluffy ball and stroke gently.

To clean the camera body, hard to remove spots can be taken off with either

a pencil or typewriter eraser. If the leather is old and dry a good coat of shoe polish dye, followed by a coat of shellac, does wonders. Alcohol will remove most stains, grease or fingerprints. Never, at any time, remove any screws, nuts, bolts or tacks from your camera to attempt a more thorough cleaning. Only a camera repairman should ever be allowed inside your camera.

After a little practice, there afore mentioned suggestions for getting better pictures will soon become second nature. And, believe me, the results are worth it!

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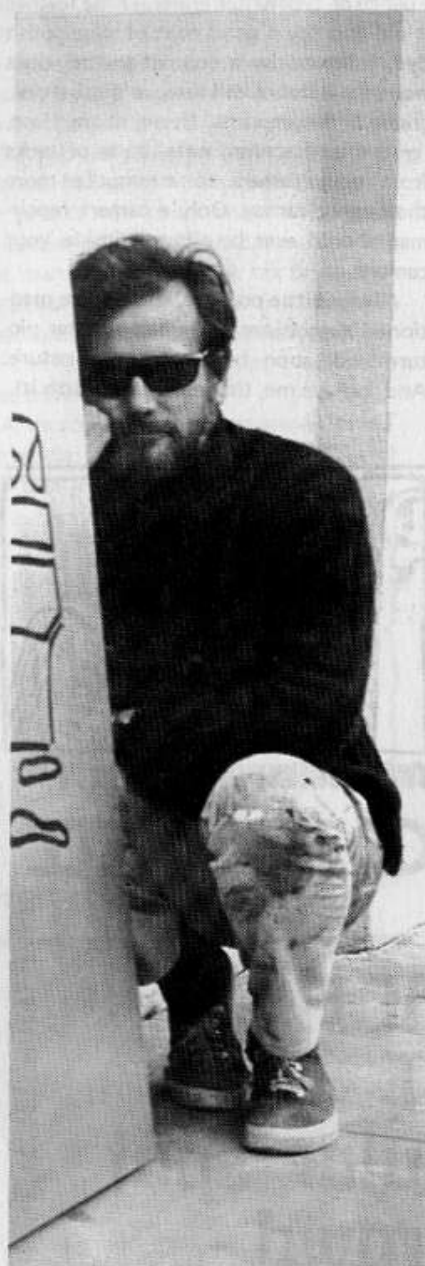
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**ARTS****LOVE ME OR LEAVE ME**

"Hi, my name is Ed Wallowitch. No Kissing, please." That will be your introduction to an experience. . . for to know Ed Wallowitch is an experience.

The artist, a self-proclaimed alcoholic, intends to become to death what Andy Warhol has become to Campbell's tomato soup.

Warhol, who earned a good living as a photographer for a number of years, made the big time with his silk screen of a tomato soup can.

Wallowitch, of Lake Worth, at 17 had his photographs on exhibit at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the youngest person ever to be accorded this honor. These days he makes his living as a photographer, but his real interest is his death exhibit.

"When people see a funeral sign," said Wallowitch, "I want them to think of me."

He recently exhibited his death display at Florida Atlantic University and is currently planning an exhibit to be held on Florida's west coast.

Part of his death exhibit is a grouping of 50 skulls. "I call it 'skull'," said the artist. The silk screen was made from a photograph of a child's drawing on a subway wall in New York.

Another part of the death exhibit is a painting of an American flag. It is done in black on a black background and was taken from a chalk drawing on a New York sidewalk. Standing next to "Flag" is a five-panel screening of a sign which, according to the artist, is "drifting off into eternity." The sign reads "Funeral, No Parking."

Wallowitch says his exhibit is not a preoccupation with death, but an aware-

ness of death. "If all of us could live with the awareness that our life could end at the next moment, our lives could achieve a kind of serenity," said Wallowitch. "People would tend to become less destructive and more creative."

Wallowitch came to Florida a year ago from New York. As a freelance photographer he sells much of his work to national magazines. He is basically self-taught and recalls that his interest in photography began when he got his first camera at 11.

The reason the photographs taken by Wallowitch can so easily be made into paintings or silk screen prints is that he does not photograph what just happens to be there, he is selective. The creative photographer forms the base for the creative artist.

Daylight hours find him with his camera snapping a dead pigeon in Miami one day, a lifeguard in Ft. Lauderdale another day and a group of hippie demonstrators in West Palm Beach the next day. The Gold Coast is his studio.

Just let a funeral cortege pass by and he can envision all sorts of new additions to his death exhibit. . . but no kissing, please. . . . *Sky Masters*



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## DAVID feature— BOOK REVIEW

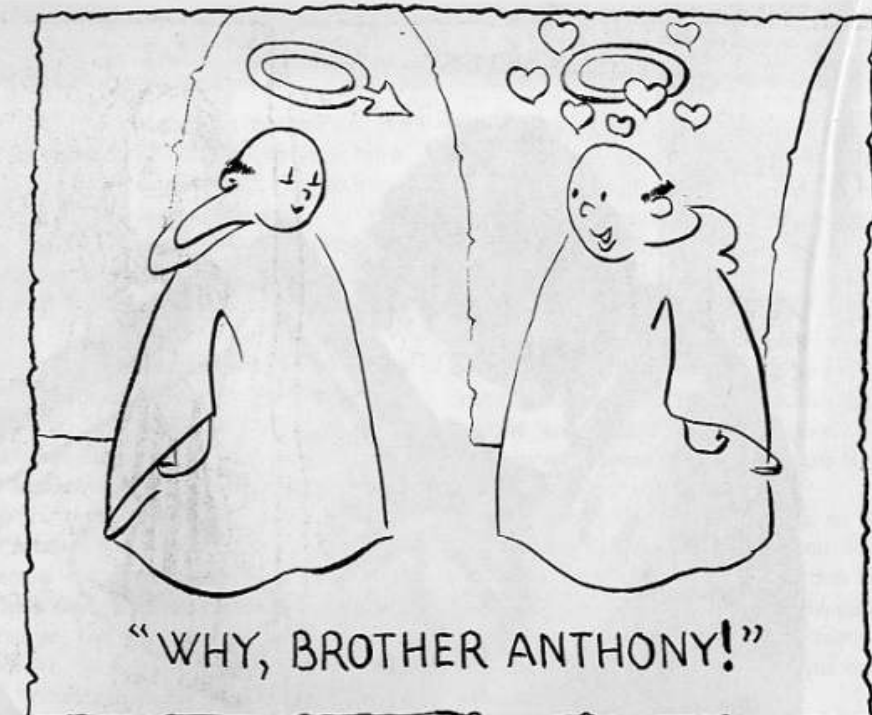
EVERYTHING YOU ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT SEX BUT WERE AFRAID TO ASK.

Explained by David Reuben, M.D., Copyright 1969 by David R. Reuben, M.D., Forth Printing—February 1970.

Dr. Reuben's opening line of his book is, "obviously this book is not based solely on my personal experiences." # WELCOME TO SONNY'S WORLD

Happy New Year, and may I add, I hope your inauguration of 1971 was as festive as mine (minus the hangover). In the last issue I got into a rap concerning the art of graphics. I would like to explore this interesting media in a little greater depth.

During an era in which we find men on the moon, and everyone is out to save the environment, and the words peace and beauty have become world headlines, many people are still polluting their home with bargain basement art. The even greater tragedy is that some will spend more money on cheap photographic reproductions and their framing, then an original piece of art would cost.

This is one of the many reasons that the field of graphic arts attracts my attention. It is also one of the best ways for a beginning collector to buy art and still remain within a sensible budget. Further, as if merely having an original piece of art were not sufficient reward in itself, they usually always increase in value, whereas a reproduction very rarely does.

An original print is not a one of a kind type of art, such as an original painting. It is generally produced by the artist in limited edition quantities. The print should be numbered in the bottom center. In addition to the numbering, the artist's name, and the title of the work should appear at the extreme right and left respectively. This number identifies your print, and usually is written as a fraction. The first half of the figuration is your print, and the second is the number in the edition. Thus with the number 3/10, we know that this represents the third print in an edition of ten. Also of value are the artist's proofs. There are generally run to test the design, and can be noticed by the letters EA or AP replacing the fractional numeration.

There are four basic forms of printing in this media. The first, and most popular form is the relief print. In this process, the artist cuts the design into a solid block

(wood, linoleum, etc.), with the non-print surface carved away, resembling a rubber stamp. When ink is applied, the design prints on the paper, and the cut areas remain plain. This process may be repeated several times for color variation.

A second type of print is the incised or intaglio. Here the design is cut into a metal plate. The printing pick-up is reversed in this type and a smoother finish is resulting.

The lithograph is another, and entirely different type again. The artist draws directly onto a specially prepared flat stone or even metal plate, with a greasy crayon. Next the surface is dampened with water, and ink. Since the water does not hold ink, only the greasy area prints when the paper is pressed onto it.

Finally we come to the serigraphs. This is also called silk-screen or stenciling. This is accomplished by stretching a piece of silk or nylon over a frame. The design is made by making part of the material opaque and part open. The ink then passes through the open part of the screen, transmitting the design onto the paper.

The price of a print will vary as in any of the art fields. A limited edition work by a major artist, will command more

than a piece by someone lesser known. Here again we must use taste and pocket-book. But again if we use patience we can usually find something we like. I once found an original wood block and a lithograph in a second hand furniture store for less than ten dollars.

All hand printed original graphics have a wide range of subtle tones and textures. The vivid, spontaneous quality of the original can seldom be retained in a reproduction. However it is not always easy for a beginner to distinguish. This is where the art dealer comes in. You should go to a reliable gallery. Make sure that your print is certified as to the artist's name, the work, the date of printing, and the size of the edition. Then when it comes to framing I have only one word of advice. If you appreciate art, and your investment, take the work to a professional framer. This is one field where "do it yourself" can be self destructive.

One quick word on theater today. If you haven't seen the new low budget, lower acted, feature length soap opera, *Love Story*, skip it. Put your money into a good book.

Or how about Cream cheese and chopped shrimp. Add a little Curry Powder if you dare.

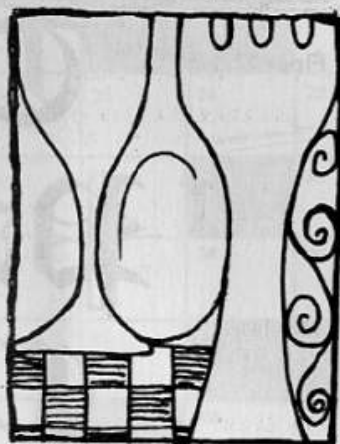
Just use your imagination; there is always the joker around that'll put anything into his mouth.

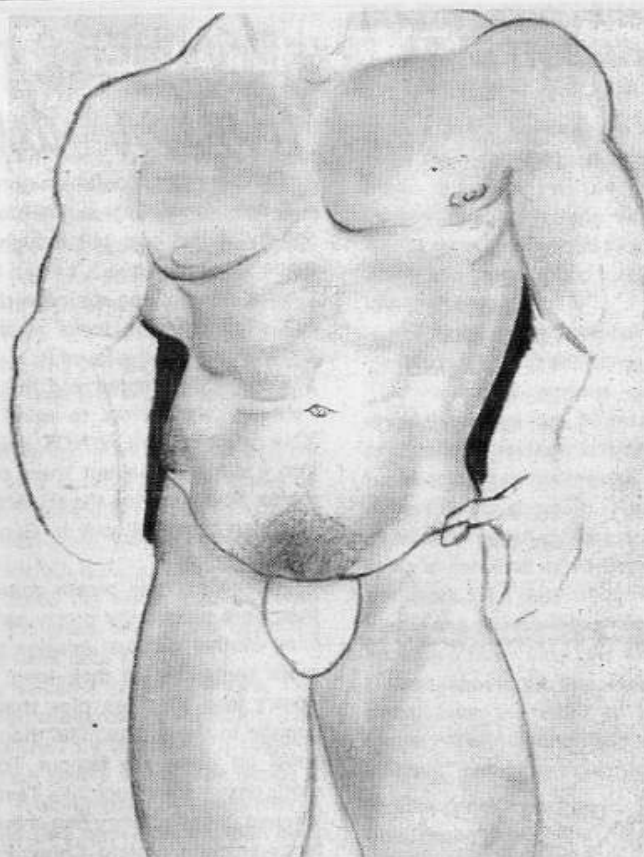

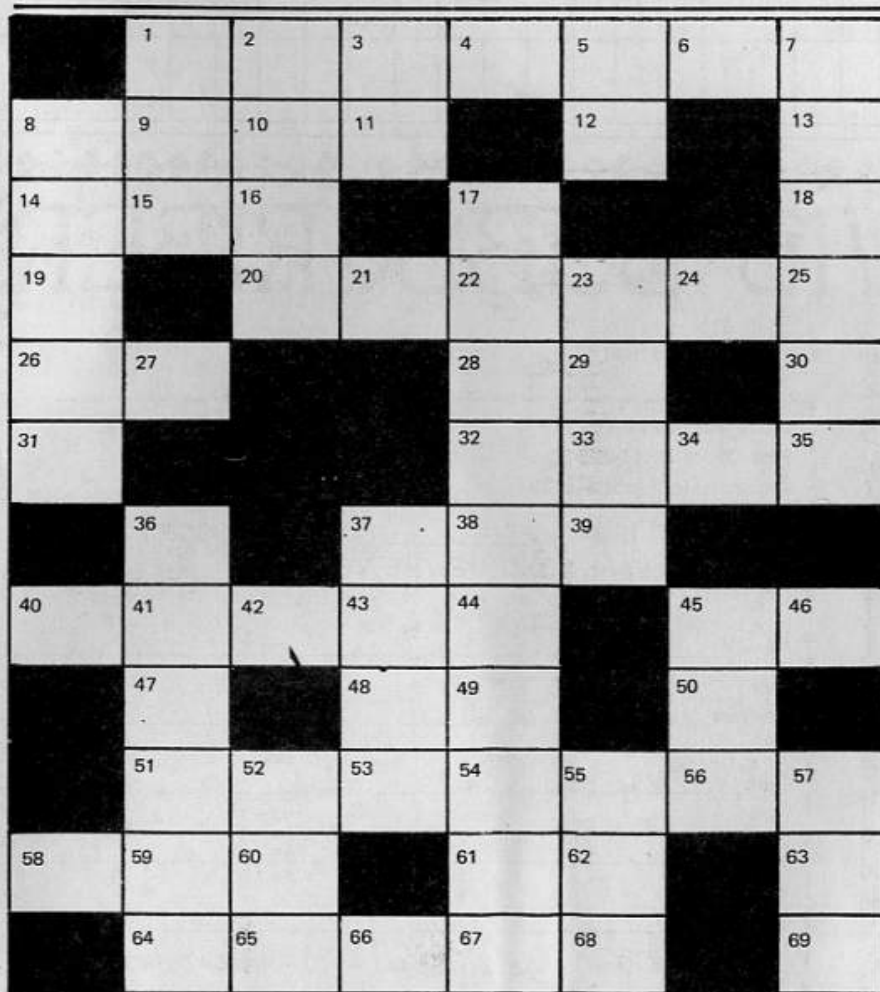
