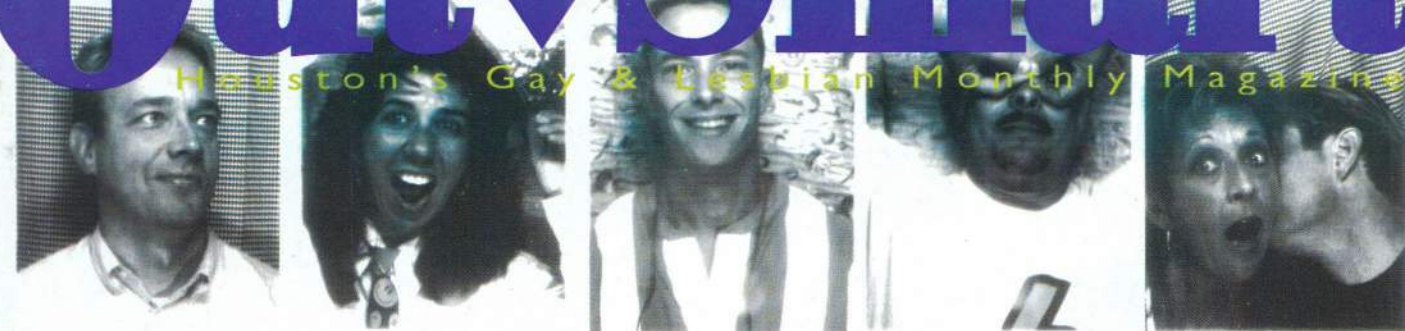

I really appreciate the diversity of voices I read each month in *OutSmart*. As usual, I found parts of Mr. Dale Carpenter's article on LGRL insightful and interesting ["LGRL and the Coming Republican Majority in Austin," May 1998]. I support LGRL with my dollars and believe in its work.



No organization is exempt from criticism, however, and community groups may often benefit from a thorough critique. While it has done reasonably well at a difficult task, LGRL has room for improvement.

What's great about Nate is that she doesn't bring you down with these questions, she lifts you up. Her messages always have a positive feeling of hope, that in the end everything will be OK. "Found a Cure," topping the dance charts for three weeks, is proof of this: "How many times before have you been left alone and you feel confused do you have the strength to keep trying when the walls just keep on closing in, but you got everything that you need inside your heart if you just believe, things ain't always what they seem."

Ms. Nate ignited gay pride celebrations all around the world last year with the album's first number-one dance single, "Free." She has always been a supporter of gays and lesbians. This album lets her explore more than dance beats and rhythms. The soulfully tender slow jam, "It's Crying Tim," finds Nate in a blue mood over lost love, while "Release the Pressure" funks things up a bit. *Situation Critical* is the strongest album to date for house music's truest diva. 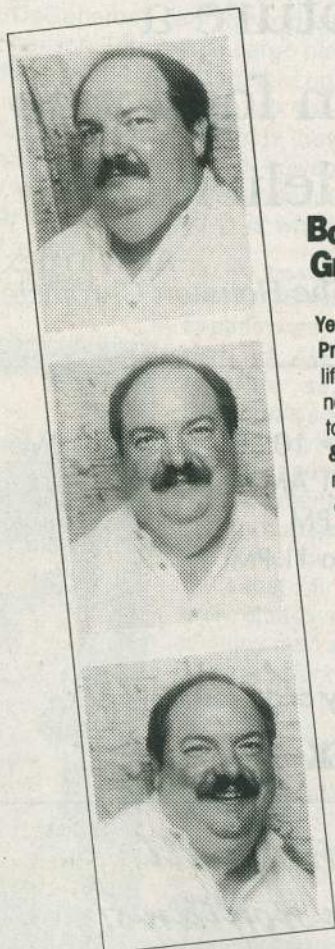
Mahlon Banda Copy Cat

Maybe I'm having brunch in bed. **Pottery Barn or Home Depot?** Home Depot. That one's an easy one. **Grand Being Marshal?** It's wonderful. Sometimes I feel like there are a lot of other people who deserve the honor as much as me. *Bob Bouton (with Jackie Dova) is this year's Pride Grand Marshal.*



OutSmart: You've got a great name. Were you named after actress Alexis Smith?

Alexis Arquette: [Laughs] No, my mother's side of the family is Russian. I was named after the last emperor-to-be of Russia, but he didn't really make it, because they were all killed off. Well, let's hope that doesn't happen to you.

[Laughs] Yeah.

So what was the first film you ever made?

The first thing I ever did was *Down and Out in Beverly Hills*. I played the friend of the son, at the end of the film.

Was *I Think I Do* enjoyable to make, or was it hard work?

It was great and a lot of fun. It was hard because we had a tight budget—independents are always a stretch.

Do you fluctuate between the two—commercial and independent?

Yeah. I usually do them for the same reason—because I like the script. But it's a lot easier when the budget is bigger, because of the perks. But sometimes you work harder on the lower budgets because you really want them to work.

When I interviewed your brother David, I asked him about you, but I was cautious. I said, "I don't know that your brother Alexis is out, but I've heard that he's gay. If he is, are you cool with that?" He said, "Totally. Alexis is a complete individual, and his whole life is an open book. A little while ago, I met his girlfriend . . . and they're talking about buying inflatable furniture together. Lex is a free spirit and the most creative person I've ever met. I talked to him about it once, and he said, "You know, the only people I tell my sexuality to is if they wanna fuck me." [Both laugh] Is that what you said?

Yeah, my usual pat answer.

Well, if I said I wanted to "do it" to you, would you tell me your sexuality?

[Laughs] Well, I only know you from over the phone.

Well, but still . . .

You can understand that response, right?

Oh, yeah.

There's no reason to discuss it really, unless you're gonna [pause] do it.

[Laughs] Right, and I guess we're not. Okay, then, if a loaded gun was pointed to your head, would you label yourself a bisexual?

Um, oh God, that's even worse than gay.

Well, do you think that bisexuality even exists?

I think it's a lot more common than gay, quite frankly. Not active, it's probably not self-aware bisexuality.

But it just seems . . .

You've got the most options.

Yeah, when you meet somebody, it doesn't matter what sex they are. Bisexuality seems so normal.

In a better world . . .

Yeah, in a perfect world, so . . .

Well, I'm not gender specific when it comes to desire. I have an affinity for the gay community because so much of the humor that I think is funny is from the gay community—it has a gay aesthetic in it.

Do you believe in monogamy?



as one of her male characters, Rick, on Murphy Brown]

M.P.: You probably never thought that when you were doing *The Search for Signs of Intelligent Life in the Universe* that you would go and do Rick on a national sitcom like that.

L.T.: No, I didn't. Actually, I did Rick in *Appearing Nitely*. He was a prototype for that kind of fellow.

M.P.: Does Rick have chest hair?

L.T.: Actually you couldn't see it, but I stuck a little hair coming out the top of his T-shirt, but you couldn't really see it. He was sort of bastardized. They got the idea to do it a little late, and then you only have a couple of days to put it together. And I actually used Tommy Velour's hair, and I combed it differently.

Blase DiStefano: Guys dress up in drag all the time. I wondered what it's like for you to dress up and have a hairy chest, 'cause Tommy Velour had a hairy chest, right?

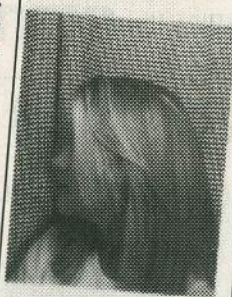

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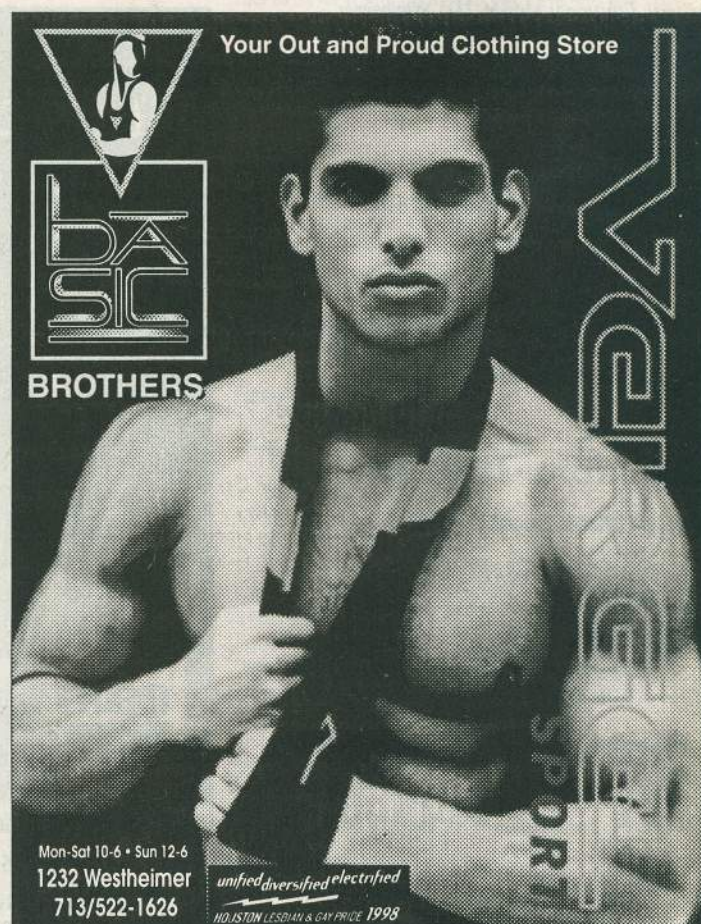

Nature Vs Nurture

Genes aren't everything! From a "born-that-way" advocate like myself, that may seem like a surprising admission, but it's true: for most aspects of our psychological makeup, including our sexual orientation, genes are no more than about half the reason why we end up the way we do. So what else is involved?

One possible factor that's been looked at is birth order. MIT psychologist Frank Sulloway, who created quite a stir with his 1996 book *Born To Rebel*, believes that early- and late-born children develop in fundamentally different ways, because they are exposed to different family dynamics. Early-born children, he says, tend to be ambitious defenders of the status quo, while late-born children have to carve out their own niche, often developing an unorthodox or creative personality in the process.

If Sulloway is right, one might expect gay people to be later-born, for homosexuality is certainly unorthodox, at least in our society, and gay people are often credited with being unusually creative. The question of gay people's birth order had been studied extensively by Ray Blanchard and Tony Bogaert at the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry in Toronto. From their reviews of previous scientific literature, as well as from a number of studies they have carried out themselves, they conclude that there is indeed a connection between birth order and sexual orientation, but their interpretation of this finding is quite different from what one might expect.

Their basic finding is that, in a large number of studies, gay men are on average slightly later-born than straight men. Male-to-female transsexuals, as well as gender-nonconformist boys (who will probably become gay men), are even more likely to be late-born. Lesbians, on the other hand, have the same average birth-order position as heterosexual women.

Looking more carefully at the data for gay men, Blanchard and Bogaert observed that their relatively late birth order was due to an excess of older brothers, rather than older sisters. In fact, for every older brother a boy has, his chances of becoming gay are increased by about 33 percent. But since the prevalence of male homosexuality is only about 4 percent, a boy would have to have at least 11 older brothers before he had even a 50:50 chance of becoming gay. So the birth-order effect is really quite a weak one.

Sulloway himself has noted the connection between birth order and male sexual orientation. In his book, he suggests that later-born boys are freer to experiment sexually, and that this may lead them to experience homosexual attractions that their older brothers never discover.

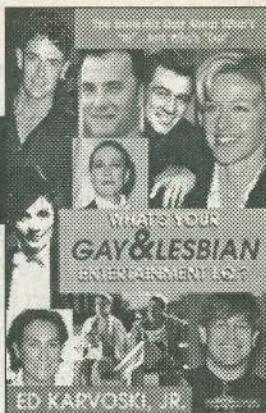

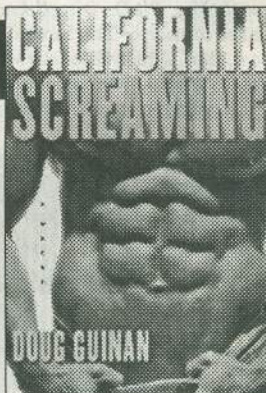
What's Your Gay & Lesbian Entertainment I.Q.? by Ed Karvoski Jr.



Who made her film debut by playing a lesbian in *The Group* (1966)? Who appeared on the cover of the first issue of *Entertainment Weekly* in February of 1990? Who said, "Being a man one day and a woman the next is not an easy thing to do"?

Who said, "I like them all—men I mean. And a few chicks now and then"? Don't panic—to answer these questions in *What's Your Gay & Lesbian Entertainment I.Q.?*, you're at least given choices in order to make an educated guess. The 569 queer questions are divided into 20 appropriate categories, including "A Kiss Is Just a Kiss" (onscreen kisses between same-sex stars); "Musical Notes" (gays in music); "Speaking Out" (quotes from celebrities); and "TV Drama Queens" (playing gay on TV). Of the 20 sections, four are inexplicable entries (thankfully, they're short): "Bar Hopping" expects you to match the bars with the film in which the bar appears; "Channel Surfing" wants you to identify the network on which TV shows aired; "Places" hopes you'll know the birthplace of actors/actresses; and "A Very Good Year" thinks you might actually possess the knowledge of the year of anything gay-related, like the model year of Corky's Chevy truck in the film *Bound* (if you know that answer, you've got way too much time on your hands). Nevertheless, it's fun and informative. The rating scale: The Victor/Victoria Victory Award (400 or more correct answers); The Ellen DeGeneres "Yep, I'm Gay" Award (300-399 correct answers); The Rupert Everett "Best Friend" Award (200-299 correct answers); The Mariel Hemingway *Personal Best* (But No Cigar) Award (100-199 correct answers); and The Bad Drag Show Award (0-99 correct answers). California Screaming by Doug Guinan



Kevin Malloy, an off-and-on fashion photographer and a ridiculously gorgeous hunk, is picked up by wealthy record mogul Brad Sherwood, a thinly disguised David Geffen. The improbable pair initiate a relationship which on the surface appears to be based on money and looks—Brad's money and Kevin's looks. Beneath their jaded exteriors, however, both are yearning for more, as are the other characters who inhabit *California Screaming*, a few of whom include: Leon Delvalle, Kevin's roommate, who dreams of being a set designer on a soap; Shane Dunne—Kevin and Leon's next-door neighbor—a flight attendant; and Rob Erikson, an ex ice-skating star and Brad's longtime friend. *Screaming* is, well, *screaming* with stereotypes. (Italics for emphasis, though easily overused, in this book warrant them!) This book has got the gym, the sex, the narcissism, but author Doug Guinan—who calls his debut work "a book proudly without any redeeming social value whatsoever"—has pulled off what seems almost impossible: an interesting, funny, sexy, touching fictional story about stereotypical gay men. (Simon & Schuster, \$23)
