Did you know that the Houston LGBT Pride Celebration is the fourth largest Pride Celebration in the United States and sixth largest in the World? Pride Houston attended the latest World Pride Conference in 2012 and found out these interesting facts about our own Pride Celebration. Everyone in the city should feel a sense of pride with the evolution of our own Pride Celebration. In as little as eight years the Houston LGBT Pride Celebration went from an attendance of around 75,000 to now well over 325,000 and climbing. This is just a testament to how amazing the City of Houston is.



People have to understand that Pride is a deep word, and that they have to search in their souls for what that word means to them. Pride means something different to anyone and the reason we all show up is to celebrate who we are as a Community but do you remember your very first Pride? Here is a collection of first pride stories individuals have shared with us.

1979

Carol Wyatt

Pride was held in the daytime back then, and it was incredibly hot! My lover and I brought gallons of ice water to the parade, along with a couple of Super Soaker water guns. We shot everyone in the parade, and once they figured out what we were doing, they were all BEGGING to be shot so they could cool down. Except for the drag queen that I shot in the face, damaging her makeup. I thought she was going to come down off that float and beat me up!

1979

Donald Goad

As a 20 year old coming from small town south Texas. I was finally home. My New Family. That's why I'm still here in 2013. The parade has been a symbolic barometer through the years, the good and bad. And through it all there is and was PRIDE! Oh the Beautiful Houstonians, touching so many, remembering the past and looking forward to a Bright Future.

1989

Nicolas Brines

As a college student just completing my freshman year, I hesitantly followed some new friends to the Pride Parade in 1989 along lower Westheimer. Having been in Houston less than a year (and fresh off of a dairy farm in Wisconsin), I was scared to death as I was still very closeted and unsure of myself. I was worried somebody from school would see me or that I might be captured by a camera filming for the evening news. I remember not even wanting to stand near the curb of the street, simply happy to blend in behind several rows of spectators. Imagine my horror when the University of Houston Gay & Lesbian Student Association (as it was called back then) marched by and a fellow dorm mate in the group spotted me, waved real big and screamed, "Hey Girl! I always knew you were gay!" I turned bright red. I knew this fellow student was openly gay, and I was mortified he recognized me as I had tried to avoid him at all costs in the dorms. However, I couldn't help but notice that nobody laughed or judged me. Rather, everyone seemed to be really enjoying themselves and waving back. I saw such a diversity of people in the parade that day: all ages, races, professions and backgrounds. I truly began to sense there was a deeper community of acceptance than I ever realized. My first Pride Parade played such a giant role in my coming out and self-acceptance. I look forward to attending the next 25 years of parades, too!

1982

Mark Clark

I was 20 years old. I was so impressed by the number of people there. At that time there was still an atmosphere of bohemian celebration. We were carefree and without the worries of the things that were soon to come. It felt so liberating to be among so many people like me. It was the first time I'd experienced such a large public affirmation that it was okay to be proud of myself. So much has changed since then. So many of my familiar faces are gone. It hurts me to remember but how can I forget? The happiest times of my life.

1981

Rusty Mueller

It was the first year that my partner and I were together and we went with friends to see the parade. Honestly, I had no idea what it was about other the Gay Pride Parade and we were going to drink and party like no tomorrow. I enjoyed it, but didn't get the picture until several years later. It wasn't until the 90's when I began to realize what "pride" meant and how far we had to go in being accepted for who we are. In 2002 when I was Male Grand Marshal, it all hit home and I realized just how proud I am to be a gay man in the city I live in.

1993

Jane Smith

Our son had come out to us in 91 so we were still a little in the closet. We had a young lady come up and thanked us for walking. Another young lady told us she wished we were her parents. We have marched almost every year since--now I ride as am 77 and legs don't work as well. We were honorary Grand Marshalls in 2002.

1997

Tammy Wallace

I will never forget my first Pride Parade as I sat on Westheimer and realized that there were so many LGBT and LGBT supportive people in Houston. I had only come out a year or so before. It was an evening of excitement and tears as I felt such a sense of pride as I celebrated our community. As I teared up, I remember thinking of how wonderful it was to finally be completely comfortable with who I am in a very public setting for the first time in my life. It was a remarkable day for me and one of many to come in terms of the Houston Pride Parade. My first parade is a day that I will never forget.

My first Pride was PRIDE HOUSTON, in 2007, right after I graduated high school, when I was 18. I never knew there were so many LGBT members in Houston. I was so amazed to see how friendly everybody was there. I'm 24 now, and have attended every year since my first time. The love of the LGBT community keeps me coming back every year. 2011


Gabbie Morant



FRANK BILLINGSLEY, Honorary Grand Marshal

Frank Billingsley is the Chief Meteorologist for KPRC Local 2. Raised in Alabama, Frank has called Houston home since 1989 and is proudly part of our community. He has been named by the Houston Chronicle as the “Ultimate Weatherman.” Frank has been in the public eye his entire adult life and has lived openly.

Growing up in a conservative house, he was taught that truth is the ultimate guide in life. So that’s what he’s doing- living out his truth. He states, “Anything else would drive me crazy.” This year will be Franks first year to be in the Parade and he says, “to be one of the Grand Marshals is such a nice honor.” He shares that it seemed the first Pride Parades, decades ago, were more about “we are here and this is who we are”, while they’ve evolved into, “this is who we are and we are truly happy about it.” Frank says, “The pride part has become much stronger recently which is wonderful.”

When Frank was asked what he would say to the younger LGBT generation, he said, “Coming out should always be on one’s own terms, regardless of your age. Most of us who have done it realize it’s not the end of the world, but rather the beginning. And you don’t choose to be gay, but what you do choose is how you will live your life and whether you will embrace differences openly and honestly. That part is up to us. Life is not dress rehearsal, this is it. Make the most of it. And while you’re at it, demand your equal rights as an American and don’t settle for anything less.”

Frank is a warm and confident man; we are so honored to have him this year as Honorary Grand Marshal!



JOHN NECHMAN,

Male Grand Marshal

“It feels really good everyday knowing I saved a life and didn’t necessarily make a lot of money.... what I do goes beyond a job, it is personal for individuals.”

John Nechman serves as a leader in our community from a legal and practical position. He is a criminal case and immigration lawyer whose primary focus is on those impacted by HIV and on those who identify as LGBT. John has worked with extremely hard cases where LGBT immigrants were scared for their lives and they see his practice as the only pathway to freedom, life and love.

After graduating from UT Austin with Bachelors of Arts degrees in Business and Spanish, Mr. Nechman traveled to Europe and lived overseas for 5 years. At his decision to come back to the states, his mother strongly urged him to start law school. Mr. Nechman says, “I’d love to say I had a great zeal to be a lawyer, but that wasn’t the case.” John had developed love for a Columbian man who was facing troubles being legally accepted into the country. This spurred John’s passion to start fighting for equal rights. Through much perseverance, John and Rich overcame the system and now continue to share a wonderfully committed relationship of 13 years.

In 1984, John experienced his first Pride Parade. “It was a hot summer”, he says, “but neat to see the gay and lesbian community celebrating.” Pride to him then meant coming out and gaining confidence and now Pride to him is the opportunity to look back at a part of our life that is so intrinsic of who we are. He says, “I am impressed and excited for the future generation because of work we have done. The young people have taken the baton and are moving forward and are on the verge of achieving the ultimate goal of total freedom and acceptance. He explains Houston’s Pride Parade as “home-spun” and “down-to-earth”. For the LGBT community, he desires to see full equality in the eyes of the law. What is allowed for heterosexuals should be allowed for same gender loving individuals. He wants for this country to be the “leader in civil rights.” John considers himself to be a person of faith and uses the word “thankful” to describe himself. He has worked hard to get where he is now and is proud to be on the path meant for him.

ROBIN BROWN, Female Grand Marshal

Robin Brown, a driven and strong individual, has given so much to the LGBT community and still does not cease to pour out her time and talent for those around her. Originally from Michigan, Robin transferred from Florida to Houston in 1988 and has been here ever since. She soon became involved in the community and has done nothing but continue to grow and help others along their path. Robin is a successful business woman, but still finds the time and energy to serve in the community. She is well involved in HRC, an organization that is working to achieve equality for the LGBT community. Robin also sits on the national board of Victory Fund, where she raises money to train LGBT elected officials.

Robin is a "do it right or don't do it at all" kind of person who doesn't take no for an answer. Two of her sayings are "Go big or go home" and "Suit up and show up". She strives to live these out every day in the workplace, at home, and in the community. Robin does a lot of fundraising for the community and recently claimed the 2012 Prominent LGBT Female Activist and Leading Female Fundraiser in the Out Smart Gayest and Greatest Awards. She works hard for Marriage Equality and for Anti-bullying. Robin has a big heart and is the kind of person that doesn't just talk about it, but she walks it out.

In 1989, Robin attended her first Houston Pride Parade and says now how Pride has matured over the past few years and she is very proud of it. She enjoys celebrating with all the LGBT community the great accomplishments from the previous year. A long time friend of Robin and partner of the HCR, Linda Lopez, says, "Robin has been a role model for women of all ages for as long as I've known her. She is strong, she doesn't stop, and she is awesome both personally and professionally. She is respected by so many."



JANUARI LEO, Ally Grand Marshal

Januari Leo, our Ally Pride Grand Marshal, began her work with the LGBT community over 20 years ago while working with homeless youth in Austin. Most of the young people were LGBT and the majority of her work included HIV outreach and education. She developed a love for the community and says she "found her niche." Januari currently works in Government Relations at the Legacy Clinic in Montrose.

Januari is on the board for the Coalition for LGBT Health and leads Continuing Education for other social workers. She is committed to doing whatever is needed in the community to help and is good at connecting people together to further their cause. Januari is married and has two children whom she raises to be involved in the community as well. She says, "I want my kids to see the value in community." As they are getting older, Januari describes them as becoming little advocates for the LGBT community. She has a strong passion to see equal rights happen for LGBT people. She desires for the LGBT community to have domestic partner benefits and to not be discriminated against because of who they love or who they are. She hopes for marriage equality soon and for the adoption process for gay and lesbian couples to become less strained.

Januari enjoys working with the LGBT community and describes the LGBT people as fighters. She says she appreciates how they are willing to stand up and say what isn't right and to make a difference. She describes herself as thoughtful, accountable and a fighter as well. She shows her zeal by fighting for the rights of the community and accepting all people as equal. She is passionate about family, community, education and empowerment.
