

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PRIDE COMMITTEE UNVEILS 2000 SLOGAN AND LOGO

The Pride Committee has unveiled the logo for Houston Gay & Lesbian Pride 2000, an interpretation of the 2000 Pride theme, "Take Pride, Take Joy, Take Action," designed by local graphic artist Diane Jolley.

The slogan selected by the PCOH general membership at its November 16 meeting for the June Pride celebration is also the international Pride 2000 theme, picked at the annual InterPride conference in October 1999. This will be the first year since 1996 that Houston has used the international theme for its own Pride festivities. Slogans picked in the last few years have been related to aspects of Houston's unique nighttime Pride Parade.

"We need to use the international slogan to show our solidarity with

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other Pride committees around the world and to show how big and worldwide our movement is," -Pride Board member PRIDE Brian Keever said during discussions about various slogan ideas. InterPride Region 3 Take Coordinator Tina Travis said adopting the international theme for 2000 would be appropriate since the Pride Committee will host a regional InterPride conference in February.

After selecting the 2000 theme, the Pride

from among several outstanding portfolios at its December 7 Celebration Committee meeting. Diane Jolley was selected and presented various interpretations of the theme for a vote at the Committee's December 21 general meeting.

Diane's logo illustrating the 2000 Pride theme is colorful, festive and very contemporary. The primary visual image is of two heads that are close enough to portray intimacy, albeit in a subtle way. Diane explained that the image can be interpreted as either a lesbian or a gay couple and it is symbolic of unity and love. She also said its violet, yellow and magenta colors were chosen for their strength and warmth. The typography she used is whimsical, continuing the joyful attitude of the logo.

The logo also incorporates the pink triangle, an important symbol in the gay and lesbian com-

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munity. The pink triangle was used to identify gay men for persecution in the Nazi Holocaust and was co-opted by the community to symbolize gay power and action. Diane's design adds another layer of symbolism to the pink triangle because it is the point of contact and intimacy between the two faces in the logo.

Diane studied Commercial

Graphics at Idaho State University. She has been the owner/principal of Jolley Design Studio, a print creative and design company, for

packages, brochures, catalogs and CD and book covers for clients ranging from small businesses to international companies, including Moody Gardens, The Houston Arboretum and Nature Center, St. Luke's Hospital, Racal Survey Inc., Van Ommeren Ceteco, Trendmaker Homes, Tenneco and Harold's Menswear.

HOUSTON TO HOST REGIONAL PRIDE CONFERENCE COMMUNITY-WIDE MEDIA WORKSHOP TO BE HELD IN CONJUNCTION WITH REGIONAL CONFERENCE

Gay and lesbian pride celebration coordinators from the Southwest and elsewhere will meet in Houston, Texas, on Saturday, February 19, to learn how to organize bigger and more successful Pride events in their communities and to begin networking with one another. Topics to be addressed at the regional conference include fundraising, legal and financial issues, marketing, events and record-keeping.

The Pride Committee of Houston is hosting the conference under the auspices of InterPride, the international association of pride organizers. The Pride Committee has had a long history of leadership within InterPride, including hosting one of its annual international conferences and having a former co-president of the organization as a member. I am proud to serve as coordinator of InterPride Region 3, which includes Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and Kansas. On Sunday, February 20, PCOH will host a media workshop open to conference attendees and Houston community groups that will focus on maximizing publicity for community events and advancing gay and lesbian issues through the press. The workshop will be held at the Hollyfield Conference Center (2700 Albany) from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. A \$20 fee will cover lunch and material costs; the workshop is free for regional conference attendees.

Workshop attendees will learn how to develop relationships with media professionals, interact proactively with the media, monitor and respond to coverage of gay and lesbian issues and of the community and undertake a media campaign for their organizations. The workshop will include several exercises, discussions with Houston media professionals and take-home resources. The Pride Committee is grateful to the Hollyfield Conference Center for donating space for the media workshop, and to the Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection for hosting the regional conference.

PCOH has secured discounted hotel rates for representatives of Pride organizations in or outside InterPride Region 3 who would like to attend the regional conference. We are finalizing details regarding the media workshop for Houston groups.

VOTE FOR THE 2000 PRIDE PARADE GRAND MARSHALS

In 1999, voting for Pride Parade Grand Marshals was opened to the entire Houston community, leading to the greatest participation ever in deciding who would be given this great honor. The Pride Committee is excited about increasing voting opportunities for 2000 even further, especially since there is a surprising number of nominees in each of the available Grand Marshal categories. A very large voter turn-out is expected.

To add your vote, you must be a resident of Harris County or its surrounding counties. Other eligible counties are Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Liberty, Montgomery and Waller.

Send the ballot below to PCOH by Thursday, February 24, 2000. Check one name or organization per category and print and sign your name on the ballot. All votes are confidential and the signature portion of your ballot will be removed before it goes into the ballot box.

Include with your ballot proof of residency in Harris County or its surrounding counties. This could be a copy of your driver's license or state identification or a copy of a utility bill. License and account numbers can be obscured, but your name and address must be readable. Mail your ballot and proof of residency to Grand Marshal Vote, Pride Committee of Houston, Houston, Texas 77266-6071, or fax them to 713.529.6929. Ballots not received by February 24 or received without proof of residency will not be valid.

In addition to its publication here, the 2000 Grand Marshal ballot is also available on the Pride Committee's web site, www.pridehouston.org, and it has been made available to local community publications for wider distribution. On Saturday, February 26, the Pride Committee will hold poll voting for the Grand Marshal positions at the Houston Lesbian and Gay Community Center (803 Hawthorne) between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. To vote at the Community Center, you cannot have voted by mail-in ballot and you must bring proof of residency in Harris County or its surrounding counties.

Vote tabulation will be conducted by members of the PCOH Board of Directors. Winners will be determined by a plurality of the vote, with any ties resolved by members of the Board. The 2000 Pride Parade Grand Marshals will be

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announced at a special press event to be held at Riva's Restaurant (1117 Missouri) at 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 9.

GRAND MARSHAL NOMINEES

The Pride Committee announced the nominees for the Grand Marshals of the 2000 Houston Lesbian & Gay Pride Parade at its general meeting on Tuesday, January 18.

Nominees for the position of female Grand Marshal are Pat Gandy, Anita Renteria, Barbara Walker and Tori Williams. Male Grand Marshal nominees are Tony Brigandi, Kevin Davidson, Ray Hill, Grant Martin, Pete Martinez, Bill O'Rourke and Richard Wiederholt. Nominees for Honorary Grand Marshal are Jack Adams, Sarah Gish, Ann J. Robison, Don Sinclair and, nominated as a couple, Blake and Gordon Weisser. Groups nominated for Honorary Grand Marshal - Organization are the Greater Houston Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce, the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus, the Houston Lesbian and Gay Community Center and the People with AIDS Coalition.

The female and male Grand Marshals of the Pride Parade are lesbians and gay men who are honored for their community leadership. They are shining examples of gay and lesbian achievement and role models for all of us. Honorary Grand Marshals are heterosexual individuals who have shown outstanding dedication to gay and lesbian causes or to the gay and lesbian community. Groups that have been the Honorary Grand Marshal - Organization have supported the Houston gay and lesbian community, significantly contributing to its positive image or outlook, and have been in existence for over two years.

Letters of nomination for these Grand Marshal positions were sent to the Pride Committee in December and January and a committee of former Grand Marshals met on Monday, January 17, to review each nomination. According to PCOH rules, the review committee is charged with assuring that each nominee meets the qualifications outlined above, through a simple majority vote. This year's review committee included Bob Bouton, Jim Carper, Sean Carter and Brian Keever. PCOH representative Troy Christensen acted as the committee's coordinator. The qualifications for each nominee, as detailed in the letters of nomination, are listed on the following pages.

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MEDIA GETS THE WORD OUT





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

PRIDE PARADE WOWS RECORD CROWDS


THE 2000 HOUSTON LESBIAN & GAY PRIDE PARADE was a huge celebration of our community's unity, diversity and history, featuring 120 entries, the first appearance of a sitting Houston mayor, the return of Houston's fabulous disco ball and by far the largest attendance in the Pride Parade's history.

According to unofficial Houston Police Department estimates, between 150,000 and 170,000 came out to "Take Pride, Take Joy, Take Action" at the Saturday, June 24, parade-at least 50% more people than in the recordbreaking 1999 Parade audience. In addition, many, many more people saw live coverage of this year's parade on the evening news on several Houston TV stations.

The huge crowd was treated to a brilliant spectacle as the Pride Committee's 8 1/2-foot disco ball was again suspended above Westheimer and Montrose with even more special effects. Street lights on lower Westheimer were turned off by Reliant HL&P during the parade to heighten the disco ball's effect.

Passing under the disco ball were floats, walking units and vehicles sponsored by many different community





organizations and businesses. Houston Mayor Lee Brown became the first mayor of the city to participate in the annual Parade in its 22-year history. He was joined by U.S. Representative Sheila Jackson Lee, Texas Representative Debra Danburg and Houston City Councilmembers Carol Mims Galloway, Annise Parker and Gordon Quan.

The bright, colorful floats and other entries in the Parade showed the diversity of the groups in Houston's gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community. Awardwinning entries were:

The audience at the 2000 Pride Parade also showed the beautiful diversity of our community. The power of Pride can educate, invigorate and empower all of us. The audience at this year's parade had a large number of families—both gay and straight—with children, reminding us that we should take pride in ourselves and our community, but we must also take action to ensure an inclusive and free future for everyone.





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WOMEN'S FESTIVAL FLOURISHES EACH FALL

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istory. orts t we r us help THIS YEAR MARKED THE FIRST TIME that the Houston Women's Festival had an entry in the Pride Parade. With Tina Burgos at the helm of a DJ booth and over a dozen volunteers dancing and passing out prizes, the colorful float was a hit with spectators all along the route. Festival producer Shirley Knight says, "We had a great time participating in the Pride Parade and we look forward to having an entry every year."

The Houston Women's Festival is an annual event held in the fall to celebrate art, music, crafts and community. It is one of the premier annual events for women in Texas and draws people from throughout the state and beyond. Founded in 1995, the festival has grown every year, from over 500 participants the first year to over 1500 in 1999.

The sixth annual event takes place on Saturday, October 28, from 1 p.m. to midnight at Garden in the Heights, 3926 Feagan between Heights and Shepherd. The show on the main stage kicks off at 1:30 with local artist Chris O'Toole. She'll be followed by Elaine Townsend, a blues artist from South Carolina who has shared the stage with k.d. lang and the Indigo Girls. Next up is local singer/songwriter Noria, a name to remember.

At 4:30 the Therapy Sisters take the stage. This musical comedy duo travels nationally and is spending the summer performing in Provincetown. Tret Fure is next at 5:30. A legend in women's music, Fure produced albums for and toured with Cris Williamson for many years before returning to her solo career.

At 6:30 Texas sensation Terri Hendrix takes the stage. Hendrix recently opened for Joan Armatrading in Houston and has launched a successful musical career. She performs in a duo with guitar player Lloyd Maines.

At 7:45 the festival is pleased to present Tina of Tina and the B Sides. This charismatic performer was signed by the same Sire Records exec who signed Chrissie Hynde, Deborah Harry, Madonna and k.d. lang. Expect a dynamic solo set from this artist who wins fervent fans wherever she plays.

Reggae artist Tchiya Amet is up next at 9 p.m. A favorite on the Bob Marley tour, Amet combines native Indian themes with reggae rhythms and Sade-like music to create beautiful, uplifting tunes. She will be backed by her fourpiece band.

The show concludes with the all-woman band Diamella and guest artist Miss Molly. This Louisiana band keeps Gulf-Coast music alive with a steady stream of blues, rock and boogie.

Also included in every Houston Women's Festival is a performing and visual art show featuring established and up-and-coming artists who work in a variety of media. The art show is held indoors in the Main Hall. This year's featured artist is Charla

Bruce and the featured photographer is Sharon Stewart. Poets Donna Garrott and Karon Cook are among the women who will share their work on the indoor stage.

Throughout the event, festival-goers can stroll through the community marketplace where craftswomen display their wares, entrepreneurs promote their businesses and organizations provide information. Jewelry, pottery, stained glass and imported clothing are just some of the items that will be offered.

It was a tremendous effort, gathering volunteers from Progressive Voters in Action (PVA), the Harris County Democratic Party, the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political manager for PVA. Mr. Morua noted further, "With over 150,000 people in attendance, the Pride Parade is an excellent opportunity to both identify and activate our GLBT and straight, allied supporters. We look forward to working with the Pride Committee next year to identify you find a progressive organization that has a sharp focus and holds itself accountable to measured results and to social justice."

PVA is a non-profit, non-partisan, voter identification organization dedicated to building a progressive political

PVA was co-founded by Grant Martin, Annise Parker's campaign manager, and Alejandro Morua. Dr. Maria Gonzalez, University of Houston Professor of English, is PVA's other founding board member. Dr. Gonzalez noted, "PVA is a great way to test academic theories on social justice in the real world. It's not too often you find a progressive organization that has a sharp focus and holds itself accountable to measured results and to social justice."

PVA is a non-profit, non-partisan, voter identification organization dedicated to building a progressive political culture in Houston by identifying and organizing a community of voters who share its broad progressive values. The group's initial focus is on GLBT civil rights, reproductive rights and racial justice. In subsequent years PVA will expand on these issues to demonstrate its commitment to a broader vision of social justice.
