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




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DOCTORS BAG

In 1960, President John Kennedy revealed his dream that Americans would walk on the surface of the moon before ten more years had passed. In that same year, the Surgeon General of the United States, Luther Terry, announced the results of a federal task force study that showed that syphilis would be totally eradicated from the U.S. by the year 1970. The virginity of the moon and the disease syphilis were both to be abolished during the 10-year period. Only one of the two dreams would become reality. How strange, the nation that could put men on the moon could not rid itself of a dread disease — a disease for which it had a cure!

For while science had the tools for destroying the disease, it could not overcome that one uncontrollable factor — public ignorance and embarrassment. As unbelievable as it seems, a large majority of our modern era population does not know the symptoms of syphilis. And even worse, there are still those who DO know they have the disease, but are shy about seeking medical aid because they still think of the disease in religious terms and would rather have the infection than admit that they have "sinned." Unfortunately, this phoney moralism does not stop them from spreading the "sin" to others.

Doctors would never have known how great the spread of syphilis had been in the United States had it not been for World War II. For while many men might have desired to keep their disease a secret, there was no way to hide the truth during an army draft

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


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physical. The doctors began to realize how big the syphilis epidemic had become, and they were shocked. Of the 12 million men called to service more than 170,000 required treatment for syphilis before they could be placed on active duty. To quickly cure infected men for the draft and to treat the civilian population without hindering the war effort, drastic steps were taken.

Special therapy facilities, known as rapid treatment centers, were established throughout the country by the Lanham Act, passed in 1943. These centers provided intensive syphilis therapy for thousands upon thousands of military men. Controls were also established to treat infected men prior to their discharge into civilian life.

Shortly after the close of World War II, 63 V.D. centers had been established and were treating more than 185,000 persons each year for all stages of syphilis. But then the situation seemed to get even better. New drug treatment, including penicillin, allowed doctors to treat their own patients for syphilis faster and easier. U.S. citizens need no longer spend days getting "cured" at a V.D.

center as they had before. All they had to do was get a couple of shots from their doctor for early-stage treatment. No wonder they thought that surely syphilis could be wiped out by the year 1970. It seemed so easy.

But as we've learned, the shallow thinking of the people made the final solution evasive. The syphilis epidemic in this country is growing, even faster than the peak spreading years of World War II. The efforts to educate the people about the symptoms of syphilis have been slowed by religious "do good-ers" who feel syphilis is not a fit topic for public education. They think it is better to continue having the disease in the U.S. than show what the disease is like on radio, television and billboards along the highway.

So the ignorance spreads. How much do you know about syphilis? Are you aware of the new developments concerning the disease that have come along in the last six years? Do you know about the syphilis that shows no symptoms that you might have been taught to recognize? Do you know the ailments that syphilis causes that you may have thought was something else? Can syphilis kill you without knowing it? We'll discuss the answers to these questions next time.

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
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


