At the heart of Europe, bordering Germany and Switzerland and running along the Rhine, Alsace inspires lovers of incredible journeys and the extraordinary. Original and intimate

Alsace has a strong sense of identity. 

Alsace is located in the east of France and at the centre of Europe. Bordered by the Rhine River, the region offers close proximity to Germany, Switzerland, Luxembourg, and Belgium. The departments of Haut-Rhin and Bas-Rhin merged on 1 January 2021 to form the European Collectivity of Alsace.

> Strasbourg, home to numerous European institutions including the European Parliament, is a regional hub brimming with attractions. All year round, visitors can explore the city's history, architecture, and UNESCO World Heritage sites: the cathedral, the Petite France historic centre, and the former German imperial district of Neustadt.



> Colmar, the capital of Alsace wines, enchants visitors with its beautiful historic centre. A typical Alsatian town, it invites visitors to discover its rich and well-preserved heritage including Bartholdi's Statue of Liberty and the Petite Venise district. The not-to-be-missed Unterlinden Museum houses a masterpiece of Rhenish Renaissance art — the Isenheim Altarpiece by Matthias Grünewald and Nicolas de Haguenau, two great masters of late Gothic art.





2. Alsace, land of remembrance



Alsace is a long-contested region, alternately held by France and Germany and shaped by a rich and tumultuous history. The region still today bears the marks of its past, offering a wealth of remembrance tourism experiences that convey universal values. The story of Alsace unfolds at remembrance sites, museums, battlefields, memorials, and military structures.

Exploring the region's history, from the Habsburgs to today, reveals the origins of a culture firmly rooted in European humanism.

Four periods to explore in Alsace:

- The Franco-Prussian War of 1870-1871
- World War I
- World War II
- Building peace with the emergence of an economic and political Europe

> Museum of the Battle of 6 August 1870 in Woerth

This museum focuses on the battle that took place on 6 August 1870. The French defeat here paved the way for the German coalition forces to advance toward the Vosges Mountains and on to Paris, ultimately leading to the annexation of Alsace and Lorraine by Germany.

1929-1940

Most of the items on display were found on the battlefield, offering visitors a deeper understanding of the events surrounding this decisive battle. The collection includes documents, weapons, uniforms, helmets, and tools, as well as a diorama featuring more than 4,000 pewter figurines recreating the cavalry charge of the battle.

> Fort Mutzig

Fort Mutzig is one of a kind in Europe. Construction on the military site began in 1893 on the orders of Emperor Wilhelm II to block the Alsace Plain from French offensives. In 1914, the fort covered 254 ha and housed 7,000 soldiers, making it the largest and most powerful fortification in Europe.

Today, the site is a symbol of peace and Franco-German reconciliation. Visitors can explore this concrete fortress along a 2-km itinerary through the engine room, dormitories, kitchen, infirmary, and trenches, as well as the firing posts offering stunning panoramic views of the Bruche Valley.

The fort is also a technological marvel:

- the first electrified site
- the first site with telephone lines
- an experimental site in concrete construction

A scene of intense battles throughout 1915, the summit of Hartmannswillerkopf was the primary site on the Vosges Front during World War I and the only mountain battlefield in France. The site features three key elements: a national monument, the battlefield, and a Franco-German war memorial.

Hartmannswillerkopf 14-18 commemorates the battles fought on the site and is one of four French national monuments of World War I. Designed by architect Robert Danis and sculptor Antoine Bourdelle, the monument consists of two sections: the Altar of the Homeland, which overlooks the necropolis, and the crypt, accessible by an 80-meter-long pathway designed to resemble a trench.

The battlefield, perched at an altitude of 956 m, is a remarkable open-air museum and recognised as a historical monument. 30,000 French and German soldiers perished here throughout the war, and the site still bears the marks of battle, with several shelters and kilometres of trenches that are remarkably well

An essential World War I remembrance site, the Franco-German Historial offers a comprehensive overview of the Great War while focusing on the history of Hartmannswillerkopf. Visitors can explore photographs, videos, interpretative displays, soldier testimonies, as well as the evolution of Franco-German relations.

Between the Munster and Kaysersberg valleys, this remembrance site commemorates the Battle of the Linge (1915), one of the bloodiest of World War I. This confrontation caused nearly 20,000 casualties —killed, wounded, or missing—on both the French and German sides. The memorial includes a museum, the battlefield, and its preserved trenches.

Three walking trails with various levels of difficulty cross through the heart of the trenches. The museum houses a collection of artefacts recovered from the battlefield and a video providing historical context on the Battle of the Linge. The site is an immersion into the life of the soldiers at this place and time.

> Haute-Alsace Memorial in Dannemarie

Located near Kilometre Zero, marking one of the ends of the Franco-German front, the Haute-Alsace Memorial invites visitors to discover the lives of both soldiers and civilians during World War I in Sundgau. Two exhibitions are on display: the Haute-Alsace Memorial collection boasts a notable set of uniforms, and the Forgotten Trenches collection focuses on the daily life of soldiers in the trenches.

Three other notable sites dedicated to World War I:

- The Abri-Mémoire in Uffholtz: a former medical shelter from World War I, the Abri-Mémoire is now a cultural centre run by the Thann-Cernay local council. The exhibitions focus on the themes of remembrance, citizenship, and peace.

- The Serret Museum in Saint-Amarin: in a former military hospital, the Serret Museum has one of the most extensive collections of weapons and equipment from World War I. An area of the museum is dedicated to the Alsatian resistance during World War II.

- The Alpine Ambulance Museum in Mittlach: nestled in a former glacial valley, this interpretive centre focuses on the war in the Munster Valley. The museum is housed in an old medical post that treated wounded soldiers and civilians from 1915 to 1918. The site also includes a remembrance trail exploring the impact of the war on locals, whether active participants or not.

> Fort Schoenenbourg and Fort Four-à-Chaux

Fort Schoenenburg in the north of Alsace, is the largest artillery fortification of the Maginot Line in Alsace, with three kilometres of galleries. The visit unfolds 30 metres underground and explores the operations of this monumental structure and the daily life of the garrison. Dormitories, kitchens, the infirmary, command posts: the still-intact original facilities provide a glimpse into how the soldiers lived underground. A 4-km outdoor path follows the fort's visible sections, offering insights into its strategic location.

Visitors can extend their outing at Fort Four-à-Chaux overlooking the nearby village of Lembach. Guarding the Sauer Valley, this mountain fortification has a unique two-level design, featuring an impressive inclined plane to make up for the elevation difference. The 1.5-km tour immerses visitors in the kitchen, dormitories, hospital, and officers' quarters to understand the fort's organisation and operations. The visit ends with a demonstration deploying one of the combat turrets, followed by the descent of the 215 steps of the inclined plane.

> Memorial Museum of the Rhine Maginot line

Built as a memorial, the Marckolsheim casemate is a standard fortification featuring two firing chambers designed to defend a key passage over the Rhine River. It commemorates the fierce battles of 15-17 June 1940, when over 80% of the town of Marckolsheim was destroyed. The museum displays numerous objects and documents.

Other sites of the Maginot line to discover include

- The Haute-Alsace Maginot Memorial in Uffheim: the only authentically restored Maginot Line fortification open to the public in Haut-Rhin. This reinforced concrete casemate has been restored and outfitted to reflect its original state during 1939-1940. An adjoining museum presents a series of multimedia displays that vividly recount the major stages of the conflict in Haut-Rhin.

- The Musée de l'Abri in Hatten: located 1 km behind the Maginot Line, this bunker served as barracks for the crews. The site is now a museum, housing an impressive collection of military equipment and exhibits retracing the battle of January 1945, one of the largest tank battles in France. > abrihatten.fr

> European Centre of Deported Resistance Members - Site of the former Natzweiler-Struthof concentration camp

Le Struthof is home to the remains of the only German concentration camp on French soil. It opened in May 1941 to provide the Reich with slave labour for its industry. A total of 52,000 people, mainly political deportees and resistance fighters, passed through this camp or one of its satellite camps. Nearly a third of them perished.

Within the former camp, visitors can explore four barracks, including the prison and the crematorium, as well as a historical museum. The gas chamber is also open to the public, located 1.5 km downhill.

In 2005, the site was expanded with the European Centre of Deported Resistance Members. The vast 2,000-m² site includes a permanent exhibition about Nazis and resistance as well as educational rooms and a temporary exhibition space.

> Battle of the Colmar Pocket Memorial Museum

This museum in the heart of Turckheim showcases an exceptional collection of objects that meticulously detail the history of the battles of the Colmar Pocket.

In the vaulted cellar of a former 18th-century presbytery, the museum recounts the two months of fighting to liberate Colmar during the harsh winter of 1944-1945. Two exhibition rooms display weapons, equipment, uniforms, posters, photographs, and mannequins representing the German, American, and French armies, alongside scale models of tanks and fighter planes.

MM Park

Covering 7,000 m², this military museum is one of the largest museums in Europe dedicated to World War II. Its extensive collection is dedicated to the war and its key participants, with hundreds of mannequins, armoured vehicles, trucks, light vehicles, motorcycles, personal items, an airplane, and even a floating German patrol boat. The themed game area adds a fun dimension, featuring two flight simulators, a treetop adventure course, and an air rifle shooting range.

Walbourg Memorial Museum 1870-1945

This museum explores the conflicts in Alsace from 1870 to 1945, with a particular focus on World War II. It showcases more than 7,000 authentic objects, mostly from northern Alsace. The immersive and realistic displays, including sensory exhibits with elements of sound and smell, aim to give the visitors a true sense of the war.

Several necropolises and cemeteries from World War II are worth a visit:

- The National Necropolis of Sigolsheim: located on one of the deadliest sectors of the Alsatian front, this military cemetery was established at the request of Marshal Lattre de Tassigny. It contains the graves of 1,589 soldiers of the French army.
- The German cemetery of Niederbronn-les-Bains: located on a hill, it holds the remains of 15,809 German soldiers who fell in northeastern France, particularly during Operation Nordwind, the last German counter-offensive of World War II. The nearby Albert Schweitzer Centre highlights the stories of twelve individuals among these victims.
- The German military cemetery in Grasberg: the remains of more than 5,000 German soldiers have been interred in this cemetery since 1975 on a site that blends seamlessly with the landscapes of the Bergheim vineyard.

> Alsace-Moselle Memorial

The Alsace-Moselle Memorial takes visitors on an interactive historical journey through the complex history of Alsace and Moselle, a region tossed between nations by the tides of war, changing nationalities four times between 1871 and 1945. The site focuses on World War II, when Alsace and Moselle were the only parts of France to be de facto annexed by the Third Reich, suffering the violence of a totalitarian system.

The final museum space is dedicated to Franco-German reconciliation and European integration, offering a universal history lesson on the importance of uniting Europeans. The displays explore the major milestones in the construction of Europe. The site helps visitors understand the cultural identity of Alsace-Moselle and appreciate the region's strong attachment to Europe.

> European institutions in Strasbourg

After World War II, Strasbourg was chosen as a <u>symbol of reconciliation</u> to host the newly formed European institutions. The city is home to the Council of Europe, the European Court of Human Rights, the European Science Foundation, the European Directorate for the Quality of Medicines & Healthcare, and more. The European Parliament is the only of Strasbourg's European institutions open to the public.

The visit of the European Parliament, the world's only directly elected transnational parliament, is a unique opportunity to explore the hemicycle where the deputies of the 27 European Union member countries meet each month. The building stands out with its elliptical design of glass, metal, and wood. Its designers, Architecture Studio, imagined an ocean liner slicing through the waves.

The inside of the building, in particular the Parlamentarium Simone Veil offers an immersive and interactive visit exploring the role of deputies, the political missions of the institution, and its impact on the daily life of European citizens.

Near the European Parliament, the Lieu d'Europe aims to familiarise citizens with Europe and strengthen a sense of belonging to a community of shared values. The site features a permanent exhibition space, a resource centre run by the European Information Centre, as well as meeting and discussion rooms.

Exploring the trails



The bunker trail: this easy path follows the front line, dotted with German bunkers from World War I built by the German army. Educational panels along the way provide historical context. The itinerary includes plenty of remarkable sites including mills, a washhouse, and the Hagendorn spring.

• Paths of remembrance: in the Val d'Argent, two 8-km interpretive trails take hikers along the front line of World War I. Starting from the Col de Sainte-Marie-aux-Mines mountain pass, this path winds through the forest along the ridge line that marked the border between France and Germany. Along the route are remnants of the Great War: trenches, fortified shelters, and even an old cistern. Each stage recalls the tumultuous history of this area where French and German soldiers once clashed.

• The Smugglers' Trail: this thematic trail highlights a unique episode of World War II: the smugglers who helped people escape annexed Alsace across the border along the ridge monitored by German troops. The fugitives included escaped prisoners, soldiers, civilians, and Alsatians unwilling to submit to the demands of the Nazis. The border crossings were made possible by the daring smugglers who had an expert knowledge of the forest and mountains.

• The Wild Boar Trail: this nature walk in Grand Ried invites hikers to follow the course of human history. Guided by a boar emblem, visitors uncover the trail's hidden treasures while learning about the battles of January 1945 in Grussenheim.

Cycling and mountain biking routes

• Bike loop The Strasbourg fort belt this local loop created by Alsace by Bike takes visitors along the remains of the defensive forts built around Strasbourg by the Germans after the war of 1870. Some of the sites are open to visitors, including Fort Rapp in Reichstett and Fort Frère in Oberhausbergen. Blending history and nature, the itinerary showcases diverse landscapes, with breathtaking views from the Hausbergen hills overlooking the Strasbourg Eurometropolis and its impressive Notre-Dame Cathedral.

• Bike loop: on the trail of the Great War.

This rather challenging local loop crosses the ridges of the Vosges Mountains, leading to remembrance sites commemorating the battles of World War I.

Distance: 38.7 km Difficulty: regular cyclists (704 m of elevation gain) > cyclinginalsace.com

• Mountain biking circuit - in the footsteps of a giant: Initially designed for hikers, this circuit is also adapted to mountain biking. It explores the military heritage of Fort Mutzig while immersing visitors in the medieval charms of Mutzig's historic town centre and the natural beauty of the foothills of the Vosges.

• Firstacker mountain biking circuit: this challenging circuit climbs the ridges near the historic Hartmannswillerkopf summit (Vieil Armand) and Zeller's canteen. The area is steeped in history: the old village at the foot of the battlefield witnessed clashes between German and French troops during World War I. Today, the site includes the canteen building, a chapel, a large terrace, and bunkers converted into a museum.

> Originally military roads, the Peak Route and the Joffre Route are now popular tourist itineraries. They offer breathtaking landscapes as well as access to iconic mountain passes, farmhouse inns, and hiking trails.

Fluo Grand Est: bike hire at the train station

The Grand Est region will launch the Fluo bike rental system in spring 2025. Created to enhance the train travel experience, the initiative will cater to both occasional riders and TER pass holders. The service will roll out in phases, with 52 train stations selected for the initial launch, including around twenty in Alsace.

Getting around in Alsace

Service: water refill points (Bruche Valley)

Hel'eau la Bruche: Alsace's first water refill network. The Vallée de la Bruche Tourist Office, aiming to reduce plastic waste in natural spaces, has worked with residents, businesses, town halls, and local sites to identify over 100 water refill points for tourists, including walkers, hikers, and cyclists. Visitors can refill their bottles for free during opening hours of public places or directly from participating residents.

The renovation at the intriguing Zoological Museum aims to modernise the collections, streamline the displays, showcase the reserves, improve the visitor experience, and develop scientific engagement programmes for diverse audiences. Upon completion, 2,600 m² will be dedicated to the museum, including 2,000 m² for exhibitions (compared to 1,500 m² previously) and 600 m² for the reception area, school groups, and educational workshops. The four exhibition spaces will address different themes: the animal world, local ecosystems, global biodiversity, and nature in the laboratory. The reopening is scheduled for the first half of 2025.






MAJOR EVENT: 150th anniversary of the birth of Albert Schweitzer > ALSACE > 2025

To mark its 25th anniversary, the Musée de l'Image Populaire - François Lotz pays tribute to the collection of François Lotz, one of its founders. The exhibition retraces the history of this curation through 80 works by more than 40 artists, including paintings, drawings, prints, engravings, some of which have never been exhibited. highlights Ιt various perspectives on Alsace, with a particular focus on the works of Lothar von Seebach, a key figure of the exhibition. The collection encompasses Alsatian art from the 18th to 20th century, reflecting on the region's social and political contexts through landscapes, folkloric scenes, and portraits of Alsatian women. The exhibition also explores the impact of artistic movements such as Romanticism and Impressionism, while celebrating the diversity of Alsatian art through the ages.

Exhibition "Child's Play. Alsace and the origins of children's illustrations, 19th - 20th centuries" at Galerie Heitz > STRASBOURG > 8 November 2024 to 17 February 2025




This exhibition focuses on the key role of Alsace, and particularly Strasbourg, in the creation of illustrated works for children starting in the 19th century. Artists and publishers such as Gustave Doré, Théophile Schuler, and Pierre-Jules Hetzel were pioneers in this adventure blending education and entertainment. Early works inspired by Christoph von Schmidt were followed by public instruction books. The increased accessibility of images, including the picture books produced in Wissembourg, gave children the opportunity to discover new leisure activities. From the 1820s onward, images became central to children's books. The exhibition also explores illustrations of Alsatian fairy tales and the use of imagery for propaganda during wartime.

The period from 1939 to 1945 was a dark time for the Humanist Library, as it was for society in Alsace as a whole. The written heritage of Sélestat faced significant threats in an ideological context marked by a widespread effort to nazify the population.

This exhibition examines the challenges of preserving the heritage of the Humanist Library from 1938 to the Liberation, as well as the ways the written legacy of the Renaissance was co-opted to celebrate the literary glories of the so-called "eternal Germany" promoted by the Nazi regime.

Marking the 80th anniversary of the Liberation, this exhibition is presented in collaboration with SPAL, the Alsace-Lorraine association of specialists in postmarks and cancellations.

Letters, envelopes, postal forms, postage stamps, and postmarks provide a glimpse into the communication and daily life of ordinary citizens during this time. Postal documents starkly reveal the Nazis' control over Alsace and Moselle from 1940 to 1945. In an effort to erase all traces of France, the Nazis introduced new postmarks with Germanized names and issued their own stamps. Mail sent from Alsace and Moselle to the rest of France and abroad were subject to rigorous control by both French and German authorities.

Exhibition "The Man Eater" at the Hartmannswillerkopf Historial > WATTWILLER > 1 April to 11 November 2025

In December 1915, the battles at Hartmannswillerkopf reached their peak. Nearly 20,000 French and German soldiers clashed along only a few kilometres. The French offensive on 21 December was followed by a violent German counterattack, resulting in devastating losses with hundreds killed, wounded, or captured. The German 14th Jäger Battalion and the French 152nd Infantry Regiment were nearly wiped out.

"The Man-Eater", an exhibition organized by the National Monument Committee of Hartmannswillerkopf, pays tribute to these men through the intertwined stories of French and German soldiers. It also celebrates the centenary of the 152nd Infantry Regiment's adoption of the Red Devil insignia, a nickname earned after the regiment seized the summit in March 1915. This iconic symbol will take centre stage in this exhibition commemorating 110 years of Hartmannswillerkopf's history.



Africa area at Mulhouse's Zoo and Botanical Park> MULHOUSE

In 2025, the Zoo and Botanical Gardens of Mulhouse (m2A), a European centre for conservation and knowledge welcomes around fifty species as ambassadors of African biodiversity in a new space named Horizon Afrique. For the first time in Mulhouse, giraffes, pygmy hippos, venomous snakes, and amphibians will be showcased to the public. This is the largest project undertaken by Mulhouse's Zoo and Botanical Gardens (m2A) since its creation 155 years ago. It requires significant developments over 1.5 ha, including 1 ha of savannah, an immersive 1,200 m² building for giraffes, 11 terrariums, a multi-species aguarium, a 500 m² immersive tropical greenhouse featuring aquavision for the pygmy hippos and crocodiles, as well as 2 islands to host guenon monkeys.

The project aligns with the park's missions and aims to:

- · Raise awareness among visitors about the conservation of two endangered African ecosystems (the Upper Guinean rainforest, shrub savanna) by presenting species in their natural habitats and providing an immersive and educational experience.
- · Offer an immersive visit with different viewing areas to observe the animals both on land and in aquariums and terrariums.
- Introduce new species as a part of conservation programmes: giraffes, gazelles, red-necked ostriches, pygmy hippos, amphibians, reptiles, and endangered insects.

Other species already in the park will join the new African space for their well-being: to support their conservation in optimal conditions and promote breeding for reintroduction into their original natural habitats once they have been protected.
