

Houston is queer. This I always knew growing up, but when I thought of Montrose and Pride, gay boys tended to take up the picture. When I recently moved back, I wanted to know more of the queer history, especially the stories of women and gender non-conforming people.

As there are so few lesbian bars left today, I became interested in those from Houston's past. I like to imagine what they might have been like, the purposes they served, the yearnings that created them, and the people who went there. I found an incredible wealth of information online in the JD Doyle Archives (see end of book for more info). This included bar ads, LGBTQ publications (local, Texan, and national), and research gathered by JD Doyle from friends and community members.

Bars and clubs served as vital meeting places for queers who may have otherwise been isolated. And the South has always had its own flavor of queer hospitality. From 1975-2013, *This Week In Texas* was a weekly printed booklet sharing news, events, "cruise camera" photos, starscopes, and notably: a guide and map to the gay bars and businesses in major Texas cities. In that spirit I am compiling this incomplete list of historic lesbian bars in Houston from the 1960s-2000s. The pages following the map serve as present-day engagements with the archive through collage, drawing, and writing.

For me, this zine is the beginning of meeting queer Houston again for the first time...so let's get acquainted.



Yhat a glorious way to spend a well earned, well deserved day off. Wish all our customers and readers of the Nuntius were here to enjoy all this.


I had not meant to deviate from the original subject, but nostalgia got the best of me.
