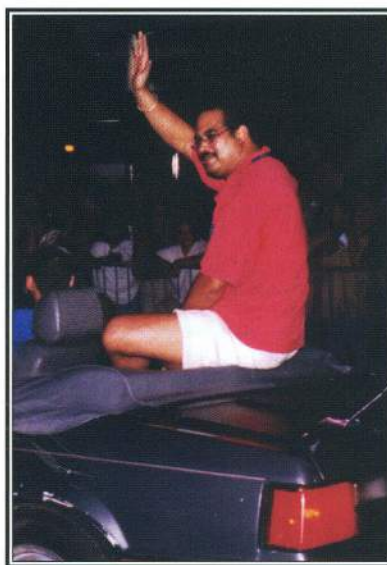

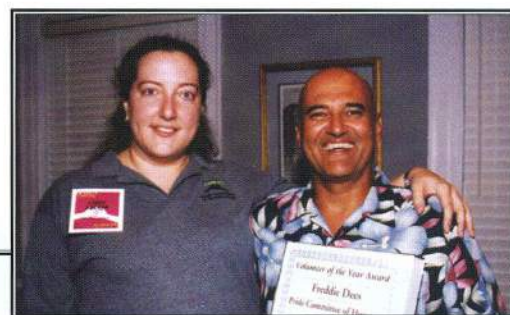
Want to Volunteer?

Meet the Pride Committee of Houston

The Pride Committee is an energetic group of people who work year-round to develop and produce the annual Pride celebration for Houston. The Pride Committee is made up completely of volunteers, including a seven-member board of directors, a 20-member general committee, and dozens of committed volunteers, who work feverishly throughout the entire year to bring you the annual Pride Celebration. This year's Celebration starts June 21 with the kickoff party, continues through Pride Days and culminates with the annual nighttime Pride Parade Saturday, June 29, at 8:45pm on lower Westheimer in the Montrose area.

The board of directors meets the first Tuesday of the month at 7:30pm at the G&L Community Center, 803 Hawthorne. The general committee meets on the third Tuesday of every month at the Metropolitan Multi-Service Center, 1475 West Gray, at 7pm. All meetings are open to the public, and participation is always welcomed. Volunteers are encouraged to participate any time of year for one of the largest volunteer-run GLBT organizations in Houston.

The Pride Committee of Houston is proud to be a member of InterPride, the International Association of Lesbian and Gay Pride Coordinators. Through

our association with InterPride, the Pride Committee has helped hundreds of smaller Pride organizations around the world gain insight into how we organize our group, handle our problems, and put on the Southwest's largest Pride Parade. In turn, we take away new ideas and creative ways to make our Celebration that much better.

The mission of the Pride Committee of Houston Inc., as a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, is to bring the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender community together to celebrate individual pride, to commemorate our community's history and to educate society for the liberation of all people.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The executive director of the Pride Committee of Houston helps to set the organizational goals and then to shape the organization to achieve them. This often means working one-on-one with various areas of the committee and the board of directors to get them working together harmoniously with other areas. Sometimes it means filling in the gaps in the organization with direct, hands-on involvement, such as in the absence of a director to manage subcommittees, or after the development of a new area. The executive director is also responsible for the overall health and well-being of the organization — legally, emotionally and financially. The tone that the committee will take for the upcoming year is set and reinforced by the executive director.

In his third year with the Pride Committee, Ken has taken on increasing responsibility since he first joined for "Take Pride, Take Joy, Take Action" in 1999. He started as *Pride Guide* coordinator and soon became the editor of the committee's new magazine. "Actually, it was a fluke. I was late to the meeting when they were asking for volunteers for subcommittees. By the time I had gotten there, the only thing left without a coordinator was the *Pride Guide* [magazine]. However, I used that position to be involved with all the other subcommittees on some level and to connect with the community." The following year he took on the extra responsibilities of the Pride Web site and the newsletter, subcommittees he still manages as executive director. "I have been volunteering my time in one organization or another since I was in high school, so I feel out of touch if I am not helping out somewhere, somehow."

Taking over the reins as executive director, Ken wants to move PCOH forward by looking back at our roots and taking an example from our history. "Pride in Houston started not as a parade, but as a weeklong celebration of the community coming together to commemorate, educate and celebrate Pride. I want to take us back to those days by providing a framework whereby the community can achieve those goals by coming together

and taking ownership of Pride. The Parade will then become the ultimate culmination of the community coming together." The result is Pride Days: themed days where community organizations are the event sponsors, and their messages and programs are center stage. "I want everyone in the community, come Saturday night, June 29, to feel like they had a personal part in Pride. I want them to feel that they were the Celebration, that they were Pride."

Nick Brines

FUNDRAISING DIRECTOR

The fundraising director is responsible for overseeing all fundraising, including corporate sponsorships, grant writing and the individual donor campaign. With corporate sponsorships, Nick negotiates with sizable national or local companies for large donations in return for publicity and exposure to the Houston GLBT community. He must walk a fine line between raising funds to put on events that achieve our mission and turning Pride into a corporate-marketing event. He has the delicate job of creating win-win-win scenarios for the corporation, the committee and the community. With grants, he oversees the art form that is writing grant requests for funding from foundations and other organizations. His oversight of the individual donor campaign includes developing and managing the efforts to speak directly to our community for monetary support of Pride.

This is Nick's seventh year as a member of the Pride Committee of Houston and his fifth as a director on the board. Nick coordinated the popular "Pumped Up On Art" fundraising gala in 1996 and 1997, when he first joined PCOH. During that time he became involved in negotiating corporate-sponsor contracts, which led to his current position on the board of directors. Nick joined the Pride Committee after years of watching the Pride Parade throughout his "coming out" in college. "Houston's Pride events are a great way to showcase the strength, diversity and unity of Houston's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender community," says Nick. "I believe that visibility is important while we celebrate who we are with one another." ➔





When Nick is not helping the PCOH, he is helping others as a consultant, raising funds for their organizations. Nick has also been involved with a variety of activities in Houston's GLBT community, including coordinating "house parties" to raise money for Annise Parker's election to Houston City Council and fundraising for the Miss Gay USA pageant in support of HIV/AIDS charities. When it comes to the hard work of funding Pride, Nick is the miracle worker.

Troy Christensen

PUBLIC-RELATIONS AND MARKETING DIRECTOR

This is Troy's second year as the organization's public-relations and marketing director. His job is to coordinate the media and marketing efforts of PCOH by publicizing the year-round activities and events of the Committee. He is also responsible for advertising our mission and promoting community involvement of the Pride Committee. But Troy's efforts to get the word out don't stop there. He also mentors and advises Celebration Committee coordinators who publicize the June Pride events through media sponsorships and other avenues.

Troy has been involved with the Pride Committee of Houston since 1997, editing the annual *Pride Guide* and the *Inside Pride* newsletter. He has also acted as grand marshal liaison and has coordinated the decorations, costumes and music for the Celebration Committee's float in the Pride Parade since '97.

Prior to joining the Pride Committee, Troy was a volunteer for the Gay & Lesbian Switchboard of Houston between 1994 and 1996 and was on its public-relations committee. At the University of Houston, he was a member of the Gay/Lesbian Students' Association and OUT, a direct-action group. He even participated in the successful lobbying of the administration of President Marguerite Ross Barnett to include sexual orientation in the University of Houston's nondiscrimination policy. During these college years Troy also was a member of Queer Nation's Houston tribe and helped plan and publicize the Montrose march, protesting the murder

of Paul Broussard in July 1991. That march turned into a powerful act of peaceful civil disobedience when thousands blocked the intersection of Westheimer and Montrose.

Troy likens his role as communications director to that of a teacher. "Our life experiences as Gay and Lesbian people give us the ability and opportunity to be teachers and to reshape society in compassionate, nonobjectifying ways, ending prejudice and scorn for racial, ethnic, religious and sexual minorities. To be truly effective teachers, shaping a society in which we are full members, we must be self-aware, self-reliant and self-assured." Troy adds, "All of my service to the Gay and Lesbian community has been done to foster this kind of empowerment." Troy is excited about using his talents to promote the Pride Committee as it educates our community and celebrates our Pride. In his words, "Pride is a force for change in the world, a euphoric act of self-identification, of defiance and of love." You just can't argue with that.

Brian Keever

PARADE AND BANNER DISTRICT DIRECTOR

The director over the parade subcommittee needs to have a great deal of insight, a good grasp of history and a whole lot of patience. That's because the parade subcommittee is one of the largest and most visible subcommittee in the organization. No matter what, come floods, droughts and everything else, the parade must go on! Remarkably, the show does go on, year after year, thanks in great part to the mentoring of the parade subcommittee. The banner district is the demarcation with flags of the Westheimer strip for the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Pride in June. The rainbow banners go up in May and don't come down until late July, proudly identifying the Montrose neighborhood as the gathering spot for our community to commemorate the Stonewall Riots. This position requires a public-relations role before the Houston City Council and Reliant Energy/HL&P to gain approvals for banner display, location and potential expansions to the banner-district area.

Brian is the perfect man for this position. With over 20 years with the Pride Committee, including being the parade's



grand marshal in 1992, Brian has a keen sense of our community's history and definitely knows how to put on a parade. His community involvement doesn't stop with just PCOH, however. He has been the president and charter member of the National Leather Association, Houston, and currently serves as its treasurer. He was on the board of the Montrose Activity Center for over four years and was a past officer of the statewide Lesbian/Gay Democrats of Texas. Brian was coronated Empress Ten of the Royal Sovereign and Imperial Court of the Single Star of Houston in 1994 and also serves on the executive committee of the Harris County Democratic Party.

Brian's personal goal for Pride is to create an environment of acceptance and inclusion. "I am very big on opening doors for Gay and Lesbian Pride here in Houston and in Texas. I believe that what I do helps people who can't afford to be out and also helps to educate our own community about all aspects of Pride. I hope that I will be able to open at least one new closet door every time we are out there and show our Pride." Brian is both a living history of Pride and an example of service and dedication to community for future generations.

Jeffrey Neaves

MERCHANDISE AND EVENTS DIRECTOR

Though the parade often steals the show, Pride events are the critical stepping stones that lead up to it. Without them, the Parade would not be the crescendo event that it is. This year is particularly true with the revamped Kickoff Party and the all-new Night at the Alley Theatre added to the list of year-round activities. Every year the Pride Events provide the community with another way to come together in a spirit of Pride! Merchandise is yet another way that the Pride Committee works at bringing the community together. Pride merchandise is seen as an integral part of the Pride Celebration. By communicating our theme and giving everyone, from the grand marshal

to the parade bystander, the opportunity to visually display his or her belief in Pride, they can come to feel a greater connection with the Celebration.

Heading these two critical areas is Jeffrey Neaves. Jeffrey is no stranger to challenges, after successfully orchestrating the experimental return to the Pride Festival last year. Though economic conditions do not allow for its continuation this year, Jeffrey proved that he could organize a new event with little history to fall back on, and with it being only his first year with the Pride Committee of Houston. But he did have a great deal of experience outside of PCOH to fall back on. Jeffrey was on Atlanta's Pride Committee for two years acting as an assist stage manager. He also has volunteered for many other organizations in Atlanta, including Meals on Wheels, the Gay Softball League and the AIDS Walk. He also played host to Gay athletes and visitors alike at the first-ever GLBT Welcoming Center at the 1996 Olympic games.

Though he gladly continued with his event-management experience by mentoring the events subcommittee, it was Jeffrey who also wanted to take on the additional responsibility for Pride merchandise. When asked why he volunteered for the extra duty, Jeffrey talks about a message that has stayed with him. "At one of last year's Pride Events hosted by HRC, I had the opportunity to hear Candice Gingrich speak. During that presentation, she said one thing that really left an impression on me.

Studies have shown that telling someone that knows you — even if only in a limited capacity — that you are Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual or Transgender greatly reduces the likelihood that that person would vote in favor of discriminatory or restrictive legislation against you. If this is true, just imagine the impact an average person could have in the simple act of wearing their Pride shirt for Saturday errands." Thanks to Jeff, we will all be wearing it proudly this year. ➔





Paul Radous

CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Maintaining fiscal responsibility and accounting for operations is a difficult task in any organization. Doing it for the largest all-volunteer-run GLBT organization in Houston is downright tough. However, year after year, the CFO of the Pride Committee manages to help develop the budgets, maintain the accounts, manage the expenditures and account for all the activities of PCOH. Additionally, the CFO also keeps the committee legal and helps to maintain our nonprofit status with various government agencies through various filings and reports. The result is an organization that consistently creates near-miracles every year with a very limited donation-driven budget. Moreover, the committee does it with accounting for every penny spent.

New to this position but definitely not new to the Committee is Paul Radous. In only his third year with Pride, Paul has moved up to the number-two slot of the Committee after taking on such roles as last year's Celebration Committee male co-chair. The success of last year's parade speaks for Paul's dedicated leadership and ability to get things done. But Paul has long been dedicated to the GLBT community, even before joining Pride. Paul was the co-president of the American Civil Liberties Union chapter at Trinity University in San Antonio, as well as the co-president for the university's Gay and Lesbian Interest Group. Paul has also been a member of the Human Rights Campaign since 1996.

It is Paul's belief that people should get out of their comfort zones and meet people in unfamiliar environments. That's why themes like "Pride Worldwide" are so important to him. He believes that they help us to examine our own attitudes toward those who are different and discover how we may be discriminating against them. It also helps others to see us for who we are: a vibrant and diverse community. If we put a face on the GLBT community, Paul theorizes that society in general will have to respond to their own prejudices as well. "I do not expect them to be carrying the banner for PFLAG this year, but now that they have a human face, they must consider when speaking about GLBT issues."



Julie Siska

PRIDE BOOSTERS DIRECTOR

In an effort to reach out more to the GLBT and GLBT-supportive business community, an entirely new area of the committee was created this year: Pride Boosters. Boosters are local businesses that are too small to be major corporate sponsors with large marketing budgets, but too large, and with completely different needs, to be individual donors. As a result, small local businesses that wanted to be a part of supporting Pride were often left without an option, and the Pride Committee was unable to show support in return for the very businesses that we patronized daily right here in our community. Pride Boosters corrects this problem by providing a whole new level of sponsorship, with a different set of benefits and donation possibilities from our large Corporate Sponsorships.

Heading this new area is Julie Siska. After a brief break to work on growing her own small business, Julie is in a unique position to move this program forward both as a small-business owner and as the idea's sponsor. But Julie is no stranger to Pride; she has been on the Pride Committee in various positions for many years. Her work with the committee started back in 1992 as its treasurer. From 1993 to 1995, Julie was the female co-chair for the Celebration Committee. In 1995 Julie stepped up to take over the reins as executive director for the next three years. Internationally, Julie has also been the treasurer for over two years for InterPride, and she also was its co-president for another two years. But her commitment to the community does not stop there. Julie is also currently on the advisory board for the People With AIDS Holiday Charities and the CareGivers Wall.

When asked why she does so much work in various capacities and organizations for Pride, Julie responds, "I think we need to be proud of who we are and take a stand for it. Pride organization activities give us an opportunity to express ourselves while making a difference for our community." Though time spent can never be replaced, Julie has no regrets about her volunteer time with Pride. "We have come a long way with Pride. I feel that we are on the right track." All aboard! ★

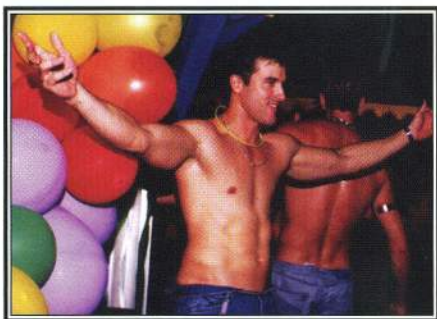

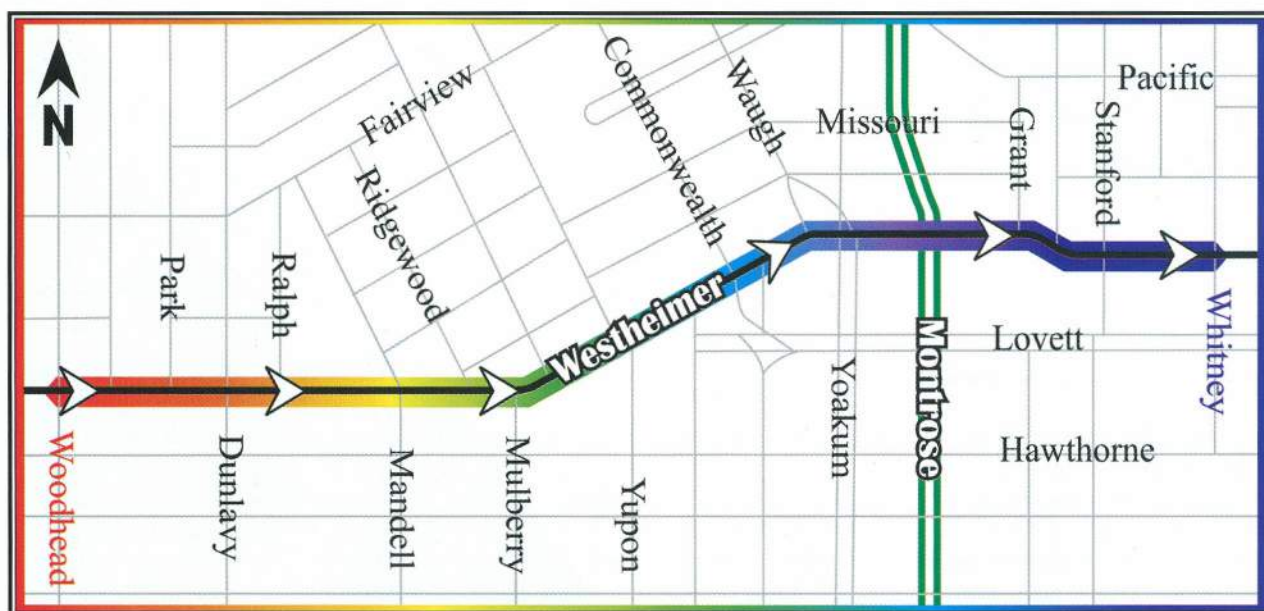

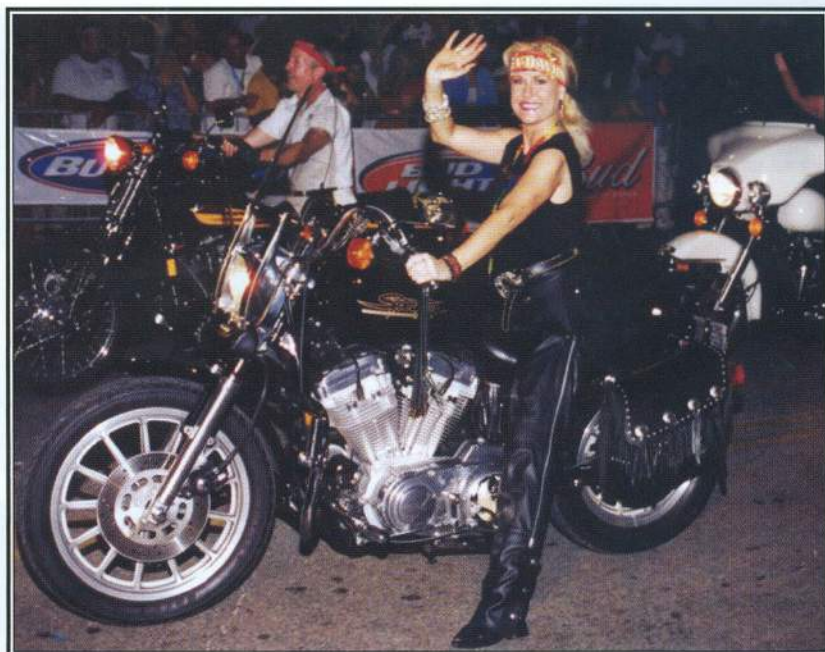

Parade Map

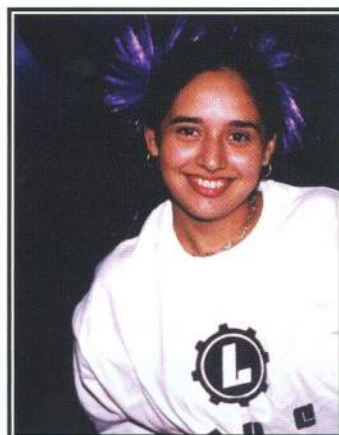


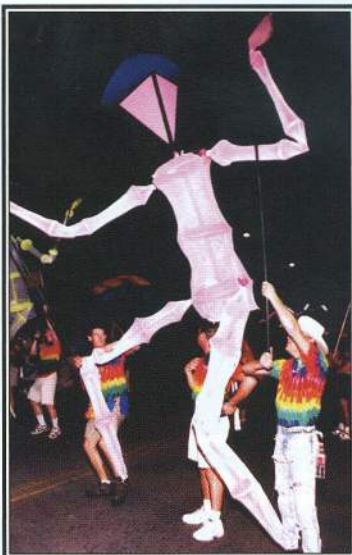

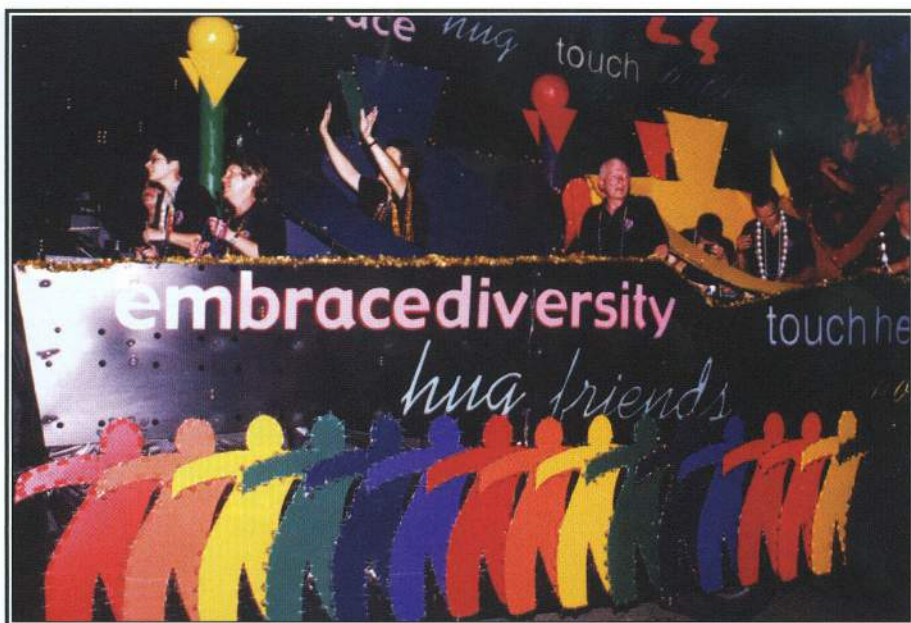

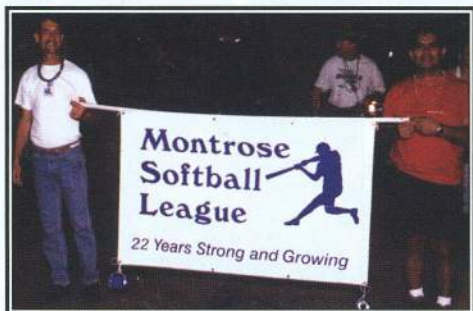

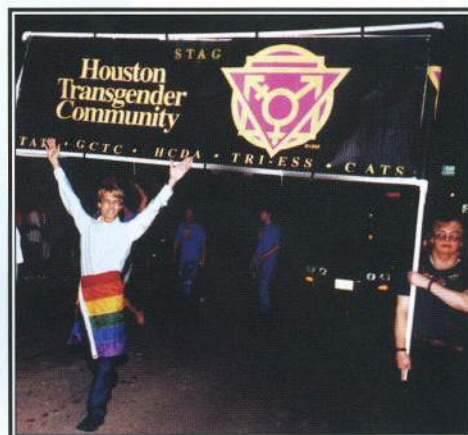

Houston Pride Parade 2002 Grand Marshals

Each year, the Houston Lesbian & Gay Pride Parade is led by several grand marshals — individuals and organizations honored for their leadership in the community. We admire the accomplishments of our Pride 2002 grand marshals, and applaud their continued support of our Gay and Lesbian community.

The male and female grand marshals are self-identified Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual or Transgender men and women who are

honored for their community leadership. They are individuals who have excelled in their activities and achievements, and they serve as role models for all of us.

Honorary grand marshals are self-identified heterosexual, non-Transgender individuals who have shown outstanding dedication to Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender causes or to our community. Groups honored as “honorary grand marshal-organization” are groups that support the →



Houston GLBT community, that significantly contribute to its positive image, and that have been in existence for over two years.

Achieving grand-marshal status is no easy task. Letters of nomination for grand-marshal nominees were sent to the Pride Committee in December and January from people throughout the region. A committee of former grand marshals then met in January to review each nomination. The review committee assures that each nominee meets the qualifications outlined above, through a simple majority vote. This year's review committee included past Grand Marshals Bob Bouton, Jim Carper, Sean Carter, Gene Harrington, Jack Jackson, Brian Kever, Dalia Stokes and Tori Williams. Parade co-coordinator Dick Dickerson acted as the committee chair. Once the nominees were selected, individuals in Harris County and the adjoining counties could mail in their ballots. The Pride Committee also held one day of poll voting.

All of this year's nominees should be commended for their work to the community. They are all outstanding examples of volunteerism and leadership for us all. Unfortunately, only one in each category gets to lead this year's parade. So let's meet this year's grand marshals:



**Male Grand Marshal — Rusty Mueller
aka Crystal Rae Lee Love**

It's hard not to know Rusty Mueller. He has been serving the community in so many different leadership roles — as both Rusty and his alternate persona, Crystal Rae Lee Love — that chances are you have met him at least once. So what does Miss Gay Pride 1997, the winner of the B. J. Summors Memorial Entertainer of the Year Award and the Giovanni Lamond Memorial Entertainer of the Year Award, do in his spare time? Volunteer!

The list of GLBT organizations that Rusty has participated in is a long one. He is currently an executive board member and treasurer for the Colt 45's, and the past chair of the AIDS Trouble

Fund and past co-chair for Soiree Aubergine. Rusty also serves as a board of directors member for the Royal, Sovereign and Imperial Court of the Single Star (as Crystal Rae Lee Love), he has served as Empress XI for the court and is Heir 17 to Jose I of the International Court Council. He has also received their President's Award for service to the community. As if that is not enough, Rusty is a member of the Lean on Me Foundation and a board member for the Montrose Clinic.

But in addition to his time, Rusty has given of his talents in so many ways to help raise thousands of dollars for our community. Some of the GLBT organizations that he has helped include the Colt 45's AIDS Trouble Fund, the Stone Soup Fund, the PWA Holiday Charities, Bering-Omega's Community Services Center, the Montrose Clinic's Women's Program, Steven's House, and Houston Lesbian and Gay Community Center.

The Pride Committee is pleased to have Rusty as our male grand marshal for Pride 2002. His leadership in volunteerism and commitment to the GLBT community are examples for us all.

**Female Grand Marshal — Herlinda
(Mela) Contreras**

Herlinda Contreras, or Mela, as her friends call her, is a woman of action. Mela is the first Mexican-American Lesbian in Houston to open a Tejano nightclub, Mela's, serving the GLBT community. She has used that to reach out to the Hispanic GLBT community through community fundraisers, barbecues, voter-registration drives, meetings, birthday parties, holy-union ceremonies and receptions. She has made Mela's a melting pot for GLBT people of all ages and nationalities.

But don't think Mela's contributions to the community are solely from one place. Mela is out and active in the community despite her business responsibilities. As a matter of fact, she has over 20 years of civic involvement, including fundraisers for various political campaigns and for individuals suffering with AIDS. She



participates in the various annual Christmas toy drives and the Tanqueray AIDS Rides. With Progressive Voters in Action, she signed up new voters, especially in the Hispanic community, on their voter registration drives, and she also sponsors Montrose Softball and Pool League teams. Her work has been so influential that Mayor Lee Brown, on Fiestas Patrias, September 15, 2001, honored her with a proclamation recognizing her 20 years of service to the GLBT community.

The Pride Committee is inspired by this woman of action and delighted that she will be our female grand marshal. She is an illustration of what it means to be a part of one's community through action and outreach.

Honorary Grand Marshals

— Jane and Irv Smith

This year's honorary grand marshals are Jane and Irv Smith. These Smiths are not your typical next-door neighbors, though you wish everyone were like them. Parents of a Gay son, the Smiths are active members and former board members of P-FLAG Houston, and they have participated in several Houston Pride Parades. They often speak at events about human-rights issues and their experiences as parents. Irv can often be found sending letters to the editor of the *Houston Chronicle* supporting equal rights for GLBT people. Meanwhile, Jan is busy as a board of director member, recruiting new volunteers for the Gay Men's Chorus.

Jane and Irv's most prolific work has been in working with P-FLAG. They have done so much for the organization, from answering calls on P-FLAG's Helpline to helping develop P-FLAG's now-famous billboard campaign. The Smiths have also worked on the "Healing the Hurt" conference for educators, and they have distributed P-FLAG and HATCH materials to all high-school counselors in Fort Bend ISD. But their activities in

the fight for equal rights are not limited to Houston. In 1996, the Smiths went to Washington, D.C., where they lobbied for ENDA with the "Moms and Dads Go to Washington" campaign.

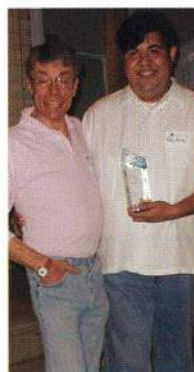

Honorary Grand Marshal Organization — Gay & Lesbian Switchboard Houston

Help is just a phone call away — that is, if you are calling this year's honorary organization, The Gay & Lesbian Switchboard. The community-issue-sensitive volunteers are always on call to assist the GLBT community. Their success is shown by the fact that they are celebrating their 20th anniversary of providing information, nonjudgmental support, crisis intervention and referral services for our community.

This year, to expand on success, the Switchboard is expanding its service, in conjunction with the Montrose Counseling Center's Anti-Violence Program. In addition to their informational resources, volunteers can now take a more active role in helping crime survivors. Volunteers can get survivors emergency transportation and put them in touch with someone who can provide assistance with Crime Victim's compensation applications and support during medical exams, evidence collection at the hospital, and police and prosecutor interviews. Callers in more violent or abusive domestic-violence situations can get help in developing a safety plan, obtaining emergency short-term shelter services, and securing legal assistance.

The Pride Committee is honored to have such a dedicated, helpful group of volunteers, such as the G&L Switchboard, as this year's Honorary Grand Marshal-Organization. ★



Pride Worldwide

An InterPride Perspective

Each year, the Pride Committee of Houston selects a theme to highlight some aspect or issue of our community. This year, PCOH adopted "Pride Worldwide" as our theme for the 2002 Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual & Transgender Pride Celebration. But why "Pride Worldwide"? The answer lies in our participation in InterPride.

InterPride is an international association of Pride organizations. Founded over 20 years ago, this network of groups acts as a clearinghouse of best practices, training and support for various member organizations, from small committees such as Topeka and Duluth, to mammoth ones like New York and San Francisco. Larger organizations gain the creativity that abounds in the smaller ones, and small Prides get the knowledge and experience of their larger counterparts. In short, all Prides

from around the world take home new ideas to implement in their local communities, making the Pride movement worldwide even stronger.

Each year, InterPride holds a World Conference. In addition to the exchanges of information, conferences, workshops and roundtables, member organizations vote on an international celebration theme that will help unite all the Pride organizations, large and small, into one worldwide movement. After the merits of various proposals made by each of the committees are discussed, the field is narrowed to a select few and then translated into all the member languages present. On the final day of the conference, one theme is chosen as the theme to unite Pride around the world. Houston's theme of "Embrace Diversity" had the honor of being selected as the international theme in 2001. The theme selected by the InterPride members this year for 2002

was "Pride Worldwide." Of all the proposals submitted, this one caught the spirit and the mood of the delegates.

The InterPride Conference took place in October, only three weeks after the events of September 11th. Even though the conference took place in New Zealand, and was a diverse mix of people from all around the world, the delegates felt that in difficult times we all needed to focus more on what we had in common than on what made us different. At the least, Pride committees around the world needed to stand together, with the understanding that the problems that face the GLBT community in one country are problems that affect us all.

Though InterPride member organizations select an international theme each year, there is no requirement that they use it for their local celebrations. For example, in PCOH's history, the committee has only used the international InterPride theme a handful



of times. So why then did Houston select "Pride Worldwide" for 2002? The answer was simple: because there are still places around the world where Pride is not an option. People in the United States, Canada and Western Europe have certain rights, protected by law, that allow us to freely gather, either in protest or celebration, at the various Pride events. Though some places are more progressive than others in the acceptance of the GLBT community, for the most part we do not have to worry about the government using the military to break up our gathering or a secret police force to monitor our "subversive" activities.

For example, in Sydney, Australia's Gay & Lesbian Mardi Gras is covered live by national television. Several of the Pride parades in Germany are subsidized, and political retribution would come to an elected official who did not attend San Francisco's annual parade. On the other hand, in so many countries Pride

organizations must constantly fight just to be able to hold their events. Often local governments obstruct permits, and various ministers and religious groups attempt to prevent activities by lawsuits or protests. In many other countries, the thought of a Pride parade is unfathomable; places where governments persecute individuals for their sexual orientation or gender identity sentence victims to long terms in prisons or mental hospitals, and sometimes put them to death, usually in cruel and dehumanizing ways. There are places where organizations that support equal rights for GLBT people are driven underground or officially disbanded, where official government statements deride GLBT individuals as subhuman because of their differences. Just one look at the events of the past year in places such as Egypt, China, Saudi Arabia, Brazil, Indonesia, Zimbabwe and Serbia illustrate that many of our brothers and sisters still fight for basic human rights.

Their struggle should be a reminder to us that though we have come a long way since Stonewall, there is still much work to be done, here and around the world. If one person in our community is persecuted simply for who they are, then we are all lessened. Pride Worldwide is an understanding that we are one large diverse community of people. It is a chance to show the power of that diversity and our contributions to society as a community and as individuals. It is also an opportunity to work together to achieve equality and liberate all oppressed, second-class citizens. Pride Worldwide transcends borders, languages and religions. It is a bold statement that each of us is a unique individual adding to the diversity of the world. It is the recognition that we have something in common with people around the globe and the hope that one day we will all share another thing in common: the freedom to be a GLBT person full of Pride. ★

I Love a Parade

Ever since I was a kid, I have always been fascinated by parades. It really didn't matter the reason for the parade, there was something exciting and special about seeing your friends and family marching down the street in a band or riding on a vehicle or a float. One of the most vivid memories of my youth is my hometown's Fourth of July Parade, when I would get to see my father slowly drive by on one of the town's firetrucks. He seemed so larger than life up there, waving to the crowds who appeared to respond to his striking presence. No matter how big the crowd, though, he always seemed to find me in the crowd, give me a special wave and honk the air horn. It made me feel like the parade was going by just for me.

For a couple of years, I attended a completely different kind of parade, a celebration honoring the bravery of protesters at a drag bar called the Stonewall in Greenwich Village, New York, and celebrating the diversity of a community in Houston. It was my first Pride Parade. I hadn't been out very long then, only a mere two years, and I didn't feel like I fit into any of the stereotypes of the GLBT community that I had been given by society. However, here was a picture of our community that I didn't even know existed. One that made me feel like the parade was going by just for me.

The parade was filled with people that were, well, "normal." There were senior-citizen Lesbians, Gay fathers with their kids, dancing bankers, church groups in matching T-shirts and all sorts of people in costumes both familiar and bizarre, all being themselves. There was even a group of guys on a firetruck, just like my dad. That night, I came to accept my community. In the process, my perspective on the power of simple things, like parades, had changed forever.

In our desire to bring about sociopolitical change, I think we often overlook the power the Pride parade has on an individual's life and, hence, on the life of our community. Pride is an affirmation that just being yourself is a major victory. So many people stand on the edges of our community. But I know that there are others out there who find a connection with the GLBT community and peace within themselves.

I know that I may never meet these people, but they are there. I know that there is a young boy out there, confused by the fact that the gender he sees on the exterior is not the gender he feels on the inside, who will catch his first glimpse of a transgender person proudly marching down Westheimer.

I know there is a woman who is afraid of losing her kids because she is a Lesbian mom gaining solace from watching a group of Lesbian mothers pushing baby

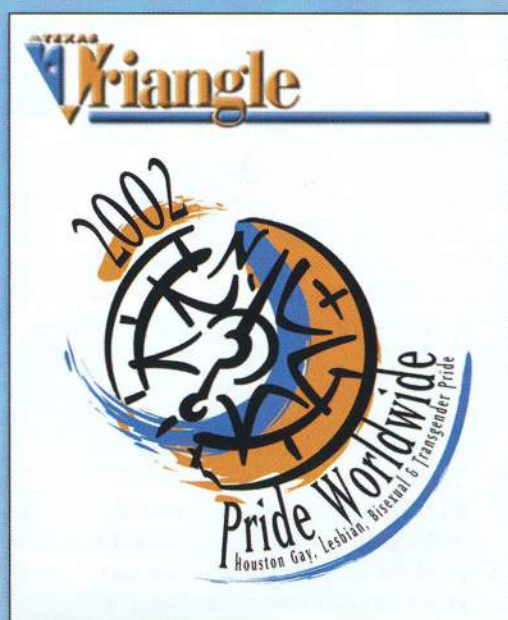
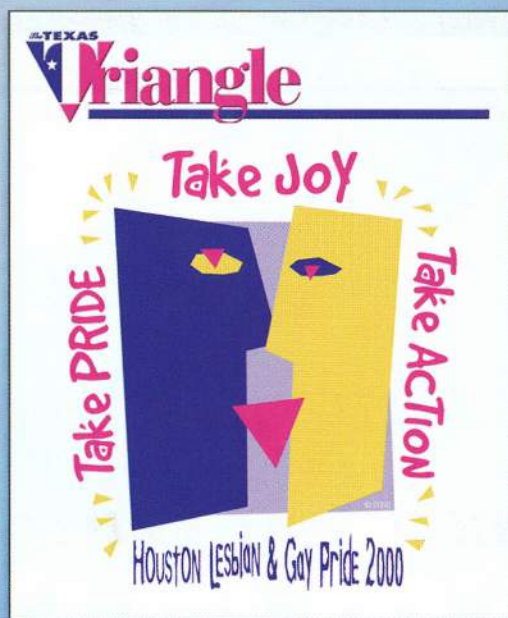
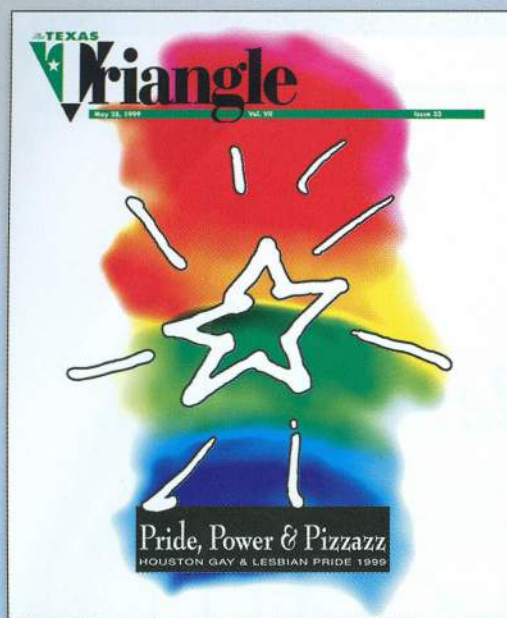
carriages down a parade route in front of 150,000 people. On parade night I know that someone in the crowd will be relieved to see their boss and fellow co-workers proudly carrying a corporate-sponsored banner celebrating diversity in the workplace.

Right now there is someone sneaking a copy of this magazine home so they can read about their community and dream of the day when they have the courage to stand up to their fears. I know that some watching the news will see their neighbor in the parade and realize that GLBT people are really like everyone else.

We may never see their faces or be able to quantify the success, but something like the Pride Parade can touch people in ways we can't imagine. A parade, after all, is about common people seeming to be, just like my dad, larger than life simply because they are not just representing themselves but the community as a whole.

We get to connect with them and, in the process, touch that part of our life they represent, maybe for the first time. So I invite everyone to come to the Pride parade this year, be a kid again, and connect with your community, maybe for the first time. After all, it will be going by just for you. ★
