provide care for those who are indigent, in financial hardship, or without much health insurance. She has also volunteered her services at the Thomas Street Clinic and the Bering Adult Day Care Activity Center.

Originally from
Puerto Rico, Jackie
returned there last year for
San Juan's 1997 Gay and
Lesbian Pride Parade. She
has also taken part in
several other activist
marches. Jackie has been a
guest speaker at various
gay and lesbian events, has
been featured in some of
our community's local
publications, and has been
a contributor to these

One of his major achievements was seen recently during "Let Us Entertain You" weekend, a fun-filled social gathering for the leather community held each year on the weekend following Mardi Gras. Bob has been chairman of the Houston Council of Clubs, the group responsible for organizing the weekend, since 1993. Nearly 800 people got together for 1998's LUEY weekend, representing 23 states and four foreign countries.

Originally from
Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Bob
moved to Houston in June 1980
and works as a legal assistant. He
serves as President Emeritus of
the Texas Renegades and has
been a member since 1987. He is
also the Vice President of the
Board of Directors of the PWA
Holiday Charities, which continues
the needed fund raising for AIDS
services begun by the late Lady
Victoria Lust.

Bob is a member of the Royal, Sovereign, and Imperial Court of the Single Star, Inc., and the year to put on the rodeo and receives a proportional amount of money from the rodeo to award local charities. In its fifteen year history, T.G.R.A. has raised over \$1.8 million statewide. The Houston chapter has raised \$120,000 in the past three years. 1997 recipients of T.G.R.A. Houston chapter awards included the PWA Holiday Charities, the PWA Coalition, the Pride Committee of Houston, the Loving Arms Foundation, Bering Care Center, and the Pet Patrol.

# Honorary Grand Marshal – Barbara Winston

When Barbara Winston's youngest son, Phillip, came out to her in 1993, she immediately joined the Houston chapter of Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) and quickly got involved in many programs that aid the group's mission of advocacy, education, and family support.

Barbara was involved in two very important PFLAG advocacy programs in 1996. She helped to bring billboards with powerful messages about lesbian and gay equality and families to Houston. She also helped to organize PFLAG Houston's "Moms and Dads Go To Washington" bus trip to lobby for passage of Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

Barbara is also active in supporting PFLAG Houston's mission of education. As an organizer of the group's Speakers Bureau, she helps to train and send out volunteers who speak about their own experiences and assist in sensitivity and diversity training in order to increase

Barbara said she has been involved in issues of inclusivity since her camp and college days and in later years, through social work. Barbara, who turned 60 in April, returned to the University of Houston Graduate School of Social Work in 1982 and was a therapist for 10 years.

## Female Grand Marshal – Jackie Doval

Jackie Doval believes in the need for leadership in lesbian activism and she has had a wide variety of leadership roles in the movement.

Jackie's leadership roles in the Houston gay and lesbian community have included founding organizations such as Woman Works, the Greater Houston Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce, and the Lesbian Health Initiative (LHI), and holding positions in several organizations, such as President/Co-Chair of Team Houston and LHI, Vice-President of Amigos Volunteers in Education and Service (A.V.E.S.), and Secretary of the Greater Houston Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce and A.V.E.S. In 1996 and 1997 she was Chair of LHI's first and second Annual Lesbian Health Fairs and in 1997 she cochaired AVES's first Pride Gala. In 1994 and 1995 Jackie was the Volunteer Coordinator of the Houston Black Tie Dinner. She is currently Co-Chair of AVES's 1998 Pride Gala and a board member of AVES. President of LHI, Vice-President of Lesbians in Business, a member of Team Houston, Team Sponsor of the Adjusters women's softball team,

Gay and Lesbian Hispanics Unidos, LHI, and AVES for her leadership in the Houston lesbian and gay community.

## Male Grand Marshal - Bob Bouton

Bob Bouton has given a



lot to the Houston gay and lesbian community for several years through his participation in many different charitable and social organizations in the community. Award for Community Service and he was the first non-member in Houston to receive a "Lifetime" title from the Court.

Over the years Bob has organized many benefits for Houston's vital organizations, including the Colt 45s' Stone Soup Fund, Q-Patrol, the PWA Holiday

Charities, the Loving Arms Foundation and others. On May 30, he will host a benefit for the Pride Committee at Chances.

Bob is also a member of the Houston Area Bears and is a Host Committee member of Soiree Aubergine. He is an associate member of several area social and educational organizations, including Houston's Texas Riders. Sundance Cattle Company, and National Leather Association -Houston: the Knights d'Orleans in New Orleans: the Firedancers in Dallas: the Cowtown Leathermen in Fort Worth: the Tri-State Wolfpack in Cincinnati,

Ohio; and the Silver Dolphins in Corpus Christi. Bob holds honorary titles in the United Court of the Lone Star Empire in Dallas and the United Court of Austin.

# **Safety Tips**

With another nighttime parade in the making, we urge the community to be alert and to use caution. Please follow these tips to assist with ensuring your safety.

- Plan your walking route. Use familiar streets, well lit pathways. Never take poorly lit streets.
- Do not travel alone. Take a friend for the walk, or go where other people are near.
- If you are walking alone, stay near the curb. Avoid alleys, shrubs, entrances where someone may be hiding.
- Avoid carrying extra money or valuables. Keep purses and bags close. Do not allow them to dangle.
- Be alert and aware of any potentially dangerous places.
- 6. Trust your instincts. If having doubt, then leave the situation.
- Do not hitchhike, pick up hitchhikers, or accept rides from strangers.
- If a car pulls along beside you and the driver asks you a question, avoid getting near the car.
- 9. Have your keys ready before you enter your vehicle or residence.

- Before you enter your car, look into the backseat.
- Keep your car doors locked at all times.
- 12. Park in areas that will be well lit at the time of your return.
- 13. If you are going to leave with someone you have just met, introduce them to someone you know.
- If trouble does occur, be calm and try to defuse the situation.

If you are being harassed or followed, call 911 and ask for police assistance. If you are the victim of an attack, report the crime. The police will need your assistance to help stop the attacker from claiming more victims.

# **HOW TO BUILD A BASE FRAME FLOAT**


loats can be built in many ways: on trailers, trucks, cars, wagons -almost anything that can move. Even Jeeps make good underpinnings for miniature floats. The best thing to do is to blend the cab of your vehicle into the design of your float. If pulling a float, be sure to include all parts in your decorative scheme. Remember, a "Unified, Diversified, Electrified" float pulled by a dull tractor loses its effect completely.

When planning to build a float, have a special place for the construction. For example, a large storage shed, a warehouse space, or an unused garage make an ideal location for float-building. Remember, decorating a float in a confined space will triple the work load. If planning to build your displays outside, have an alternate location in case of rain

#### SHAPE AND COLOR

Too often the effect of a float is spoiled because it sticks too closely to the practical outlines of the vehicle on which it is built. The idea is to reform the underpinnings completely. By changing the shape, by working curves and swirls into the ground plan and by

WIDTH; Build Frame So That There Is A Slight Clearance On Front Wheels When They Are Fully Turned To Right And Left.




developing an imaginative topside form, you will have a display to stand out in the crowd. Every float should have a climactic point, the place where someone honored or your group or business logo should be displayed. Upper levels of the float are shaped to lead the eye up to this point.

Once you have established a design, fill out the ground outline with plain, light lumber, cut in the shapes necessary and always fastened securely with nails or bolts to the trailer bed. When you lateral shape is set, the vertical outlines, transverse and foreand-aft, are cut in plywood or wall board and securely mounted. If your float is to carry live figures, platforms to stabilize them must be rigidly built and provide with unobtrusive grab stanchions-braces.

Keep in mind safety and simplicity. Simple white lights will pick up reflective colors in your design. Be creative and go for one of the many parade trophies that will be given out for your hard work.





# LIGHTING YOUR FLOAT

While this may require some electrical wiring knowledge, with a little planing you can have a well-lit float that doesn't require a professional electrician.

A production that dazzles by day may be dull at night when using artificial light. A simple color trust under lights often is enough to stave off error. Remember to please be considerate to the audience and keep the lights on your float and not on the crowds' eyes. The crowd is not in the spotlight and your float is. The less light a float sheds on the pavement or another float, the more effective the illumination will have on your display. It is o.k. to be selfish with your lights: keep the spotlight on you.

A floodlight mounted on a tractor pulling the float may serve as a main light. The use of colored bulbs or filters over the lights may set off the color scheme of the production. For a nice appearance, try silver lights. By using the above enhancements, however, it will require tricky multiple wiring. Color filters require an increase in wattage. The safest system is to have colors set into the float decoration and to highlight them with simple white lights. Try using twinkling lights similar to those you use on a Christmas Tree. In lighting a float, keep in mind that the object is to be seen without eye strain.

Any figures on the float, live or animated, should be specially spotlighted. If you need to rent a generator, please plan ahead and reserve it early from a local rental company. Be exact on how many lights you will be using. This will help renting the correct size and wattage for your float.

- If you are going to wear lights, only use battery operated lights.
- Do Not put 120 volt lights on your body.
- Battery Operated Lighting Options:
  - Fluorescent, either 6v or 12v run for approximately 10 hours and Home Depot is a good source for these.
  - Car lights, either 6v or 12v use bulbs and sockets both available from auto parts supply stores.
  - Battery operated Christmas lights.
- When using Christmas lights, 6 volts is the maximum you should try to use, as they get extremely hot.
- The size of the battery determines the number of lights you can use for a given length of time.
- Choices for batteries include:
  - 6 volt battery packs from Radio Shack. Can also use lantern batteries.
  - 2. 12 volt battery packs.

simple items are needed to create an effect that will make the crowd go wild, fishing line, balloons in the 6 rainbow colors (number varies depending on how long you want your arch to be) and helium to blow the balloons up is basically all that is needed.

Another cheap and inexpensive way to illuminate your group is the use of a flashlight with a colored condom on the end of it. Blow up the condom and quickly place on the end of the flashlight and wah lah, you have a colored light to make your group shine.

The key is to have fun. If you are planning on doing a throw from your group or float make sure that the Parade Throw form is filled out and sent back with your parade application and fee. If you have not received a parade packet yet please give the Pride Line a call and we will get one out to you a.s.a.p. at 713-529-6979.

parade was bigger and better — not only in the number of floats, but also in the quality of the floats and the individual creativity of all the entrants.





The Houston community can be proud of our beautifully lit floats, which dazzled spectators at America's original nighttime Pride Parade. But gay and lesbian communities everywhere have many reasons to be proud of their unique celebrations.

Here's what the press said about a few of the many Pride events in June.

# CEDAR RAPIDS, IOWA

Carol Riels says she often fields calls from homosexuals considering moving to the area. "I tell them Cedar Rapids is a friendly city to gays and lesbians," said Riels, a member of the Gay and Lesbian Resource Center's board. "We don't have a lot of gay-bashing. People may not like what we stand for, but they don't get in our faces about it. That speaks well of Cedar Rapids."

Riels is also co-chair of the organizing committee for the first local observance of Gay Pride Month, highlighted Saturday [June 13] afternoon by the Pride Fest. About 200 people gathered in Greene Square Park, browsing the booths set up by vendors and activist groups and listening to music and speeches.

With the city's Civil Rights
Commission considering a proposal
to amend Cedar Rapids'

marched smoothly through the city's downtown June 14.

"Nice and quiet, no problems," said Sgt. Don Cronin of the Lawrence police department, who added that there were around 200 marchers in the parade which lasted about an hour and a half.

# SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

While fun and fellowship were a big part of Saturday's [June 13] PrideFest parade and pienie, the first-of-its-kind downtown event also helped close a rift in the city's gay and lesbian community, organizers said.

"There's been a lot of difficulties in the gay community about coming together as a group because we're the most diverse community that exists," said Dan Castor, PrideFest coordinator. "It's hard for us to agree all the time, but this is an opportunity for all of us to come together and share our commonality."

More than 30 organizations took part in the noon parade, which wound from Travis Park to the Alamo and back again. There were several decorated vehicles, a halfdozen floats and dozens of marchers.




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Alamenda all took part. The Parade was led, as always, by over 500 women motorevelists. Also near the front of the parade was a rainbow flag borne by flag creator Gilbert Baker. It was during the San Francisco Lesbian & Gay Freedom Day Parade 20 years ago that the rainbow flag was first unveiled. In keeping with that anniversary, this year Market Street was dressed with 500 new giant flags — one for every

light post of its entire two-mile length. In addition, two 40-foot flags in the original eight colors (turquoise and pink added) flew in front of City Hall on Civie Center Plaza — the venue for the Celebration.

The number of people attending this year surpassed all expectations. Estimates varied wildly, but the official word from City Hall is that a million people attended this year's Parade and Celebration.
