Moreno dead at scene when truck leaves rural highway, flips end-over-end; 2 colleagues injured

The state's GLBT political leaders joined Democrats and Texas lawmakers in mourning the death of Representative loe Moreno, a Democrat of Houston

Moreno, 40, died early on May 6 in a one-vehicle accident in LaGrange. Representative Rafael Anchia, a Dallas Democrat, and Monica Pinon, chief of staff for Representative Joe Pickett of El Paso, were riding with Moreno and were injured in the crash. The three were returning to Austin from a Dallas Mayericks-Houston Rockets NBA playoff game in Houston

was diriving his 2004 pickup truck, apparently veered off a rural highway then overcorrected in an attempt to regain the pavement. The truck went into a ditch, flipping end-over-end several times, they said. Results from toxicology tests, stadard in all one-vehicle accidents, will be released when they become available.

Moreno died at the scene. Pinon suffered two broken ankles and a crushed hand. She was taken to an Austin hospital where she underwent surgery. Anchia was treated for an ankle injury and released.

"Joe Moreno was a great friend to our community," said Randall Ellis, executive director of Lesbian/Gay Rigths Lobby of Texas. "He always did the right thing. He was not only always a solid vote for us, he was also a solid worker on our

Surprises in Dallas municipal elections

Marcum outspent nearest foe 2-1 but loses; voters say no to strong mayor

The fat cat in Dallas's District 14 council race emerged as a wet kitty at the polls Saturday.

Candy Marcum, the former Human Rights Campaign board co-chair who outspent her nearest competitor by a 2to-1 ratio, came in third in the Oak Lawn-East Dallas district

Marcum, widely believed to be the front-runner in the contest, will sit out the runoff on June 4, which will feature East Dallas lawyer Angela Hunt, who

DALLAS took 41 percent of the vote, and portfolio manager Kathy Ingle, who received

Accountant P.D. Sterling, a second gay candidate in the four-way race, got 2.4 percent.

31 percent.

Having a strong, popular incumbent in your corner may be a more valuable resource than many Marcum supporters would like to admit. Four-term District 14 representative Veletta Forsythe Lill had endorsed Hunt at an early juncture.

Marcum said she believed she ran a strong campaign.

"We held our own," she said. "I thought I was a pretty good candidate. It was just a surprise."

Monica Greene, a transgender

restaurant owner seeking the District 2 seat, won about 40 percent of the vote and faces a runoff with top finisher Pauline Medrano, who captured 45 percent. District 2 lies generally to the west of District 14 And like District 14's Lill, the Duistrict 2 incumbent, John Loza, has reached his maximum number of terms and was forced off the council.

Incumbent Ed Oakley, a construction contractor who represents District 3 in North Oak Cliff, cruised to victory, receiving 74 percent of the vote over former Dallas city employee Khaleef Hasan.

The Dallas "strong mayor" proposal, a ballot measure listed as Proposition 1, failed by a large margin, surprising both

supporters and opponents. When all the votes were counted, 62 percent were opposed to the plan to eliminate the post of city manager and transfer most of the position's powers to the mayor. Only 38 percent favored the plan in a contest that pundits one week ago said was too close

In the Dallas Independent School District election held concurrently with the municipal election, Irby Foster, a gay candidate for a seat on the board of trustees, came in last in his four-way

He promises to run again in the next election.

Anti-HIV compound to see largest trial yet

Experimental protease drug shows promise in Phase I. II trials

Keeping up with a killer virus that constantly mutates is a challenging task. But Tibotec, a pharmaceutical and research company in Belgium owned by industry giant Johnson & Johnson, is testing a new protease inhibitor carrying

HOUSTON the experimental designation TMC-114 that so far has shown excellent

According to Dr. Ben Barnett of the University of Texas Medical School in Houston, TMC-114 was found to reduce the viral load to undetectable levels in 47 percent of patients when used without other drugs during a 24-week peri-

When taken in concert with the

fusion inhibitor T-20 which blocks HIV from fusing with a host cell, the drug helped reduce the viral load to almost zero in 67 percent of patients in the trial.

Dr. Barnett, an infectious disease specialist who is on staff at the medical school, said TMC-114 was designed to block the virus's protease enzyme, which helps in breaking down proteins into amino acids and peptide particles.

The 300 volunteers participating in the TMC-114 trial all had to show laboratory evidence that they harbored a mutated form of HIV. They also had to be treatment "experienced," or have taken at least two protease inhibitors as part of their previous therapy.

Existing protease inhibitors have proven to be less effective over time as the virus mutates. But the early success of TMC-114 may provide a longer-lasting line of defense for people with

Dr. Barnett presented the trial's findings Tuesday night at Houston's Center For AIDS, a nonprofit agency specializ-Continued, Next Page

ing in treatments and advocacy for HIV positive and AIDS patients.

Thomas Gegeny, executive director of the Center For AIDS, said the early news of the drug's success is definitely cause for hope for patients who have struggled with medications that stop working

"The whole idea of resistance is really important," Gegeny said.

Dr. Barnett said that resistance seems to develop with every drug used against HIV.

"Resistance seems to develop with every drug used against HIV. It's pure Darwinism in that sense."

"It's pure Darwinism in that sense," he said. "But the mutation that the virus undergoes may actually weaken the virus. It just mutates to make something different, and not all mutations are going to survive or be as efficient at killing T-cells."

Gegeny said that he believes TMC-114,

intended as a treatment for AIDS patients who have a mutated form of HIV, may be available to the public by 2008.

Still, Dr. Barnett said that he is concerned that the country is failing miserably in preventing the spread of HIV. "It's hard to change human sexual behavior, just like it's hard to stop smoking or stop driving without a seat belt," he said.

Gegeny has similar concerns for the nation's state of HIV treatment. "At one time, we were the model for how to treat HIV. We're losing that status."

He also said that cuts in federal funding for HIV education and treatment are "creating a public health hazard."

Phase I and Phase II of the trials, which showed that the drug is safe and identified its most effective dose, are completed. Phase III. a 48-to-52-week test period to gather more dosage informaiton from a larger group of volunteers, is set to begin this summer.

Lesbian bar feels TV station's sting

Club Rainbow shuts doors after Channel 2 probes underage drinking

Club Rainbow, a Montrose bar that catered to lesbians, has closed its doors on the heels of an undercover investigation by a Houston television station.

According to a story by Channel 2, Houston's NBC affiliate, the bar sold beer after 2 a.m. in violation of state law. Also, the report said that minors were "embracing" in the parking lot or in parked vehicles on the premises and urinating within a few feet of the club's front doors.

The Channel 2 investigation was prompted when police apparently failed to respond to neighbor's complaints about underage drinking and brawls in the parking lot.

By the time the story aired last week, the club had locked its doors and posted a sign saying it was relocating. No forwarding address was given on the sign.

Representatives of Club Rainbow did not return three phone calls this week seeking comment

Lieutenant Robert Manzo, a spokesman for the Houston Police Department, said he could not comment on any ongoing criminal investigation.

But according to Carolyn Beck, a spokeswoman with the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, Club Rainbow has been cited seven times since April 2004 for violations that include possession of alcoholic beverages unfit for consumption and failure to post

Lieutenant Harlan Hudgins with the Houston office of the alcoholic beverage commission said that no complaints about the bar have been received by the agency since March 2005. Hudgins also said that if the police find a bar to be in violation of state regulations, they typically forward a report of the findings to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage

A season of rejoicing

Just 10 years ago, the goal of legalizing marriage for two men or for two women was remote. Surveys of gay men and lesbians placed marriage rights well down on their list of legislative priorities. For that matter, family rights in general were not widely discussed back then. The gay issues of choice in the mid-'90s were AIDS and sexual orientation discrimination.

But one particular group of GLBT activists — civil rights lawyers — were paying very close attention. In 1993, the Hawaii Supreme Court had delivered a shocking opinion, sending a marriage equality case back down to a trial court with instructions that virtually guaranteed a victory for the plaintiff couples.

Lawyers on all sides understood at once the implications, and began research on the impact of making marriage available to gay and lesbian couples in one state. Would

riages? Would the federal government? How many couples would flock to Hawaii to be wed? How would that affect the state's economy? How would America react?

Thus began a strange three-year period. While advocates on both sides prepared for

The first anniversaries of gay couples married on American soil are coming up in Massachusetts this week. The sky hasn't fallen, and support among the state's voters for extending marriage to gay and lesbian couples is at an all-time high. It's difficult to believe the push for gay marriage began just 14 years ago in Hawaii.

what appeared to be the inevitable arrival of gay marriage, the vast majority of the country had no inkling that same-sex marriage was approaching like a loaded freight train. Even the GLBT community was largely clueless, although as articles began appearing in the gay press a buzz began to grow.

In Hawaii, the trial date was repeatedly delayed, and state lawmakers deliberated over what to do. A commission was appointed to study the needs of same-sex couples. A year went by, and then another. At Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, Marriage Project director Evan Wolfson had joined the Hawaii lawsuit as co-counsel. For Wolfson, the delays were not unwelcome, buying the community some time to begin the process of educating the country, a process that feels today as if it has only barely begun.

By the presidential election summer of 1996, America was waking up to the pending marriage breakthrough. Congress had certainly opened its eyes. With the Hawaii trial scheduled that fall, Congress drafted and passed a law that allowed each state to set its own marriage policy.

Implicit in the law, termed the Defense of Marriage Act, was the right of each state to ignore a same-sex marriage contracted elsewhere, despite clear instructions to the contrary in the federal Constitution. Since the Constitution mandates that each state extend "full faith and credit" to the "public acts, records and judicial proceedings" of the rister states, there was a strong argument that could be made that the Defense of Marriage Act was unconstitutional.

But that concern was set aside in the heat of presidential politics. Then, for all its promise, the Hawaii marriage train derailed before any same-sex marriages could take place. Although same-sex couples won their case in Honolulu trial court in December of

WHAT'S HAPPENING ...

IN CANADA?

Over the last two years, provincial and territorial courts have legalized marriage for gay and lesbian couples in all but three provinces and one territory. Roughly four in five Canadians now live in a part of the country where same-sex couples may marry. In response, the governing Liberal Party has pledged to support a bill already introduced in Parliament to make marriage equality the law of the land. But the leadership has delayed bringing the bill to the floor, and now the party may be losing its grasp on power thanks to an unrelated kickback scandal.

If new elections are called, Conservatives would likely take over the government, and the marriage bill would be removed from the table. Nonetheless, marriage would remain legal in most parts of Canada by court order. A confidence vote in Parliament is expected soon.

IN EUROPE?

Same-sex marriage has been extended to gay and lesbian couples in the Netherlands and Belgium. Spain will apparently be next, with a vote in the upper house of the Spanish Cortes, or parliament, expected later this year. The Cortes authorized marriage rights for gay and lesbian couples last month, with the encouragement of Prime Minister Jose Luis Rodriguez Zapatero. Sweden is considering whether to extend the institution of marriage to same-sex couples. France offers a civil union status, but most politicians there seem opposed to same-sex marriage. And last year, the United Kingdom passed the Civil Partnership Act, providing a range of new rights to gay families starting later this vear. Other formal partnership arrangements are available in Germany, Luxembourg, Switzerland, Poland, Andorra, and Iceland.

IN NEBRASKA?

Nebraska passed a constitutional amendment against same-sex marriage back in 2000, long before the idea caught fire. Two years ago, Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund and the ACLU filed a federal lawsuit against the state on behalf of plaintiffs who contend the amendment is unconstitutional. Nebraska has outlawed not just same-sex marriage, but also civil unions, domestic partnerships, and "other similar same-sex relationships." The restrictions are so severe that the state attorney general has indicated that the Legislature would violate the Constitution if it passed a measure to allow surviving partners to make burial arrangements.

The advocates won the first round, when the court refused to dismiss the case. The case was argued last year and a decision is pending. If the amendment is struck down, expect the state to appeal. The Nebraska suit is highly significant today, when state after state is considering constitutional language that goes far beyond "defining marriage," and would seem to prempt a host of legal ties between gay and lesbian couples.

1996, that ruling was suspended pending a final appeal to the state's Supreme Court. For two years, the high court took no action, giving the citizens of Hawaii the time to amend their constitution to explicitly ban gay marriage. The trial court ruling was then dismissed as moot.

By that time, however, the marriage cat was out of the bag. Taking their cue from the federal Defense of Marriage Act, state after state passed legislation making clear that marriage for gay men and women was against their public policy. The window of opportunity in Hawaii had closed, but a case was pending in Vermont, and same-sex marriage had evolved from a joke into a serious subject of national debate. The issue of marriage, in turn, was central to a rising constellation of other GLBT family matters, from second-parent adoption to de facto parents, to sperm donor rights and more.

In late 1999, Vermont's high court issued an ambiguous decision, ruling that same-sex couples must be treated equally, but allowing the legislature to figure out the means to reach this equal status. After months of haggling, civil unions were the result, an institution that carried all the rights and benefits of marriage within the state's power to convey. Many gay activists were frustrated by the half measure, but many others considered civil unions a major step forward.

In 2001, marriage lawsuits were filed in Massachusetts (by the Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders) and New Jersey (by Lambda Legal), two states carefully chosen for favorable courts and liberal social policies. In the Netherlands, where a parallel civil union status had been available, gay and lesbian couples were given the full right to marry that year.

Meanwhile, with every new legislative session, another handful of states formally expressed hostility towards gay marriage through so-called "defense of marriage" statutes. In 2000, Nevada and Nebraska went further, voting to amend their constitutions to block gay marriage rights, as Hawaii and Alaska had done in 1998. Two years later, the Nevada ratification process

was completed when the electorate again voted in favor of the amendment, as required by state law. And by mid-2003, the stage was set for what was to become an explosion of sorts.

Beginning that June, the provincial courts in Canada started opening the gates of marriage based on equality principles similar to those in American law. Here at home, the United States Supreme Court issued a strong gay rights ruling, reversing their own 1986 decision that had allowed states to outlaw consensual, private sex between gay and lesbian pairs. With that precedent obliterated, future American courts could negotiate, if they so desired, a clear path towards extending marriage to gay and lesbian couples.

One American court in particular was considering the status of gay and lesbian couples throughout that summer and fall. The Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court had taken fast track review of the Bay

State's two-year-old lawsuit, and was expected to rule within a few months. At last, in November, the justices issued the opinion that GLBT lawyers had been waiting for a decade to read. The ruling, ordering the state to begin issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples within six months, was more a relief than a surprise to those involved in the fight for marriage equality. But opponents let loose a barrage of objections, framing the court's decision as the whim of a 4-3 liberal majority with nary a reference to constitutional law.

If there was anyone left in the United States that still thought same-sex marriage was a joke or a pipe dream, the early months of 2004 cleared up all misconceptions. In the city and county of San Francisco, over 4,000 couples received marriage licenses under the auspices of newly elected Mayor Gavin Newsom, who issued the first renegade certificate to the city's grand dames, Phyllis Lyon and Del Martin, partners of half a century. Local officials followed his lead in Multnomah County. Oregon, where three thousand marriages were authorized in the Portland area in February and March. The youthful mayor of New Paltz, New York, conducted two dozen ceremonies before a judge ordered him to stop. Although those marriages lacked licenses, state law was vague about whether they might be legal nonetheless.

It's no coincidence that new marriage lawsuits were filed in the three states where civil disobedience was most dramatic. Cases in California, Oregon, New York as well as Washington, have outpaced the older litigation now under review by a New Jersey appellate court. Lower court rulings were delivered in record time in all four states, as judges took months rather than years to deliver opinions. In the last year, no less than five courts have ruled in favor of samesex couples, including two courts in Washington, where the ACLU and Lambda Legal filed separate suits.

In Oregon, much like in Hawaii six years earlier, the favorable lower court ruling was rendered moot by voters who amended their constitution last November. But all eyes are now focused on the Washington Supreme Court, where justices heard arguments in early March and where

a decision could be issued as soon as this summer. As for New York and California, these cases will go through appellate courts before arriving at their final destination before their respective justices. A suit in Connecticut is just getting started, and pockets of marriage litigation are still outstanding elsewhere in the country.

No one can predict exactly what route will eventually bring the country to marriage equality, but as the century came to an end, two thirds of Americans told pollsters that they expect us to arrive at that destination one way or another. Nor can anyone say how long the road ahead may be, or how rugged and contentious. But majorities expect us to arrive at that destination one way or another. "The classic American pattern is that civil rights advances come in patchwork," Evan Wolfson, who now runs the organization Freedom to Marry, told Planet Out earlier this year. "History tells us that in the early stages of a civil rights struggle such as ours, opponents will have some successes








Spokane mayor takes leave amid allegations

He's accused of using Internet sites to lure young men in scandal that continues to grow

The conservative mayor of Spokane, Washington, a Republican with a record of opposition to gay rights, was accused last Thursday of molesting boys in the late 1970s. school senior. After the news began to break, two other gay men came forward with stories of their own. Ryan Oelrich, 24, said he was appointed to the Spokane Human Rights Commission a year ago, but eventually quit due to the constant sexual pressure from the mayor. Once, Oelrich said, West offered him \$300 to swim naked in a pool. Oelrich described other antics as "totally inappropriate."

Another 24-year-old, who remained anonymous, said West offered him a post as

The accusations were leveled by the *Spokane Spokesman-Review*. The newspaper said the information it published this week capped a more than two-year investigation.

Mayor James E. West was also caught approaching young men on Gay.com and offering jobs and perks.

The revelations emerged from an investigation by the *Spokame Spokesman-Review*, which has been looking into the mayor's activities for several years. West has denied taking part in molestations, and has suggested that his forays on the Internet are his own personal business. On Monday, he announced he would take a couple of weeks leave of absence, in order to consider how best to refute the "false accusations leveled against me."

On Tuesday, the FBI confirmed that they have opened a preliminary investigation into possible public corruption, based on the allegations that West used the trappings of his office to solicit the attentions of young men.

During a sting operation by the Spokesman-Review, West offered an internship, sports tickets, and sports memorabilia to a man posing online as an 18-year-old high head of Spokane's human resources department. "When I told him I wasn't qualified for that job," the man said, "he told me I would be qualified if I was a friend of the mayor's."

The 54-year-old mayor was elected in November, 2003, after a long career in the state legislature, where he rose to the powerful position of senate majority leader. In 1990, West melodramatically proposed marriage from the floor of the senate to a Spokane woman, Ginger Marshall, who was visiting the Legislature that day.

West, who was campaigning for re-election, had been the object of gay rumors. According to the *Spokesman-Review*, his public demonstration of heterosexuality won him a standing ovation, as well as international headlines, but the marriage ended in divorce five years later.

Throughout his political career, West took positions hostile to the GLBT community, according to local press reports. In 1986,



West and 14 GOP colleagues introduced a bill to bar gay men and women from teaching in schools or working in day care centers. The same bill, which did not pass, also called for identifying and firing gay state employees. Later that year, West voted against state funded AIDS education pamphlets, characterizing the safe sex content as "something people go buy at dirty bookstores." He opposed gay rights bills at every juncture. In 1990, West advocated for a ban on consensual sex and sexual contact between teenagers. In 1998, he voted for the state Defense of Marriage Act, and as majority leader in 2003, he personally killed the gay rights bill that session.

As the incoming mayor of Spokane, he opposed offering domestic partner benefits to city staff, although the program passed the city council by a veto proof 5-2 vote.

But West's public positions contrasted with his personal views. In the course of its investigation, the Spokesman-Review interviewed an 18-year-old who went out on a date with West last New Year's Eve. and had consensual sex with the mayor. The teenager, who had saved some of his e-mail correspondence, told West that he would not be mayor if his right-wing supporters "knew you like to mess around with guys." West allegedly responded: "Two consenting adults must have the ability to protect their privacy or else the damn sex Nazis will be telling everyone what

By far the darkest part of the story — and the most remote in time - involves the accusations of child molesting over two decades ago. West was friends with a man named David Hahn at the time. Hahn, a known pedophile, committed suicide in 1981. Both West and Hahn were sheriff's deputies, and both men worked with young boys through Boy Scouts and through an operation called the Morning Star Boys Ranch.

West resigned Friday from the board of Morning Star Boys Ranch, and stepped down Thursday from the executive board of the Boy Scout's Inland Northwest Council.

According to two men, now in their thirties, both West and Hahn fondled them and sodomized them on repeated occasions when they were boys. Robert Galliher, 36, is part of a lawsuit attempting to hold Spokane County liable for the actions of David Hahn. In addition to the abuse he suffered from Hahn, Galliher also points the finger at West, who he says he met at Hahn's apartment in the late 1970s. Galliher says West molested him several times up until August of 1981, when Hahn killed himself. Galliher was a witness to the suicide.

Michael Grant, in turn, says he was seven or eight when Hahn picked him up in a patrol car and sexually abused him. At some point, Hahn took him to his apartment and West joined them. "They just molested me. Sodomized me," Grant told reporters. "Not at the same time, just like took turns, They took me into the bathroom and one came in, then the other." Another time, Grant says, West forced sex on him during a Scout trip at Camp Cowles.

In a statement Tuesday, West said he hoped "people will reserve judgment on me until the newspaper is done persecuting me and allow me to have the fair opportunity to respond to each of the allegations in due time." He has also made an effort to portray himself as an embattled gay man, in the style

of former New Jersey Governor Jim McGreevey. The pose has not impressed Matt Foreman, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, who said West "deserves nothing but scorn," and "needs to resign immediately." Pedophilic behavior, said Foreman "has nothing to do with sexual orientation."

Finally, in one last bizarre detail, Spokane City Council member Cherie Rodgers revealed that she had an odd conversation with the mayor on Saturday, when West confided that he would often masturbate in his office while chatting online. West's city hall computer has been impounded, and Rodgers has called for West to resign.



No wonder my Sapphic sisters and I have so little difficulty in luring girls off the straight and narrow and into our perverse clutches. One word: Givenchy.





Discrimination is Immoral. Enough Said.

We're well into the 'blame the victim' game on same-sex marriage

I'M HEARING BOTH gay and straight people say that the long string of losses we've faced at the polls around marriage equality are really our own fault; our community pushed too hard and too fast, they argue. The

prominent theme being generated is that we have failed to "educate" the public about who we really are and get beyond the stereotypes of leather people, butch dykes, circuit boys and drag queens - and that it is now our obligation to reintroduce ourselves to the American people. I also repeatedly hear that it's up to us to reframe the terms of the debate away from "moral values" to simpler concepts, such as fairness, which polls indicate resonate most with the public.

I disagree. This is nothing more than the blame-the-victim mentality afflicting our nation generally and the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender movement specifically.

Rather than reframing the debate away from moral values, we must embrace them. Or more precisely, the utter immorality of the escalating attacks against LGBT people. And, equally, the utter immorality in the failure of so many people of good will to stand with us. It is time for us to seize the moral high ground and state unambiguously that anti-gay discrimination in any form is immoral.

WEBSTER'S DEFINES DISCRIMINA-

TION as "unfair treatment of a person or group on the basis of prejudice." By any measure, LGBT people are targets of discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations. FBI statistics show that more people are being murdered because of their

sexual orientation than for any other biasrelated reason. Our young people are still routinely bullied in schools. The examples of injustices in the area of partner and family recognition are too many to list.

No thinking or feeling person can deny these realities, which, as always, fall hardest on LGBT people of color and those who are poor.

But, alarmingly, rather than seeing a groundswell of support for measures to com-

bat these injustices, the opposite is occurring. In Congress and in statehouses nationwide, it's rhetorical and legislative open season on LGBT people. For example, over the last nine months, anti-marriage state constitutional

amendments were put on the ballot in 14 states, 10 of which also prohibit the recognition of any form of relationship between people of the same gender. It's likely another 12 states will have similar measures on the ballot within 3 years.

Nothing like this has happened since the Constitution was ratified in 1791 — essentially a national referendum inviting the public to vote to deprive a small minority of Americans of rights the majority takes for granted

and sees as fundamental.

AND WHO'S BEEN THERE to fight these amendments? Basically us, the very minority under attack. Mainstream media and churches are largely silent to our opponents' lies. Most progressive organizations and political campaigns, meanwhile, steer clear. There have been sterling exceptions, but they have been few and far between.

Many people who see themselves as supporters of equal rights for all tolerate this because they believe prejudice on the basis of sexual orientation is profoundly different than that based on race or religion — that it comes

from an understandable disapproval of our behavior — not on some "immutable characteristic." Homosexual behavior, they feel, is "unnatural" (doesn't the Bible say so?). Pundits say there is an "ick" factor — that the thought of gay sex revolts non-gay people, and that this seemingly innate reaction

is proof there is something wrong with homosexuality.

This rationale is hardly unique to gay people. Scholars point to comparable "ick" sentiments about Irish immigrants in the 1880s, and describe how in preceding generations sexual ideology was used to strengthen control over slaves and to justify the taking of Native American lands, and that for centuries Jews were associated with disease and urban degeneration.

THERE IS NO JUSTIFICATION for antigay prejudice; the "justifications" for it are as unfounded as those used to support the second-class treatment of other minorities in past generations.

So, what needs to be done?

First, everyone must realize that when straight people say gay people should not have the freedom to marry, they are saying

we are not as good or deserving as they are. It's that simple, no matter how one attempts to sugarcoat it.

This is unacceptable. And it is immoral. Second, while we should talk to straight people honestly about our lives, we must flatly reject the notion that we are somehow to blame for all of this because we have not effectively communicated our "stories" to

others. Fundamentally, it is not our job to prove to others that we can be good neighbors, good parents, and that gee whiz, we're actually people too.

Third, equality will remain elusive if we keep relying on intellectualized arguments or by dryly cataloguing, for example, each of the 1,138 federal rights and responsibilities we are forced to forgo due to marriage inequality.

The other side goes for the gut; it's now our turn.

IN THIS VEIN, we must put others on the spot to stand up and fight for us. As the cascade of lies pours forth from the Anti-Gay Industry, morality demands that non-gay people speak out with the same vehemence as they would if it was another minority under attack. Ministers and rabbis must be challenged with the question, "Where is your voice?" Elected officials who meet with and attend events of the Anti-Gay Industry, must be met with the challenge, "How can you do that? How is that public service?"

The orchestrated campaign to deny us jobs, family recognition, children and housing is immoral. Silently bearing witness to this discrimination is immoral.

America is in the midst of another ugly chapter in its struggle with the forces of bigotry. People of good will can either rise up to speak for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Americans, or look back upon themselves 20 years from now with deserved shame.





The new Houston native Jenna Drey shares her chart topping dance sound with gay fans

fledged dance diva to call their own and her name is Jenna Drey. Sure, Drey's fellow Houstonians — the bootylicious Beyoncé and Brooke Valentine, whose *Chain Letter* is one of 2005's most eclectic albums - have chops. But Beyoncé and Valentine have a sound grounded in hip-hop beats and R&B grooves. Drey's music is pure, unfettered pop fun perfect for a shimmering night under the disco ball.

Drey's slinky breakout single, "Killin' Me," recently took up residence in the Top 10 of Billboard's Club Play chart, amid megawatt hits from Mariah Carey, Gwen Stefani and the Pussycat Dolls. The song weaves a hypnotic tale of lost love, anchored by Drey's confident, pleading delivery.

"Killin' Me" has pedigree. The song was remixed by Mike Rizzo, who has worked with Jewel and "the Deborahs" (Cox and Gibson), and was produced by the legendary Nile Rodgers, whose list of credits include Madonna, Diana Ross, David Bowie and Chic. (Drey's full-length album is scheduled to drop later this year.)

"I always knew I was a good singer," Drey says. "I never considered myself a great singer, and I had to work really hard at it. You can't sit around and wait for somebody else to tell you that you're worthy enough to go somewhere."

She'll be working it in front of a Saturdaynight crowd at South Beach nightclub in Houston this weekend.

Drey was born in Los Angeles, but she lived in Houston from the fourth grade until after graduating from St. Thomas Episcopal High School. In 1995, after a year at Houston Baptist University, Drey left for Boston, where the overachiever simultaneously attended Simmons College and the New England Conservatory of Music.

At Simmons College, she majored in nutrition but her minor in music composition was her passion.

"Let's put it this way - I was writing songs on my notebook in the middle of lectures," Drey says, from her home near Miami Beach

Songwriting has opened doors for the young singer, who still visits Houston regularly to see her family. Drey has won countless songwriting awards, including VH-1's Song of the Year contest, Her rocket-fueled track "Just Like That" was even used as a theme song at home games for the Boston Red Sox.

And it's all thanks to a little nudging from Mom, Margaret Teele, who also had a brief



run in the spotlight. (Teele graced the small screen in'60s classics like Gomer Pyle USMC. The Andy Griffith Show and Batman.)

"My mom was telling me, 'You need to write your own songs.' That became an outlet, because I really wanted to sing. I enjoyed it enough to where I wanted to get better at it," Drey says.

Inspiration also came — and still comes — from the work of the Bee Gees, ABBA and Madonna, defining pop artists who wrote much of their own music. Drey also lists Aussie idols Olivia Newton-John and Kylie Minogue as favorites. She's a woman after a gay man's heart.

Drey embraces her burgeoning status as one of the many fabulous female singers lovingly embraced by the gay community: Kristine W, Amber, Deborah Cox, Cyndi Lauper. She's in grand company.

"Killin' Me" still has plenty of hands in the air and hips swiveling. Its equally solid

follow-up, "Why Should I Believe You," will likely follow suit, thanks to searing remixes from Rizzo, Valentin (Christina Aguilera) and Josh Harris (Britney Spears, the Killers). Drey is also slated to work with Rodgers again on an undetermined third single. The new track is scheduled to drop in late August, and Drey will debut it at South Beach.

"I love the idea of being in a gay club filled with a thousand good-looking men, all calling my name. There's nothing more exciting than that!" Drey says. "I think it's wonderful - and gay men, for whatever reason, are more perceptive to a certain kind of music, a certain kind of art. There's something about the beauty of emotion and melody that I find gay people tend to respond to better. That's the music that also turns me on."

Life is good for the Texas-bred diva. She's finalizing her full-length disc while the "Killin' Me" remix single and an early version of the album are now available on her Web site (JennaDrev.com). But she really can't wait to come back home.

"Hopefully, Mom is going to come to the show. Dad probably will, too. They haven't seen me perform these songs, and I think they will enjoy it. They know how hard I've been working at this," Drey says.

"The fact that [my music] is getting played and people can hear it, and just the whole struggle of how much you have to go through to get there, and to actually see it happen. It's kind of surreal. I'm grateful."
