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EDITORIAL

It looks like Gay Lib has done it again! According to a report sent to DAVID, "about 20 young men from the GAY LIBERATION MOVEMENT, some of them holding hands and kissing, came to the office of Sen. Edward Gurney (R. Fla.) to lobby against the war." "The protesters, one in a miniskirt and opaque pantyhose, others in long flowing dresses, sat in the hall outside Gurney's office and talked with one of his legislative aids, Paul McGinley.

"They wanted Gurney to vote for a deadline to end the war. They also demanded that homosexuals be given the same rights as married people, including the right to marry and file joint income tax returns."

Their ideals were commendable. Their methods DEPLORABLE!

Just what did their gallant "Take me as I am" efforts get them? To quote the report again, "McGinley said he was 'grossed out' by the appearance and actions of some of the men, who caressed each other and kissed as they presented their case" even though he noted some of them were "intelligent people, articulate as to their positions."

Gurney's reaction? "I welcome any group which wants to sit down and talk responsibly, but I've had enough of these ill-mannered adult children who have nothing to do than to come to Washington and act like juvenile delinquents."

As we stated, the Gay Lib had good points to discuss, and we commend them for having the balls to get up and say them to the right people. They may have been able to do some good toward achieving these goals had they acted a little more maturely.

We would have liked Senator Gurney to make an attempt at overlooking the appearances of the people that chose to represent the entire Gay Community in such a shoddy way, and listened to some of the things they had to say. They had an urgent message to deliver that affected millions of people. Too bad they weren't man enough for the job.

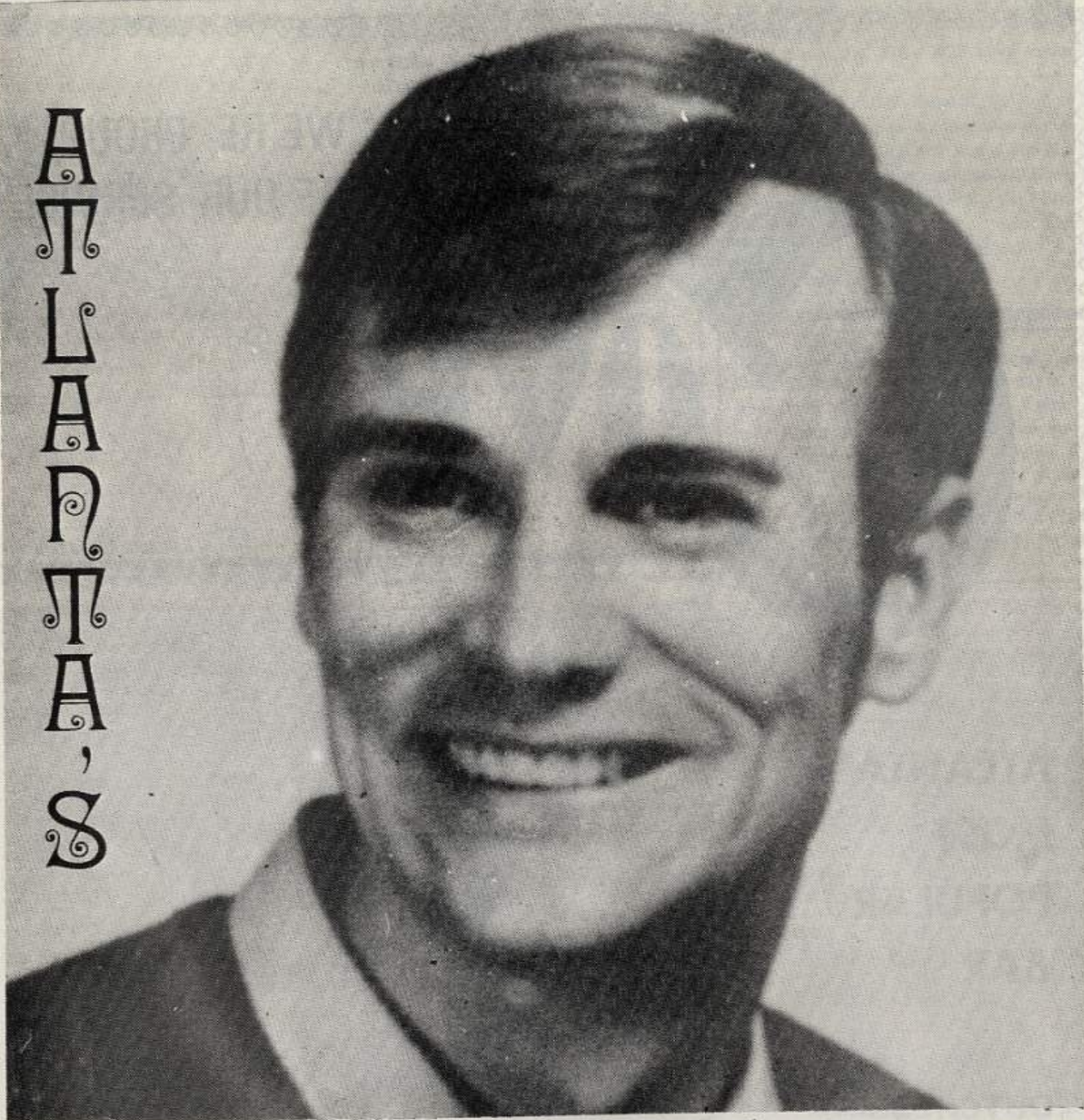

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SIR-PREME, BUDDY CLARK

The overture begins. The three large follow-spots pan over the audience of hundreds (and many times thousands). The large dressing room is crowded as a cast of twenty (ten boys and ten female impersonators) awaits the ending of the overture and the voice of their producer and director, as he welcomes the audience to Chuck's Rathskeller. Atlanta sits back to enjoy another "Clark Productions Presents", a drag show that can hardly be

called a drag.

As the music begins again, the cast moves first onto the stage, then the runway, and finally to the dance floor. The audience goes wild. Loud applause and even louder screams welcome the drags, the guys, the gorgeous gowns, and the beautiful scenery. From that moment on, until the end of the show, Atlanta is spell-bound.

All of this is Buddy Clark's "dream-

come-true".

"It all started about the age of ten," Buddy recalls, "when my three sisters dressed me up as a girl (without any underwear!) and sent me up the road to gather treats on Halloween night. What I didn't know was that the rough guys were waiting for me. My damned sisters had

called them and told them to tear my clothes off. I remember standing in the middle of the road as they came running toward me.

"What a welcoming committee! Before I knew what was happening, I was standing in the middle of the road—as naked as a jaybird!"

As you sit and listen to Buddy tell these stories, you go from laughter to tears and back again before you realize it. One thing about Buddy's stories: he can show you pictures from over the years to prove all the wild things he has done.

"Show business," says Buddy, "was without a doubt born in my blood."

Buddy's first experience with an appreciative audience was during the many roller derbies over the state in the days when he was a roller-skating whiz. Then again when he captured the Georgia State Diving Championship title in 1961. In 1962, as a senior in high school, he became Georgia's first National Baton-Twirling Champion. He also played football in high school, to offset anything



that might be said about what he enjoyed doing most: twirling the baton.

"It was hell," Buddy remembers, "trying to prove so much to myself—or maybe just trying to find myself as I grew up."

Many gays in Atlanta remember Buddy leading most of the major parades down Peachtree Street. He also marched in the Inauguration Parade of President John F. Kennedy, the Rose Bowl Parade, the Rex Parade (in New Orleans), and the National American Legion Parade at the Legion's convention in Miami Beach. Most of these latter parades were on national television.

All this came to a standstill when, in 1966, Buddy received a letter all too

familiar to many American males. It began: "Greetings from the President of the United States of America". Buddy, unlike some before and after him, did not check the box, as many were sure he would do.



Even the Army couldn't hold him back for long, however. He wrote home and asked his mother to send him his batons.

"Before I knew it," he tells us, "I had won all the Post titles in every entertainment contest they had. Then I found myself in the Third Army Entertainment Contest—with the title of Best Entertainer! I appeared at Army posts from Florida to New York, where I led Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, and made an appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show. Once I was asked to entertain the soldiers of the Third Army at the Army Rec-

reation Center at Lake Altoona, above Atlanta. Well, I borrowed a wig, a sequin



ski costume, and water-skied in drag!

"One of the most interesting stories I can remember, while visiting Uncle Sam, was flying from Augusta to Atlanta—in



a WAC uniform! And Military standby at that! I can't believe now that I did such a thing, but I did. It was the only way I could get to Atlanta for a big party, be dressed when I got there, and it was the least expensive way."

When Buddy returned to civilian life



after his two years in the military, he became the lead singer in a group called "The Atlanta Sir-Premes."

"You have got to have a gimmick," states Buddy, "I remember when we first

started out as Dianna Ross and the Sir-Premes with five-dollar dresses. Our gimmick was black make-up."

All over the Southeast there were many groups impersonating the Supremes, but the Atlanta Sir-Premes were closest to the real thing. Their gowns had become beautiful (and expensive) and the black make-up made the girls look authentic. By the time Buddy retired from the role of Dianna, they had appeared in every major drag club in the Southeast. Their salaries were the highest paid for drag, and audiences cried out for encore after encore.

Like the original Supremes, the Sir-Premes presented their Farewell Performance recently. Buddy was given an award at Chuck's Rathskeller which read: "To the Atlanta Sir-Premes, for Outstanding Entertainment and Showmanship."

In August of 1969, Chuck Cain asked Buddy to produce the Halloween Beauty Contest in Atlanta. He agreed, went to work, and came up with an instant success. The show had nineteen final contestants, a forty-foot runway, and an audience of two thousand people. Telegrams carrying congratulations came from all over, including one from Miss Pearl Bailey. The popular consensus was that the show was as good, if not better, than any state or national beauty pageant. Atlanta is still talking about October 31, 1970 and the Miss Gay Atlanta Pageant.

"Atlanta was 'stood on its head' in February of '69," Buddy boasts proudly, "when Pearl Bailey, performing there in 'Hello Dolly', asked me to come up on stage to impersonate her as 'Dolly'. I did, and Pearl was so delighted with my performance that she invited me to her New York home on July 4th and held a 'Southern Dinner' in my honor."

Still another surprise was in store for Atlanta in March when Buddy walked into Chuck's Rathskeller on a Saturday night with none other than Dionne Warwick at his side, and yet another when she dedicated her Atlanta Concert to him.

"He never ceases to amaze me," says

This month's Action Boy, Ronnie, is one of the best in his field. He has delighted

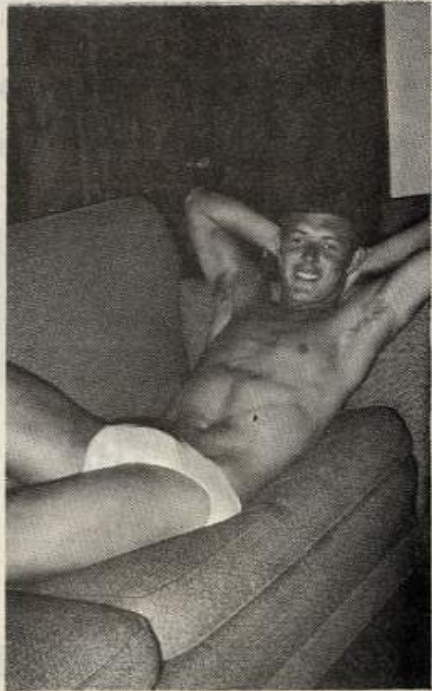
and totally mesmerized many of the customers at KEITH'S CRUISE ROOM in Hallandale, Florida for over a year.

YOU'VE COME A LONG WAY, W.P.B.

The West Palm Beach area has come a long way since Gene Greeder opened the TURF BAR more than 18 years ago. Gene told DAVID how rough things were before people finally got used to the idea of having a gay bar in their midst. Pastry for a 1 crust pie.

2 tablespoons flour

½ pound swiss cheese, grated.

½ teaspoon salt

pepper

1 cup milk

3 whole eggs

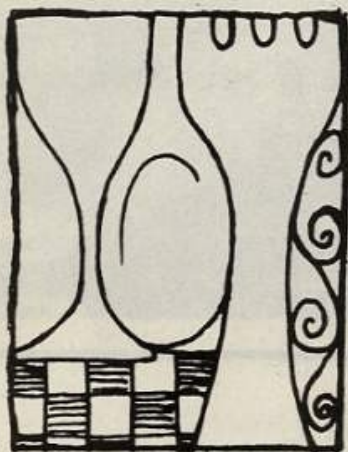
4 slices bacon cooked crisp and crumbled

Line an 8 inch pie pan with uncooked pastry. Mix flour into grated cheese; add

salt and a grind of pepper.

Heat milk in a saucepan while you beat eggs in a bowl. Slowly add milk to the eggs, beating constantly. Add cheese and blend well. Sprinkle crumbled bacon over the bottom of the unbaked pastry, pour in the cheese mixture and bake for 15 minutes at 400 degrees, then for 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Cut into pie shape wedges, let cool for 15 minutes and serve slightly warm on little plates with forks.

Try it. You may start a who new way of living—that sweet thing you tried to pick up a couple of months ago may decide he doesn't really go for chicken after all.
