















OUT IN BOUNDS a summer with AYC





During the summer of 1990, Alliance Youth Corps was a life-impacting experience for many students. St. Paul Bible College students stretched the globe from the Philippines to Zaire. The fall AYC chapel held many surprises for the student body. The AYC'ers shared the strange and unusual experiences that they encountered in different cultures. In Argentina, Carletta Roche was left in the cold for an hour and a half waiting for her missionaries to pick her up at the bus station. Across the ocean in Spain, Gloria Herrmann was scrubbing toilets. In France, Valary Mullenix found herself compelled to toilet paper the missionary's trees after they had short-sheeted her bed. Several AYC'ers discovered the little viruses that were different in foreign countries.

time was spent in many countries on daily survival. At times the missionaries could be frustrated by the language and the lack of vocabulary as they began their ministry.

At times the AYC'ers took part in what seemed to be boring tasks such as painting walls and building pews. Although these tasks seemed trivial, they were a great help to the missionaries who did not have the time to spend completing these things. Other times were spent with the people talking to them about Christ, or distributing literature, or performing in church services. The interaction with people was encouraging for the AYC'ers.

AYC was life changing for some and a confirmation on God's call for overseas service for others. In any case, those who participated in this program would never be the same again.














Married Student Fellowship, a campus club designed and their families, also had several activities. These included: a welcome barbecue in the fall, a progressive

There was a memorial service in the SPBC chapel on Friday, January 11, for Dwayne. His father, Rev. George Jaderson gave the meditation.




There is many things that we will remember from the year. Each person had their own events that they will remember for the rest of their life. The whole nation, though, will remember the events that took place this year in the Middle East. We will remember August 2nd, the day when the leader of Iraqi, Saddam Hussein, lead his troops into Kuwait. In twelve hours Kuwait was his. We just stood there and wondered what to do. On August 4, the leaders in Washington D.C. felt that intervention was needed in the gulf to protect the rest of the world. The operation was called "Desert Shield" and in October it was realized that more troops were needed in the gulf. Phases two of the Desert Shield commenced. On December 21, 1990, President Bush commented after talking on the phone with world leaders that making peace will be likely, but only by war. The threat that Hussein would invade other countries too was great. Now there was many American troops as well as many from other countries troops were stationed in Saudi Arabia. The tension was great. The Iraqi leader had many hostages in Kuwait, many of them were Americans. Many things had to be taken into consideration before any decisions were made about going to war. President Bush gave the leader of Iraq the deadline of pulling out of Kuwait by January 15th. If he did not, Bush had no choice by to use force. The deadline

came and went with no movement on Husseins part. So with the thunder of jets and the lightning of missiles, Desert Shield exploded into Desert Storm.

The first fighter planes took off from the Drahan air base in Saudi Arabia. U.S. warships launched Tomahawk cruise missiles to land the first blows on Iraq. Baghdad telecommunications center were demolished. Desert Storm's target was all the command-and-control centers, airfields and Scud missile launchers they could hit.

It was not all one sided, the Iraqis fired back also. They launched Scud missiles that hit Tel Aviv and Harifa. The U.S. immediately dispatched Patriot antimissiles to Israel to protect Israel. The Patriot antimissiles intervened many of the Scud attacks. Only a few destroyed anything.

The casualties of the leader Hussein was great. His army and fighting power was decreasing. Yet for the U.S. casualties was kept very low. The pictures that were coming our was the gulf war was that of mile after mike of burned, smashed, shattered vehicles of every description littering the highway coming out of Kuwait City. Husseins army just left the vehicles there. Hussein had also ordered the oil drilling wells to be set on fire. In many of the places, the wells were spewing poisonous fumes that choked the air. There was also oil spilling into the Persian Gulf. The threat to the sea life made the



Hussein threats of using chemical warfare never came to life. One Scud missile did hit a barracks and killed many Americans, but even that didn't compare to the casualties of Hussein.

Finally the Iraqi leadership ordered a withdrawal and President Bush call a cease-fire. On February 27, President George Bush said that the war was over. The U.S. casualty list was short. The Pentagon recorded that 90 Americans were killed in action, 34 missing, 9 prisoners of war and an additional 63 noncombat deaths. The low casualty count came as a relief to many Americans who had fearfully anticipated a chemical attack or a long, grinding ground war. So the end of Desert Storm came to the end and it was the start of Desert Peace.

When the first American troops began arriving home from the gulf it touched off a nationwide celebration. The reuniting of many families were a event cause for much reioicing.

Some of our own SPBC students and faculty were a part of the support. Professor Dave Thompson was sent to Japan to replace a chaplain who was sent to Saudi Arabia. Another person sent for support help in the states was Darin Kelsey. We all

knew people who were involved in some way in the operation. American pride was very noticeable, American flags were always out and yellow ribbons were for the Desert Shield/Storm.

The war will always be remember, but the good thing about it is that it is over. We will always remember what happened and praise God that not many American lives were lost and that Kuwait is free.

Along with the memories of the war we will also have the memories of the other things that happened during the year. We can always see the hand of God touching our lives. It is great to know that HE IS IN CONTROL.


