The Pride Committee broke with tradition and did not choose to follow the international theme this year. Instead, the decision to use 'Glowing with Pride' was based on two factors. First, the logo needed to reflect the night parade. Second, it had to inspire the community and capture the imagination of the participants. Supplied with little more than these two basic ideas and the standard guidelines for logo requirements, Leana presented the Committee with 3 prototypes. The Executive Committee critiqued the designs, ranked the three entries and made suggestions for changes on the final selection. Leana took the suggestions and two weeks later, the logo you see here was the result. We hope you feel it captures the essence of a night parade and the colorful celebration it will generate.

The predictable daytime Houston summer heat has inspired the Pride Committee to make history by planning the country's first night time Pride parade. Already garnering accolades from the Houston

THE MAKING OF A LOGO

For the first time, Pride Committee of Houston commissioned a graphic designer to design the Pride Week logo for this year. In the past, the Pride Committee held a logo contest in which designs were accepted from members of the community. These logos would be judged by a panel of local artists with the final logo being chosen by the Pride Committee of Houston. Unfortunately, recent years have resulted in a small number of entries from which to choose. The Pride Committee decided rather than spend time and energy to have a contest, time and money could be better channeled by commissioning a graphic designer to create the logo. The Pride Committee obtained bids and reviewed portfolios of three Houston professional graphic designers. The Pride Committee chose Leana Colmenares to design the logo because of her strong portfolio and talent for creating icon based identities for other Houston based businesses. Leana, who coincidentally is also a member of our community was thrilled to do the logo since pride is a very close and personal issue with herself. Pride Committee of Houston is also thrilled with the new logo and hopes to continue a relationship with Leana for future design work.

Why have a night parade?

Over the years, the community has expressed concern that the parade held in June on a Sunday afternoon was too hot for most people to attend and especially difficult for those in the community that may be ill. Last year we formed a task force to determine a way to solve the heat problem.

After six months of meeting, surveying the community, talking with community leaders and researching temperatures the task force recommended a night parade held in June. Most of the community wanted to keep the parade in June to commemorate Stonewall and a night parade would be the first night gay pride parade in the country. This solution solved our heat problem, kept pride week during June to commemorate Stonewall, and gave us a new, creative way to have a parade by having it at night. ▼

Although fishing events are the group's main social function, other activities are being considered. Monthly trips are planned for weekdays and weekends to accommodate members' different work schedules.

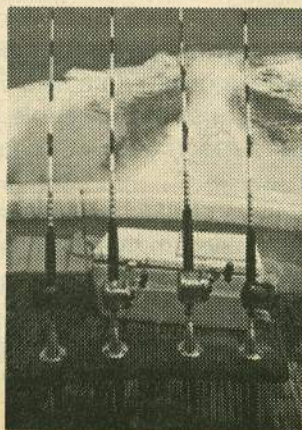
Trip prices range from \$45 - \$60 depending on the time of year, the length of the trip and boat availability. There is even a night

been home grown and continue to grow with the community. The retail clothing sectors are difficult to sustain, being so centrally located, but a burst of new store fronts may change that in the coming years. HOUSTON GAY AND LESBIAN PRIDE WEEK HISTORY

In 1975 the first gay and lesbian march was held in Dallas as part of the StoneWall remembrance. In Houston activists held a widely attended news conference. That summer, which announced the formation of a political coalition that has become the Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus of Houston. In 1975 an estimated 200 people held a march in downtown Houston to celebrate the StoneWall Riots, which was sponsored by the fledgling Gay Activists Alliance of the University of Houston. Singer and former beauty queen Anita Bryant, came to Houston as a featured entertainer for the Texas Bar Association Convention.

This brought over 5,000 angry gay men and women down Houston's streets in protest. We had such notables as Gay Publisher David Goodstein and the Rev. Troy Perry of the M.C.C. church, in reaction to her effect in Miami, Dade county, Florida. A few weeks later Houston's Gay community held its first Gay Pride Rally in Cherryhurst Park. On June 28, 1978, over 4,500 community activists met at the Astroarena complex the first gathering of people from all walks of life in the community. Former state legislator, and vice-president nominee, Frances "Sissy" Farenthold was the keynote speaker.

1979

First Houston Gay Pride Week. The excitement of the afternoon parade spilled over to the rally at Spotts Park, attended by over 5,000 people. At the end of the Star Spangled Banner the first spectacular \$2,000 fireworks display erupted in the sky above the park.

1983

"Unity Through Diversity" was the theme, a song written by John Day and Co. just for the pride week celebration. It was broadcasted over top radio stations to promote the parade and Gay Pride Committee event "Tina Turner Live" at the Summit.

1986

The first full color rainbow logo was used to promote and celebrate Pride Week. "Liberty Is In Our Grasp" with the Lady Liberty holding a rainbow flag.

1988

We were "Rightfully Proud" eight month's after the march on Washington the co-chairs' message to the community was to stand proud as a unit to fight discrimination, self-doubt and ignorance.



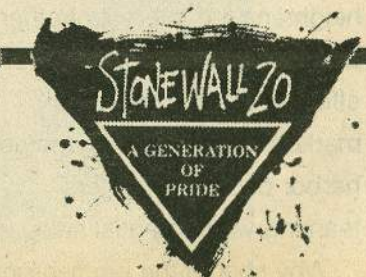

"Alive with Pride in '85" paralleled the ten year celebration of Gay Pride Committee's *After Dark in the Park Celebration* at Spotts Park.

1985

A live concert by Romanovsky and Phillips continued the theme "Come Out And Celebrate." With more people marching in the parade than ever before.
