




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

Dear DAVID,

In the April issue, J.J.N. suggested that you form Gay Liberation groups in the South. Such groups already exist. In fact, almost all the major cities have their own organizations for Gay rights and Gay pride, and in some places where you would expect it would be suicide to even talk about Gay issues, there are active organizations pushing for our freedom, people who know you have to take a stand to be free.

I was born in the south and I, like so many others in that part of America, grew up believing that we had to take it easy, that nobody should push too hard against injustice (even if it was blatantly unhuman). In a region that has denied so many human beings their liberty, it is damned hard to be an advocate of change. I know that you never get anywhere until you take the first step, that you are never heard until you say something. That's what Gay Liberation is about.

When I was still a student at my western Kentucky high school in the mid 60's, we had a teacher who was one of the best liked teachers in that school. One day, he was discovered to be Gay and suddenly all 6,000 people in Providence hated him. He had been a well-respected teacher, a community leader, and a deacon in his church. All at once, he became 'in their

eyes', a sinner, a criminal, a "pervert", a "queer" child molester. He was transformed from a model citizen whose name was a household word, to a monster whose name couldn't be mentioned in "decent" company, a dirty word to snicker at in gym. Because of their ignorance, because they still held onto their dark-age prejudices against anyone who was different, because nobody had ever dared tell them that Gay is good, that we are not psychopaths out to rape their six-year-old sons, a life was shattered. Because we have not demanded our human right to be, right now, in some little town or in some city, there are hopes being crushed, other lives ruined. That's what Gay Liberation is about.

Gay Liberation is no more a supremacy movement than DAVID is Anti-North just because its home office happens to be in Florida instead of Maine. We are simply refusing to be complacent any longer about the position of Gay folk, dealing with our reality of oppression, the reality of that teacher and all our people who have had to lead their lives in silent agony. That's why Gay Liberation exists: for all of them, for all of you, and for folk like me. Together, we will be free!!

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## LOOKING AROUND



IN FT. LAUDERDALE, the Gay-Way Counseling Service, founded and managed by Louis Cameron, is finally on its way to becoming a reality. A successful benefit performance by Ty Bennett and his Fabulous Fakes at the VENTURE INN was held April 24th and held over for two other nights.

The response produced enough funds to have a preliminary charter submitted to the Secretary of State in Tallahassee. An approval or decision is due within 90 days.

Now, it might be beneficial to our readers to know that those who have so far offered their support are: The Rev. Callaway of the Ft. Lauderdale Metropolitan Community Church, the Henderson Clinic of Broward County, consisting of psychologists and psychiatrists; the Broward County Health Services and the Family Services consisting of social workers and health counselors; and a few other individuals who wish to remain unmentioned at this time.

Your opinions and suggestions are most welcomed. They may be mailed to Louis Cameron, 715 NW 3rd Avenue, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. 33311. It is requested that, at this time, Gay-Way Counseling Service be left off the address until a post office box has been secured.

So take a minute and drop Mr. Cameron a line on your viewpoints. A great portion of the success of this service depends on the gays themselves.

### AT THE MOVIES

Let's face it-A CLOCKWORK ORANGE is the most brilliantly directed piece of

trash ever to happen. Kubrick is an absolute genius...but why he has to choose such pseudo-intellectual subject matter to direct, I'll never know. From a technical standpoint, *A Clockwork Orange* is probably the number one movie of all times. From the plot/story angle, it's probably one of the worst. It's pure sickness. If it were done for \$300,000 instead of \$3 million and were done by a lesser director, it would be just another grade 'B' S&M sex flick...but...

Nobody, but nobody can handle a camera like Kubrick. The same goes for creative make-up and sets. And no one in the history of cinema has been able to put classical music with contemporary direction the way he does (remember *2001*?).

As for symbolism, Kubrick goes from genuinely intellectual to absurdly camp. He uses a Zen condition called Sanpaku with his characters when they are at their sickest. It is a condition whereby, when one is looking straight ahead, the whites of the eyes show beneath the iris. This is considered in Zen to be an indication of great sickness. Most people, however, would miss this bit of brilliance because they've never even heard of Sanpaku. On the other hand, Kubrick uses some symbolism that is so ridiculously phoney, it makes you sick, but unfortunately, this is the stuff that is going to make people say things like, "Heavy, man!" and "Wow, what a statement!" and I'm sure Kubrick means it as pure camp.

I think the thing that gives me such a negative outlook on this film is the fact that I can't help feeling that Kubrick,

with all his talent, is coping out by picking a piece that he can cash in on because he knows that John Q. Public is buying violence and sex this year. The violent scenes are all, admittedly, directed with tongue-in-cheek so that while you're getting nauseated you are also laughing your insides out...but still in all, he's selling violence which to me, is a bummer.

*A Clockwork Orange* is the story of Alex, a young malcontent who gets his jollies out of what he calls "ultra-violence". He and a gang of three other toughs pillage, plunder and rape their way around London until Alex goes one step too far and murders a very affluent woman. He is caught and is sentenced to 14 years in prison where he immediately begins kissing everyone's derriere in order to win favors. (Incidentally, as sick as he is, the homosexuality in prison is treated as being even more perverted. Hmmm?). Ultimately, Alex is chosen for a rehabilitation experiment. He is conditioned to become deathly ill at the thought or sight of violence. He is also inadvertently conditioned to become sick when he hears his favorite piece of music, Beethoven's Ninth. To make the proverbial long story short, he is later subjected to the Ninth in a locked room and consequently tries to commit suicide.

The papers pick up the story and they are totally sympathetic, claiming that he has been cruelly used as a human guinea pig. Consequently, the politician responsible for his "rehabilitation" tries to shut him up with money and various other favors. He has a fabulous stereo set brought

to Alex's bedside playing ("well, wadaya know?") Beethoven's Ninth. All of a sudden, Alex realizes that he is not getting sick and that some time during his recovery from his attempted suicide, he had been "cured" and can now go back to ultra-violence. The end. Doesn't that sound wholesome?

As I said, though, the use of music is brilliant. Walter Carlos, who did *Switched On Bach*, even got into that end of the deal. The violent scenes are done in a ballet-like style to the accompaniment of some very well-chosen classical pieces and there is one orgy scene that is a classic piece of low humor in itself. Alex picks up two girls in a record shop and takes them home for a three-way. The sex-scene is speeded up terrifically to the strains of the William Tell Overture. This is just one piece of very bawdy, very funny comedy relief. There's not even any bloodshed in this scene...just sex. (Oh well, it sells too).

*A Clockwork Orange* is definitely a paradox. It is one of the best and one of the worst movies ever made. It really depends on your point of view. But from any point of view, I suppose it's worth seeing. From a technical aspect, it's a mental orgasm and from the story aspect, it's sick, really sick, but sadly enough, it does make some sort of statement relative to the direction that society is taking. At least Kubrick can make an audience react emotionally in a time when overt reactions seem to be not at all chic.

## AT THE BOOKSTORE

### I HAVE MORE FUN WITH YOU THAN ANYBODY

The purpose of writing this book, I believe, was to show that all gay love affairs are not merely one trick after another with eventual cohabitation.

Although the book has many merits, it seems almost too short and too sweet. Have you ever met a couple that seemed too perfect? Whatever one does, the other does. What's good for one is ALWAYS good for the other.

The only problem is they put down almost all "unmarried" gay activities. Is there no joy left for the single gay?

It would be interesting to see what they would have said about gay life if they were single.

Jack and Lige are active in gay rights movements striving for equality and pride for gays. I hope they haven't excluded single gays in their fights there too.

As you read this book, it's like a trip down memory lane where you can remember all the things you've done with past lovers. Many of their activities should be easily identifiable to almost all gays. For example, when they first met, it was a mad passionate love affair until Lige decided he wasn't ready and they split up for a while. Sound familiar? Naturally, as in most "Doris Day" type stories, they

get back together and live happily ever after.

In essence, however, the book covers the various basic activities of two lovers. Their travels together; their thoughts on religion, politics and sex; their jobs, their friends and life in general. In that respect it was an intelligent and well written diary of the lives of two lovers.

I would highly recommend this book to all lovers and those hoping to have one. Don't let the idealism fool you though. I found a lot of what they had to say along those lines hard to swallow.

One passage which bears mentioning sums up gay love life quite nicely:

"We tried looking at our lives from new vantage points. If we held on to each other too tightly, our life-dance would be clumsy. If we were tense we'd step all over each other's feet. At the same time, if we still laughed for the same reasons we knew that neither of us would be dancing far away. Both of us would linger nearby, always eager to touch, happiest when we saw the smiles of pleasure we evoked in each other's faces. We knew how to give each other the freedom to do as each of us pleased. Neither of us would be a warden for the other. We discovered too, that if we didn't press such issues, we had more fun with each other than with anybody else."

Also in the review is Ft. Lauderdale's version of Soul Sister Aretha Franklin.


His "Fire Dance", Pata Pata number ala Mariam Makeba and interpretations of

Try to catch their "Grease Show" one time. You'll like it. The shows feature Alvino, Lily White, Kitty Litter and Apple.



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

Dear Jon,

As of this date, the only candidate to have said anything publicly is Hubert Humphrey. In an interview with New York's GAA, Humphrey said the following:

"I am and have always been committed to the civil rights and civil liberties of all Americans. I see no reason why homosexual Americans should be excluded from

equal protection under the law. I am against arbitrary discrimination against homosexuals, especially as it pertains to unfair occupational hiring practices. Homosexuals are citizens; let us treat them as such."

The ADVOCATE has held a survey to find out the viewpoints of the candidates, and thus far, Humphrey's opinion is the only one on record.

Dear DAVID,

I read the article about "Athens Grease" by Miss Diamond Lil in your May issue. It was good to see the Committee On Gay Education mentioned in the pages of DAVID, as it seems to me that the two can compliment each other. I would like to take this opportunity to inform DAVID readers of what the Committee is doing and to seek any support that might be available.

The gay dance certainly did shake up the University of Georgia campus--and

now the Committee's application for recognition as an official University Organization is doing much the same thing. The Student Senate approved the application which was then vetoed by the Student Body President. The President's veto was overrode by the senate; but the Senate is only the first (and easiest) step in the recognition process. The next two steps involve University Councils, from whom the Committee expects rejection of the application. Presently, the Committee is trying to raise funds to support court actions when this occurs.

The Committee is not, however, sitting around doing nothing--it is presently engaged in the 'education' part of its title. This activity includes speeches by Committee Members to various University classes. Over a thousand students are spoken to every quarter. (Since the beginning of the committee's activities, Feb. of this year, over two thousand students have been exposed to at least some fact-

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# Ready, Get Set, Grow!

What kind of gardener are you—novice or expert? It doesn't really matter, if you want to grow some of the numerous plants which are now so readily available in supermarkets, variety stores, garden centers and flower shops.

There's no need to have a "green thumb" to succeed with the houseplants mentioned here. After all, a green thumb is no more than a little basic knowledge about what you're doing—and you need that, regardless of the job you tackle.

"Minimum care" does not mean "no care at all." Just remember that and you'll be off to a good start with any plant.

The plants now widely sold, have become popular because of their adaptability to a wide range of home conditions. Still, each plant is an individual, and there are a few basic facts that you should know, such as the light, water and food requirements for the plant. As for temperatures needed, any of these houseplants can easily survive the daily fluctuations indoors.

The market is flooded with so many varieties of houseplants these days, that it is impossible to cover all of them. Therefore, I will give descriptions of a few of the more easily grown varieties, ranging from the common types to the very exotic.

Few plants can match the beauty of the ORCHID. Several varieties can be grown under the most normal home conditions. The White Moth Orchid (*phalaenopsis*) is so named because the bloom resembles some tropical moths. The snowy white blossom has a yellow throat and grows

atop a long stem. Many kinds of Moth Orchids bloom from two to five months. Give them more light in winter, less in summer. The Lady Slipper Orchid (*cypripedium*) makes a colorful contrast to the white "moth." Its bloom is basically yellow with orange, reddish-brown and white markings. It thrives on moisture and light intensity. Both of these should be kept out of direct sunlight.

One of Mother Nature's most unusual creations is the BROMELIAD. The leaves of this curious plant form a center cup which should be filled with water at all times. The most common of the bromeliads is the pineapple. On the market now, is a small version of the commercial variety, which is too large and thorny to qualify as a good houseplant. A pineapple needs a porous, fast-draining soil mixture—one composed of equal parts of loam, peat and sand. They require more light than most other bromeliads. Give this one the most light it can get. Keep water in the center cup of leaves and only moisten the soil on occasion. Even though the plant holds water on the inside (and needs it there) do not let the soil stay wet and muddy, as this will cause the base of the plant to rot. Rotting of the base is one sure-fire way to kill a bromeliad. It's easy to check the water level in the cup and you should add it as needed. Since one filling will last a week or two, this plant can do without your attention when you're off on vacation.

The Painted Feather (*Vriesia mariae*) is one of the most popular bromeliads and it's quite easy to grow indoors. Just keep

the cup filled with water. Soft-leaved bromeliads like these, don't need strong light. The flattened, featherlike red and yellow flower spike remains colorful for up to three months and more.

You can use bromeliads with large cup "vases" such as billbergia, to hold bouquets of cut flowers. The plant's own blossoms will force themselves up through the water kept in the center cup. Then, remove the cut flowers and enjoy the spectacle produced by the billbergia's bloom spike of blue and chartreuse.

ZEBRA PLANT is the common name for a long-neglected beauty. Its foliage is a glossy dark green, ribbed with yellow. The plant produces brilliant yellow flowers, which only last a short time, but the spike continues elongating so you have color for several weeks. Plants may drop foliage and become leggy after flowering. The best thing to do at this stage is to start new plants with tip cuttings. Tip cutting and other methods of propagating (multiplying) plants will be discussed in the article. In planting Zebra Plants, use a standard soil mixture of moderate fertility. Keep the plant in bright light, but out of direct sunlight which will burn the foliage. Attend to watering each time the surface is almost dry. The leaves are stiff and brittle, so beware of breaking them. If they soften, that's a sign that they are wilting and that water is needed. This plant has the odd inclination for leaves to sag (but not soften) when it's in bloom. Remember this and keep it in mind. Otherwise, you may mistake it for a wilting plant and water it to an early death.

Gaining ever-increasing popularity are the houseplants which are big enough to be considered trees. Among these is the CALAMONDIN. This dwarf citrus is a joy to have because of its fragrance and color. For months during winter and spring, it bears flowers and both green and ripe fruits at the same time. For a dwarf plant, grow one that's been grafted. Shape it by trimming lightly when fruiting is over. Citrus grown from seed will not be dwarf-and fruit, if any, will be of dubious quality. Use a general potting mix to moderate the fertility to keep the plant growing vigorously and to get fruit. Citrus takes full sun in winter--and even in summer, outdoors, if you ease it into the sun gradually. Let the soil dry a bit before you water. Fruit drop results from over- or underwatering.

The SCHEFFLERA rates as one of the top cast-iron houseplants. It's available in all sizes, from eight-inch seedlings to ceiling-height trees. The leaves are in clusters of six at the ends of long stalks. The foliage has a natural high gloss--easy to restore if dulled by dust. Gentle rubbing with any damp, soft cloth will do it. The rate of growth of this plant is moderate so don't be worried by the eventual size that the plant can reach. If it gets too big, reduce the size by air-layering, which will be explained later.

In growing Schefflera, use a general potting soil mix available at garden stores. Strong light is best, but not direct sun, shining through glass. Water each time the soil surface appears to be dry. Timing of this varies according to the size of the pot--more frequently for small containers, less so as the size increases. Remember, soil dries faster in clay than plastic pots.

The RUBBER PLANT, a durable, reliable plant, has disappointed many people, largely due to the fact that they've taken advantage of its easy-to-grow nature. True enough, a rubber plant does not need lots of bright light to survive, but it can't survive a long incarceration in a dark corner

either. For planting, use a general potting soil mixture and feed the plant lightly--once in the spring and once in the summer. You're dealing with a plant that is, by nature, a large tree. The idea is to keep it suitable to the house. All species will grow in shade, but will fare better in bright light if there is a uniform supply of moisture. You can grow rubber plants in any window, but protect them by a thin curtain if you place them in windows with a Southern exposure. Lack of water causes dead areas in leaves and they eventually drop. Water moderately about three times weekly.

The DWARF PALM is well-suited to indoor growing, especially where space is at a premium. You'll often find several growing in a pot. You can leave them crowded (nothing much deters these palms) or separate them, as you wish. Use a general potting soil mixture. Apply some houseplant fertilizer lightly every three or four weeks during active growth. Plants grow slowly. Mature ones need only six-inch pots and therefore they can fit almost anywhere. This palm tolerates the dim light and dry air of homes. However, it will do even better if you can give it bright light, but not direct sunlight.

Grow this (and most other palms) on the moist side. If the soil dries out for any length of time, the plant won't fold up, but the tips and edges of fronds will turn brown and unattractive. You can resort to the snipping routine, but that has its limits if you want to keep a well-shaped plant.

The SNOWFLAKE PLANT is an appropriate name for this annual trevesia, a member of the ARALIA family. Its usual snowflake-shaped foliage, evokes wonder in all who see it. The large leaves require considerable water but only when the soil surface starts to dry. Use a standard soil mixture available from garden centers. Grow the plant in a good-sized container and it needs little light. It will thrive for years with only artificial overhead light.

However, a summer change does it good. Put it outdoors under a tree where the sun is well filtered. Stake or tie the plant to protect it against wind damage--especially if the specimen is over two feet tall. During the cooler months, place the plant in your warmest room and provide moist air at all times. Older plants develop spines, so be very wary of the trunk. Other varieties of Aralia should receive the same care.

PHILODENDRON is one of the most versatile plants on the market. Varieties range from the common plants with heart-shaped leaves to the large-leaved climbing varieties, to the bush-like split-leaved Sellaum. The small vining varieties may be trained to climb a totem or allowed to vine freely. They're very attractive on window sills and in wall brackets when they are allowed to vine freely. A large-leaved climbing plant, such as Red Emerald, should be trained to a totem for most effective growth. Do this by gently tying the new growth to the post. Leave the ties in place until the aerial roots penetrate the post and that section of the plant is well supported. If the vine gets too tall, simply add another piece to the totem, or take cuttings.

Although bush-like in appearance, the split-leaved varieties of Philodendron are actually a vine. However, it is not necessary to train them to a totem--the stem should be strong enough to support it.

Philodendrons do well in practically any soil of medium nutrient content. All varieties need strong light--though direct sun will burn them. Small-leaved varieties will tolerate a little more shade. The point to be made here is that with large-leaved plants, the idea is to grow them so that they continue producing big leaves. The new leaves are naturally small, but they should normally increase in size with age. If they remain small, then you know that the plant needs light. Water the Philodendrons three times weekly. And be sure to water the totem as well as the pot soil--

the roots are in both places.

ENGLISH IVY is one of the old standards, but it is still a favorite of many plant growers. These attractive evergreen vining plants come in such a variety of forms that they make good items for the hobbyist or collector. Some are dwarf, and many leaf forms are available. Variegated kinds (those having green leaves, with lighter green or white markings) are more tender and offer much more of a challenge. You'll find the trailing habits of ivies useful for hanging baskets or wall pockets. Or, they're suitable for mantels or room dividers. You can also train the vines over wire or wood and form many designs to your own taste.

All varieties of English Ivy take a standard potting mixture. Grow them in a bright north window; avoiding the hot sun. When the soil surface feels dry to the touch, water until the surplus runs out of the bottom of the pot. Mist the leaves with water every few days. A windex bottle which has been cleaned and refilled with water works quite well for this.

DIEFFENBACHIA, more commonly referred to as "dumb cane" has several varieties now available. The toughest of the lot is *Dieffenbachia amoena*. It has a cane-like trunk with almond-shaped, variegated leaves. However, if it's bold, dramatic leaves are too large for your situation, try one of the beautiful small-leaved varieties, such as Rudolph Roehrs which is chartreuse with a dark green midrib.

Grow the canes in a mixture of equal parts of loam, sand and peat. *Dieffenbachia* tolerates a wide range of light--from poor to bright. But full sun will yellow the foliage--your main reason for growing it. The best growth results in bright light. Don't let the soil dry out, or the edges of the leaves will become discolored. If the leaves start to droop, you know that water is needed. When the soil starts to dry out, water it well. You can immerse the pot (not the plant itself) in a pail of water. When the water stops bubbling, remove the pot with the plant and allow to

drain. You'll save yourself two or three waterings this way.

The DRACENA, with its striking blade-like leaves, is popular inspite of its tendency to develop brown tips and edges. The discolorations are easily snipped off with scissors. A new, resistant form has been developed and is now available on the market. Plants thrive in small pots--seemingly disproportionate to the size of the plant. Repot to a larger container only when the plant is rootbound and normal growth slows down noticeably--that is, if new leaves fail to put out. Loose, well-drained soil, high in organic matter, encourages good growth in Dracena. Grow the plants in an east window or out of direct sunlight in south and west windows to maintain brightly colored foliage. Never let the soil dry out--the plant likes plenty of moisture. Mist the leaves occasionally. In fact, do this with all plants to remove the dust which may impede the plant's growth.

Hosts of people find AFRICAN VIOLETS easy to grow. There's also a large group who feel they just don't have the knack. Actually, the key to success is no great mystery. Violets need a more porous soil than most houseplants do--at least half organic matter. Grow them in small pots--up to the four-inch size for mature plants.

Your African Violets fail to flower? The chances are, you don't have them in the right light. If your plants have only beautiful, healthy green foliage and no blossoms, the light is probably too low. If the foliage gets burned, there's too much light. Grow the plants in a bright north window in summer and in a bright east one in winter (on coldest nights, put a sheet of aluminum foil between glass and plants to prevent damage from freezing). Avoid overwatering by using porous soil with drainage in the bottom of the pot. Apply warm water when the soil surface dries. Never use cold water (but not too warm either) and do not get water on the leaves as it will discolor them.

Becoming more and more popular these days are FERNS. The range of varieties is outstanding, from the ever-popular Boston fern to the exotic staghorn fern. Most varieties enjoy the same treatment. They like good drainage, rich soil, humidity, plenty of space, partial shade, ample water and air circulation--but no direct drafts.

Garden centers and nurseries have commercial potting soils suitable to almost any plant. However, if you have the facilities, the time, and the desire, you can make a general potting soil of your own which can be varied according to the individual plant. Here is my favorite recipe:

1 bushel garden loam (top soil)  
1 4-inch clay pot of sheep manure  
3 gallons leaf mold and/or peat moss  
1 3-inch pot of bonemeal  
1 3-inch pot of hydrated lime  
1 gallon of sand


The peat moss, manure, bonemeal and lime can be acquired at most garden centers. The loam can be dug from the top four or five inches of garden soil. The leaf mold is rotted leaves and can be raked up in the woods or in flower beds. Be sure that you get decayed and not freshly fallen leaves. The sand can be gotten from a building supplies store. For smaller amounts of potting mixture, simply reduce the amount of all the ingredients proportionately. For purely ornamental foliage, double the amount of leaf mold or peat. When potting up a plant in a pot which has a drainage hole in the bottom, place a piece of broken pottery over the hole to keep the soil from draining out. If you use a more ornamental planter which doesn't have a drainage hole, put at least an inch of coarse gravel in the bottom so that the excess water will have a place to drain from.

The true hobbyist will want to multiply (or propagate) his plants. Most plants can be started from seeds, but it takes longer than from cuttings and because most houseplants have been hybridized, (Continued on page 57)

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# DAVID DISCUSSES

In the April 1971 (Vol. 1 No. 6) issue of DAVID, a story appeared entitled, "They Did it Anyway." It concerned two young gays (from Jacksonville) who decided to "get married" and did so, in front of a large crowd in a bar located on Jacksonville Beach. One of the gays, Ronnie Far-

mer, is now classified among that category of people which we refer to as 'Transsexualists.' That is, Ronnie is now going through the sex-change procedures in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Hopefully, by next Christmas, Ronnie Farmer will no longer be a man. He will, for all intents and purposes, be a woman, complete with

all (or most) of the necessary equipment.

This writer has known Ronnie since he first made the gay scene and feels that his story is one that should and needs to be told. This subject is one that so few of us know anything about, yet is happening to more and more people every day, right here in the U.S.

## On Sex Reassignment

**DAVID:** Can you explain exactly what "sex change" means?

**FARMER:** Sex change is just slang for 'sex reassignment' surgery, which simply means changing a male to a female or vice-versa.

**DAVID:** What was it that prompted you to go through with this?

**FARMER:** This is something that I have always wanted to do. I had, however, many things stopping me. The main thing was just getting up the nerve to do it. Another was that I wanted to wait until I reached my twenty-first birthday so if my family did not agree with what I was doing, I could go ahead and have it done without their consent. I have been talking to people and consulting different societies for about a year. So when I decided to go through with this, I moved to Baton Rouge and took the necessary steps.

**DAVID:** Does your family know? If so, what do they think of it?

**FARMER:** I will say that my family does not agree with me on this. They don't believe that this is what I really want. I would rather not bring them into this interview, though.

**DAVID:** What were the procedures that you had to go through in order to begin the change? (That is, what were the very first steps that you had to take, i.e. seeing doctors, a judge or whatever).

**FARMER:** As I told you earlier, I had been writing to different societies to find

out what would happen. When I finally decided that I was going to do this, I decided to move to Baton Rouge because of the Reed Erickson Foundation there, with Dr. James Lorio. I had to set up an appointment for an evaluation session and write an autobiography in as much detail as possible. I came to the evaluation session and received my prescription for my hormones. Next, I had to get a job, working as a female. I work as a cocktail waitress in a straight bar. They gave me identification papers to stop any trouble with the law. They require that you live and work in 'drag' for a period of six months to two years, so you will be sure that this is what you want to do. As far as a judge goes, you don't need a judge until the operation is complete and the legal records need to be changed.

**DAVID:** Are you taking hormone shots? If so, what effect do they have on you?

**FARMER:** I have been on the hormone pills for seventy-five days, as of now. You don't start shots until after two hundred days unless you want to take silicone. The reason for this is so that your body can adjust to the female hormones. If at all possible, I will avoid the silicone because it has been proven to be very cancerous. The effect that I have received from the pills are, my breasts have begun to swell, my hips are shaping, and my arms and legs are getting smoother. Occasionally, your stomach gets upset after

taking these pills but this can be avoided by taking the pills before going to bed at night. They also cut down considerably on your body hair.

**DAVID:** What are the legal requirements for the sex-change procedure?

**FARMER:** There are really no legal requirements. It's up to the doctors. It would be too difficult to make any legal requirements because so many people change their minds at the end. The only thing is that you have to be, is 21 years of age or have your parents' consent.

**DAVID:** Are there any organizations that are or were created specifically for people going through this?

**FARMER:** Yes, there are quite a few and some very good ones, I might add. There is the foundation that I am seeing here, The Reed Erickson Foundation. Also, there is the John Hopkins Society in Boston, the Gender Identity Clinic in Jacksonville and another branch of the Reed Erickson Foundation in New York City. There are also many more which I could list, but I think these are the best-known ones. If you were planning to go through with the change and didn't live in any of these towns, they could put you in touch with a doctor in the town you live in, or in the closest big city.

**DAVID:** What is the cost of the procedure?

**FARMER:** This all depends on the per-

The most impressive is Jason Miller's "That Championship Season," produced by Joseph Papp. It's our bet that Papp takes "Championship" to Broadway for next season. Also slated for opening is "All the Girls Came Out To Play" starring that hunky blond, Dennis Cole. Dennis has had a fantastic tour with "Girls" and it's a sure Broadway hit. Well, that's all for coming events as we see it, so let's take a look at where Broadway stands and what's happened in the last year to get it there.

With the closing of such greats as "Company," "1776," and "Purlie," Broadway looked like it was doomed. It's big stars were leaving to take their shows on the road, leaving behind a gap sometimes too big to fill. But Broadway's been through this before and it has always survived.

The record holder on Broadway is, of course, "Fiddler on the Roof, with over 3200 performances, thus making it the longest running show ever. Even with the movie version now released, the play is still going strong.

bright revival of Youman's musical of 1928. And good news for the "nature-lovers"—both "Hair" and "Oh, Calcutta" are still going strong.

Some of the newer musical shows seem to be leaning to nostalgia for their popularity as well. "Different Times" by Michael Brown is about several generations of an unhappy New England family.

The revival of "A Funny Thing Happened to Me on the Way to the Forum" turned out to be better than the original. The cast includes Phil Silvers (who won the Tony Award for best actor in a musical for his role) and Larry Blyden.

"Grease" has a cast of virtually all unknowns and it brings back the not-too-long forgotten memories of the 1950's.

You'll probably get the same feeling from the play that you got from that tiresome decade.

Another revival, "Lost in the Stars" stars Brock Peters and a huge cast. A return of the Kurt Weill-Maxwell Anderson musical of 1949, the play offers fine dancing and a magnificent set.

And, the king of nostalgia on Broadway is "Follies". "Ain't Supposed to Die a Natural Death" is a great show by Melvin Van Peebles. The play mingles social protest with the usual difficulties of people falling in and out of love. The cast is all wonderful.

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
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# CHICAGO

Although "Jamimma" is not a musical, it's a funny yet tragic story. It's all-Black cast and their great performances make it a welcome addition to Broadway.

Four non-musicals warrant mentioning as well: "Night Watch," a thriller with Joan Hackett and Edward Winter; "The Prisoner of Second Avenue", Neil Simon's newest play starring Peter Falk and Lee

Grant; "Promenade All!", an hilarious comedy with Hume Cronyn, Eli Wallach, Anne Jackson and Richard Backus; and "Sticks and Bones", a comedy about a young veteran of Vietnam.

Lauren Bacall is on the road doing "Applause," Angela Lansbury is touring with "Mame" and Zero Mostel is in Connecticut with "Fiddler".

"Company" is looking for a good male lead—perhaps to replace George Maharis and of course there will be a new season, a new list of successors and new stars right around the marquis.

 ual information about gay people.) This effort will continue.

The Committee sponsored a Forum on Homosexuality (May 18th, 1972) with encouraging results.

The biggest problem facing the Committee at present is financial. All funds raised thus far have had to be used to pay expenses incurred by obtaining the injunction for the dance of March 10th.

I would like to urge DAVID readers to support the Committee financially if at all possible. Such funds would be used to bring well-known speakers to the Campus, to obtain and show films on homosexuality which present gay life as an acceptable life-style, for the publication of pamphlets and leaflets to be distributed on campus and for court costs; there is also the need to set up a 'gay switchboard' to aid gays in the area. These are just some of the ways that the Committee would use funds to serve and foster better understanding between the gays and straights.



son and how the hormones take to the body. For instance, if you needed to take silicone, it would run you more than the regular hormone pills. Also, some people might need more psychoanalysis than others. For the average person, it would run roughly between \$3,500 and \$4,000. I might add here that Blue Cross/Blue Shield does cover the surgery. Their requirements are as follows: Subscribers to Blue Cross/Blue Shield are covered for sex-reassignment surgery with the following stipulations: (a) many contracts require an eleven-month waiting period to qualify for treatment benefits for a pre-existing condition (b) the pre-operative work-up must be performed on an out-patient basis (c) coverage for hospitalization does not include the period of convalescence.

**DAVID:** Have you encountered any problems living as a woman?

**FARMER:** Not really what you would consider a problem. It was quite difficult getting use to it, though. I was only asked for identification once and that was in a bar in Jacksonville. I gave them my permits and they accepted them and went on their way without bothering me any more. The law is pretty good about this as long as you aren't on the streets making a fool out of yourself. You co-operate with them and they will cooperate with you. I can remember an amusing incident when I started this. I didn't get home from work until 6 o'clock one morning so I went straight to sleep, with

all of my make-up on, but no wig and no bra. About 8 o'clock, my doorbell rang and I just put on a housecoat and opened the door. There stood the Avon Lady, looking as if she had just seen a ghost. Then I realized what my condition was and how I must have looked. She came inside and in one minute, was showing me the latest in lipsticks and compacts. I gave her an order for some stuff and now she comes back every other week. All she says is that it's hard to believe that I'm the same one who answered the door that morning. I've watched that poor woman age!

**DAVID:** What do you do about your voice?

**FARMER:** I could have guessed that you would ask that question. If anyone questions my voice, I just tell them that I had a throat infection that affected my vocal cords. Rather than get into a big conversation about it, people just say that's a shame and then they're on their way. These hormones will make my voice higher plus I'm seeing a voice coach who will more or less teach me to talk through my nose. There is no surgery that can help your voice. The doctor told me that once you stick a knife into your vocal cords, the voice is gone completely. So you just have to learn how to talk softly and, like I said, through your nose.

**DAVID:** What about the draft board, the Driver's Licence Bureau and the Social Security Administration? Were there any problems encountered there?

**FARMER:** This was one thing that I was

worried about. I have been through all three of these and I'm glad to be done with them.

I was still eligible for the draft. I went to the draft board with a note from my doctor telling them what I was doing. They were very polite about it. They "Yes Ma'am'd me to death and then handed me a new draft card with a 4-F classification. This will prevent me from any embarrassment later.

If you apply for a driver's license in this state, you are required to wear a unisex outfit because they have your picture on your license. Also, you are asked to wear your own hair, which is no problem for me now, as my hair is down to my shoulders. They will still mark your license with male, but that's easily fixed with a quick smudge. You can always give them a fake name and use fake identification, but if they catch you, it will cause you more trouble than it's worth. The Social Security Administration was the easiest of all. What a lot of people don't know is that it is everyone's legal right to be called by any first name they choose, as long as they don't do it with the intent to commit fraud or bring harm to any individual. Therefore, you may go to the S.S.A. and get a card entitled a "Request to Make Change in Social Security Records" and apply for the name that you will be working under. You will receive your new card with the same number you had but with a new first name. This way, you get all the benefits that you are entitled to.

**DAVID:** What does the actual operation

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involve?

**FARMER:** It's really a little difficult to explain the whole process. I'm not a doctor and would hardly be qualified to explain the details. One thing I can tell you is that a lot of people think that in the final steps, the penis is completely removed. This is not true at all. After the castration, they split the penis four ways and tuck it under to serve as the walls of the vagina. A doctor would be able to explain the details a lot easier, simpler and quicker.

**DAVID:** I know you have seen psychiatrists concerning this. Are you required to see one every so often? What usually happens at these sessions?

**FARMER:** You are not really required to see any psychiatrists while on the pills. You see one at first and then after you have been on the pills for a while. The main reason that they want you to see a psychiatrist is so they will be sure you haven't changed your mind or that you have any doubts. The doctors have to be sure that this is really what you want. This is a step in your life that you want to be sure is really what you want.

**DAVID:** How far into the change can you go and still change your mind, without any permanent changes?

**FARMER:** I imagine you can go up into the time right before the castration. It will take some time to undo the changes that the hormones have done, but eventually, they will all return to their normal conditions. You might have to get male hormone shots to help the process. A lot

of people turn back but it's better to have regrets before the complete operation is done. This is why they recommend that you live and work in drag for six months to two years before making the final decision about the operation. I find, myself, that it was very difficult getting used to living as a woman. It's no bed of roses. This sure isn't a woman's world.

**DAVID:** What has the reaction of your friends, both straight and gay, been?

**FARMER:** Here in Baton Rouge, I don't associate with the gay crowd very much. I know very few gay people. The gay friends I have in Jacksonville seemed to be quite shocked when I came home in April. I left without saying a word and then I came back with this news. They were really great about it. Very curious, though, which was to be expected. I am corresponding with quite a few now who want to know how I'm getting along. It's a nice feeling to know you have friends and acquaintances like that. My straight friends that know are really great also. They just seem to think that if this is what I want, then this is what I should do. I have a family living next door to me that is just great. Even the kids in the family understand. I now have a female roommate who is straight. She thinks this is great also. Her boyfriend doesn't say either way.

**DAVID:** In closing, Ronnie, I would like to ask you the all-important question—Do YOU think you're doing the right thing?

**FARMER:** This is really a hard question

to answer. Deep inside, I know that this is what I really want. It is a hard road to get prepared for this, but after it's over, I will be the happiest person alive. As everyone knows, people are cruel and if someone finds out that you are going through with this, they can harass you to the point where you make the change just to make people happy. I just hope I have the strength to get through this but if not, it won't be because I don't want to.

And the pamphlet was full of photos of beaming home gardeners, who were holding bushel baskets bulging with tomatoes and cucumbers, or clutching huge bunch-

es of perfect orange carrots, or standing in the midst of their lush little plots, and staggering under the immense weight of monstrous pumpkins and tremendous watermelons. Kindly little old grandmothers smiled, surrounded by tasteful arrangements of their own home-grown squashes. A couple (who were dead-ringlers for "American Gothic") stood in a cellar, surrounded by hundreds of sparkling glass jars of foods which he had grown and she had packed (send for canning booklet).

"Be fruitful and multiply," and here I could do it without the bother of obstetricians and diapers. you're not likely to get the same kind of plant you started with. When you root part of your old plant, the new plant will be an exact duplicate of it. Some plants can be started by more than one method--tubers as well as stems, leaves, and seeds. You can bury part of the runners from vines and when they have rooted, cut off the new plants and pot them up. Thick veins of begonia leaves can be cut at intervals and pegged on a moist rooting medium to take root. Here are four common ways to start new houseplants. They do not apply to calamondin (which is grafted) or dwarf palm (grown from seed).

Houseplants with long stems and leaves along their length--either bushy or vining plants--can be propagated from TIP CUTTINGS. Cut four-inch shoots from bushy plants (wax begonia, zebra plant, aralia, coleus, geranium). From vines (philodendron, ivy, hoyia, pothos), take eight-inch lengths. Snip off a couple of lower leaves and stick the cuttings in a rooting medium such as sand, peat moss or vermiculite and keep them moist. Pot them up when roots form.



Houseplants with thick, fleshy stems (dieffenbachia, schefflera, rubber plant, dracena) are readily made to root without cutting off the top. This is done by AIR-LAYERING. If the plant becomes too tall and leggy, select a spot about six inches below the bottom leaf (or six inches longer than you want the new plant to be, measuring from the top of the old plant) and make a slanting cut halfway into the stem. Insert a stick to hold the cut open. Firm a handful of wet sphagnum or peat moss about the size of a baseball around the cut and cover completely with aluminum foil or clear plastic. Secure at top and bottom with plant ties (ties that come with plastic bags will do). After several weeks, when you can see white roots in the moss, cut the stem off below



the roots and pot up your new plant--then water it. You can cut the remaining long cane of dieffenbachia or dracena into two-inch lengths and bury them in a moist medium to get more new plants.




Some houseplants produce more than one plant from the crown (African violet, fern and nonvining philodendron). These should be multiplied by DIVISION. When they become crowded, it's an easy matter to separate the cluster and pot up the individual pieces to make better specimens. You can cut the plants apart, or simply pull them apart if the roots are not too in-

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# MOTHER MOLLY'S

## CARROT SOUFFLE RING

As usual, Mother Molly has been busy in the kitchen (as well as in one other room). I've been having company at the oddest hours (my door is never closed) and I've been making them happy—with my cooking, that is.

Someone once said that I did "something" like a bunny (Mother Molly never swears). I figured, if that was the case, I'd live up to my reputation. And I have!!! There may be snow on the roof, but there is still plenty of fire in the furnace!

I've been experimenting with carrots lately. (They beat the hell out of cucumbers, if you know what I mean).

Actually, I've been cooking with them also. The following is my famous "Carrot Souffle Ring"—a must for all you "bunnies."

The ingredients are:

3 cups ground raw carrots  
3 tablespoons butter  
3 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1 teaspoon salt  
Dash of red pepper  
1 cup of milk  
3 eggs

1 canned pimento

1 green pepper cut into thin strips

1/2 cup coarsely chopped almonds

First, melt the butter in a small saucepan. Stir in flour, monosodium glutamate, pepper, mustard, salt & red pepper. Add the milk gradually and stir until thickened. Cool. Mix the egg yolks with the sauce and then add the ground carrot, pimento and green pepper. Stir in the nuts. (Be careful whose you use!)

Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and pour into a well-greased 2-quart ring mold and set that into a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven at 350 degrees, for an hour. Loosen around the edges, (and we all do, sooner or later) and unmold on a platter. Fill the center with green vegetables such as beans or peas if you wish. It makes eight servings.

This is a great summer-time recipe and it's really so easy to fix. Besides, it does wonders for your eyesight!

Well, believe it or not, MM has a hot date and I really have to prepare. It takes me a little longer to put everything on, but I'm still just as fast at getting it all off! Tonight, the Avon Man is taking me out.



tertwined. Divide the plant so that each new section has a good root system. Pot up, water and keep the new plants shaded for a few days. When moving plants from shade to light, always do so gradually in order to give the plants time to adjust to the new brightness.

Certain houseplants (African violet, gloxinia and peperomia) can be started from LEAF-STEM CUTTINGS. Just select a medium-mature leaf and cut it off the cut leaf-stem in a good rooting medium such as a 50-50 mixture of perlite and peat moss. When several new leaves develop, transfer each plant to a 2½-inch pot. If a leaf produces multiple plants, don't repeat for quite a while. It sometimes takes a long time. Never add plant food to any rooting medium.

One overall caution: don't fuss your plants to death. Give them the little care they need--and relax!

I guess travel makes you learn a lot, even if you don't know it: just like Buddy Babe, who never did come away from those Indians.

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

I was under the impression that ALL advertisers of public establishments, namely bars, were open to ALL gays. Upon arrival at STEPMOTHER'S on Lejeune Road, my date and I were told we had to wear dresses in order to be served, that it was a rule of management! We both had on nice pant suits, not Levi's or tuxedos, we do not have short hair cuts, nor look obvious, but we certainly don't wear signs on our back either. There was a boy there with a dog, which is against the Florida State Board of Health Law and I didn't see the nelly queens in dresses!

Although the WAREHOUSE VIII is predominantly boys, we were served without

question. I have been going to KEITH'S in Hallandale for several years and find Pete, Keith and all very informal and friendly to all patrons.

I certainly feel that if a bar as a place of business is going to have rules and regulations such as what was stated at STEPMOTHER'S (which, had we had dresses on, we would more than likely have been classed as straight and told something else) I think it should appear in print to save embarrassment to others.

I am originally from South Florida and have seen all the problems since 1949, so nothing really amazes me anymore, however, if this is a "United We Stand" effort, it is a pure flop. I feel that this type of treatment is a little outdated and unfair.

I once visited a bar in Jacksonville that had more of a girl-crowd than boys and believe it or not, it was very successful. They made quite a bit of money. It was not a large bar but it was crowded almost every night of the week. Some of you give us a chance also; I'm sure if you had a few features for us gals, you would soon realize the boost in your profits.

I really think this VENUS thing is about the greatest thing that has happened to us lately and it gives us a chance to voice our views and I must say, I have really voiced mine. I think gay life is just the greatest and wouldn't change a minute of it if I could. Maybe if you guys could come up with a little more help for us girls, we would come out of our hiding and stand up and be counted. If us girls don't think enough of our own way of life to fight for it, then we're not worth DAVID fighting for us, are we? Wake up, gals, it may be later than you think. If you're an honest to God gay gal and not a half and half, then we need DAVID more than they need us, so let's help DAVID by support-

ing them by writing in or if you own or operate a business of any sort that caters to gals, list it with them and especially if you have anything that caters mostly to gay girls as I would rather give my business to someone of my own kind than to some rich straight. One more plea before I close: If there is anyone out there that knows of a place where a nice, clean-cut American Butch can go and possibly take a date, where we can eat, drink and dance write to DAVID and let me know. It's kind of lonesome now that Chuck's has closed.

## Venus in The Kitchen

### ROAST DUCKLING PIQUANTE

Girls, here's a treat that'll please any hungry butch. It's easy to make yet she'll think you were slaving over a hot stove all day. Here's what you'll need:

3 (4 lb.) young ducklings, quartered

3 green peppers cut in pieces

3 carrots cut in pieces

8 sprigs of parsley

3 tablespoons lemon juice

4½ cups consomme

18-20 fillets of anchovy, drained

6 tablespoons cornstarch

Brandy (optional)

Arrange the pieces of duckling on a rack in an open roasting pan and roast in a moderate oven, at 350 degrees, until it's tender. It should be about 1½ to 2 hours, depending on the weight and youth of the birds, turning them frequently, and prick the skin even more frequently to make sure all the fat gets out. While the ducks are roasting, saute the peppers, carrots and celery for 3 minutes in a little fat poured off the ducklings.

Add the parsley, lemon juice, consomme and drained anchovies.

Cover and simmer until the vegetables are tender; then strain the broth. Remove the ducklings from the oven and drain on paper towels. Drain the fat from the pan. Skim off the fat and thicken the broth with the cornstarch, moistened with a little water and, if you wish, flavor with a little brandy. Taste for salt; the anchovies will probably have supplied enough.

Put the ducklings back in the roasting pan. Cover with sauce. Turn off the oven and let the duck and sauce warm together for 15 to 20 minutes before serving.

This is a great dish to serve at a large dinner party. It will really impress your guests, and we all know how important that is. So try this one this summer for a real delightful change of pace.

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
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
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## GINGER
