
# LAS VEGAS





## MOTHER NATURE

Female impersonators started way back in what the professors call the "Greek Drama", when women were not allowed to perform in public.

The same rules applied during Bill Shakespeare's time and many actors became famous in those days playing "drag" parts. But who's to say some of the cave men didn't dress up a little and ape their sisters for domestic reasons.

In America we date the female imper-

sonators from our minstrel shows, which as you know, had all male casts. There was always a great "drag" part in every minstrel show, and nearly all real minstrel comics played a distaff role at some time in their careers.

Did you know the first president of Actors Equity, Francis Wilson, was first elsewhere too? Like in the variety team of Mackin & Wilson, as he took on the leading lady role. Jerry Cohan (George

M's dad) stepped into bustles and hoop-skirts when needed. The old time imps (impersonators) were usually hefty, full blown figured, popular at the time. There were many female imps in the honky-tonks and bars working as hostesses and entertainers never removing their wigs. Years later during the tab show era in vaudeville there was a shortage of chorus girls, and male chorus gals were recruited. Imagine the surprise of the "Stage-door Johnnies" waiting at dressing room doors after the show. A "Miss Smith" won them over nonetheless back in 1840 when he became a top ballerina.

Tony Pastor refined the trend of "bitchy types" when he made an entertainment for the family trade. The boys had to tone down their routines and make-up to become, shall we say, more respectable. But some didn't bother about clothes or class. John and James, the famous Russell Bros. did two Irish biddies billed as "our Irish Servant Girls" and became the greatest comedy act of all the imps of their time.

Bert Savoy, part of a comedy team, was killed by lightning while walking with Jack Haley (the Tin Man) at Long Beach. When Bill Collier, one of the "gals" heard about it, he said, "I hear that all the "queens" are now carrying lightning rods". I'd imagine that kept Georgie Jessell in doors during the rainy season.

Ray Monde had a good finale. He would finish the act by removing his wig to show that he was a man, then for an encore he removed another wig and showed long beautiful hair like a woman. The audience was left guessing. Fag and White, a man and woman team, did a switch on Ray. He would take off one wig to show he was a woman then take off another to show he was a man. The Mosconi Bros., did a sort of Veloz and Yolanda as partners in their dancing careers, keeping it all in the family. The acrobatic acts had it tough. The boys made up as girls and had to live that way for booking purposes. The "too many men" curse and as

girls it made the tricks look harder. Well, you know what I mean.


Women came to the shows, not so much for talent as for clothes and millinery they wore. They tried to copy make-up, clothes, demeanor, voice and mannerisms. A lot of the guys had wives and mothers as personal dressers not to mention husbands. The college shows brought out lots of hidden talent (?). At a Middle Western Naval Station during the war, a call was issued for volunteers for "chorus girls" for the show and 125 servicemen came..... to the auditions.

I don't care how straight you think you are, sometime or other in the annals of show-biz you must have heard about the late Julian Eltinge. He was never offensive but offered artistic ability, a true art. He was one of the few who made (and lost) fortunes. England's Danny LaRue has made a fortune in a dress and is keeping it. Julian headlined for years in vaudeville, became a star on Broadway and in pictures and traveled with his own show all over the world. He even had a theater named after him. The Old Chandler on West Forty-Second Street in New York renamed the Etlinge Theatre, now an office building. One of the reasons for his great success was his press agent and the image he held before the public and, of course, how he was managed. He was smart enough to surround himself with the right people.

When Vaude died, the boys went back to the honky-tonks where they started, the Greenwich Village joints and odd spots around the country.

One remained to stage annual recitals at Carnegie Hall, Francis Renault. Not only did it give Francis a chance at some quick money but it got the moth-ball smell out of his famous feathers (aigrettes, ostrich plumes, etc.) He had a picture in Variety showing him with featherweight fighter Harry Bright; Bright was on the canvas taking the count with Francis in feathers

This is how I felt as I left a performance at Mr. Kelly's and drove down Michigan Avenue. Coming to the stop lights, I glanced out my side window and couldn't believe my eyes. It was her! The gal responsible for my mood. Without hesitation I shouted through the window of my VW Bus to the young lady seated in the rear of the cab, "I loved your performance; Sorry you're not feeling well." The young lady rolled down her window and tried to shout back, "Yea, I feel rotten, but thank you." Flash! The moment of insanity had arrived and began to sweep over me as I shouted, "Don't go away. I've got something to cheer you up."

"Hey, hurry up, the lights are going to change", she anxiously shouted back. I pulled the emergency brake and hopped over the front seat grabbing quickly and frantically in front of me for two of the latest issues of DAVID. Quickly jumping back and out the driver's door, I stood between the lanes of traffic and all but threw the magazines at her breathlessly saying, "Here. Read these."

Certainly her appearance at Chicago's Mr. Kelly's with a new night club act, lived up to predictions when she established a new house record. And she did it with two physical handicaps which might have thrown a less capable artist.


Because of an unfortunate knee accident last spring, Miss Cass was aided to the stage by a cane and the help of the house manager. Misery needs company and an unshakable summer cold was it; only adding to her troubles.

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

her a delightful, child-like, bug-eyed, innocent creature who, while telling you she loves diamonds and men, in that order, charmingly murders the English language.


TIME Magazine, in a cover story of GENTLEMEN PREFER BLONDES, then hailed Miss Channing as follows:

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

tacus as well as a wide selection of high lights beautifully presented.

The knowledge that all of this grew out of over 200 years of tradition and school which trained dancers with a scientific thoroughness almost unequalled in the world making it even more exciting.

A selective system instituted in the day of the Czars and maintained through post-revolutionary Russia starts with the 7 and 8 year olds who apply for admission. Only those who meet the rigid physical requirements are chosen and over half are dropped before graduation, if their bodies do not continue to conform to physical ideals. Once a child is selected he receives 3 years of general education. At the age of ten the student then begins intensive training in classical dance, dance history and dance forms from other countries. During these years those with special talents are noted and given special attention for these are the future soloists. But by the time they reach graduation, all have been thoroughly trained in the classical, folk and character dance as well as in acting, fencing, acrobatics, music, theater painting and make-up. Now the student appears before the State Examination Commission and the commission decides at which theater and in what capacity he is to begin his career. If you have not been made a soloist, it is very rare and doubtful that you will ever rise to that position. It sounds very cold, calculating and severe. Maybe it is, but the results is an inexhaustible supply of soaring male dancers and


I was really excited as I rushed from the parking lot towards the theater for I was the owner of a precious ticket to opening night of the Bolshoi Ballet. The last time the company had been here was 6 years ago. A political crisis between the U.S. and Russia had put an end to the cultural exchange program and many feared that the 1967 tour would be the last time they would be seen in this country, since politics in the past had prevented other great artists and groups from performing here.

One of the world's greatest ballerinas, Alicia Alonso, because of her Cuban ties, hasn't danced here in years. Ballet lovers had to go to Canada in order to enjoy one of her final performances as Giselle.


At last the Bolshoi was back again! However, to get to the theater entrance, I had to push my way thru a crowd of ill-mannered, sign-carrying pickets who insisted on shoving leaflets in my face. Their signs read, "Free the Soviet Jews", "Ukrainian Art is not Russian Art" and the like. As I disgustedly handed my ticket to the doorman, he embarrassedly asked if he might check my brief-case. This happened twice again before I was finally seated; once by an usher and then again by a policeman.

The theater looked like the Policemen's Convention was attending the ballet. I realize that security measures are necessary, but I still can't help resenting them or the uncomfortable feeling they create. Once the orchestra began and the curtain rose, all of the earlier unpleasantries were momentarily forgotten as I became mesmerized by the dazzling perfection of the corps de ballet in Giselle and realized that this was only the beginning of a week of excerpts and full acts from Swan Lake, Don Quixote, Walpurgis Night and Spar-



Each winner, in addition to a trophy, won cash and a year's free pass to the Club Houston Baths. In February, Richard will be in



This year American audiences got a special treat for the company came to us with an excitingly fresh group of dancers making up the corps de ballet. For the first time in its 200 year history, the Bolshoi Dance Academy sent a group of graduating students on tour through the U.S.. Heading this young corps was the 47 year old Riassa Struckova, one of the most versatile demi character ballerinas in the company and a former academy graduate with 29 years of dancing as a member of the Bolshoi. But don't let age fool you, she brought the house down each time she appeared. She still has all the fire, flair and style to set off fireworks. Especially in the Don Quixote pas de deux and Walpurgis Night. Miss Struckova was partnered by Marius Liepa, Nicolai Ladeychev and a new wonder boy in the company, Alexander Godunov.

Nureyev better take notice, because this newcomer has got it. This blonde, god-like creature doesn't seem to like to stay on the ground. Godunov is electrifying! Another dancer relatively new to the Bolshoi is Miss Semenyaka who is someone to watch for in a few more years when maturity is added to exceptional technique she will be brilliant.

The word Bolshoi means great and grand and that they were. The only real disappointment was the antiquated look of the sets and costumes. It's strange that a company this great won't do something to improve a real visual soreness.

Fortunately the week ended without any protest incidents as there had been in other cities with pickets climbing on stage nor were any performances interrupted by a stink bomb as was the case at a recent performance by the Red Chinese Aerobic Company at the Opera House.

Nothing more salubrious could happen to the world cultural scene than to have groups like the Bolshoi Ballet Company tour other countries nor is anything more

scandalous to any country when these visits are marred by groups of people seeking revenge or sympathy for a political cause.

Ballerinas don't pack pistols in their toe shoes or carry hand grenades in their tutus!

Mark Spitz was not actually carrying torpedoes in his swim trunks nor were any of the Israeli athletes toting machine guns at the Olympics. Most of these artists have dedicated their lives and energy to demanding art forms. They have no time for political views or interest in voicing political opinions. Their main concern is the perfection of an art that might bring some pleasure and escape to those that appreciate it from a world that reeks of political ugliness that causes nothing but waste, wars, poverty and only more warped human ailments.

When are people going to realize that being German doesn't make you a Nazi; Russian a communist; or Jewish an Arab-hater. Politics has no business in the world of art for it is a world apart and it should be left that way. When politics are stupidly super-imposed, the only thing it does is restrict and make the inter-cultural exchanges between countries less frequent. That is unfortunate because many of these artists are the only real ambassadors of good will that we have.

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

which was often printed (poetically) in prominent places, like toilet walls. However, Clyd's reputation really blossomed when, at the suggestion of the school psychiatrist, he was placed on the football team. The coach, in a stupor of surprise, put him on end tackle. Clyd didn't exactly know what that was (tackle had something to do with fishing), but when he learned it meant he could run after boys and grab them, he thought that was swell. However, complications arose. The boys not only ran away, but quite often the position was reversed, they ran after him: with spikes on their shoes! This misunderstanding of the game, plus his teammates,

who kept him in the shower so long he was turning into a prune, finally did Clyd in. He expired on the field after a devastating shock play where-by both teams tackled him with baseball bats. (Unfortunately, no one at that moment was playing football: Clyd rushed into the wrong game at the wrong school at the wrong time, carrying a bouquet of long stemmed American Beauty roses and a bar of Zest soap.)

Services were brief. (2½ minutes.) The whole school was bracing itself for the big game against the detested Horrible Huns of Hun High, whose team boasted they could "knock a speeding locomotive off the track". The future looked dim.

But the game was worse. Then, with two

seconds left to play, on a 0-0 score, eight men out, and two in the hospital, Redneck High suddenly sensed something magnificent was happening. A lone figure, carrying a bouquet of American Beauty roses and a bar of Zest soap, floated across the field and wiped out the Horrible Huns in one devastating play after another. Crowds roared, cheerleaders screamed, men cried.

The game screeched to an end: 69-0, in favor of Redneck High! Football history was made.

(Note: in memory, Redneck High framed a plastic pansy in the boy's shower, redecorated the locker room, and hired a priest to exorcise the football field. The Horrible Huns retired, but came back two seasons later as the girl's soft ball team.

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

After several months it became apparent, Bruce says, that the expedition was lost.

Ted & Carol wanted to retreat, but Willie, who possessed "the personality of a steamroller and the patience of a machine gun", refused. They marched on. This decision disturbed Bruce because he "hadn't a thing to wear", except a silver lame bikini and a pair of black suede pumps. However, the next evening brought a crises that made even a lackluster wardrobe seem small. They were attacked by a band of Pigmies.

Bruce describes their battle (and capture) as "more wild than a drag ball on the White House lawn". Not even Willie could stop the little men from "committing indignities of the spirit and flesh beyond civilized comprehension". Strapped to poles, exhausted, and tormented, the quartet was carried off "into the sinking

sun, where no man returns".

In the village, Ted & Carol were shuttled off into a dumpy hut and forgotten. However, much to their surprise, Bruce & Willie, were ushered straight to the center of a vast square and made to sit "on gold thrones". They were given water, fresh fruit, and oil rub-downs, which Bruce says "were incredible". It was obvious, after such regal treatment (and prayers that included the sacrifice of a virgin), that the pair was being worshipped! In a flash of philosophical wisdom, Bruce states, "I guess a couple like us had never hit town before."

A feast that night in honor of the new deities brought matters to a fateful head. The food was fabulous, especially the

meat course. And when Willie, through intricate sign language, asked what kind of meat it was, they discovered it was Ted & Carol! Right then, Bruce declares, Willie showed the depths of her personality: she ordered a second helping.

Bruce immediately made plans for escape. But Willie, who was "bribed with fifteen vestal virgins" decided to stay because "this is better than banging around the bars". They parted, Bruce says, "as brother and sisters, too fraught with emotion to speak".

Bruce's desperate attempt at escape makes pertinent reading. Despite being heavily guarded, the young explorer made his displeasure known by refusing what he called "cheap affairs". (Although he admit-


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


ted being married 189,000 times, once, briefly to a missionary.) Finally, after years of "fighting against hope, time, and men", escape came. But in a more daring than imagined. As though from a dream, a man on a white elephant charged through the village and scooped him up just as he was to be "married" to the king (reputed to be 112 years old and senile). Racing into a new life, Bruce suddenly realized who his champion was: Ted! At that moment, Bruce fainted. When he awoke, he found himself "in a sleazy hotel on the north side of Brooklyn, in a room littered with wine bottles."

But he was free.

(Note: Snubed by *National Geographic*, ignored by *True Male Adventures*, Bruce was invited to lecture for Alcoholic's Anonymous, which he declined, for personal reasons. However, in conjunction with various police agencies (and the American Psychiatric Association), Bruce is making striking appearances across the country. His life story, bought by an Italian film company, was judged obscene by the Federal Courts, and is being readied for a children's television series, staring a chimpanzee.

Willie, whose whereabouts are still unknown, was given a "Man of the Year Award" in absentia, by the Daughters of



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Sappho, and a lifetime subscription to the *Gourmet Quarterly*, a magazine for discerning dinners.

III. All About Yeves: A French import (and understudy), Yeves Babbit, achieved instant stardom only after the star of the Follies Revue died suddenly on opening night (after being run over by a tractor). A country boy (with a heart of gold and nerves of steel), Yeves conquered a hostile audience with his brilliant comic style in a number which, oddly, included the same tractor that flattened his very best friend. Theater is full of coincidences.

However, tragedy stalked the newly discovered star as one understudy after another came to an unfortunate, untimely end. Soon, rumors that the show (and its star) were cursed began circulating. Yeves, frantically religious, rushed to a gypsy fortune teller for help.

No part of this remarkable interview was revealed, but almost at once the show, the star, and the new understudy improved. For two days no mysterious incidents occurred. Joy abounded in the shadows of the theater.

Suddenly, tragedy lowered the curtain:

The new understudy, Violet Lovely, a beautiful twenty-three year old blond boy (and friend of the producer) was alone with Yeves rehearsing a country-western song. "All at once," Violet says, in an in-depth story by "Real Experiences," "I saw what's-his-name, who used to work here, tearing across the stage on a tractor. I nearly fainted. I thought I was a goner." He wasn't. Yeves, however, passed over, to that great stage in the sky.


That night, facing a hostile crowd, Violet Lovely became a star: in a revue which, oddly, included the same tractor that ended the career of his very best friend! Theater is known for such coincidences.

(Note: After three weeks Violet Lovely retired "while still in one piece" and is now appearing at Woolworth's 5&10 as check-out girl. His life story is being sought, in Court, after investigation of the Grand Jury, which is notorious for its stand against spiritualism.)

in front of the footlights in Manhattan's Alvin Theatre bellowed Gershwin's "I Got Rhythm" in a voice like a fire siren and blew the audience right out of its seats. Before her, a gawky torch singer named Fanny Brice and a twinkle-toed dancer named Marilyn Miller had enchanted a million-odd playgoers of the 20's. And now we have Carol Channing."

And now we have her doing it again! Only this time the Little girl from Little Rock arrives to us as a matron looking back on her past. In 1950 the role was

considered the greatest comic creation of the decade and it is still, even now, a great vehicle for someone who knows how to play the audience and has a flair for comedy. Although I can't think of anyone except Channing or the late Marilyn Monroe doing the role. The musical is a showpiece for Channing and I dare say almost a well-staged night club act. The only thing that elevates it from this status or from being a one-woman act is that Miss Channing is supported by four other top entertainers who obviously also know their way around the legitimate theater's stage and by a fine chorus of



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singers and dancers.

The music for the show is far from great. The musical doesn't have one memorable song in it except those that were taken from Gentlemen such as "I'm Just a Little Girl From Little Rock" and "Diamonds Are A Girl's Best Friend", but again without Channing doing them or the individual performances of other songs by other cast members, it is very doubtful the music itself would have much effect.

During the opening scene, Miss Channing joked with the audience about how "Everything 'habbins' in 'Chicago'" because the Chicago run seemed plagued with ac-

cidents. During one performance Miss Channing's wrist was broken when she was knocked down in a collision with the men in the fight scene. She just covered the unsightly white cast up with more diamond bracelets.


An unfortunate backstage fire during another show destroyed the Opera House's original drape curtain, constructed in 1929 from 7,000 pounds of velour (today's costs make it irreplaceable) and caused considerable water and electrical damage. After 2 days of a forced holiday, Channing announced that performances would continue if she had to play by candlelight.

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Peter Palmer, a native Chicagoan, who plays Lorelei's husband to be, has one of the best voices in the production and is quite a leading man. The former lead in the broadway hit and later in the film version of "Li'l Abner" stands 6 feet 4 inches and is 230 pounds of handsome man. He not only makes Channing look petite, but has her and the rest of the audience staring goo-goo eyed. Since Channing

herself is always larger-than-life, Peter Palmer is the perfect match for her. He does not detract, he complements.

Another perfect match in the show is the coupling of Tamara Long and Lee Roy Reams. These two talents sparkled in "I Won't Let You Get Away" and "We're Just a Kiss Apart". Miss Long proved to be a real song belter when she cuts loose in "I Love What I'm Doing". It's no wonder Mr. Reams was chosen as her leading man for beyond his good looks, he has an exceptional good lyric baritone voice and proves to be a fine dancer.

Dody Goodman, who began her career as

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a ballet dancer is another gal who brought a new meaning to the word "comedienne". She managed very nicely to grab the spotlight when the show gave her a chance but unfortunately her real talents were wasted in the role of Mrs. Ella Spofford.

Two others who deserve mention are Robert Fitch and John Mineo for their excellent "Me-and-my-Shadow routine", throughout the show. Not even the four little cynettes in Swan Lake could have been more perfectly matched, more in step or fully co-ordinated. Bravo! Joe Layton's choreography shined here, but it was otherwise rather mediocre, showing nothing particularly new or inventive. He

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did, however, do an excellent job of staging.

Special compliments go to the set and costume designers for they did a lot to brighten the stage. Especially the costumes which ranged from outrageously ridiculous to very smart; all reeking with expense.

At the end of each performance, Miss Channing announced that "My Lorelei is going to America first. New York can just wait."

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
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

standing over him, and the caption read; "Nothing ladylike about this".

Many of the famous imps became designers, milliners, hairdressers and hit the Hollywood trail where they are doing very well. I guess you couldn't expect them to go back to lumberjacking!

Today many performers try to make it in a "drag" scene and few carry it off with all the right comedy effect or style. Jerry Lewis (At War With The Army) tried in a blonde wig and cheap dress. But he couldn't get picked up in a servicemen's bar. Cary Grant looked better as a WAC than in that dressing gown (Bringing Up Baby), except he reminded me of Rosalind Russell. Eddie Cantor (Palmy Days) looked and acted like Funny Girl, Fanny Brice. Bing Crosby (High Time) looked quaint while Jack Benny as Charley's Aunt looked cute. Mickey Rooney (Babes on Broadway) as Carmen Miranda wore his fruit basket and beads well and the wedgies added a few inches...in height.

But William Powell in drag looked too much like Bette Davis from the Corn Is Green. The best sister act of them all of course will be remembered from Some Like It Hot, Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon. The list is endless but I can't forget Stan Laurel in black satin and pearls as a society matron.

Today there are no longer novelty acts and overdressed trollops. The boys are proving they have talent, fine voices, a sense of humor, are good dancers, experts in the art of make-up. They have gone beyond just camp acts to legitimate theatre as qualified performers. San Francisco is accomplishing great strides in community theatre. City Players are offering their latest theatrical experience, Neil Simon's PLAZA SUITE. Starring Chuck Waltz and Brandie, Billie, Faye and Nancy. Directed by Wally Rutherford. Versatile, imaginative and creative. KIMO productions brings DAMES AT SEA to the Village theatre through October. Many theatregoers are confused as to what "gay

theatre" really is. Especially when they see a show advertised, ALL MALE CAST. Unfortunately seeing a very different picture from the one intended. Little wonder that this type of small theatre is insecure and underdeveloped beyond a certain curiosity level. A conditioning to educate and accept masculine interpretations of a female part has been saturated with misconceptions and factual errors. If this type of community theatre is to achieve true freedom and fulfillment as opposed to the suprious kind consisting of material efforts and repetitious jokes - they will have to re-examine and re-evaluate and re-write to show what is happening. It will emerge a very different story from the one the general public has envisioned. As "gay community theatre" matures, inclinations to explain will be unnecessary. The shows will not be frustrated by a few critics' indifferent attitude as to an amateur show. Success is due, only to the patient, unrewarded work of a handful of dedicated talented people that changes to the recognition that is beginning to appear.

When you're in San Francisco, check out theatre listings and see a current community production. Nowhere, will there be anything like these DAMES AT SEA, but on a San Francisco stage, unless they tour. And if you'll excuse an expression... these gals are GIFTED guys.
