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This summer she rolls out as the headlining act for the traditionally male-dominated *Van's Warped Tour*, before hitting the road again to promote her latest release, *Sinner*. Considering she hasn't

released a new album since 1997's **Fetish**, this one has been highly anticipated. It's also been well worth the wait.

Many who have previewed the new disc agree that it hearkens back to Joan's roots, combining a tight pop smartness with that underlying grittiness which has always defined her music. "To me, it sounds like pretty traditional *Joan Jett And The Blackhearts* music," she says. "There was no real conscious effort to make it one way or the other, it just kind of happened." That organic creative process is one of the very reasons Joan continues to have a strong following, gaining new fans every time she hits the road, doing what she does best.

"I think it's very interesting that people are commenting on this Warped Tour and saying 'wow, man, that's really intense. Are you going to be able to handle it?" she admits. "I don't get that. I've been doing live tours my whole life. This should be like falling off a log. I should knock on wood when I say that, 'cause I'll wake up a month from now and go, 'oh my god, what did I say?"

Her laughter is infectious, infused with genuine joy to be back where she belongs. The whisky tones of her speaking voice soften a little as she reflects on what it takes to "handle it." To have a career that spans decades, rather than months, especially in a male-dominated playground like rock 'n roll.


"I think you have to be yourself," she reveals. "You have to try anyway.
I'm always quite amazed at how people find it odd that I'm just trying to
live my life. Or the things that I do. I don't find them that weird or different. Just being a girl playing rock and roll, wearing leather
and sweatin', seems pretty normal to me, but
everybody else takes it as being
something very different. In a

way, I suppose it is,

because there just aren't a lot of girls out there doing it. I guess I just don't analyze the things that I do too much, I just do it. It's only through other people's reflections on what I do, that I'm able to look at it and try and think about how it relates to other people."

Obviously, normal is subjective, but that honesty about herself and what she does is part of





what has gained Joan such a diverse appeal. She was, after all, breaking down gender barriers long before the word *Queer* became hip "There are those of us out there that don't necessarily slip into these defined roles and aren't necessarily comfortable with rigid stereotypes," she says. "So, I think that really is what I'm trying to touch on. That people should be able to be who they want to be without being ridiculed or being perceived as being extreme in one form or another."

I posit the theory that this attitude is exactly what makes her a hero to so many people, from more than one generation. "That's really interesting," she says hesitantly. "I think it's great for people to let you know how much you've affected them, whether it's your music, or you, or something you've

done. I think that's really valid. It's an exchange of energy between people.

I do get a little uncomfortable when it gets too... when it puts me on a level that's different from everybody else, you know?

Because I want people to know, they can do what I do. They can do the same things. They can inspire people. It doesn't have to be as a musician or whatever, but everybody can follow their dreams. I'm not really doing anything special. I'm ist following my dream.


"I don't want to think that I've got something that other people don't. We all have it. That's really what you try to fire up in people, is to find their own passion and find that thing that they love. Even if they don't know what it is yet, to not lose that belief that they're going to find something to lock into and they're going to be who they're going to be. They're going to be powerful in their own right. I guess sometimes I get uncomfortable with the adulation. I think a lot of it is great, you want to hear it, but when it goes overboard, that's when it gets a bit uncomfortable."

Because for Joan Jett, the every day hero, the whole reason for doing what she does is creating a bond between herself and the legions of fans who relate to her

and her music. "To me, the whole magic of music and performing live, is those little moments when you connect with people," she says. "That's what it's about. You know, when you hear a song that just makes you feel so great and you don't why and you don't ever need to know why. It's just those moments when you look someone in the eye and there it is. It's heaven on earth. To me that's the real agic of it."

So, what is it that will set this latest release, Sinner, apart from the rest? Besides the honesty and ability to connect on a personal level? For many Joan's fans, it's







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









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The Gospel According To Gays

Spirit-pop duo **Jason & deMarco** are living proof that art imitates life, and that music can be inspired by the best that life has to offer.

In a recent interview, the couple - whose romantic relationship has endured a half-decade - picks up where their new album, Till the End of Time, leaves off, delving deeper into their lives as professional and personal partners.

Michael A. Knipp: I know several gay men and women who balk at the topic of religion. Because of its traditions, some feel that it has no place in gay culture. Considering that your music has religious undertones, is it hard to win over the homosexual secularists?

Jason: There have been so many people who have said they've heard of us, and even like our music, but they don't want to have to come to a church or pay for an event to see us. We totally understand this. A lot of people, particularly in the gay community, have been burnt by the church, or at least not welcomed. We feel it's no mistake that our first single is entitled, *Trying to Get to You*. We've been trying to get to our community for years now, and we've reached many, but we feel there are many more who can be exposed to us and our music.

MK: How much flak do you receive from anti-gay Christians?

deMarco: Fred Phelps has picketed a concert or two of ours before, but we've had some of the largest crowds at those shows come out and support us. We've joked and said that we wish he'd picket every show!

MK: You two have been dating for several years now. How do you keep the relationship fresh when you're with each other so much?

Jason: Great sex!

deMarco: We are total opposites. Where one is weak, the other is strong. I'm more grounded; Jason is more dreamy. We balance each other. It honestly surprises me that we still feel in love, considering we're together 24/7. I was a very independent person when Jason and I met. I never thought I would have been able to handle this type of life, but I love every minute of it. And when I don't, I am reminded of how many guys in our community aspire to having the kind of relationship that Jason and I have.

MK: How is your new album, *Till the End of Time*, different from your previous releases? Is your message still the same as when you started making records in 2001?

Jason: We definitely feel this new album is taking us to new places musically and artistically. This album focuses on the emotional landscapes of life - most of the songs written from personal experiences about the ups and downs we've faced in our relationships. We feel it's much edgier than our previous work and believe it's the best we've done yet. It's a new sound, but still very much Jason & deMarco because of the vocals.

MK: How much of your relationship together is on these tracks?

deMarco: It's very mixed. Jason tends to write more from personal experience, and I write more from my imagination. We obviously can relate to many of the songs personally.

Jason: I wrote a few of the songs about past relationships. I Found the Number is a true story of my finding out my ex was cheating on me. I literally found a number in his car and it said, "You're cute - give me a call," with a guy's name and phone number on it. I write songs that relate to where I am at the moment, usually emotionally.




POSTCARDS FROM THE EDGEY

Something requiring you to both sit and act like an adult, while time passes and you await food, as well as, perhaps, well, hair product. However, for those days when I've been working a long project that has captured every waking moment of my life for a good week or so, the last thing I want to do is have to think about what I want off a menu of choices that begins to look like the matrix code dripping down the menu and onto my shoes. When I'm tired and just want something that I know will be great and won't take that long, it's time to call Romano's.

Located on West Gray, it's central to Montrose, but still sorta hidden away in the shopping center, dwarfed by the mammoth Marshall's and the overwhelming FIT gym. But, while their space is small, their dedication to all foods of Italian origination is bigger than Tom DeLay's ego.


I was introduced to Romano's by a friend of mine a while back who, after yet another long project day, turned to me, squinted, lit a Newport, took a puff and then asked, with smoke slithering out his lips, "You wanna split a pie?" Well duh! Do your eyes work? I've got to eat to maintain my girlish figure, and dammit if pizza isn't the way to go!

most everyone else calls it, a cheese pizza. It was delicious. The recipe for the pizza dough has been handed down since forever, and given that the owner is from Italy,

the story of the recipe could easily have Sophia spouting out, "Picture it: Sicily, 1942..." Regardless, it's fantastic, because at Romano's they care that they make great food. The sauce is spicy without being dramatic, and they don't drown the pie in tomato, nor do they leave it (or you) rasping for a beverage. The large slices fold easily and combine with adult beverages smoothly. That time, the pizza was devoured in record time, leaving only the scratched and mangled remains of the box as a sign that our appetites had been conquered.

Most recently I ordered the chicken and garlic pizza. which comes slightly lighter on the sauce, with finely sliced bits of chicken meat tossed under the cheese and fresh slivers of garlic. I've never seen anything like this on a pizza before, but it seems that the garlic was sliced like you would almonds and then tossed onto the pie like pepperoni. With my pale skin and nocturnal tendencies, you'd think I was a vampire, but after that pizza I'll be lucky if I can ever get the garlic off my breath, let alone get bitten by a vampire. And while I do recommend that you have a way to get to a bucket of Scope relatively guickly after eating the pizza, I really would contemplate having another slice if you have any left, first, Perhaps order another pie.

Either way, Romano's is a great place, and while I've only Now, being that he's a New Yorker, we got a real pie, or as had the pizza's there for a meal, I've gotten to taste some of their other dishes - all of which are brilliant! Paison, go
