National Domestic Violence month

October was National Domestic Violence month, an effort by mainstream proponents and domestic Violence activists to highlight and publicize the growing problem of domestic violence. But did you know domestic violence is not a "heterosexual" thing? And did you know that domestic violence is not a "woman" thing? And did you know that domestic violence is not a "lesbian" thing?

And did you know that SM (sado/ masochistic) behavior is not domestic violence? And did you know that child abuse is domestic abuse when it occurs in the home by a parent or relative?

And did you know that domestic violence does not necessarily mean physical violence, but can be words or mental abuse?

Domestic violence does not just ride and hide in heterosexual homes and families. Like HIV/AIDS it knows no sex, no orientations no class, no neighborhood boundaries And like HIV/AIDS it often lies hidden and buried away by ignorance, fear, pain and mistrust. Today there are a lot more avenues of help for heterosexual woman and the word out to all parties involved: victim, battered or service provider.

Have you witnessed domestic violence by/to a friend or a coworker? Do you know for a fact that someone is a victim of physical, mental or verbal abuse? You cannot rescue them, but you can be there for them. You can let them know you will help if they ever need it. You can let them know you will listen if they ever just want to "talk." Educate yourself so you can let them know that you are a non-threatening source of information if they should choose to seek help. Be there as a friend, as a support, as a potential escape route. Assure them that what it happening is not their fault and is not right. Assure them there is a way out and that there is all sorts of help out there. Educate yourself so you are ready to be a weapon against domestic violence.

Today there are a lot more avenues of help for heterosexual woman and children who are victims of domestic violence, but when one ventures into the gay and lesbian communities those doors are often shut — out of ignorance. Then when one is a gay male seeking help as a victim there are very few if any doors or avenues to even turn to. And if one is in an SM relationship, but becomes a victim the door to help is not only slammed, but the double deadbolt lock can be heard clicking.

First step for anyone in dealing with domestic violence is to seek help, Either one can say, "no!" And as the gay and lesbian communities become more open and active more services become receptive to help. And the key to getting help is education, getting

there as a friend, as a support, as a potential escape route. Assure them that what it happening is not their fault and is not right. Assure them there is a way out and that there is all sorts of help out there. Educate yourself so you are ready to be a weapon against domestic violence.

For those in an SM relationship remember; once you have withdrawn consent the behavior or action taking place has become abuse. SM becomes abuse just like sex becomes rape when permission has been denied and/or when one is forced against ones will to participate. DSM-IV (Diagnostic/Atastistical Manual) for Psychiatry has ruled consentual SM between adults is not sick or inappropriate behavior-consentual being the operative word.

Be sure, be sane be consensus and be Proud, don't put up with Domestic Violence of any kind.

Walt Disney Offering Domestic Partnership Health Coverage

The Walt Disney Co. will begin offering health coverage to live-in partners of gay and lesbian employees beginning Jan. 1, a move that analysts say may prod other corporations to follow suit.

"We made this decision because it brings our health benefits in line with our corporate non-discrimination policy," Disney spokesman John Dreyer said Friday. "We constantly review our benefits."

Disney joins other entertainment giants such as Universal, Paramount Pictures, Sony and Warner Brothers, which have extended such benefits to their gay and lesbian workers in the last three years. Most of corporate America, however, has been reluctant to extend health benefits to gay partners. Disney's announcement may change that, a health insurance executive said.

"I think other people will say, "If it's good enough for Disney, maybe it's something we should consider," said Gary Schmidt, marketing director of PacifiCare Health Systems, a health maintenance organization based in Cypress.

Gay rights advocates said Disney's decision was a hard-won battle. "It's been a long effort," said Richard Jennings, executive director of Hollywood Supports, a non-profit group promoting awareness of AIDS and gay issues.

According to Jennings, Disney Chairman Michael Eisner made a commitment to his group late last year that the policy would be adopted. Jennings said the company's primary concern "is their reputation as a maker of family entertainment."

Already, there has been criticism from the leader of a conservative Christian movement. "With the understanding that the homosexual agenda has penetrated Hollywood, it should come as no surprise that Disney now supports anti-family values," said the Rev. Louis Sheldon, leader of the Traditional Values Coalition in Anaheim.

"Disney is no longer Walt Disney, it is a secular, anti-family corporation," Sheldon said. The new policy was announced in an employee newsletter issued this past week. Under the policy, a Disney employee who wants to claim the benefit must sign an affidavit that says he or she is living with the

partner who will receive the benefits. Domestic partners also must show they are financially dependent on each other and their children will also be eligible for coverage. Unmarried heterosexual partners are excluded from the policy.

Disney employs about 60,000 people, including 9,000 at Disneyland in Anaheim.

"I think it's wonderful that the company recognizes all the individuals within the company," said Steve Valkenburg, co-chairman of Disneyland's Lesbian and Gay United Employees.

Quotes from the Supreme Court

Quotes from the Supreme Court argument over whether Colorado voters can ban all state and local laws that would protect homosexuals from discrimination:

Colorado Solicitor General Timothy
M. Tymkovich called the amendment voters'
"response to political activism by a political
group that wanted to seek special protections
... That's a quintessential political judgment."

Jean E. Dubofsky, lawyer for those who challenged Colorado amendment: "I think there is a right which everyone has to be free from arbitrary discrimination."

Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg said the amendment essentially says, "Thou shalt not have access to the ordinary legislative process for anything that will improve the status

of homosexuals. I would like to know whether in all of U.S. history there has ever been anything like this."

Justice David H. Souter: "Why is discrimination against one group dealt with under state law differently than discrimination against other groups? ... I don't see in your answer the kind of justification, independent of majority will, that equal protection calls for."

Justice Antonin Scalia said anti-bias laws "are laws that provide special protection to that particular category of person." Not everyone is protected from discrimination, he said, adding, "You can refuse to hire someone because you don't like the way they comb their hair."

Financial Report 1995

Pride Committee of Houston, Inc. has released its financial report for the fiscal year September 1, 1994 through August 31, 1995. Total Revenue for the year was \$55,703 and expenses were \$48,808 resulting in an Earned Surplus of \$6,895 compared to fiscal year 1993-94 Earned Surplus of \$2,766. Factors contributing to the increase for 1995 include larger corporate donations, a significant increase in merchandise sales, and an increase in Parade & Festival entry fees. For the second year in a row we have been able to give a portion of our revenue back to charitable organizations in the Houston Gay & Lesbian Community. Five organizations were selected as benefactors each receiving one-fifth of the proceeds collected at the entry gate to Pride Fest '95. The five organizations that received these proceeds were MCCR, Stephen's House, Aves, 20 Something, and Lesbian Health Initiative.

The Executive Committee has already begun planning the 1996 Pride Week and budgets will be prepared & discussed at the Executive Retreat in November and voted upon by the general membership shortly thereafter. We will continue our efforts in obtaining larger corporate donations and marketing our merchandise to enable us to strive for excellence in next year's pride celebration while monitoring and evaluating expenses and overhead to enable us to continue the precedent of giving money to charitable organizations.





OCA Pickets Youth Conference

October 13 about 40 people from the Oregon Citizens Alliance (CCA) protested outside the Third Regional Lesbians Gay & Bisexual Youth Conference being held at the Portland Conference Center (PCC) which hosted NLA: International's Living in leather X Conference the week before. An OCA leader said he objected because of the use of state & county money to stage the conference. The protesters carried signs including "Sodomy is Not a Family Values" "Don't Promote Homosexuality," and "Why are you supporting Gays, Mr. Governor?" A number of teens linked hands outside the PCC to help get individuals inside through the protesters, and police were on hand to ensure the two groups didn't clash. The conference was organized in part by the HIV Education department of the Oregon Health Division, and the goal of the two day conference was to promote an open discussion to the issues and needs of homosexual and bisexual youth.

Just seven days prior Living in Leather X (LIL X), NLA: Internationals annual leather/SM/fetish conference was held at the conference center, a privately owned and operated convention center. LIL VIII was held here in Houston in 1993 and last year LIL IX was held in Toronto, Ontario, Canada and received full coverage from main stream press (TV and newspapers) the entire weekend. Dean Walradt, Houston resident and this Years Pride Week Committee secretary was Assistant Director for LIL VIII and Director for LIK IX & X.

"We were ready and anticipating some type of attention from the OCA or similar groups," said Dean, "but we didn't even get the main stream press attention we got in Toronto for LIL IX. In a way I am glad as it made for a very good and stress-free conference for me, but publicity & confrontation can have their benefits too."

The conference in Toronto in 1994 made the front pages on several of Toronto's daily newspapers and Dean conducted two interviews for television and took City-TV on a tour of the vendor space which is held as part of the conference. As a whole the reception was positive if not down right warm and all publicity steered away for the most part from the sensationalism. Nor did the publicity result in any kind of protest-right wing or otherwise!


