The Benefits of Crime

Not many people in the judicial system, as well as the average man on the street, are aware of some wonderful, relatively new procedures that have been brought into consequence regarding the disposition of criminal cases filed in the court system and their benevolence towards charity.

In mid 1989, it was brought to the attention of one of the local judges over the Montrose area that certain defendants were not able to continue with making restitution or pay their fines as a result of their terminal illness, AIDS being the primary disease along with other terminal diseases. This judge was aware of the plight of people with AIDS because he had attended several conferences put on by the CDC and other experts regarding legislation towards such. The result was a policy set forth in his court, where a person suffering from a terminal illness could fill out a form letting the court know of his plight. The form was a simple and effective way to allow this information to be placed in front of authorities without the embarrassment of announcing one's illness in front of a courtroom full of people. This information, along with medical verification from the defendant's doctor, would

experts regarding legislation towards such. The result was a policy set forth in his court, where a person suffering from a terminal illness could fill out a form letting the court know of his plight. The form was a simple and effective way to allow this information to be placed in front of authorities without the embarrassment of announcing one's illness in front of a courtroom full of people. This information, along with medical verification from the defendant's doctor, would allow due consideration by the court regarding the disposition of the case.

Disposition of the case is at the discretion of the judge, within certain guidelines, and upon advice of the state, he or she can then act upon those recommendations. One of the guidelines is called differed disposition, which usually means that the state will defer the final disposition of your case (not make a ruling) for a certain period of time during which you must meet the state's requirements. These requirements may be something such as no more tickets for ninety days, and/or a donation to a local charity, and payment of court costs by a certain date. The judge may set aside final judgment on the case and allow for defendants to do community service, or donate amounts of money, smaller than normally charged for fines, to charities in lieu of their fines to the state. This does not mean that court costs will be disallowed, those costs must be paid to the courts, however the defendant is allowed to pay charities moneys that would normally be going to the county coffers or state treasury. This is also possible for persons that are not ill but wish to donate time or money to charities in lieu of their fines.

Now don't get all fired up the next time you get a ticket and decide to donate to your local gay charity and discover you won't be able to. The action is strictly allowed upon recommen-

Dear Gay/Lesbian
Pride Parade Committee:

I am writing to voice my opinion and convey the date of the annual gay/lesbian pride

The current scheduled date puts the parade into one of the hottest times of the year, at a time of day that the parade is held makes it worse -- typically during the 1pm to 5pm slot. This time slot makes it very difficult for PWA's and even otherwise healthy individuals to attend due to the extreme heat.

I would like to suggest that the parade be moved back at least a month to mid-May or later in the year till mid-October (this would be great if it would allow the parade to build on the Halloween holiday season thus getting more people to participate in fancy costumes and stuff). While I understand the idea of having the parade coincide with Stonewall, I don't think that is practical in Texas. Most New Yorkers don't have air conditioning or air conditioning — that mean that Texans should not have to suffer from the heat? No - and using the same ideas for the parade do not mean that if our pride parade is held at a later date that we have any less pride - it just means we are being practical for our area and respectful for our citizens. I personally have not been able to attend the parade because of the extreme heat, humidity, and as a PWA, due to the large amounts of drugs I must take to survive, they make me highly sensitive to strong heat.

Over the past year our budget, volunteer staff and executive committee have grown immensely. This is a credit to what we have accomplished, as many pride week organizations throughout the country have either declared bankruptcy or disbanded. We attribute our success partially to our inclusivity. We not only try to get men and women to work together, but we succeed at this task greatly.

The parade time and place will probably

never please everyone, nor will the Pride Festival. However, due to our past success with very limited resources, we now have individuals and companies that are seeking to assist us in underwriting our Pride Week activities. In the future we hope to expand the scope of Pride Week.

While the Pride Committee can defend and justify its actions, we would much rather seek to communicate with the community in an atmosphere of harmony. Rather than waiting until after Gay and Lesbian Pride Week 1995, we would ask that people come to us now with their suggestions and their assistance. Our mission statement directives are to motivate, educate, and celebrate. We are constantly working to achieve these goals. 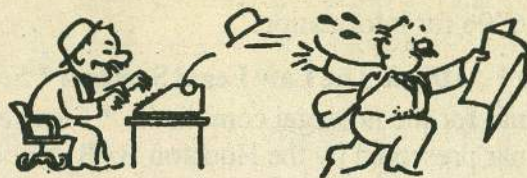
Wanted: Missing and Overdue Library Books

This means that if the state decides, in your case (hypothetically), that you are not eligible for this type of disposition, then you will still have to take care of the case via some other avenue, i.e. defensive driving class. "Why wouldn't I be eligible?" you ask. Well, there might be certain stipulations, such as you have had too many other tickets. The name of the charity may be also chosen by the state. Of the two Justices of the Peace whom have dominion over the Montrose area in Houston, only one has decided to settle cases in his court in this manner. Justices of the Peace who have dominion over the Montrose area in Houston, only one has decided to settle cases in his court in this manner. Judge David Patronella, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Position 2 has coordinated the donation of moneys in lieu of fines via his court since the installment of these guidelines allowing this procedure. The other judge over this area, Judge Dale Gorczynski was not available for comment. Included on the list of charities receiving these funds in Judge Patronella's court are two well known AIDS organizations, Casa de Esperanza (which benefits babies and children with AIDS), and Garden Party, (which provides direct aid to people with AIDS). Other charities on the list include various food banks, a battered women's center, and Citizens for Animal Protection. I recently had the opportunity to speak with Judge Patronella regarding this legislation and his choices for designation of the funds. He explained that the selection for naming which charities are to receive donations stems from requirements such as location, classification by the IRS as a nonprofit organization, and must reflect the nature of the crime: i.e. an animal abuse case might result in the donation being made to the Citizens for Animal Protection organization. An HIV positive defendant may make a donation to an AIDS charity.

While there is a waiting list for charities to be beneficiaries of this program in Judge Patronella's court, there are other Judges in Harris County, or for that matter all over the state of Texas, that are quite capable of setting up this program in their courts. Perhaps if someone approached them regarding this marvelous new tactic, they would realize that they could possibly make a difference in the way crime pays.

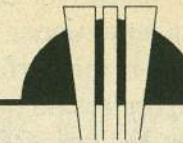

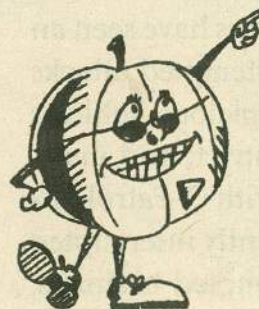

A Gay Cincinnati *

In a major victory for gay equal rights, a federal judge ruled August 9 that an anti-gay initiative passed by Cincinnati voters in November is unconstitutional. The ballot initiative, known as Issue 3, was intended not only to strip gay people of protection against discrimination, but also to prohibit Cincinnati lawmakers from extending any such protection in the future.

The court is sending a clear message that the basic civil rights of gay and lesbian citizens are not subject to a popular vote," said Patricia Logue, managing attorney for the Midwest Regional office of Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, a national gay rights group which is co-counsel in the case. Adds Lambda staff

Unlucky 13

Among the provisions of the Act are a ban on public funds "expended in a manner that has the purpose or effect of promoting or expressing approval of homosexuality" and an adults-only restriction on "the availability in public libraries of books and materials . . . which address homosexuality." "No on 13" organizers encourage everyone outraged by this censorious and hateful legislation to speak out in the mainstream press. Death Verdict in Gay Slaying *

KERRVILLE, Texas - Former fast-food restaurant manager Donald Aldrich has been sentenced to death for the execution-style slaying of a gay man. Aldrich was convicted in the capital murder of Nicholas West, 23, who was abducted from a park and shot to death last November 30.

Aldrich, 29, showed no emotion last month when state District Judge Joe D. Clayton read a Kerr County jury's verdict August 9. Aldrich would not speak to reporters as he was ushered away by jailers. He later cried openly during an interview in the Kerr County Jail with the Tyler Morning Telegraph. "I didn't intend for [Nicholas] West to die. I'm a lot of things, but I'm not a killer," Aldrich told the newspaper. "I can't justify what I did no matter what I say. I just can't justify it."

In a videotaped confession, Aldrich said he and some friends abducted West from a park and robbed him because he was gay. Aldrich told investigators he flinched and fired two shots after another man began shooting West. West's half-naked, bullet-riddled body was found in a clay pit about 10 miles outside Tyler.

Dear Pride Committee,

The Board of Directors of NLA: Houston strongly urge you to consider moving Houston's Pride Celebration either in its entirety or split its events similar to Dallas. The health of our entire community is too critical to be stubborn over this issue. Many of us including those who participate year in and year out are HIV+ or diagnosed with AIDS. For many less fortunate their health does not even allow them to be in a wheel chair along the parade route unless its cloudy. With the heat, the humidity and the heat rising off the pavement many march when they probably shouldn't, but they feel strongly about their pride and their freedoms and need to be seen and heard.

One potential compromise is to move the parade and other Pride Week activities to either early April or early to mid October, and then have the Pride Committee host a major event / fundraiser during the June 26th weekend. Such an event could be a number of things, but with the proceeds going to the Pride Committee. The Spectrum '95 event along with an evening dinner and ball/dance might be one possibility and a way to get Houston's many clubs and organizations involved. Another would be to tie in a contest with the above mentioned events naming a Mr., Ms. and Miss Houston Pride, who would be leaders from within the community and possibly required to be a member of a Houston club or organization, leading off the parade and helping organize the next year's June event. 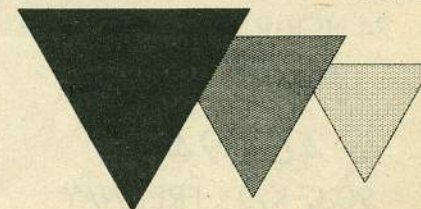

Government Opens AIDS Hot Line

WASHINGTON—The federal government is opening a toll-free telephone number Monday to provide treatment information by telephone or computer to people with AIDS, their families and health care providers. The HIV-AIDS Treatment Information Service was scheduled to begin taking calls at 9 a.m. EST. The number is 800-HIV-0440 and the hours are 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. EST Monday through Friday.

The service will be staffed by health information specialists who are fluent in English and Spanish. Deaf access is included, and all calls are confidential. The service's staff will not provide treatment advice. Staffers will, however, provide information on the latest research and treatment options to physicians and patients who call. "In addition to assisting health care providers, the AIDS Treatment Information Service will help people living with HIV/AIDS extend and improve the quality of their lives by helping them make informed decisions about their health care with their providers," said Philip L. Lee, the director of the U.S. Public Health Service.

The service's data base, which is housed at the National Library of Medicine, will be updated to include all federally approved HIV and AIDS treatment information. The data base can be accessed free via computer. Users can call 800-272-4787 for directions on how to access the system with their computer. [Note: Access to the computer database at the National Library of Medicine is not free, and requires specialized communications software that costs \$29.95.]

For parents who would like to have a response from Santa sent to their children with a North Pole postmark, they can write the letter from Santa themselves (or have a friend do it, if your handwriting would be recognized) and follow these guidelines:

- Completely address and apply postage stamps to the envelope or envelopes you wish to have postmarked.
- Insert the items into a larger envelope or container
- Include a note requesting the North Pole postmark
- Send to:

Those wishing to have holiday cards they are sending to friends receive the North Pole postmark, should send the cards already addressed and stamped to the address above. The Postal Service recommends this be sent via Priority Mail or Express Mail. The cards will be postmarked North Pole and enter the mail stream at Fairbanks. Customers cannot have their postmarked cards returned to him for mailing from their own town. The Postal Service recommends these requests be received by Dec. 8th.
